Town Council Approves \$65 Million Budget

NORTH BRANFORD - On April 22 the North Branford Town Council approved a \$65 million budget for the next fiscal year. The Council voted to approve adjustments made to the budget proposed by the Town Manager and Board of Education, sending the budget to a town-wide referendum on May 13th.

The budget represents a 5.1% increase over the prior year's budget. The vote on the budget follows a state-mandated independent revaluation process which saw residential property increase in value at a far greater percentage than commercial, something that is happening statewide with other municipalities, which shifts the tax burden more onto residential taxpay-

ers. The mill rate for the town has decreased 8.9 mills accordingly from 35.93 last fiscal year, to 27.84 under the Council's proposed budget. The Council cut over \$2.1 million from the Town Manager / Board of Education budget over the \$5.1 million previously cut by the Town Manager.

Increases in the budget are driven largely by inflation, increased costs in materials and supplies, contracts, insurance, and personnel, as well as increasing debt service mostly associated with the new high school and police department projects. This is coupled with a significant decrease in state aid in the Governor's proposed budget. The budget gives a

\$200.000 increase to the Board of Education and arranges for the purchase of a new Engine 1 for the Fire Department without yet committing funds. The Council also cut operating hours of the Edward Smith and Atwater Libraries removing all winter Sunday hours and eliminated a current part-time position in the Building Department. The votes on budget adjustments were unanimous apart from the vote on the level of the Board of Education increase which passed on a party-line vote, 6 Republicans in favor, 3 Democrats against.

The budget now goes before residents for

EDITORIAL

Budget season is moving at warp speed as the Appropriations (spending) and Finance (revenue) Committees recently voted on their proposals for the next two-year state budget.

Both of these bills were drafted by majority party Democrats, who chair each committee. And while most people don't follow the state budget process closely, they may

be surprised to learn the two proposals are not balanced—not by a little, but by a lot. The Appropriations bill, for instance, exceeds the state's spending cap by more than \$272 million.

Thankfully, these separate proposals are just the starting point. They usually serve as bargaining positions in the larger negotiations that shape the final state budget—a process that typically involves the Governor's administration and both Democratic and Republican legislative leaders.

While Republicans successfully pushed for retirement and income tax relief in the 2022, the last *truly bipartisan* budget passed in 2017, when legislative control was nearly evenly split. That budget gave us the *fiscal* guardrails that continue to serve our state well-helping to rein in spending, reduce long-term debt, and rebuild Connecticut's once-depleted Budget Reserve Fund.

This year, however, the Democrats' revenue plan includes a so-called "temporary" 1.75% capital gains surcharge on some filers-expected to raise more than \$500 million over two years. Supporters claim it's about fairness, but their plan gives no tax relief to working- or middle-class families. They simply spend the money.

Even worse, this surcharge comes with no effort to cut spending. And here in Connecticut, we know how "temporary" taxes tend to stick around. Two moderate Democrats on the Finance Committee recognized this and voted against the surcharge, but the bill still advanced.

Meanwhile, there's no change to the truck tax that raises the cost of groceries and goods. The meals tax remains. There's no relief on the tax for children's clothing. And no help with the public benefits charge on electric bills—a hidden tax that's stretching family budgets to the limit.

In the weeks ahead, I'll join my Republican colleagues in offering responsible alternatives to the Democrats' nearly 10% General Fund spending increase—a plan that flies in the face of the fiscal discipline Connecticut desperately needs.

Hazwaste Central is opening Saturday May 17th

<u>Safe & Free Disposal of Residential Household Hazardous Waste</u> They take household batteries

The Regional Water Authorities' HazWaste Central will be open on Saturdays starting on May 17th through mid-October. They are closed on the weekends of Memorial Day, July 4th and Labor Day.

HazWaste Central helps area residents in member towns protect water quality by safely disposing of household wastes. Located at RWA at 90 Sargent Drive in New Haven, HazWaste Central is open from <u>9 a.m. until</u> <u>noon on Saturdays only</u>. Household hazardous waste comes from everyday products used in the home, garage, yard or garden.

A visit to HazWaste Central is quick and easy. Participants never have to leave their cars, and the waste is off-loaded by professionals. Some of the household wastes that can be dropped off include aerosol cleaners and sprays, antifreeze, oil-based paint and pool chemicals. We also list some of the accepted items on your yellow trash information card.

Plastic Wrap Reminder

Most bird seed, pet food and mulch bags are not made of the right plastic to be considered plastic film. And even if they are labeled as recyclable, they would need to be clean to go into the plastic film bin. Please put these items into the trash unless it has a recycle symbol on it and has been turned inside out and clean.

Black plastic plant pots and takeout containers are not recyclable. The machinery can't detect the black plastic. Either try to return the plant pots to the place where you bought your plants or try to reuse them. I find the takeout containers have many uses around the house.

Change to North Branford's Plastic Bag Recycling Program

The town buildings are no longer collecting plastic film. We have started a new recycling station at Public Works to take plastic film, eye glasses and cell phones. No batteries will be collected, as it's a safety issue. Some retailers such as Staples, Home Depot and Lowes take household batteries for recycling.

Recognizing National Cornelia de Lange Syndrone (CdLS) Awareness Day

The North Branford Town Council was joined on Tuesday by North Branford's Ashley Fernandez, regional coordinator for the CdLS Foundation, her husband Michael, daughter Lilly, and her daughter Lindsey who was diagnosed with CdLS at the age of 18 months, to promote awareness about CdLS.

Mayor Rose Angeloni and the North Branford Town Council issued a proclamation declaring May 10th as International Cornelia de Lange Syndrome Awareness Day in North Branford. Cornelia de Lange Syndrome is a little-known genetic disorder causing children to be born with a low birth weight, develop slowly cognitively and physically, and experience numerous medical complications. An estimated 30,000 men, women and children in the U.S. have CdLS and are undiagnosed or are without support services. North Branford is proud to join in the national effort to promote awareness of CdLS and to seek positive and productive impacts on the lives of people with CdLS and their caregivers.


