# State Representative Vincent Candelora The Ups and Downs of Legislative Activity



From the outside, the state legislature must look like a bit of a roller coaster.

And if you're wondering, it feels that way on the inside too!

Take last week as an example. It started on an almost unbelievably positive note—bipartisan unemployment reform—only to end with the specter of new taxes I fear will hurt our state's recovery.

I've talked a lot about solvency issues with the state's unemployment compensation fund over the last few months, and for years I've joined Republicans in calling for fixes to our system that would—in normal times—achieve a better money-in, money-out balance.

Recently, legislators from both parties sat at a negotiating table where the governor, the business community and organized labor all had seats. Last Monday, we gathered *together* outside the state's Department of Labor for a news conference announcing a bipartisan package of reforms that have eluded lawmakers for years. The changes are, perhaps, rather wonky to anyone who doesn't run a business, but they'll align Connecticut's unemployment taxes and benefits with neighboring states. The most significant outcome, thanks to changes such as broadening the taxable wage base, will lead to tax reductions for 73 percent of businesses. The positive impact on small businesses will be tremendous.

Gov. Lamont ended the news conference—a rare public display of teamwork—with a boisterous "let's get it passed." We left feeling as though we took a meaningful step toward economic recovery.

By late Wednesday, however, it started to feel like we were headed in the wrong direction.

That's when Appropriations Committee Democrats approved their budget that not only increases spending 5.5 percent over two years, but also grows the size of government while failing to install efficiencies that would spring our state from the vortex of structural deficits. Does that state need an "Office of Pandemic Response"? I don't think so—we already have a Department of Public Health.

The following day, Finance Committee Democrats—despite the availability of \$2.9 billion for discretionary spending—approved a tax package that would install \$1.9 billion in new taxes over two years. It includes an increase to the capital gains tax, a mileage tax on heavy trucks, a new "consumption" tax targeting the wealthy, and a social media advertising tax.

Their quest for more revenue, it seems, is never-ending.

It's too bad, because their budget does include some worthwhile pursuits such as extending the tax exemption of retirement income to include IRAs, a new child tax credit, and for a year allowing pandemic-stricken restaurants to keep a percentage of the sales tax revenue they collect.

Good discussion points, however, are outweighed by overwhelming negatives.

Even Gov. Lamont took aim at the overall budget tableau from the legislative majority, expressing concern about both the level of taxation and its plan to maneuver around the spending cap.

If Monday's announcement was a peak, we're in a valley now.

Fortunately, we're at the beginning of the budget process—one of my Democratic colleagues likened it to being in the fourth inning of a ballgame. I hope they let us on the diamond.

If last Monday was any indication, we do our best work when we're working together.

# Let's Be "Frank"

Wow brother. When I hit 65 I was releaved in a few ways. First, I reached that milestone, and I only need six months to live longer than my siblings did. (I'll never know why but I won't argue with fate). I miss you and Mary but in a sick way it was refreshing not having you guys here to bust my chops about getting old.

So now I am officially on Medicare. The card in my wallet is leaving a psychological scar on my butt where I know it is pressing from my back pocket. For fifty years I contributed to Social Security and now I can start getting something back. That statement is filled with more manure than a North Branford cow patch.

First thing they did was tell me I was not covered for my eye doctor of more than fifteen years and it was time to pick another. The next issue was that the Medicare people didn't think I needed the amount of blood pressure pills the doctor prescribed. I needed a note from my doctor (brought me back to grammar school) telling them I really needed that much medicine. I found that humorous but it get's worse.

I have spent upwards of forty hours in the past two weeks trying to get my diabetic testing materials.

First they refused my test strips because I was testing too many times. "Get the doctor to send a notice telling us that you need these items and you need to test that much" they suggested. "Why the hell would I prick my finger that often if I didn't need to do it.

Once the doctor did this, they still denied it. They finally said it would be okay if my doctor limited my testing to three times a day. They finally okayed that one, but they gave me different strips and said they no longer covered the one's I used. With this I finally had to buy a new meter to match the strips. That wasn't covered.

Lastly, no one could tell me why they kept denying the fourteen day sensor I now use, which has been instrumental in keeping my sugar numbers under control. After hours of deliberation the brain surgeons are now asking me to send them a thirty day log of my numbers, taking my readings four times a day. I found this to be an odd request. They wouldn't give me the fourteen day sensor and they just limited my strips to three a day. Yet they were asking me to send them records of readings from four times a day.

So you spend your entire life contributing a great portion of your pay check to assist the elderly and needy and guarantee your stability when you reach the tarnished golden years.

I have now become a statistic with the people in my demographic group getting little help and fearing the roads ahead. I am fortunate to have a few dollars and I was able to pay for a few things to get me through the obstacle course of red tape. I now know what our sister went through when she hit this age and was too proud to tell her younger brother about her situation. She put herself into a debt she couldnt pull out of as well as cutting her medications which ruined her health. Without an advocate she died way too soon.

I really think the system killed her and I will take that thought to my death. Take care and I'll see you soon.


Minor leagues is best described as different levels of talent trying to develop to become the next Aaron judge, Mike trout, etc. Only about 10% of the guys here will


# **BACK IN THE GAME**


