No Longer Silent as the Northford Store Moves Forward



Mario Di Gioia is the owner of Don Mar, the construction company that built the Northford Store back in 2010. For many years he was a silent partner in the business but earlier this year he took over 100% ownership.

As sole owner, Mario decided to make a commitment to improve the stores daily operation.

"The main focus will be to serve the needs of the customers by increasing stock in the store and carrying many new items," Mario explained.

The meat department has already seen an increase in traffic with some of the new features like bone-in pork chops, pork cutlets, Italian seasoned store made porchetta, beef soup shanks and store made meatballs, as well as Italian seasoned bracciole.

"We are carrying Italian foods such as Parma prosciutto, mortadella with pistachio nuts, fresh mozzarella and burata. Also, a variety of olives such as Italian dry cured, green and red cerignola and Castelton vetrano."

He has also added Grande imported cheeses, and a host of other Italian foods from Napoli Foods. Add to this a full line of fresh frozen fish and this store is now a full service to the community.

If this isn't enough, Mario is planning an expansion with a goal of sixty days, the store will expand the old coffee and ice cream shop and will offer freshly made prepared foods, for customer convenience. The plan is to serve coffee, full breakfast and hot and cold lunch, as well as prepared dinners to go. "We are looking forward to not only serving our current customer base but expanding our clientele by fulfilling a need and having a reputation for superior customer satisfaction. We have initiated our community outreach by donating 10 Thanksgiivng turkeys to the Northford Congregational Church, and 100 turkeys at cost to Metronics to distribute to theNew Haven Soup Kitchen.

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
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State Representative Vincent Candelora



As I write this column, we're just days away from the opening day of the 2023 legislative session, when 151 state representatives and 36 state senators elected in November will begin their new two-year terms.

I'm honored to be among these elected officials, many of whom spent their summer and fall knocking on doors to introduce themselves to voters

The legislative session runs through the beginning of June. As always, I walk into the five-month period hopeful that the Democrat majority and Republican minority can find common ground on the biggest issues—particularly, those that affect your wallet. What goes underreported is how often we work and vote together on smaller issues that may not garner big headlines yet carry significant impact on our lives each and every day.

Affordability has been and remains a top issue for me, and recently I've found it encouraging to hear Gov. Lamont endorse the idea of a middle-class tax cut similar to the reduction Republicans proposed twice last year—cutting the income tax rate from 5 percent to 4 percent for individuals earning \$75k or less and joint filers earning \$175k. In a move to make our state more business friendly, the governor has pitched reducing a corporate surcharge that's been a sore spot for the business sector. I'm hopeful that he'll look at other taxes, too, such as a recent pass-through entity tax increase affecting businesses and the 1 percent meals tax.


Given that this a long session when all legislators can submit individual bill proposals—only committee bills are allowed in the short session, or even numbered years—it's likely that we'll tackle a wide variety of other subjects.

Among them are headline-grabbers, such as the high cost of home energy and construction of a framework for early voting, and those that won't gain much coverage in the media, such as adding legislative appointments to the state Board of Education. I look forward to telling you more about these topics, and my specific proposals, as the session takes shape.

At this point, the details of how we'll conduct business—virtual versus in-person—have yet to be finalized. I remain a proponent of doing as much as possible, if not all our work, in the building. With that said, I recognize that the Covid pandemic may have made virtual meeting rooms, and public hearings in particular, a permanent component in the legislative process. I'll share more information with you as this picture becomes clearer.

Want to be Guilt Free in '23? Hit the Reset Button



Here we are at the end of the holiday season. Sunday launched a new year. Some of us may still have some decorations lying around or even gifts yet to be delivered. The one thing not to let linger is the guilt you might be feeling from enjoying too many holiday treats.

I attended a Zoom meeting recently and something that was said resonated with me in regard to changing course if we're not happy with the path we're on. In making a point about always being free to start again, someone used the analogy of a gym membership stating, "If you sign up for 12 months

and don't go for 3, it doesn't mean you can't go for the rest of the year - just hit the reset button." Although those words aren't deeply profound, at that moment they hit me in a deeply profound way.

It's our self talk that often gets in the way of our progress, whether it's health related or otherwise. We replay the tape in our head of what we shouldn't have eaten, which also zaps the joy out of the actual occasion itself. It can be toxic and destructive to both physical and mental health. Replaying those thoughts allows them to dictate our actions, which when it comes to food, more often than not translates into not eating or skipping meals in an



attempt to balance the numbers. This type of negative talk leads to a cycle of chronic dieting. Deprivation is not the answer.

Taxpayers, residents and non-residents of the Town of North Branford are hereby notified that the second installment of Real Estate, Motor Vehicle, and Personal Property taxes on the October 1, 2021 Grand List for the Town of North Branford, are due and payable on January 1, 2023. Payments will be received up to and including February 1, 2023 without interest. Supplemental Motor Vehicle tax bills pursuant to Section 12-71B will be due and payable in one installment on January 1, 2023. Supplemental Motor Vehicle tax includes vehicles registered between October 2, 2021 and July 31, 2022. Taxes are considered delinquent as of February 2, 2023, unless POSTMARKED FEBRUARY 1, 2023, and will be charged 1½ % interest per month, from the due date, or a minimum of \$2.00. All delinquent Motor Vehicle files will be sent to the DMV for non-renewal of their registrations. You may pay your tax bill in person at the Tax Collector's Office at the North Branford Town Hall, 909 Foxon Road, North Branford. Office hours are Monday through Friday, 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Tax Payments on Real Estate, Personal Property, Motor Vehicle and Supplemental MV can also be made with credit card, debit card or an electronic fund transfer from your checking account by going to the Town of North Branford's website, www.townofnorthbranfordct.com, and go to the link for online services or in the tax office. There is a fee for this service. If payments are made by mail and a receipt is required, please enclose a self-addressed stamped envelope along with the tax bill and check made payable to the Tax Collector, Town of North Branford. Mail must be postmarked no later than midnight February 1, 2023. Postmarks after February 1, 2023 are considered late and will be charged interest from January 1, 2023. If you have misplaced your tax bill, call the Tax Collector's Office at 203-484-6011. Failure to receive a tax bill does not invalidate the tax or any interest that may accrue per State Statutes 12-130 and 12-145.






