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## Risk Assessment - Part I

#### Deal Dation.

More than a century ago, Big Pharma used us as its lab rats. At the end of the 19<sup>th</sup> century vaccines were being developed for typhoid, smallpox, cholera and the bubonic plague without regulatory oversight. People fell victim to manufacturing shortcuts when untested products were rushed to market. In 1902 the first regulatory testing and restrictions were required by the Biologics Control Act after a contaminated diphtheria antitoxin caused tetanus outbreaks in St. Louis and a deadly smallpox vaccine was sold in New Jersey. In 1954 the Division of Biologics

Historically, it has taken two to four years to get a vaccine through pre-clinical tests in an array of tissue-culture and animal testing designed to assess vaccine safety and viability before any human testing. An Investigational New Drug application must be filed with the FDA, describe planned manufacturing and testing processes, summarize laboratory studies, and propose a process for safe human testing and the assessment of long-term effects. An institutional review board must approve and oversee this process. *continued on page 4*

# **For the Health of it** Giving Thanks for 2nd Helpings!

Although an attitude of gratitude is best practiced year round, November brings a holiday designated to doing just that. Giving thanks is not only good for the soul, studies show it also benefits physical and mental well-being such as less depression, a boosted immune system, and better sleep. So if gratitude isn't on your daily "to do" list, this may be a good time to give thought to the things that mean the most to you.

In addition to drawing attention toward our blessings, Thanksgiving kicks off the holiday season as the gateway to multiple celebrations that center

around enjoying good food. The anticipation of a bountiful table with all our favorite things can conjure up good feelings, as well as feelings of anticipated guilt. But, what if you could enjoy second helpings guilt-free and in a way that may support your health goals? Number one, consider yourself fortunate that second helpings are even an option. The next, less obvious reason may surprise you. "Second helpings" in the right balance, intervals, and portions, can help burn fat and stabilize blood sugar.

That statement needs clarification for sure so let's look at it another way; eating frequent meals throughout the day in the right balance of protein, fat, and carbs, in proper portions and intervals, helps keep blood sugar balanced.

Granted, the typical Thanksgiving plate piled high with turkey, stuffing, mashed potatoes, and a few vegetables, all smothered in gravy doesn't look very balanced at all. But there are ways to savor the first helping and have more to enjoy later without having a food hangover and longing for those stretchy pants!

Check out the tips below that can guide you to eat balanced holiday meals, drink alcohol if you choose, and enjoy dessert.

1. Skipping meals all day long in anticipation of the celebratory meal is a huge mistake! Each time a meal is skipped, blood sugar drops. A hormone called glucagon is over released and the body burns muscle, blood sugar goes up and cravings increase.

2. Start the day with a balanced breakfast that includes protein, a healthy fat, and a carb (like fruit) and repeat with similar small meals at 3-4 hour intervals throughout the day. (Don't like breakfast? Have  $\frac{1}{2}$  of a good quality protein shake.)

4. Choose your protein first, and balance out the plate with a sensible serving of dense carbs (like potatoes). No problem deciding on fats as there will likely be enough in what's already on your plate. Don't forget to add some veggies.

5. Enjoy all your traditional favorites without a bit of guilt, knowing you can make better choices starting with your very next meal.

6. Get moving. Start a new tradition by taking a family walk after the main course and before dessert.

7. Avoid taking a nap or going to bed on a full stomach. Sleeping on a full stomach causes the body to store fat and interferes with a restful sleep.

8. Be in the moment. Chewing food longer helps break it down which in turn helps the stomach digest it. In addition, eating slowly allows the senses the full experience of all the wonderful flavors and aromas.

## **Estate Planning for Everyone** By Attorney Marc P. Guertin

Never underestimate the power of a basic estate plan. Currently, the world is a complex place. Just because the world is so very complicated doesn't mean that your estate plan must be.

A basic estate plan focuses on a different set of "P's" people, property and plans. Any good estate plan, basic or otherwise should answer two questions: "What happens to my stuff when I die?" and "What happens if I am seriously ill?"

The center piece of a basic estate plan is a Last Will and Testament. A Will can be a simple document distributing assets outright to your heirs or it can be more complex; planning for all types of situations from minor children to special needs beneficiaries. Wills only contemplate one thing- your death, but what happens if you don't die and you just become seriously ill or incapacitated in some way? Planning for incapacity is just as important as planning for death.

The core document in an incapacity plan is a Durable Power of Attorney. A Durable Power of Attorney allows you to appoint an agent who can handle your financial affairs if you should become incapacitated. A Durable Power of Attorney is critically important. In the absence of this document no one has the power to manage your affairs while you are incapacitated and the only way to get that kind of power is to go to court. Going to court, even the probate court, is not what I would call a cost-effective solution. Any time you have to get a doctor, a lawyer and a judge involved it is going to be costly. This problem is easily avoided with a Durable Power of Attorney.

Healthcare Directives and Living Wills are extremely important when planning for incapacity. These documents focus on your health. A Healthcare Directive appoints someone to interact with healthcare professionals and make decisions on your behalf if you are incapacitated. Just as with the Durable Power of Attorney, in the absence of a healthcare directive your family would have to petition the court to get the power to make healthcare decisions.

The final piece of a basic estate plan is a Living Will. A Living Will lets you inform your doctors (and loved ones) your wishes regarding what extraordinary medical procedures you want performed if you are in a terminal condition with no hope of recovery. It spells out your exact intentions which takes the weight of a decision like that off your family. In these times it is critically important to have a healthcare agent who can speak for you and a Living Will in place to speak to your wishes regarding end of life decisions.

Thinking about our own mortality is not an easy thing to do. Planning for not being here can be stressful. Sometimes it's hard to even get started. Focus on people and property. Once you have identified the important people in your life and your property- it is time to make a plan on how to transfer your property to your people.

this process. Only if a vaccine gets through this pre-clinical phase can a vaccine be used on humans. Human testing is then carried out in three clinical phases: small groups of 20-80 adults, then groups of several hundred and finally in groups of thousands. These three phases take many years to cautiously assess the long-term as well as short-term effects of vaccines with otherwise unknown dangerous or fatal effects. The sum and substance of all pre-clinical studies, testing and reporting for our COVID-19 vaccines took less than three months. Forty-five volunteers then got the first jab in Phase I testing on March 16, 2020. The study of long-term side effects was similarly shorted, to be tracked in the group of 45 for just a year. On December 11, 2020, however - with the Phase I human trial yet unfinished - emergency use was authorized. With only eight months of any study of the dangerous effects on the group of 45, the FDA assured us that it had "conducted a thorough evaluation of available safety, effectiveness and manufacturing quality..." According to 120 years of regulatory development, hundreds of millions of us are now in the Phase II test group. We are all - once again - Big Pharma's lab rats.

for extra savoring time, extends the experience and allows food to be metabolized in a way that treats the body better.

Now there's a chance that none of the above appeals to you. Maybe the part you enjoy most about Thanksgiving is to pull out all the stops, put on sweats, eat until you fall onto the couch, take a nap and wake up asking "why did I do that?" If that's the case, it's fine-just make that choice ahead of time. Making that decision in advance takes the power away from the food and gives it back to you. The key is to get back to sensible eating with the very next meal-not the next day!
