I'm a former 30 year resident of Harrison Road and a 15 year retiree of Tilcon North Branford. I'm acutely aware of the hazards of a propane storage facility as I filled the tanks from bulk storage while working for Tilcon. I also had a mishap while building my in-law apartment.

We hadn't installed windows or doors and were roughing in when someone in the North Farms condos released the remaining gas in his grill tank so he could "get a full tank for his money". The gas is heavy and hugs the ground. It enveloped the apartment and my house. A spark would have been a catastrophe, never mind that a youngster among the onlookers out in the street was smoking a cigarette.

Every day I see people smoking cigarettes and using cell phones while pumping gasoline. Do you think anybody in the vicinity of this facility will be MORE diligent? Will the Town ban smoking on Ciro Road? As for the Town P&Z, Rivezzi's closed one day after Christmas. I knew something was a foot when soon after there was a gaggle of P&Z Board members walking the site. Two weeks later came the announcement that a Big Y was coming. No hearing, no referendum.

My former wife and I fought down a proposed Industrial complex on the bend in Route 139 near School Ground Rd and we were successful in getting a buffer between our yards and the North Farms condos which, incidentally was proposed as a 325 unit complex with a rec center. pool, Tennis Court and instead 525 living quarters were built.

The Town has always striven to bring in tax base at any cost and under the radar when possible. The more isolated Northford section of town is less of a risk being less populated and 5 years since I moved to Florida, there is still no Industry at that end of town. Maybe the residents of Northford have always had the right idea. McDonald's brought traffic and trash, Big Y put Central Market out of business and

Declare Personl Property

PERSONAL PROPERTY

All Personal Property must be declared to the Assessor's Office by NO-VEMBER 3, 2014 for the Grand List of 2014.

Personal Property is described as follows: Business machinery & equipment, computers & computer equipment, office furniture & fixtures, unregistered motor vehicles, farm tools & machinery, and other miscellaneous personal property. *Real estate and registered motor vehicles need not be declared.*

ALL declarations *must* be either returned or postmarked no later than November 3, 2014 in order to avoid a 25% penalty. Requests for an extension of up to 45 days is available *for just cause*. All accounts are subject to audit.

Declarations are available either on-line or in the Assessor's Office. For more information, please contact the Assessor's Office at 203.484-6013.

FARM AND FOREST LAND

New applications for property owners claiming land as FARM or FOR-EST land must be filed by October 31, 2014 in order to qualify for PA490 for the 2014 Grand List. Applications are available on the Assessor's Web Page.

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PLANNING FOR THE FUTURE

The new mantra of the baby boomer generation is beginning to sound something like: "I'm getting older, I'm not in the best of health, I'm worried about the costs of long term care, and I'm scared to death." This is the kind of stuff that keeps people (including myself) up at night. I wish that I could tell my clients not to worry, that it's going to be alright, but often times it's not alright. The effects of aging take over and many people end up in a nursing home and then the financial pain begins. A long term stay in a nursing home can be financially devastating. It can completely exhaust your estate, leaving nothing for your surviving spouse or heirs.

The sooner you plan for this possibility the better. Time can be both your worst enemy and your biggest ally, depending on how you approach the problem. Often, I am contacted by the families of people who are literally on their way to a nursing home- at this point time is not on their side. Sure, we can preserve some assets but only a fraction. I call this approach the "emergency planning mode." It is kind of like being on a game show, but the prize is your own "stuff" and you win by getting the privilege of keeping some of your own "stuff." Emergency Planning Mode is, of course, not the best approach to the problem.

The best time to plan is well in advance of needing nursing home care. Given enough time and proper planning all of your assets can be preserved and sheltered from the costs of nursing home care. Many people utilize irrevocable trusts to protect and preserve assets long term. This is the best option for dodging the nursing home cost bullet, which can be financially devastating for you and your family. Irrevocable trusts are also a great way to avoid probate and to ensure that you can pass something on to your heirs or favorite charity.

If you're worried about the cost of long term care, get out in front of the problem. Make an appointment with a qualified estate planning attorney and see what can be done to protect your assets. Just because you can't take it with you doesn't mean that you have to give it to the nursing home.

Senator Ed Meyer More Chances to Vote



During the last few years, the majority of states in our country have increased voting rights by, for example, permitting no excuse absentee ballots and by permitting voters to vote early before Election Day. Connecticut has not yet made those advances, but our voters will have the opportunity on November 4 when we will be able to approve a ballot resolution which will open up our voting rights. Don't miss that resolution on the top of your ballot on Election Day!

The Connecticut Constitution currently re-

stricts voting by absentee ballot. A voter can only use such a ballot if he or she will be out of town or are disabled or are members of a religion that prohibits secular activity on Election Day. The November 4 ballot resolution this year will allow our State Legislature to expand the absentee ballot system, probably to allow any voter for any reason to vote by absentee ballot by mail.

Early voting will also be permitted if we approve the ballot resolution on November 4, although the State Legislature will have the discretion as to the conditions of such a vote. How many days before Election Day? Where can you cast your early vote and at what hours?

A bill is likely to be drafted in 2015 which will describe these specific details, and a public hearing will be held on the proposal with plenty of opportunity to be heard. In my personal view, I would not like to see early voting of any more than five days before Election Day.

The experience of other states which have extended these voting rights has been an increase in the number of voters by 2% to 10%. That is progress in the exercise of our fundamental voting right in a democracy.

Expanded voting rights are particularly suggested by the historical fact that only about 60%, on the average, vote in general elections and only about 20% in primary elections. For that reason, I thought it extraordinary that when our state legislature voted recently on these new voting rights, the vote was strictly partisan, all Democrats voting yes and all Republicans voting no.

Let's be more non-partisan on this issue when we vote on November 4.

I am confident that Northford is about to become internationally famous as the home of the world's oldest living chicken. Probably as the home of the oldest chicken to have ever lived. "Banty" didn't have an official name until now, but since those listed on the internet and in the Guinness Book of Records are all glorified with names it's time she goes down in history officially as "Banty".

For years we have watched in awe as this Banty Cross goes on living and laying eggs regularly. Figuring that I was 74 when I bought her and am now 97 she has to be at least 23 years old. I remember looking to buy some chickens those years ago, when I saw an ad in the old Farmers Bulletin advertising laying pullets for sale by a person in the Bridgeport area. When we got there I saw the most motley group of chickens I ever laid my eyes on. No two were alike, but it was evident that all had some Banty in them. The fellow selling them gave me a lengthy sales pitch as how they were excellent layers. Having been brought up on a farm in which chickens were our main source of income it was my job to earn my 35 cents weekly allowance by helping Pa deliver the egg route every Saturday morning. Knowing the importance of the eggs having to be all the same color and about the same size I knew these weren't going to be that, but since they were just for us, so they were a little different in size and color. The gentleman was walking with obvious pain so asked if his legs bothered him. "I hurt all over. I'm too old to take care of the chickens that's why I'm getting rid of them". Asking how old he was, he said, "You won't believe I'm 68".

My usual response to these young old people was, "Your just a kid". "How old are you"? came the usual response. When I said, "74" he couldn't believe it and obviously thought I was kidding him. I am using this as my proof of Banty's age.

Now, all the records I can find on the internet relate of one hen that lived to be 16, but never laid an egg. Another in Britain was 17 and aroused much notoriety, because she had suddenly laid a couple of eggs after a 13 year hiatus. She got a full page pictorial with her owner holding a white egg that a viewer questioned the authenticity of since he said only chickens with white waffles laid white eggs and this one certainly didn't. Another claimed his parents had the oldest some years previous that died at 22.

Now you won't believe the wonder Banty is. Oh yes, Banty has never lived a

pampered life like those on the internet all of which are or were pets, living in special cages under ideal climatic conditions. Banty lives with the other chickens battling for her share of the food and earning her space in their society. She lays, about a pullets size white egg and has been laying without stop, except for the time she is moulting, which is at least every two months. During this time she clucks and jumps in any nest there are eggs to sit on. If we steal them from under her she jumps in any other nest until she gives up and starts laying again. In fact there are 3 eggs sitting in our refrigerator right now and will be part of whatever member of the family stops for the eggs needed for whatever.

Not only is she a wonder, I doubt there are any older people than we who can lay claim to the privilege of having such a wonder blessing their lives. Our cnlckens are never put in a pot or denied the fruits of their labor. In fact we even eat the same food as they. Well, not quite. We don't eat theirs, but we feed them any left overs they relish as desert. When their laying days are over they go on in retirement with the same privileges they enjoyed while working.

**This is a special session for those whose rights mature: have reached the age of 18; people who have become citizens and/or have moved into town after October 28, 2014.

Please also note that mail-in voter registrations must be postmarked by October 21, 2014.

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Home Fires

In 2011, U.S. fire departments responded to 370,000 home structure fires. These fires caused 13,910 civilian injuries, 2,520 civilian deaths, \$6.9 billion in direct damage. On average, seven people died in U.S. home fires per day from 2007 to 2011.

Cooking is the leading cause home fires and home fire injuries, followed heating equipment. Smoking is a leading cause of civilian home fire deaths.

Most fatal fires kill one or two people. In 2012, 8 home fires killed five or more people resulting in a total of 44 deaths.

Smoke Alarms

Almost three of five (60%) of reported home fire deaths in 2007 to 2011 resulted from fires in homes with no smoke alarms or no working smoke alarms. Working smoke alarms cut the risk of dying in reported home fires in half. In fires considered large enough to activate the smoke alarm, hardwired alarms operated 93% of the time, while battery powered alarms operated only 79% of the time. When smoke alarms fail to operate, it is usually because batteries are missing, disconnected, or dead.

An ionization smoke alarm is generally more responsive to flaming fires and a photoelectric smoke alarm is generally more responsive to smoldering fires. For the best protection, or where extra time is needed, to awaken or assist others, both types of alarms, or combination ionization and photoelectric alarms are recommended.

Escape Planning

According to an NFPA survey, only one-third of Americans have both developed and practiced a home fire escape plan. Almost three-quarters of Americans do have an escape plan; however, more than half never practiced it. One-third (32%) of respondents who made an estimate thought they would have at least 6 minutes before a fire in their home would become life threatening. The time available is often less. Only 8% said their first thought on hearing a smoke alarm would be to get out!

Cooking

U.S. Fire Departments responded to an estimated annual average of 156,600 cooking-related fires between 2007-2011, resulting in 400 civilian deaths, 5,080 civilian injuries and \$853 million in direct damage. Two of every five home fires started in the kitchen. Unattended cooking was a factor in 34% of reported home cooking fires. Two-thirds of home cooking fires started with ignition of food or other cooking materials. Ranges accounted for the 57% of home cooking fire incidents. Ovens accounted for 16%.

Children under five face a higher risk of non-fire burns associated with cooking and hot food and drinks than being burned in a cooking fire.

Microwave ovens are one of the leading home products associated with scald burn injuries not related to fires. According to the National Electronic Injury Surveillance System, two out of five of the microwave oven injuries seen at emergency rooms in 2011 were scald burns.

Clothing was the item first ignited in less than 1% of home cooking fires, but these incidents accounted for 15% of the cooking fire deaths.

Heating

The leading factor contributing to heating equipment fires was failure to clean, principally creosote from solid fueled heating equipment, primarily chimneys. Portable or fixed space heaters, including wood stoves, were involved in one-third (33%) of home heating fires and four out of five (81%) home heating deaths. Half of home heating fire deaths resulted from fires caused by heating equipment too close to things that can burn, such as upholstered furniture, clothing, mattresses or bedding. In most years, heating equipment is the second leading cause of home fires, fire deaths, and fire injuries. Fixed or portable space heaters are involved in about 4 out of 5 heating fire deaths.

Smoking Materials

During 2007-2011 smoking materials caused an estimated 17,900 home structure fires, resulting in 580 deaths, 1,280 injuries and \$509 million in direct property damage, per year. Sleep was a factor in 31% of the home smoking material fire deaths. Possible alcohol impairment was a factor in one in five (18%) of home smoking fire deaths.

In recent years, Canada and the United States have required that all cigarettes sold must be "fire safe," that is have reduced ignition strength and less likely to start fires.

Electrical

About half (48%) of home electrical fires involved electrical distribution or lighting equipment. Other leading types of equipment were washer or dryer, fan, portable or stationary space heater, air conditioning equipment water heater and range. Electrical failure or malfunctions caused an average of almost 48,000 home fires per year, resulting in roughly 450 deaths and nearly \$1.5 billion in direct property damage.

Candles

During 2007-2011 candles caused 3% of home fires, 4% of home fire deaths, 7% of home fire injuries and 6% of direct property damage from home fires.

On average, there are 32 home candle fires reported per day.

More than one-third of these fires (36%) started in the bedroom; however, the candle industry found that only 13% of candle users burn candles in the bedroom most often.

Nearly three in five candle fires (56%) start when things that can burn are too close to the candle.





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
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
