CT Trails Day Hike with the North Branford Land Conservation Trust



Join the NBLCT on Saturday, June 4th for CT Trails Day from 9:30-11:30am to hike the Notch Hill Brook Trail where you will learn about the geology and forest makeup of the area.

The hike will be in two parts. First there will be a short walk along the old Trolley line, appropriate for all ages. Once that is complete there will be two options for the main trail.

One is an easy to moderate hike, that will be appropriate for all ages. The second option will be for the more advanced and adventurous hikers to walk the ridge trail, which has a few very steep sections.



Pressure on Connecticut Taxpayers is No Laughing Matter



An interesting moment during a recent meeting of the State Bond Commission personifies the lopsided relationship between government and the taxpayers that fuel it.

The agenda for the May 26 meeting included \$20 million for the troubled Port Authority project to make the State Pier in New London suitable for a hub for an off-shore wind farm.

Gov. Lamont, whose job it is to preside over Bond Commission meetings, made light of the agenda item when it was called, suddenly adopting an auctioneer's cadence as he jokingly fast-tracked a vote, "moved and seconded, hearing no discussion...oh!" Guffaws from bureaucrats and Democrats ensued.

Problem is, this redevelopment project is no laughing matter. Not to taxpayers at least. A project that was supposed to cost \$93 million now carries an estimated price tag of more than \$250 million. What's more, in a recent CT Mirror article, the current Port Authority chairman signaled that at the project's outset officials knew it would cost as much as \$120 million.

"To be totally frank, there probably should have been more nuance conveyed at the time that it was a preliminary estimate," the chairman said, according to the Mirror.

Yes, more "nuance" would've been appropriate.

It's also important to keep in mind that, as reported by the news media, federal investigators have their eye on the beleaguered State Pier project as well as school construction projects.

Forgive those of us who found the Governor's foray into comedy just a little off-key.

Yet it's the current tone of a state government that's working for itself rather than residents. Need more evidence? Look no further than \$3,500 bonuses for state workers approved on the eve of a state budget vote that installed far less tax relief that could have been achieved. After all, a nearly \$4 billion budget surplus was part of the equation. That's right—no income tax cut, no break from skyrocketing diesel fuel prices, and full steam ahead on the highway use truck tax that will undoubtedly increase the cost of goods and services as residents absorb the impact of runaway inflation.

As I write this, Democrats' signature tax relief measure—the one-time child tax credit—is getting media attention. Under the plan, parents who meet specific income thresholds will receive \$250 per child for a maximum of three children. This tax relief, we were told in celebratory messaging, would benefit 300,000 families. Turns out, though, that parents must apply for this rebate. That means it's unlikely the benefit will reach the advertised number of families, eroding the \$600 million in tax relief that's been ballyhooed by a majority party that increased tax revenues by more than \$6 billion over the last decade.

Government, it seems, is poised to win again.

Not laughing? I don't blame you.

Farm Fresh Finds Start the Season Right

There are lessons to be learned from the rhythms and patterns of nature. This time of year, one of the easiest ways to get in sync with that rhythm is to visit a local farm market. Freshly picked produce is at its peak flavor. With no need for long distance shipping or sitting for weeks in storage, it is healthier and more nutritious. The best nutrition comes in rainbow colors and the color palette of fresh fruits and vegetables; vibrant reds, greens, blues, and yellows are not only pleasing to the eye but taste even better than they look.

And, although the vast array of fruits and vegetables are clearly the stars of the show, fresh herbs like basil, mint dill, chives, and thyme, enhance flavor and take our favorite dishes to the next level. Local dairy products allow for even more variety.

Everytime I sink my teeth into a thick slice of native tomato, whether in a caprese salad, with fresh basil and mozzarella or on a slice of my favorite bread, I'm immediately taken back to my childhood. In those days, a salad of fresh tomatoes, basil, olive oil, onion, and garlic would be accompanied by crusty white Italian bread fresh out of the oven. Those were definitely the good old days. But these too are the good old days so let's make some new memories to intertwine with the old. It's never too late to start making delicious and nutritious food memories that last a lifetime.

While savoring native produce at the peak of season may be a good enough reason to support local farmers, doing so has additional benefits like strengthening our community and local economy. It's also a place where you can ask questions about the best cooking methods and preparation recommendations and get answers from those who know. You can join a CSA Share or inquire as to whether there might be a "misfit" section where less than perfect items might be sold at a discounted price.

Regardless of where you shop or even if you grow your own, it's always fun to try new ways of preparing your new found harvest. Hopefully the recipes below will help. Pair the first two with your favorite protein for a balanced meal. The Chocolate Zucchini Cupcakes are versatile as a grab and go snack or to dress up a bit and serve to guests. (It's also a great way to sneak in zucchini for finicky eaters).

Jerry's Roasted Corn Salsa

4 ears of corn par-boiled and grilled, (remove corn from cob), ½ jalapeno pepper, 1 can of organic, low sodium, black beans (rinsed), 1 each red pepper, green pepper, orange pepper, diced, 1 minced small red onion, 1 tomato seeded & diced

Prepare and combine all ingredients in a large bowl, add 1 cup minced cilantro, juice of 3 limes, salt & pepper to taste. Enjoy at room temperature or cold.

Tip: Remove seeds from jalapeno for a milder kick.

Red, White and Blue Summer Salad (My summertime favorite)

This tasty fruit salad is edgy and delicious and will add sparkle to your Fourth of July menu.

Watermelon cubed a bit larger than bitesize, pint of fresh blueberries, fresh mint leaves, goat cheese crumbles, juice of 2 limes (optional drizzle of sweet balsamic vinegar).

Combine fruit with lime juice and refrigerate. Toss with mint leaves and add goat cheese crumbles before serving.

Chocolate Zucchini Cupcakes (Courtesy of my friend and fellow Nutrition Coach Tania Gustafson). I like to call this recipe nutrition in disguise.

2/3c (scant) olive oil

1/4c applesauce (unsweetened) or mashed banana

4 scoops of protein powder-chocolate or vanilla)

4 egg whites

1/2c almond milk + splash of lemon juice

1/2c coconut flour

2.5 tbsp cocoa

1/2 tsp baking powder

1 tsp baking soda

2c grated zucchini

walnut/pecan pieces for topping

Raspberry puree and coconut cream for serving cupcakes (optional)

Serving suggestion: Cut the muffin in 1/2 and serve topped with raspberry purée and coconut cream. Simply heat the raspberries in a small pan on medium heat until it becomes a puréed consistency. For the coconut cream, put an open can of coconut milk in the refrigerator overnight and the cream will rise to the top. Put a dollop on top of the raspberries and there you have it.

DIRECTIONS

Mix ingredients in order, then spoon into muffin cups about 2/3 full. Parchment cups are best to avoid sticking. Bake at 350F for 22-25 mins. I took mine out at 22 mins and allowed to cool in the pan. Serving size 2 cupcakes

Make it a point to venture out this season, either solo, with a friend or as a family adventure where everyone gets to choose a fruit or vegetable they never tried before. Probate Judges Nominated as Frank Forgione Retires Chuck Tiernan Wins Democratic Nomination For Branford/North Branford Probate Judge

Attorney Chuck Tiernan was nominated to represent the Democratic Party in the election for Probate Judge for the 35th District covering Branford and North Branford. The Democratic Convention to select a candidate for Probate Judge was held on May 12 at the Branford Community Center.

Tiernan was nominated following the announced retirement of Probate Judge Frank Forgione. Forgione was first elected in 2010 when the 35th Probate Judge District was first created. Previously, Forgione served as North Branford probate judge from 1990 to 2010.

A lifelong Branford resident, Tiernan told the convention members, "I was lucky enough to grow up here. I want to make a difference in the communities where I would serve: Branford and North Branford."

An attorney at Lynch, Traub, Keefe & Errante, for almost 40 years, Tiernan told the convention members that he has "a diverse practice and over his career has handled virtually every type of probate case" including guardianships, estates, adoption, name changes and appointing conservators and psychiatric commitments. He has been appointed by superior court judges to represent minors and act as guardian ad litem. Tiernan has represented clients in cases involving termination of parental rights in juvenile court and handled custody and paternity matters. Talking about this part of his practice, Tiernan said, "The cases I find most rewarding are those helping children and families and I can think of no better way to continue that than as a probate judge."

Tiernan was educated in the Branford schools and captained the Football Team in his Senior season. He received his B.A. from Trinity College and his law degree from Drake University, where he was an editor on the Drake Law Review. He has served as Chairman of the Connecticut Judicial Selection Commission which makes recommendations on the appointment of judges. He said that this assignment has taught him what qualities are most important in a judge: "temperament, compassion, personality, common sense, and knowledge of law."

Talking about what motivated him to run for Probate Judge, Tiernan said that he appreciated the work of the retiring Probate Judge Frank Forgione and his predecessor, John Donegan. Tiernan said that, like them, he "would like to help members of the community deal with their problems in a compassionate and common-sense way."

Although Probate Judge is not a political position, delegates at the convention felt that Tiernan, because of his experience and community ties, would draw votes from a broad section of the electorate in both communities.

Branford Attorney Al Ippolito Receives Endorsement for Probate Judge

Branford- On May 16, a joint convention of the Branford and North Branford Republican Town Committees endorsed Al Ippolito to run as their candidate for probate judge, with jurisdiction over Branford and North Branford. Ippolito hopes to replace Frank Forgione, who is retiring.

"I would like to thank the town committees in Branford and North Branford for their show of faith," said Ippolito. "I know I have big shoes to fill, but I feel I have the experience to serve this community as its next probate judge. I have been blessed to have practiced law in Connecticut for many years. For all those years much of my practice has been representing clients in probate matters."

Al Ippolito graduated Harvard University in 1979 and Boston University School of Law in 1982. He was admitted to the Connecticut Bar in 1982. Since 1989, Al has practiced law with his partner, former Senate Minority Leader Len Fasano out of their office in New Haven. The firm of Fasano, Ippolito, Lee and Florentine, LLC now has offices in both New Haven and Branford.

In recent years Al has been appointed by probate judges and attorneys as either a court appointed executor or mediator for difficult cases of feuding families that were stagnant in the courts.

"I enjoyed the work," said Ippolito. "That experience inspired me to run. My goals are to diminish probate's public negativity by educating the public on its benefits and to reunite any feuding families."

Ippolito also thanked his supporters.

"There are so many people I could thank but two deserve special mention. I'd like first to thank my wife, Elaine. If it weren't for her support, I wouldn't be running. I'd also like to thank Representative Vin Candelora, whose guidance and encouragement really got this campaign off the ground."

New High School on Schedule!

Project Narrative

“The North Branford High School project is being constructed in multiple phases; with the first phase comprising of the academic classrooms, science labs, Cafeteria, Media Center, Administrative and support spaces. Construction began in the summer of 2021 with the partial demolition of a small section off the existing academic classroom wing, which allowed the construction of phase one of . The project is proceeding on schedule despite several supply chain challenges and phase one is currently anticipated to be occupied and functioning after the 2022 Winter/New Year break. Programs and students will relocate to the new facility and the remaining building will be demolished in the Winter, with new construction for phase two starting in the Spring of 2023. Phase two consists of the Gymnasium, locker rooms, health and fitness facilities, the construction and culinary labs and additional academic classrooms and is anticipated to be completed by early spring of 2024. The site work comprising of the roads, parking and landscaping will be the final phase of construction. 




