High School, and received a Bachelor of Science in criminal justice from Sacred Heart University in Fairfield, Connecticut and a Master's in public administration from the University of Virginia in Charlottesville, Virginia. Chief Lovelace joined the North Branford Police Department in 2006, and during his tenure he has served a police officer, sergeant, lieutenant, Acting Chief, Deputy Chief, and now Chief of Police. He also had extensive leadership training at Quantico, Virgina and has served on the regional "Special Weapons and Tactics" (SWAT) team. Since 2017, Chief Lovelace has worked on the planning and construction of the new North Branford Police Station.

Deputy Chief Michael Pendleton joined the North Branford Police Department this spring following his retirement from the Connecticut State Police and the Connecticut State's Attorney's Office. Deputy Chief Pendleton has over 25 years of dedicated law enforcement experience with



Grand Opening Ceremony for New Police/Emergency Operations Center

North Branford Press Release: There will be as a grand opening ceremony and ribbon cutting for the town's new Police Department/ EmergencyOperations Center, on Wednesday, July 17th at 9:30AM.

Construction began for the new \$16.2 million facility in February of 2023. Located at 305 Forest Road, the facility represents a cooperative effort between local, state and federal authorities with a \$4.5 million in state funding and \$1 million in Federal EOC grant funds.

The public is invited to attend the ceremony where local, state and federal officials including, U.S. Represnetative Rosa Delauro (D-3), and State House Minority Leader Vincent Candelora (R-86) will Be on hand To celebrate the new state of the art facility. The new building addresses the town's change in population and policing that have occurred since the old station was put into service \more than fory years ago.

EDITORIAL

State Representative Vincent Candelora



As someone who serves in the General Assembly, a privilege that requires me to win election every two years, I am deeply committed to the integrity of our electoral process. That's why, on June 20th, I called on Governor Lamont to immediately establish a bipartisan commission dedicated to reviewing and enhancing the security of Connecticut's elections. This initiative is not merely a political maneuver but a

necessary step to restore public confidence in our democratic system.

The urgency of this matter is underscored by recent events in Bridgeport. On June 11, four individuals were arrested in connection with ballot fraud allegations dating back to 2019. More troubling still are the ongoing investigations into new allegations from 2023, sparked by a video showing a campaign operative stuffing ballots into a drop box. These incidents have cast a long shadow over Bridgeport and brought national attention to the potential for corruption within our state.

Given these events, it is no wonder that Connecticut residents are increasingly concerned about the vulnerabilities in our election system. The Governor's recent formation of a bipartisan commission to explore Ranked Choice Voting demonstrates his willingness to address electoral issues. However, the current crisis of confidence in our existing system demands equal if not greater attention.

My proposal, offered with my House and Senate Republican colleagues, calls for the formation of a bipartisan commission focused specifically on the absentee ballot process and the use of ballot drop boxes. This commission would operate independently of the General Assembly's standard committee workload, with the goal of presenting its findings and recommendations to the Government Administration and Elections (GAE) Committee for possible action in the next legislative session.

Decisions that govern our voting system should not be made along party lines, with the legislature's Democratic majority dictating the terms. Such an approach only exacerbates the crisis of confidence in Connecticut's electoral system. Instead, we must adopt a bipartisan process that ensures both majority and minority interests are protected. This commission should include appointees from the Governor, state legislators, a representative from the Office of the Secretary of the State, and the Registrar of Voters Association of Connecticut.

Republicans have been at the forefront of advocating for election integrity in the General Assembly, often offering proposals to safeguard the absentee voting process. Despite their efforts, these proposals have been rejected along party lines.

Elections in Connecticut are at a pivotal moment. This year, for the first time, early voting will be available residents for the general election. Also in November, voters will decide whether to amend the state constitution to allow no-excuse absentee ballots—a significant change that carries risks if not accompanied by robust election security reforms. Meanwhile, Democratic officials in Bridgeport continue to downplay the controversy, even endorsing for a statehouse seat an individual implicated in the 2023 absentee ballot scandal.

We must act now to demonstrate to Connecticut residents that we are serious about addressing these issues. Establishing a bipartisan commission to review and improve our election security is a crucial first step. Only through such a collaborative effort can we restore faith in our electoral process and ensure that every vote is counted fairly and accurately.

As we got older, there were different events that hit my memory. One was the day mom didn't feel well and I took dad with cousins Rudy and Ricky, as we were gonna watch the fireworks from the parking lot where Ricky worked. When we got there, to my surprise they were lifting people with the forklift, having them stand on a skid and putting them on the rooftop. Just as I was turning the corner, they had the old man on a skid. By then, they his legs were shaky and he wasn't the person that he once was. But they got him up there. I was petrified the whole time we were watching the fireworks, thinking of how we were gonna get him down. We finally did and when I took him home that was the first thing he proudly announced to mom. She yelled at me for an hour about being irresponsible and putting him in harms way. I do remember the time you took me and my girlfriend to Wooster Street. All you did was brag about the big display. There were no aerial fireworks. Uncle Rudy took us a few times when we didn't have a car and we parked what seemed like miles away from the fireworks. As we hiked to the right spot, he kept saying it's just around the corner. Billy who was the youngest of the cousins was complaining because he was tired so I put him up on my shoulders to give him a break and he threw up on my head.

One year I had a big party at my house, bought a bunch of fireworks which I wasn't big on, but I figured everybody was going to be there. It was when I first bought my house and we had a great time.

One time at the beach, an aerial bomb fell and pointed right at a group of us. Cousin Joe made it diving, rolling grab and straightened it up just before it went into the air saving what could've been a disaster.



The great part was being with family. Eating, playing bocce or whiffle ball or softball or basketball in the driveway was something I always looked forward to. Those were the special times that I am fortunate to remember. It's just sad that we don't do much of that anymore. Once the matriarchs of the families are gone so goes a great deal of the traditions. 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One More Honor for Babby Nuhn



At the National High School Athletic Coaches Association National Coaches Convention in Bismarck, North Dakota, Nuhn was presented the National Coach of the Year award in the category of Special Sports. She was one of eight finalists for the award, with the others hailing from Nebraska, Minnesota, Florida, Mississippi, Wyoming, Louisiana and Illinois.

The Thunderbirds won their third consecutive Class S field hockey title in November, capping a perfect 22-0 season with a 4-1 victory over Canton in the championship game. It was the program's seventh state title since 1980, and extended Nuhn's state record to 43 years be-

tween an inaugural championship and the most recent.

In 52 seasons at the helm, Nuhn has compiled a 579-209-103-7 record, for a .706 winning percentage. She has been inducted into three halls of fame: Connecticut High School Coaches Association (1998), National High School Athletic Coaches Association (2019) and National Field Hockey Coaches Association (2024). She has also earned numerous Coach of the Year honors, and in 2023, she was a recipient of the prestigious Gold Key Award from the Connecticut Sports Media Alliance, one of the highest honors in state sports.



The Next Electronics Drop Off will be on July 13th.

The event will be held at Public Works from 9am to noon. We will be collecting electronics such as TVs, computers, small appliances and almost anything that has a plug. We cannot accept smoke detectors, A/C's or dehumidifiers.

We will also be taking MATTRESSES (clean and dry). There is a small fee for recycling PROPANE TANKS in reusable condition.

When you bring us your mattress, you are creating jobs for those who take them apart to recycle the components.

When having your picnics, try to have a separate bin for recyclable bottles. Someone will want to cash them in when the picnic is over.

Unacceptable Curbside Waste Reminder

Construction debris (such as toilets, concrete blocks, roofing material),

propane tanks, TVs, monitors, printers, home cleanouts may not be placed curbside. These items will not get picked up; please dispose/ recycle properly.

Fluorescent light tubes do not go into the recycle bin.

Balloons go into the trash bin. They are not plastic film and don't go in the Recycle bin.

Black plastic plant pots and takeout containers are not recyclable.

The next Bulk Pickup isn't until November. Please make other arrangements for your unwanted furniture / bulky waste trash to be disposed of.

Please be courteous to your neighbors and do not place your bulky waste curbside until then.

Plastic Wrap Reminder

Most bird seed, pet food and mulch bags are not made of the right plastic to be considered plastic film. And even if they are labeled as recyclable, they would need to be clean to go into the plastic film bin. Please put these items into the trash unless it has a recycle symbol on it and has been turned inside out and clean.

Hazwaste Central is open for the Season

The Regional Water Authorities' HazWaste Central will be open on Saturdays through October. They are closed on the weekends of July 4th and Labor Day.

HazWaste Central helps area residents in member towns protect water quality by safely disposing of household wastes. Located at RWA at 90 Sargent Drive in New Haven, HazWaste Central is open from 9 a.m. until noon on Saturdays only. Household hazardous waste comes from everyday products used in the home, garage, yard or garden.

A visit to HazWaste Central is quick and easy. Participants never have to leave their cars, and the waste is off-loaded by professionals. Some of the household wastes that can be dropped off include aerosol cleaners and sprays, antifreeze, oil-based paint and pool chemicals. We also list some of the accepted items on your orange trash information card.
