Paid family leave fund overflowing with your money



There is perhaps no more recent or perfect example of government's ability to extract billions in hard-earned tax dollars from working people without them really knowing over a relatively short period — just one year in this case — than the Paid and Family Medical Leave program.

Approved by the Democrat-Controlled legislature in 2019, it had a noble aim: provide working families a better chance to care for loved ones,

or close family friends, in their time of need or illness, without jeopardizing their household budgets.

We can argue over the value of the PFML program, who gets to use it, for how long, or who should pay for it. But there can be little disagreement that as currently constituted, it is overfunded.

The wages lost away from work would be subsidized by everyone *else* in Connecticut who earns a paycheck; benefits would scale up based on income and be limited to up to \$900 a week.

In its brief history, the program has paid out claims of \$309 million for justified leaves of up to 12 weeks. During that time, the PFML program collected \$433 million from working people whose weekly paychecks were automatically lightened by 0.5 percent leaving the state-sponsored account an extra \$125 million for just the fiscal year of 2023 alone. The PFML board did not start collecting fees until January 2021 and did not start paying out until January 2022.

This somewhat obscure program, approved late on a Friday night in Hartford in the dying days of a long session with zero House Republican votes, has exploded with little public note into a \$1 billion windfall controlled by 15 un-elected political appointees.

It took only 20 months for the PFML to collect more than \$1 billion. If the recent actions of its board of directors are any indication, it will continue to grow by leaps and bounds regardless of need or cost to the taxpayer. A modest, reasonable proposal supported by the House Republicans Oct. 12 would have given taxpayers a \$20 million break in the amount contributed to the fund by dropping the individual rate one-quarter point, to.475 percent, a level supported by an actuarial accounting that ensured PFML would remain intact.

But that proposal was not even brought up for a vote by the board on Oct. 12. The current contribution of 0.5 percent will come out of every paycheck for the foreseeable future.

There was significant debate over the PFML plan when it was first raised. Our concerns were that it was yet another mandatory tax on working people and families that would continue to grow if left unchecked. I heard some constituents voice opposition, wondering why they should pay yet another tax so that someone else does not have to go to work.

Interestingly, and perhaps of some encouragement, one-third of claims presented to the governing authority were rejected in the first year.

But even if the board of directors does not make adjustments to the funding of the PFML account in the future, someone else might. Connecticut has a long history of having the legislature come in and swipe savory, dedicated funding sources during times of economic exigence. Just ask state motorists who thought they were Saving the Sound when they paid extra for those special decorative license plates. Tough economic times require tough decisions so some of that dedicated funding went elsewhere. Save the Sound? Sorry, save that year's budget.

Or the ardent anti-smoking lobbyists who, like the tulips that popped their heads up outside the Capitol every spring, mobilized when they saw millions in tobacco settlement dollars targeted into a general budget appropriation — talk to us next year! Same for the Gamblers Anonymous groups who witnessed casino revenues being redirected for other causes.

Luckily in more recent history, the public never bought into the faux "lock box" safeguard promises to spend all toll revenues solely on roads, ultimately dooming Gov. Ned Lamont's signature first-term legislative initiative.

We can argue over the value of the PFML program, who gets to use it, for how long, or who should pay for it. But there can be little disagreement that as currently constituted, it is overfunded, say neutral professionals who view the numbers through green eye shades. And more importantly the taxpayers who foot the bill deserve a break, however modest.

More Tips from Local Author Julia



In her Amazon bestselling book *Everything I Got: 30 Lessons on What You Give, What You Get, and How You Grow Through Sports*, former NBHS soccer player and current sport psychology consultant Julia Allain explores lessons from growing up in a world of sports to help players find success both on and off the field. Below is an excerpt from Lesson #16: Talk the Talk.

Most of our brains are like revolving doors, with thoughts continuously flowing in and out as new information or stimuli catch our attention. Sometimes they flow through so fast we miss them, unable to

process them unless we are purposefully attending to the moment, which mindfulness encourages us to do. However, sometimes things get stuck in that revolving door like a trap, or a skipping record, constantly replaying the same word over and over again. The most common way for this trap to occur is to try to not think about something. "Don't mess up. Don't mess up. Don't mess up. Don't mess up. Like a small, barely noticeable pimple on the side of your face that you try to poke, prod, and squeeze to get rid of, a dangerous thought that we obsessively try to suppress and get rid of only becomes redder, swollen, and much more noticeable.

Guiding, rather than controlling, our thoughts, is a more realistic approach to this challenge. In order to do this, one clever technique I use with my athletes is to take advantage of the few things we do control: our words and our actions. We all know we have much more control over our physical body than we do our internal mind. You may have all the feelings and thoughts that make you want to punch someone in the face, but it is much easier to withhold the punch than it is to suppress the feelings and thoughts associated with that desire. In addition, while we may think something, we don't always say it out loud. We have all proven throughout our lives that we can say and do things that do not reflect the thoughts and feelings we are currently experiencing.

When I work with athletes who are having trouble channeling their thoughts and emotions in the right direction, the first thing we check is their body language. Are they dropping their head and shoulders? Are they communicating to themselves and their opponent that they are defeated? Studies have shown that our body and actions can influence our emotions as much as our emotions can influence our body. While we may not be able to tap directly into our brain to adjust our emotional state, we can manipulate our body to send signals to our brain to produce the desired feelings. Stand tall when you feel unconfident. Smile when you feel nervous. Have your actions reroute your thinking rather than your thoughts restricting your actions.



Thanksgiving History and Tradtions

Thanksgiving is a national <u>holiday</u> celebrated on various dates in the <u>United States</u>, <u>Canada</u>, <u>Grenada</u>, <u>Saint Lucia</u>, <u>Liberia</u>, and unofficially in countries like <u>Brazil</u> and the <u>Philippines</u>. It is also observed in the Dutch town of <u>Leiden</u> and the Australian territory of <u>Norfolk Island</u>. It began as a day of giving thanks for the blessings of the <u>harvest</u> and of the preceding year (similarly named <u>harvest festival</u> holidays occur throughout the world during autumn, including in Germany and Japan). Thanksgiving is celebrated on the <u>second Monday of October</u> in Canada and on the <u>fourth Thursday of November</u> in the United States and around the same part of the year in other places. Although Thanksgiving has historical roots in religious and cultural traditions, it has long been celebrated as a <u>secular</u> holiday as well.

History

Prayers of thanks and special thanksgiving ceremonies are common among most religions after harvests and at other times of the year. The Thanksgiving holidays history in North America is rooted in English traditions dating from the Protestant Reformation. It also has aspects of a harvest festival, even though the harvest in New England occurs well before the late-November date on which the modern Thanksgiving holiday is celebrated.

In the English tradition, days of thanksgiving and special thanksgiving religious services became important during the English Reformation in the reign of Henry VIII. Before 1536 there were 95 Church holidays, plus 52 Sundays, when people were required to attend church and forego work. Though the 1536 reforms in the Church of England reduced the number of holidays in the Liturgical calendar to 27, the Puritan party in the Anglican Church wished to eliminate all Church holidays apart from the weekly Lord's Day, including the evangelical feasts of Christmas and Easter (cf. Puritan Sabbatarianism). The holidays were to be replaced by specially called Days of Fasting and Days of Thanksgiving, in response to events that the Puritans viewed as acts of special providence. Unexpected disasters or threats of judgement from on high called for Days of Fasting.

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Special blessings, viewed as coming from God, called for Days of Thanksgiving, which were observed through Christian <u>church services</u> and other gatherings. [3] For example, Days of thanksgiving were called following the victory over the <u>Spanish Armada</u> in 1588 and following the deliverance of <u>Queen Anne</u> in 1605. [4] An unusual annual Day of Thanksgiving began in 1606 following the failure of the <u>Gunpowder Plot</u> in 1605 and developed into <u>Guy Fawkes Day</u> on November 5. [4] Days of Fasting were called on account of plagues in 1604 and 1622, drought in 1611, and floods in 1613. Annual Thanksgiving prayers were dictated by the charter of English settlers upon their safe landing in America in 1619 at <u>Berkeley Hundred</u> in Virginia. [5]

In Canada

According to some historians, the first celebration of Thanksgiving in North America occurred during the 1578 voyage of <u>Martin Frobisher</u> from England in search of the <u>Northwest Passage</u>. [6] Other researchers, however, state that «there is no compelling narrative of the origins of the Canadian Thanksgiving day.»^[7]

Antecedents for Canadian Thanksgiving are also sometimes traced to the French settlers who came to <u>New France</u> in the 17th century, who celebrated their successful harvests. The French settlers in the area typically had feasts at the end of the harvest season. They continued throughout the winter season, even sharing food with the <u>indigenous peoples</u> of the area. [8]

As settlers arrived in Nova Scotia from New England after 1700, late autumn Thanksgiving celebrations became commonplace. New immigrants into the country—such as the Irish, Scottish, and Germans—also added their own traditions to the harvest celebrations. Most of the U.S. aspects of Thanksgiving (such as the turkey) were incorporated when <u>United Empire Loyalists</u> began to <u>flee from the United States</u> during and after the <u>American Revolution</u> and settled in Canada. [8]

In 1859, the government of the Provinces of Canada declared a Thanksgiving Day in which "all Canadians [were asked] to spend the holiday in 'public and solemn' recognition of God's mercies." On 9 October 1879, Canada's Governor General, the Marquis of Lorne, declared November 6 as "a day of General Thanksgiving to Almighty God for the bountiful harvest with which Canada has been blessed." The Canadian Parliament on 31 January 1957 applied the same language in its proclamation for the modern holiday: "A Day of General Thanksgiving to Almighty God for the bountiful harvest with which Canada has been blessed—to be observed on the second Monday in October."

In the United States

<u>Jennie Augusta Brownscombe</u>, The First Thanksgiving at Plymouth, 1914, <u>Pilgrim Hall Museum</u>, Plymouth,

An annual thanksgiving holiday tradition in North American colonies is documented for the first time in 1619, in what is now called the Commonwealth of <u>Virginia</u>. Thirty-eight English settlers aboard the ship *Margaret* arrived by way of the James River at <u>Berkeley Hundred</u> in <u>Charles City County, Virginia</u> on December 4, 1619. The landing was immediately followed by a religious celebration, specifically dictated by the group's charter from the <u>London Company</u>. The charter declared, "that the day of our ships arrival at the place assigned for plantation in the land of Virginia shall be yearly and perpetually kept holy as a day of thanksgiving to Almighty God." [11][5] Since the mid 20th century, the original celebration has been commemorated there annually at present-day <u>Berkeley Plantation</u>, ancestral home of the <u>Harrison family of Virginia</u>. [12]

The more familiar Thanksgiving precedent accompanied by feasting is traced to the <u>Pilgrims</u> and <u>Puritans</u> who emigrated from England in the 1620s and 1630s. They brought their previous tradition of Days of Fasting and Days of Thanksgiving with them to <u>New England</u>. The 1621 <u>Plymouth</u>, <u>Massachusetts</u> thanksgiving was prompted by a good harvest. The Pilgrims celebrated this with the <u>Wampanoags</u>, a tribe of Native Americans who, along with the <u>last surviving Patuxet</u>, had helped them get through the previous winter by giving them food in that time of scarcity, in exchange for an alliance and protection against the rival <u>Narragansett tribe</u>. [13]

Several days of Thanksgiving were held in early New England history that have been identified as the "First Thanksgiving", including Pilgrim holidays in Plymouth in 1621 and 1623, and a Puritan holiday in <u>Boston</u> in 1631. [14][15] According to historian Jeremy Bangs, director of the <u>Leiden American Pilgrim Museum</u>, the Pilgrims may have been influenced by watching the annual services of Thanksgiving for the relief of the <u>siege of Leiden</u> in 1574, while they were staying in Leiden. [16] Now called <u>3 Oktoberfeest</u>, Leiden's autumn thanksgiving celebration in 1617 was the occasion for sectarian disturbance that appears to have accelerated the pilgrims plans to emigrate to America. [17]

Later in New England, religious thanksgiving services were declared by civil leaders such as Governor Bradford, who planned the Plymouth colony's thanksgiving celebration and feast in 1623. [18][19][20] Bradford issued a proclamation of Thanksgiving following victory in the Pequot War in the late 1630s to celebrate «the bloody victory, thanking God that the battle had been won.»[21][22] The practice of holding an annual thanksgiving harvest festival did not become a regular affair in New England until the late 1660s. [23]

Thanksgiving proclamations were made mostly by church leaders in New England up until 1682, and then by both state and church leaders until after the American Revolution. During the revolutionary period, political influences affected the issuance of Thanksgiving proclamations. Various proclamations were made by royal governors, and conversely by patriot leaders, such as John Hancock, General George Washington, and the Continental Congress, [24] each giving thanks to God for events favorable to their causes. [25] As President of the United States, George Washington proclaimed the first nationwide thanksgiving celebration in America marking November 26, 1789, «as a day of public thanksgiving and prayer, to be observed by acknowledging with grateful hearts the many and signal favours of Almighty God», [26] and calling on Americans to «unite in most humbly offering our prayers and supplications to the great Lord and Ruler of Nations and beseech him to pardon our national and other transgressions.»

Debate over first celebrations

Devotees in New England and Virginia and other places have maintained contradictory claims to having held the first Thanksgiving celebration in what became the United States. The question is complicated by the concept of Thanksgiving as either a holiday celebration or a religious service. James Baker maintains, "The American holiday's true origin was the New England <u>Calvinist</u> Thanksgiving. Never coupled with a Sabbath meeting, the Puritan observances were special days set aside during the week for thanksgiving and praise in response to God's providence.

Recycling News

Saturday 11-18 is the last day that the leaf drop-off is open.

North Branford residents can bring their leaves to the leaf drop off center located to the left of the police station, near the Public Works Facility on Route 22 from 9:00am to 3:00pm. Just follow the signs. No brush or grass clippings. No commercial vehicles. Please place leaves in biodegradable leaf bags (no tape please) or empty them loose onto the ground.

There will be a curb side pickup of leaves in untapped biodegradable paper bags the weeks of November 27th – December 8th

Thanksgiving is a trash holiday. Pickups is delayed one day.

Thanks to everyone who came out to the electronics waste drop-off on November 4th. In the 3 hours that we were there, we had well over 200 cars who brought electronics, waste oil, batteries and tires to be recycled.

We collected over 3 dozen mattresses that will be taken apart and recycled. At some points we overwhelmed the Take2 person collecting the electronics. We are working on correcting this for next spring. Thanks to everyone for helping to keep these materials out of the waste stream.

Did you know that you can drop off waste oil at Public Works when they are open during the week? They use this oil to heat their buildings so it needs to have no contaminates in it like antifreeze or water.

Did you just find something that should have gone out for Bulky Waste?

Don't want to wait till the spring to dispose of it?

Here are some options:

- You can post on the Facebook page: <u>North Branford & Northford</u> Free Items.
- Post on the New Haven, East Haven or Milford Freecycle.org site.
- Look up your item in the **New Haven Downsizing Donation Guide**. It lists multiple organizations that want your stuff! Just Google 'New Haven Downsizing Donation Guide'. Some places even pick-up large items.
- Some big box stores take used electronics for recycling.
- Tire stores can take used tires for a fee.

Plastic Film includes grocery bags, newspaper sleeves, produce bags, bread bags, dry cleaning bags, ice bags, wood pellet bags, salt bags, and zipper bags for recycling.

They also accept plastic wraps from water bottle cases, diapers, bathroom tissue, and paper towels, as well as bubble wrap and shipping pillows.

Plastic bags with recycling symbols Number 2 or Number 4 **are** accepted.

Plastic bags with recycling symbols Number 5 or Number 7 (i.e. salad and grape bags), snack bags (potato chips, popcorn, and candy), pet food bags, frozen food bags, and any bags with food residue are **not** accepted.

Plastic bags and wraps get recycled into products such as new grocery bags, benches, and decking.
