



Farm Trail Brochures are now Available



The new brochure highlights Town grown products and services from 23 local growers with contact information and locations included. Products from each farm are displayed with an icon and a legend to interpret it. You will find where to get fruit, mulch, vegetables, poultry, horses, meat, corn, maple syrup, exotic fish, Pick Your Own, horse rescue, wood, wine, plants and flowers. There are colorful pictures of local products as well as a full page 11" X 17" map offering a detailed "Farm Trail" from Van Wilgen's in North Branford on the Branford line to 3B Ranch in Northford close to Durham.

Farm Trail brochures (free) will be available at the North Branford Town Hall, Atwater and Edward Smith Libraries, Community Center, farm stands in Town, Shoreline Chamber of Commerce, State tourism location, REX Development and B and Bs and hotels in surrounding towns.

This brochure is the result of the combined efforts of many people in North Branford. State Representative Vincent Candelora Budge Update



You are probably hearing about the dysfunction with Connecticut's state budget, which is no impacting our nonprofits, social services and towns. I believe it's important for people to understand how we got here and where we are going. June 30th marked the end of the state's fiscal year. Democrat leadership in both the House and Senate

refused to allow a budget to be called for a vote, leaving Governor Malloy in complete control to run government by Executive Order. I think it's fair to say that most residents are not happy with the Governor's decision making, and unfortunately, the lack of a budget has put his power on steroids.

While Democrats in the House only enjoy a 79-72 majority, they still control the ability to have legislation put up for a vote. Since April, the House Republican caucus has produced three no-tax increase budgets that funds our cities and towns; yet Democrats who have failed to produce a fully vetted, balanced budget refuse to allow a vote on the Republican versions or any other version of a budget. Rather, they are quick to point out that we need to work on a bipartisan solution.

Frankly, Democrats have controlled the legislature for almost 40 years, and are not accustomed to having conversation with Republicans on budget policy. In my 11 years in the legislature, I've opposed 10 budgets, which have led us down the path of economic uncertainty, job loss and high taxes. Each time, Republicans have made it clear that this tax and spend path was wrong, and offered alternative budgets the provided long-term solutions and structural changes to government. To this day, we continue to offer alternatives. It is my hope that the Democratic Party in Hartford has woken up and will begin embracing these ideas.

On the eve of the fiscal year end, House Democrats finally offered a budget framework, but want to delay the vote until July 18th. This proposal increases the sales tax to 6.99%, cuts municipal funding, provides for millions in unspecified cuts, and places an additional 1% tax on restaurants. Conversely, Senate Democrats have failed to offer any budget and refuse to commit to calling us into session on July 18th for a vote. Meanwhile, my Republican colleagues continue to wait to bring our plan forward for a vote. Governor Malloy and his legislative colleagues have made Connecticut the hardest state to live in with the highest taxes in the country, highest energy costs and most burdensome regulations. Republicans have a plan to reverse this course. The residents of Connecticut deserve better than what is currently offered by our administration. I will continue to fight for a

budget that provides no new taxes and right-sizes government to something that we can afford, and await for the opportunity to vote on such a budget.

PLANNING FOR THE FUTURE By Attorney Marc P. Guertin

According to recent research conducted by The Hartford Insurance Group, it seems like most baby boomers would rather go to the dentist for a root canal than talk to their aging parents about estate planning. The research indicated about 71% of parents of baby boomers were comfortable discussing estate planning with their children, whereas only 54% of their children were comfortable having such discussions. It turns out that parents are more comfortable discussing estate planning than are their baby-boomer children-who knew? This "communication gap" can have serious consequences for your parents and family.

Talking about your parents dying is not a fun topic to explore. Although it may be a hard conversation to have, it can make such a difference after your parents are gone. This is too important of a conversation not to have.

Getting the conversation started is the hardest part. A few simple guidelines can help turn this conversation into a positive experience. The most important rule (in my experience) is to include ALL of your siblings in the conversation. Nothing works quicker to undermine your intentions than excluding someone. Group discussion fosters a free exchange of ideas. Choose a comfortable and private setting for this family meeting that is free from distractions.

The family is assembled, in a comfortable, private, space...then what? How do you actually start the conversation? A good way to start is to discuss your own plan. Discuss with your parents what your estate planning experience was like. Talk about what your estate plan contemplates. Another way to start the conversation is with an article or book on estate planning. If your parents are readers this is a terrific place to start.

Assuming that you have created an opportunity to talk to your parents about their "exit plan" you should discuss several different aspects. Remain focused on the fact that you are trying to help your parents maintain independence and control over assets that took a lifetime to accumulate. Focus on long term care: have they considered what would happen if one or both of them had to spend time in a nursing home? Nursing home costs can quickly eliminate your parent's life savings. Ask about what type of estate plan they have in place. Make sure the plan fits their estate. Explore whether their estate plan contemplates tax issues, probate costs, or beneficiaries with disabilities? Don't neglect to focus on lifetime planning. Make sure your parents have updated Powers of Attorney and Living Wills.

Remember, most parents want to discuss their estate plan with their adult children. Finding out that your parents have planned their estate will be very comforting. Finding out your parents have not made a plan is a great opportunity to help them get their affairs in order.

It was September 1936 and Dr. Clarence Rungee and I were on a coast to coast trip. On arising one morning we were impressed with a hugh mountain directly ahead. We hadn't noticed it the night before, probably because we were driving late and it was dark. In a sort of a game we played to add interest to our trip the "Doc" said, "How far do you think that mountain is"? I ventured, "About 35 miles, the distance from New Haven to Hartford" thinking what it would be if we were in Connecticut. Well we drove all day long and it seemed no closer. In fact it took another half day to finally reach the Eastern edge of the Rockies. So clear was the air. I risk saying none of you have ever experienced such a clear atmosphere. Another experience stunning us, and me personally was one day we stopped on the Mohave Desert. As we slowed I leaped from the the car running at full speed trying to catch a Tarantula. Of course I knew I could never catch one nor would I try, for they appeared and disappeared into the sand in an instant. It was near a sizeable hill the "Doc" suggested I climb. Taking off in what I thought was at most a few hundred yards only to find myself going at least a half mile and finding a collapsed tower on top of the hill, which suggested it had been a signal tower for airplanes since it also had a large bulb on it's top. When I got back the "Doc:" said, "I never thought you were coming back. You kept getting smaller and smaller the further you went". I repeat this to emphasize how clear the air was once you got past the industrialized East and the rapidly increasing pollution. To further .emphasize I told of watching the thunder heads of the summer storms when I was a youth. Recently as I rode the same area and looking West couldn't see half way to the Bethany Ridge so polluted has our air become.

Independence Day? Eight years ago former President Obama trotted off to Denmark to sign away US independence in the Copenhagen Climate Change Treaty. Full of exuberance and believing that his popularity would carry the day, he tried - but failed - to create an entirely new World order that would have been controlled by a new international organization. The details of that treaty were never really revealed to us because mainstream media portrayed it simply as a "climate change agreement" that would stop the ravages of global warming, but it was much more.



25th Anniversary for Memorial Scholarship In memory of Arthur & Astrid Wolfe

The Arthur F. Wolfe and Astrid Hansen Wolfe Memorial Scholarship was awarded recently at Senior Awards Night at North Branford High School. The presentation was made by the Wolfes' daughter, Linda Wolfe Rankin, of Wallingford . Mrs. Rankin gave the following message about her parents.

"Tonight is commemorative for me because it marks twenty- five years since I presented my first annual memorial scholarship in memory of my father, Arthur F. Wolfe, under the auspices of the North Branford Scholarship Association.

Each one of my parents played an active and important role in the community. They owned a dairy farm on Forest Road. When it became difficult to find hired help, they sold the farm and moved to Middletown Avenue, where Dad always had over a thousand chickens, and at the same time worked at a Wallingford lumber company. In addition to family and work, Arthur was a charter member of Northford Volunteer Fire Department Company # 2, serving forty-nine years, and a long-time member of the North Branford Constabulary, working to protect our town. He was an active member of his Masonic Lodge, Corinthian #63, and his church, always doing for others. Arthur was a worker with a strong work ethic!

Astrid, who was born in Denmark, entering the United States through Ellis Island as a child. The family settled in Northford on a dairy farm. She drove a tractor, baled hay, and milked cows. She graduated from Lyman Hall High School in Wallingford; as there wasn't bus transportation and she too young to drive, Astrid and herister, Elna, drove a horse and buggy to school! Mom gave so much of herself to charities and organizations, volunteering at Red Cross Blood Drives, working at Soup kitchens, and reaching out to the needy through Women's Fellowship at her church. As a Dane, she was proud to belongto the Danish Sisterhood of America. Could she bake! I can smell the almond coffee cakes now!

MAS Paint Out at Harrison Preserve Members of the Madison Art Society (MAS) Plein Air Painters group gathered to paint the beautiful landscape at the Harrison Preserve on Wednesday, July 5 in North Branford. "This property is a gem for artists," said Jay Babina, who organizes the paint outs from May to October for the Plein Air Painters. The Harrison Preserve is an eighteen-acre parcel of woodlands and fields in the Historic District of North Branford. A stream borders the northern end of the property and is shared with Regional Water Authority land. The woods, which make up most of the property, include a vernal pool and several marked trails. A hay field with blue bird boxes attracts a variety of native birds. Other wildlife spotted on the Preserve includes deer, turkeys, and fox. Ethel and Dudley Harrison, owners of the farm that was passed down through generations, are generously donating the land parcels to the North Branford Land Conservation Trust, Inc. (NBLCT), with the stipulation that it be kept in its natural state. NBLCT has begun the process of surveying the property and filing the necessary legal documents to transfer ownership. The process should be complete by the end of this year. Work parties will be organized to clean up invasive species and clear and remark trails. NBLCT plans to have the Harrison Preserve open to the public for hiking sometime next year.
