The End to the 2021 Virtual Legislative Session



To call the last couple of days of the legislative session unusual would be an understatement, and these final hours were certainly emblematic of the entire five-month period that was nothing short of turbulent for a body that sidelined tradition for virtual meetings and social distancing.

By now, you've seen that the General Assembly approved a two-year \$46 billion state budget inside

the session's last 48 hours. I was among many Republicans who voted for the plan, which was a far cry from the original vision conjured by majority party Democrats who sought tax hikes. The minority party's voice proved too true to ignore, pushing our colleagues to not only produce a budget that didn't include new tax increases, but one that stays true to financial controls such as the Constitutional Spending Cap.

What's more, the budget prioritizes spending in areas important to parties such as nursing home funding, youth suicide prevention, and preservation of funding for local school districts. This work was made easier by pandemic aid from the federal government. That we have a budget in place—on time—is good news for municipalities and employers. Both need stability. However, we can't let this bipartisan milestone cloud the fact that more work is needed to solidify our state's financial future.

Developing and negotiating a budget's details is complex. Democrats control the agenda, and it was hard enough for them to get that budget work done in the final 48 hours let alone passing dozens of bills critical to many constituencies. Add their 11th hour haphazard push to legalize marijuana, and suddenly the General Assembly—and a midnight deadline—presented as a heaving pressure cooker.

The situation exploded when it was discovered their marijuana legislation gave an individual an advantage in the permitting process to enter what will be a lucrative industry. The bill was tainted, and the shocking news eroded support. Naturally, they blamed Republicans with a false filibuster narrative, ignoring the fact that they not only hold the governor's office but also enjoy wide margins in the House and Senate. The legislature suddenly found themselves out of time. When it became clear they'd be unable to offer appropriate debate on that 300-page bill, they announced overtime was on the way—the bill would be considered in special session.

The session's final hours were spent uncharacteristically debating bills of little importance, with Republicans wondering when they'd see legislation needed to implement the budget. Democrats left that late, too, and were unable to finish its details—another item added to the special session agenda. I can only hope that clock management improves in the future—that it's somehow a product of burdens placed on a session that was bereft of tradition and in-person participation.

This week we found ourselves returning to the building to pass the budget implementer and the commercialization of cannabis bills. Both bills brought passionate debate, and many last-minute amendments. I will continue my columns this summer to update you all of those various provisions, but hopefully, I'll be writing them from a lawn chair rather than the Capitol.
