
# 2023 North Branford **Memorial Day Parade**

Due to the departure of the Scalabrini Order of priests (a group that served Italian immigrants) the new realm of leadership slowly eliminated our traditions unitl they eliminated the Fesitval as well. So now what used to be a week of celebration has turned into a one day dinner and one special Mass on a Sunday. It's not the same and it's sad that our generation and that of our children do not get to see this wonderful tradtion and event.

But with the sadness comes the joy of our memories. We are lucky. So now with a smaller, yet just as strong group, we move ahead. We look back at the memories we share together as a family and as a parish family and we smile with happiness. We are thankful for the days of the past but now it's time to be more thankful for the days ahead.

A lesson for all of us is that it's fantastic to have great memories but we cannot lament over the good old days and we must be happy that we were fortunate enough to reach out to all those people and give them a chance to look back fondly, as we did.

But through it all, we must move on. As someone once told me the good old days are right now.

So we move forward continuing to work for our church and our parish family and strive to make new memories in the love of God and Saint Anthony.



Two bills debated and approved in the House last week within a 24-hour period exemplified the General Assembly's habit of making incongruent policy decisions.

On Tuesday, the House overwhelmingly approved legislation that would inject public safety-related changes into the commercial marijuana market, including stronger labeling and packaging requirements. And most cru-

cially, banning the sale of synthetic THC products often found outside of legal state-licensed dispensaries. The latter is particularly important, given growing concern over poison control cases involving children who didn't understand the potency of something they bought at a gas station.

But the day after acknowledging and trying to address safety concerns in the retail marijuana landscape they created, my Democratic colleagues acted on legislation that will only compound some problems we're seeing today—a bill to decriminalize psilocybin, also known as psychedelic mushrooms. This means someone caught with less than a half ounce will face a fine, not a criminal charge. The bill's proponents say more people are turning to psilocybin because it offers therapeutic benefits to individuals suffering PTSD. Maybe so, but that science is still very much emerging.

This push is reminiscent of the incremental steps that led to legalization of recreational marijuana in 2021, which also began with decriminalization legislation back in 2011. Those of us who shared concern then were brushed off, told it was a harmless step. Today, however, marijuana is everywhere, from youth athletic fields to the workplace. And just last week, a major study in the journal Psychological Medicine described an alarming link been schizophrenia and heavy marijuana use among young men.

A notable difference between the decriminalization of marijuana and the current legislation covering mushrooms, is that the former came with carve outs focused on kids—to make thorough interventions into the lives of those caught with it.

Make no mistake, if this legislation to decriminalize mushrooms receives approvals from the State Senate and the Governor, a push for legalization will quickly ensue.

I shudder to think of the impact on children, and what science will reveal to us after if legislature let's another genie out of the bottle.

Some might say the legislation comes from Democrats at a surprising time, given the bipartisan alarm about the spike in wrong-way driving problems and case after case of serious substance-influenced crashes we've seen on Connecticut highways.

After all, this session lawmakers have contemplating lowering the blood

alcohol threshold for impaired driving, and spending millions to install wrong-way driving mitigation tools such as lights, signs, and rumble strips.

The normalization of hallucinogens, I suspect, will be of little help.

Yet, such is life at the state capitol—a place where a governor can gleefully tout retail marijuana sales in the news media as his administration spends time, energy, and money warning parents their children about the dangers the drug poses.

## North Branford Fire Department

**Safety Tips for Outdoor Grilling:** 

- Gas and charcoal BBQ grills must only be used outdoors. If used indoors, or in any enclosed spaces, such as tents, they pose both a fire hazard and the risk of exposing occupants to toxic gases and potential asphyxiation.
- Position the grill well away from siding, deck railings and out from under eaves and overhanging branches.
- Place the grill a safe distance from lawn games, play areas and foot traffic.
- Keep children and pets away from the grill area: declare a three-foot "safe zone" around the grill.
- Put out several long-handled grilling tools to give the chef plenty of clearance from heat and flames when flipping burgers.
- Periodically remove grease or fat buildup in trays below grill so it cannot be ignited by a hot grill.
- Never leave your grill unattended when in use.

#### **Charcoal Grills**

- Purchase the proper starter fluid and store the can out of reach of children, and away from heat sources.
- Never add charcoal starter fluid when coals or kindling have already been ignited, and never use any flammable or combustible liquid other than charcoal starter fluid to get the fire going.

#### Gas Grills

- Check the gas cylinder hose for leaks before using it for the first time each year. A light soap and water solution applied to the hose will quickly reveal escaping propane by releasing bubbles. If you determine your grill has a gas leak, by smell or the soapy bubble test, and there is no flame:
- Turn off the gas tank and grill.
- If the leak stops, get the grill serviced by a professional before using it again.
- If the leak does not stop, call the fire department.
- If you smell gas while cooking, immediately get away from the grill and call the fire department. Do not attempt to move the grill.
- Use only equipment bearing the mark of an independent testing laboratory. Follow the manufacturers' instructions on how to set up the grill and maintain it.
- Never store propane gas cylinders in buildings or garages. If you store a gas grill inside during the winter, disconnect the cylinder and leave it outside.

#### **Please Display Your House Numbers**

Please help us help you. Sometimes it can be difficult to find the proper address when responding to an emergency. Please have proper house numbers that can be viewed from both directions on the street.

- 1. At least 3 inches in height, in a contrasting color to the background
- 2. Visible from the street
- 3. If the building is set back by more than 100 feet, the number should be affixed to a post or mailbox not more than 10 feet from the driveway

These men and women were outstanding athletes who excelled in a variety of sports including; football, soccer, basketball, ice hockey, softball, baseball, tennis and lacrosse.



#### Hazwaste Central is opening Saturday May 20th.

The Regional Water Authorities' HazWaste Central will be open on Saturdays starting on May 20<sup>th</sup> through October 28<sup>th</sup>. They are closed on the weekends of Memorial Day, July 4<sup>th</sup> and Labor Day.

HazWaste Central helps area residents in member towns protect water quality by safely disposing of household wastes. Located at RWA at 90 Sargent Drive in New Haven, HazWaste Central is open from 9 a.m. until noon on Saturdays only. Household hazardous waste comes from everyday products used in the home, garage, yard or garden.

A visit to HazWaste Central is quick and easy. Participants never have to leave their cars, and the waste is off-loaded by professionals. Some of the household wastes that can be dropped off include aerosol cleaners and sprays, antifreeze, oil-based paint and pool chemicals. We also list some of the accepted items on your green trash information card.

And please, when you are done with them, put them in the trash. Balloons do not go into the Recycle bin and they are not plastic film.

To protect our wildlife, please prevent balloons from going into the storm drains or blowing away. There are many ways to have fun and celebrate with environmentally-friendly alternatives. Giant bubbles, ribbon dancers, streamers and garden spinners are a few examples. Many of these can be reused for another celebration.

#### Please Don't Feed the Storm Drain

Is your storm drain covered with leaves or grass clippings? Please take a few minutes to rake them off so the water can flow into it.

Storm drains are designed to only carry rainfall runoff from our streets into our local waterways. Anything but water can contribute to water pollution and drainage issues. Pesticides from treated lawns and gardens can also end up in your drinking water, threatening water quality.

Please clean the street of grass clippings. Blowing grass clippings onto the road is dangerous to drivers, motorcycles, bicyclists, harms local storm sewers and aquatic life.

Remember: Only Rain in the Drain!

#### **NBLCT Awarded Grant**

FABULOUS NEWS! The NBLCT has been awarded \$385,450 in Open Space and Watershed Land Acquisition (OSWA) Grant Program money toward the purchase of 2 Regional Water Authority (RWA) parcels at the intersection of Beech St & Pomps Ln.

On May 11, Governor Ned Lamont announced that his administration is awarding approximately \$3.7 million in state funding to aid in the purchase and protection of more than 1,025 acres of open space in 14 communities throughout Connecticut.

NBLCT received the second largest single grant award. With this grant and the generous donations of so many, we have raised the \$593,000 needed to purchase the 37 acres.

Thank you all who have helped us raise the funds to purchase the RWA property, and once acquired, we will need your help again to create a parking area, build trails and generally spruce up these parcels to make them enjoyable for the public for passive recreation, that will remain open space for passive recreation for all to enjoy.


**Ruth Frank Cook (aka: Auntie Mom!)**


