Connecticut's Recovering Restaurant Industry Needs Support, Not More Government Roadblocks



The indelible nature of the American Dream was on display earlier this week, when some 1,400 hospitality professionals from throughout the state gathered for a celebration of entrepreneurship, ingenuity, and grit that characterizes an industry that has faced its share of challenges over the last few years.

It was the Connecticut Restaurant Association's marquee awards ceremony, which saw

restauranteurs and workers take honors for their craft and dedication to an industry that accounts for roughly 10 percent of Connecticut jobs.

Yet as this deserved evening celebration took place, a situation familiar to small business owners at the event brewed elsewhere—a cadre of state lawmakers prepped for a morning news conference to announce a fresh assault on the restaurant industry. State Sen. Julie Kushner, of Danbury, told the media she'll again pursue legislation to eliminate the tip wage credit for waitstaff.

This policy change, which Labor Committee Co-Chairman Kushner failed to advance last session, would increase costs for small business owners, lead to higher customer prices, and pave the way for **elimination** of waitstaff tipping. It's frustrating news for an industry hobbled by inflationary costs, stubborn workforce shortages, and government shutdowns that crippled customer traffic.

In our state, certain employers are allowed to pay less than the minimum wage because they can count servers' tip earnings toward the satisfaction of minimum wage requirements. In exchange, the employer can't exert any control over tips. If all workers received minimum wage, as Sen. Kushner and some Democrats propose, restaurants could then control the distribution of these tips or even keep them entirely to pay for their overhead operations. It's a scenario most wait staff and restaurants want to avoid.

If the tip credit is eliminated, each one dollar increase in the required wage would cause a 6.1 percent decrease in employment and a 5.6 percent decrease in employees' earnings, according to a University of California—Irvine study. That could mean the loss of nearly 2,200 tipped jobs and \$8 million in worker earnings. In fact, the concept fell apart a few years ago in Maine, where the policy was quickly repealed after it was enacted due to its dramatic negative impact on workers.

Fact is, Connecticut's restaurant employment structure provides opportunity for residents to earn a living or extra income in a flexible working environment that almost always provides more than minimum wage alone.

When my wife left teaching to raise our children, the stress of one-income living came quickly. She decided to spend a few weekend nights a month waitressing, earning more money than she did as a full-time teacher. Today, my daughter, a college student with a goal of becoming a doctor, is training as a waitress and bartender to create a pathway to pay for tuition over the next decade.

It's the type of American experience ignored by Connecticut Democrats, who, rather than appreciating the opportunity offered by our state and country, resort to demonizing those they view as mere speedbumps on the path to meeting their goals set by agitators in California, Chicago, or some other progressive haven that's disconnected from our Main Streets.

Sen. Kushner's latest broadside at our restaurant industry represents an inflection point for Governor Lamont. I presume he left the ceremony feeling as I did—appreciating the awesome diversity of the bold entrepreneurs and enthusiastic workers who are trying to build futures in Connecticut. I hope the Governor, and even my Democratic colleagues in the legislature, will join me in rejecting this proposal because our restaurant industry, and the workers who currently thrive within it, exemplify the success stories that still embody the American dream.

Well brother, another Christmas season is upon us and my thoughts trailed to some old letters and old memories. These letters and memories made me realize how lucky we really were. Things always change, and life never stands still but when you are lucky enough to have tradition and great memories, it allows us to enjoy the treasures of days gone by as well as create new memories with the foundations that were put in place.

Looking back on our childhood, it's funny, but I don't remember one gift I ever received. I often hear people talking about the great gift they got when they were thirteen or the expensive gift they got when they were sixteen. But I don't remember one thing I ever got for Christmas.

I remember that it was a season for the preparation of the birth of Christ. There wasn't just one event. It was the series of events that made it special. It started right after Thanksgiving with trip to W.T. Grants to get the money books to start shopping. The coupon books were store dollars and it would take mom and dad an entire year to pay them off then mom could start over for the next year. Pop would work a week through his vacation so he would get double time to have extra Christmas money. We would always stop at the popcorn place and get a bag of caramel corn for us and a bag of plain popcorn to feed the pigeons on the New Haven Green.

Decorating the house was a family gathering. I remember one year my Godmother and her fiancee surprised us with a visit on the night we were preparing. They were embarrassed and tried to leave but Mom would not hear of "such nonsense". She put out whatever she had to go with the coffee and we had so much fun that for a while it became a tradition for them to visit on decoration night.

The tree was never the centerpiece of the decorations. Although it was the most time consuming. It always had to be a live tree. I remember dad on his belly (no easy task) making sure the fifty cent stand was centered enough to hold a tree bigger than its allotted capacity. Sometimes he even had to tie crab line string to the windows to hold it up. Mom would then hang what seemed like hundreds of Christmas cards on the line to show the importance of family and friends. Back then, everyone sent Christmas cards.

The main event was putting out the Manger. Mom would give us cloths to polish the pieces. There would be cotton, a white linen, straw for the house and the baby never went in until the 25th. It had to be perfect. "After all, this represents the birth place of Baby Jesus," mom would demand.

We would spend a great amount of time at Church, helping the nuns with the gifts for the children. We didn't have much but we felt rich. "There were always those less fortunate than ourselves," mom would say. "It's our job to take care of them".

Before and after the holidays, we would spend the week visiting dad's older brothers and sisters. With dad being the second youngest of thirteen, mom made sure we showed respect and visited everyone of them as it was the right thing to do. There wasn't an exchange of gifts. There were cookies and baked goods exchanges, but conversation and talk about family was the main event. Being the youngest, I never found these visit too exciting as there were no kids to play with. I always laughed when daddy's sisters would force us to eat all kinds of food and then admonish mommy not to feed us so much because we were getting chunky.

Christmas Eve and Christmas Day were more up my alley as we would see Uncle Albert & Aunt Marge and Uncle Rudy and Aunt Tess. There were plenty of kids to play with and we never wanted the two days to end.

There was Christmas caroling at senior housing and also the neighborhood where uncle Rudy knew some of the older people with no families.

So we are luckier than most as we continue with these ways. The visits are fewer as televisions in the bedroom are curtailing the making of the big families. But we still do it right thanks to the foundation our parents set. We still get together with everyone and share the meaning of Christmas.

So this holiday season, we pray for those who weren't as lucky as we were. We remind our children how lucky they are and we remember the good times as we create new ones.

North Branford Fights Back Against Property Fraud by Offering PropertyCheck Updates to Residents

NORTH BRANFORD – The Town of North Branford has implemented Cott Systems' PropertyCheck in an invigorated effort to combat property and mortgage fraud in North Branford. This 24/7 service allows residents to sign up on the Cott Systems' RECORDhub through the Town of North Branford website to receive notifications when official documents are recorded in their name. Residents can activate alerts based on the spelling of their name. There is no cost to participate.

"The Town is pleased to offer this additional tool at no cost to the residents as a means to protect their property from unethical practices," said **Mayor Rose Angeloni**.

"This is an important resource to our residents to help protect their property interests, and I hope they will take advantage of it as an added line of defense against fraudulent activity," said **Councilor Thomas Zampano**.

The Town Council approved the implementation of the PropertyCheck System last October at the recommendation of **Town Clerk Lisa Valenti** and **Town Manager Michael Downes**

Property fraud can occur if someone forges your identity, transfers your property into their name, and records the document. This fraudulent activity can make it appear as if

that person owns your home or property before the victim is aware anything has happened. Such criminal activity is becoming more prevalent today as cyber criminals exploit every avenue they can to cause harm and steal from everyday citizens.

PropertyCheck works seamlessly in the background of the Town's land records management RECORDhub software, automatically alerting if a document with matching name is recorded. All residents have to do is opt-in by creating a RECORDhub account, create alerts for their name and choose a preference for alerts – email or text message.

"It's also a good idea to set up multiple alerts based on first, middle and last name variations and your spouse's name, to be sure that an alert will be triggered in case a recording happens with some kind of slight variation," says Paul Fetters, the product Implementation Specialist at Cott Systems.

To sign up for alerts residents should go to the town website, <u>northbranfordct.gov</u>, and navigate to the Town Clerk's page. Under "List of Services" click on PropertyCheck click "sign up" and follow the prompts. PropertyCheck can also be found through the "Online Services" link on the front page. **Michael P. Downes**



Jerome Harrison Elementary School

Jerome Harrison Elementary School is off to a great 2023-2024 school year! Staff have been hard at work creating positive classroom cultures that encourage student thinking, curiosity, collaboration, and engagement. Opportunities for student-led activities and discussions happen throughout the day in order to help cognitive development and independence. This year, JHS implemented STEM instruction (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math) for all students pre-k



through second grade. This has provided students with a space to explore, take-risks, problem solve, and learn foundational STEM concepts that they can build on throughout their educational career. What an amazing opportunity for our students!

Totoket Valley Elementary School

The start of the 2023-2024 school year at Totoket Valley Elementary School (TVES) has been both productive and rewarding. We continue to prioritize cultivating thinking cultures and classrooms and fostering an environment where staff actively engage students in critical thinking skills. As a school community we value high impact instruction through the Making Thinking Visible and Building Thinking Classrooms approach, aligned to the instructional vision of our district. This innovative approach breaks the traditional model of school and aims to enhance the overall learning experience for our students academically, socially and emotionally. As we planned for this year, our teachers were very thoughtful about modifying physical


learning environments to promote collaboration and a student-centered approach to teaching and learning. Building and fostering cultures of thinking in all that we do as a school leads to a sense of collective responsibility, leadership and an overall care for one's self and community, as well as increased ownership and overall commitment to the learning process. This approach has had a positive impact on students' connection to school and to learning, and has led to an increase in student confidence and academic achievement.

At TVES, we recognize the importance of emotional intelligence as the foundation for academic success. Students are consistently provided with opportunities and experiences that promote a safe school climate, which leads to students being more open to taking risks in both academic and social environments they encounter during their school day. Through our PBIS (Positive Behavior Intervention Supports) initiatives, school-wide ROCKS (Respect, Opportunity, Cooperation, Kindness, and Safety) assemblies and Community Days, Morning Meeting, Restorative Practices and our Second Step curriculum students are able to develop the foundational pro-social behaviors that support emotionally intelligent thinkers, communicators and collaborators. Through various programs and initiatives this year, our school is committed to nurturing well-rounded individuals who not only excel academically, but also possess strong social and emotional skills. Students participate daily in Morning Meetings as a way to build community, connect with one another and practice key pro-social skills. These skills are also practiced and reinforced through our Second Step curriculum. Mental health team members push into classrooms weekly to provide direct instruction to assist students in developing strategies for self regulation and management of emotions.

As a school, we also believe that a variety of enrichment offerings provide opportunities beyond the standard curriculum for students to explore and develop their diverse interests, passions and talents. Through our After School Enrichment program students participate in specialized courses based on their interests. During the school day our staff facilitates enrichment experiences including Math Olympiads, the National Scripps Spelling Bee, Battle of the Books with a focus on the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals, band, and chorus. Additionally, on Wednesdays our Allied Arts teachers provide enrichment to students in their specialized areas - third graders participate in Art Enrichment, fourth graders in Makerspace, and our fifth graders in Physical Education. Our Magic Mailbox contests and Artist Spotlight celebrates creative expression and our involvement in the Connecticut Invention Convention is an opportunity for our learners to gain experience as inventors and engineers. There are also a variety of student leadership opportunities through the TVES Student Senate.













The opening to the school year at North Branford High School was successful and very exciting as it was the first time the school year began with students attending the new facility. The learning and teaching process continues to be the centerpiece of the staff's efforts including implementing new strategies in the classroom involving Making Thinking Visible. An initiative that better ensures deeper understanding and student discourse. Staff have implemented new instructional practices, improved current teaching techniques and will continue to participate in professional development throughout the school year. North Branford High School continues to provide a comprehensive and rigorous experience for our students including offering several Advanced Placement (AP) and Early College Experience (ECE) courses. NBHS was recognized by the College Board this fall as an Honor Roll High School for AP success and participation. Students are also provided opportunities to take challenging elective courses in addition to the required high school graduation requirements. Project Lead the Way (Pre-Engineering and Bio-Medical), Video Production, World Language, Automotive and Technology Education (Construction), and several electives in the core areas are offered at North Branford High School. The NBHS Technology and Engineering Education Department has been selected by the CTEEA (Connecticut Technology and Engineering Education Association) as the Program of the Year in the stateConnecticut.



Culture and a positive school climate are essential in order for students to excel. Our vision of the graduate SOAR (Socially

Responsible Contributor, Open-minded Engaged Citizen, Achievement Focused Student, Resilient Life Long Learner) is also the framework that articulates clear expectations for students and staff in an encompassing fashion.



The expectations outlined within SOAR provide rubrics that are used to measure student achievement and progress. This framework also provides opportunities to recognize students and staff through school wide events that take



place each fall. Students at NBHS are offered to participate in many cocurricular activities including service organizations, clubs and athletics. Over twenty clubs are offered and over 20 varsity sports are offered with many students participating in several co-curricular activities each school year. The Drama Club and the Music Department sponsor several events annually including productions and concerts open to the public. The fall cabaret, the spring musical and the seasonal concerts showcase our students talents and contribute to the culture and climate at NBHS.

A flex period outside of scheduled class time takes place daily with advisory agenda sessions occurring on Fridays. School information and school news are typically included in the agendas. Additional transitional activities

happen throughout the year in order to support seniors (and their parents) as the seniors prepare for life after graduation. Financial aid workshops, individual guidance counselor conferences and ongoing support with the transition to college, the military or career is essential. As a graduation requirement, all seniors complete a Capstone Project that focuses upon career exploration or community service. This involves a mentorship experience when shadowing a professional, reflective journal writings and a culminating performance project. Our staff is looking forward to challenging and supporting all students as they progress throughout the school year in and beyond the classrooms of NBHS.

Special Services


Meeting the individual needs of all learners is a priority for the Office of Special Services. It is the belief of North Branford Public Schools that universal access to high quality education can be achieved for all students through high-leverage, inclusive instructional practices and a unified vision that all special education students are general education students first.

Each year the Office of Special Services identifies a department goal and accompanying professional learning opportunities. The focus areas for the 23-24 school year were based on the rollout of a statewide, web-based special education data management system called CT-SEDS (Connecticut Special Education Data System). As a result of this rollout the district has made the transition to Case Management as the service delivery model in North Branford. The Case Management Model provides a more streamlined approach to the special education supports and services provided in the district. A student's case manager is typically their special education teacher or related service provider. The case manager is responsible for coordinating services, overseeing the Individualized Educational Plan and serving as the liaison between a student's teachers and their family. Professional learning opportunities have been developed to support faculty and staff in navigating the new platform and transitioning to the case management model of service delivery.

While the transition to the case management model was born out of necessity, the feedback from families and staff have been overwhelmingly positive. Families have shared that communication has improved and that they feel more connected to the support being provided to their children. Staff have also reported positive associations with the model including having a greater understanding of the special education process and a more holistic view of their student's.

Curriculum and Instruction

The Office of Curriculum and Instruction has been hard at work this summer and throughout the fall in continuing our efforts across the district to expand the instructional approaches of Making Thinking Visible and Building Thinking Cultures. These instructional approaches stem from the work



at Harvard University's Project Zero and focus on collaborative learning, expression of thought, deep questioning, reflection, respectful discussion, and watching ideas/thinking evolve over time. (see here for more information: https://pz.harvard.edu/projects/cultures-of-thinking). These philosophies are also foundations of the NBPS

instructional vision, which guides administrator, teacher, and staff work across the district to enhance and improve student learning. The vision also includes a steady focus on collaborative learning, continuous student and staff reflection, and building a climate of care and trust. Administrators, instructional coaches, teacher leaders, teachers, and staff are working together to model these learning philosophies in classrooms and in their own professional learning and work together. In addition to ongoing professional learning around these instructional practices, teacher leaders and teacher teams across the district are updating curriculum landscape maps and unit plans across the district in all content areas that now embed some of these high leverage instructional practices. These are updated and uploaded to the NBPS Curriculum website as the work unfolds.

Working closely with the Office of Curriculum and Instruction is the district PDEC (Professional Development and Evaluation Committee) Team, a group of K-12 teachers and leaders across the district that support our teachers and administrators with the pending legislative changes around how teachers and administrators will be evaluated and provided with ongoing feedback on their practice; these changes will be implemented in the fall of 2024. This group meets regularly, will receive state-led training, and will ultimately develop the plan for NBPS in these areas in alignment with state guidelines. Perhaps most exciting is PDEC's efforts recently to plan for, build, and implement some new professional learning experiences for our

teachers and staff members that included a K-12 teacher panel presentation in August, and will kick off a brand new K-12 teacher mini conference in November. This conference style learning event will be led exclusively by district teachers/leaders and all teachers will be able to self-select sessions of interest around the district vision. These new changes are very exciting for our district, our teachers, and are key in improving teaching and learning in NBPS.

Dear Parents, Guardians and Caregivers,

This letter is to inform you of a recent change to the state legislation regarding the entry age of kindergarten students. The purpose of this letter is to share how North Branford Public Schools will be implementing this new requirement and what it means for families of current preschool students.

Beginning in the 2024-25 school year, the date for Kindergarten entry has changed. To start kindergarten in the 2024-25 school year your child must turn five on or before September 1, 2024.

<u>Public Act 23-208</u> states, "public schools shall be open to all children five years of age and over who reach age five on or before the first day of September of any school year." <u>Public Act 23-208</u> provides the following provisions: "a child who has not reached the age of five on or before the first day of September of the school year may be admitted (1) upon a written request by the parent or guardian of such child to the principal of the school in which such child would be enrolled, and (2) following an assessment of such child, conducted by such principal and an appropriate certified staff member of the school, to ensure that admitting such child is developmentally appropriate."

North Branford Public Schools understands that the timing of this change creates a number of challenges for families. For this reason, North Branford has developed a transition plan for the 2024-25 school year. This transition plan will allow for greater flexibility in the assessment process. The process for early entrance to kindergarten beyond the 2024-25 school year is currently under consideration and a specific procedure will be forthcoming.

North Branford Public Schools will continue to accept Kindergarten registrations for children who turn five on or before September 1, 2024. Any child who is not five years old on or before September 1, 2024 will generally be admitted to kindergarten under the following conditions:

Parents/ guardians must submit a written request to the building principal, Beth Parker.

1. Parents/ guardians will make their child available to participate in an assessment to ensure that "admitting such a child is developmentally appropriate."
