The Legislature, Sweating the Small Stuff (too)



The House of Representatives passed legislation recently benefitting consumers, a bill that would create additional protections for those who choose to get their electricity from a third-party supplier in the state's retail energy market rather than Eversource or United Illuminating.

Among the provisions of H.B. 6526 is an elimination of early termination fees for residential

customers who choose to leave their relationship with a third-party electric supplier, and another that prohibits those suppliers from reassigning customers to another supplier without first asking state regulators.

I figured that I'd mention this bill to remind everyone that the legislature, of course, does much more than what makes the nightly news. For every conversation about internet gaming or commercializing marijuana, there's commensurate talk about smaller topics that have big impact people's lives. For example, House members voted unanimously (H.B. 5596) last week to authorize expanded use of telehealth services for another two years. The Telehealth model isn't perfect, but it's been a useful tool for many people over the last year.

Other recent topics tackled in the House include creating a chronic kidney disease advisory committee (H.B. 6387) that would help raise awareness to the issue and develop research-based education and wellness campaigns. We passed H.B. 6121, which requires state economic development officials to make a plan establishing a workforce development pipeline program for people with disabilities. Due by Nov. 1, the plan must incentivize businesses to provide training programs, offer modified interviews, and reserve marketrate full time jobs.

In ordinary times, the legislature would be accomplishing much more. COVID-19 concerns have slowed the process. With capacity restrictions in the House chamber, communication has been more difficult with legislators splitting time between their desks inside the capitol and the Legislative Office Building. The House and Senate have conducted business on different days to reduce the number of people inside the capitol at one time, adding a new if not challenging wrinkle to getting bills over the finish line and onto the governor's desk.

I remain disappointed that the capitol is closed to the public. Unfortunately, that's unlikely to change before the legislative session ends June 9. By mid-May, the last remnants of the governor's business capacity restrictions will have been lifted—businesses will be open, yet the people's building closed.

Republicans and majority Democrats who control building access haven't let our opposing stance on that issue or other contentious topics-a new gas tax, and taxes in general-become a barrier to getting work done, however. We produce our best work when we work together.

We did just that in late March, when our state's pandemic-hit restaurant industry signaled the need for legislation that would preserve the relaxed restriction on outdoor dining permitting.

Another small, yet consequential bipartisan achievement.

There's a lot of work to do between now and the end of the session. Yes, conversation about big ticket items will steal the headlines: Government-run healthcare, transportation infrastructure, elections oversight. Just remember, though, that we're working on that seemingly small stuff too.

Yes, that's right-those headache-inducing variable rate contracts from third-party energy suppliers could be a thing of the past if H.B. 6526 goes the distance.

The month of May was always a special month for my mom. Not only did we celebrate Mother's Day but also her birthday.

My mother was a terrible person who in today's society would have been sent to jail. When I did something wrong, she wasn't afraid to hit first and ask questions later

In my home, low grades in school were not accepted. It wasn't enough to just try. Work without results was just a waste of time. If you studied for four hours and did not get an "A", then you should have studied for six. When I told her about the things all the other kids had that I did not, she was not sympathetic. She pointed out the things I had that others did not.

When I complained about working full time and going to high school and later college, she didn't tell me to lighten up my load, she taught me to manage it.

When I used foul language, she never rationalized that it was "the language of the times". She washed my mouth out with soap and that was the lesser of the penalties for bad language.

When I misbehaved in school or disrespected my elders, she didn't tell me how stupid those people were or make a scene at the school because her "baby boy" was being abused. She told me that in life you had to figure out how to overcome hurdles and deal with and repsect all types of people.

We could only stay home from school when we were sick. There was no allowance made for mental health days. If you stayed home from school, you stayed home from everything. That included friends coming over after school (except to bring you your homework assignments) and even talking on the phone. If you were too sick for school, you were too sick for anything else.

When it was time for the talk on sex education there were no diagrams or books to read. She simply told me to keep my hands to myself and if she found out I was "doing something wrong", she would cut off a part of my body that I really loved.

There were no large screen TV's or gym memberships. If you wanted exercise, run around the block, take out the trash or wash the kitchen floor. Speaking about the trash, we didn't take it out when we were ready, but when my mother was ready.

Yes, my mother was terrible. She would never cut me slack and never let me get away with anything. She taught me to fend for myself, knowing that she was always there to set me on the straight path should I stray. She taught me that good values and morals could not be compromised. She taught me that tough love was a very difficult task (which often hurt her more than me) but in the long run the results would be better.

My mother took the books on parenting and used them to prop up the windows that were broken or raise the youngster's seats on a chair. She used common sense and love for a parenting philosophy. She just didn't do it the way she was supposed and I'm so glad of that.

"Our church family recognizes the pain and sorrow felt by the loss of a loved one, and wanted to again give folks a safe place to share their feelings," according to Borgerson and Kennedy. "Sharing your struggles is a way that can help begin the healing process. As you interact with those in our group, all can benefit from the experience, not only helping you through this difficult time, but also bringing comfort to others as well. For we must always remember that no matter what our struggles we are never alone!" Grief is the natural response to the death of a loved one, displayed in different ways based on the person grieving and that person's circumstances. As such, grief and mourning are unique in the characteristics and course for each individual. The relationship with the person who died and the quality of that relationship will significantly impact how a child or adult will grieve. Each member of the same family will grieve the death differently because of his or her unique relationship with the person who died and his or her own personality structure. When grief goes unresolved, the impact and aftereffects are likely to be devastating. Unattended grief often results in chronic depression, withdrawal, aggression, social anxiety, failing relationships, declining job/school performance, eating disorders, substance abuse, suicidal thoughts, and much more. "Despite the uniqueness of every situation, we can nevertheless find comfort and support from others who have recently experienced loss, simply by being there and listening, and together can help each other heal. We invite and encourage you to begin this journey with us," Borgerson and Kennedy concluded.

Connecticut appears as a sea of hills cloaked with a never-changing forest. In fact, our forested landscape is always changing. At times the changes are too slow for most people to notice. But at other times its changes are faster and more dramatic. Now in Connecticut forests, we are at the beginning of a second major change in forest composition that has taken place during the past 100 years. What was once farmland is now forest. Dr. Jeffrey Ward will help us see the invisible in our woods.

Since the loss of American chestnut in the early 1900s, the Connecticut forest has been dominated by oak. Today, our forest is gradually converting from oak to other species, especially maple, birch, and beech. As with the shift from chestnut to oak forests at the beginning of the century, the emergence of a forest dominated by northern hardwoods will alter the economic, ecological, and aesthetic values of our forest. The consequences of these changes will last well into the 21st century.

The mission of the NBLCT is to acquire and maintain open space and to promote the conservation and enjoyment of land and natural resources within the Town of North Branford.
