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## State Representative Vincent Candelora

"Feeding the Beast:

CT's Legislative Democrats Turned on Their Own"



Back in April, a Democratic Fairfield County state representative made a telling comment caught on a hot mic. She wanted the governor to raise taxes on her constituents because "they won't even notice." That candid moment seems quaint compared to the very public meltdown we've witnessed this summer—one that's finally exposed what insiders at the Capitol understand: Connecticut's Democratic Party has been hijacked by its progressive wing.

Since late June, Connecticut Democrats have

been locked in an ugly internal war, and it's been quite the spectacle.

Here's what triggered the explosion: Gov. Lamont actually vetoed two bills passed by his own party. One would have allowed striking workers to collect unemployment benefits from the system supported entirely by payments from businesses. The other attempted to override local zoning control in the name of affordable housing. These modest acts of independence sent progressive Democrats into a fury—their anger already simmering over a \$55.8 billion state budget that didn't shower enough money on their pet programs.

The response was swift and vicious. Two Democratic lawmakers told the governor to pack it in and retire. Another dismissed him as caring only about his wealthy Greenwich neighbors. A fourth launched his own gubernatorial campaign. Let that sink in: these progressives are so radical that even a governor who rubber-stamps nearly everything they want isn't left-wing enough for them.

This is the same governor who has dutifully signed off on their entire agenda. Continued investment in free health insurance for illegal immigrants? Done. "Accountability" measures targeting police officers? Absolutely. Expensive green energy initiatives that would make California Democrats proud? Of course. But apparently, 99.9 percent compliance isn't enough for Connecticut's progressive Democrats, whose values align more closely with socialist activists than with the "moderate" governor voters are often told they elected.

For years, Democratic leaders in the General Assembly have been masterful at concealing the revolution brewing within their ranks. They've deployed moderate-sounding rhetoric while keeping their most radical members in the shadows. Publicly, they claim to support job growth, public safety, affordability, and fiscal responsibility. Meanwhile, they've used Gov. Lamont as their so-called moderate front man while quietly advancing policies that undermine those very goals.

But this summer's tantrum has ripped away that carefully constructed facade. Connecticut residents are finally getting a clear look at who's really running the show in Hartford—and it's not the person in the Governor's residence who views himself as a centrist.

The truth is stark: our legislature is exclusively controlled by Democrats who view California politicians as role models. These are lawmakers who believe every problem can be solved with higher taxes funding bigger government programs. They hold press conferences lamenting how expensive Connecticut has become for working families while refusing to acknowledge their role in creating that crisis. And when their own governor dares to suggest "maybe we should think about this one a little more," they respond with tantrums worthy of toddlers in a toy store.

Governor Lamont brought this chaos on himself. When you spend years feeding the beast, you shouldn't be surprised when it eventually devours you. He has enabled these legislators at every turn, signed their destructive policies, and now finds himself under attack for the smallest acts of independence. Don't shed any tears for him—he's been a willing accomplice in Connecticut's stagnation.

Democratic lawmakers are betting that voters won't notice—or won't care—that their caucuses have been devoured by radical elements. They're counting on people being too distracted to pay attention to what's happening in Hartford, all while reflexively blaming President Trump for everything under the sun.

It was Democrats that underfunded state employee healthcare. It was Democrats that imposed a hospital provider tax without consulting the state's hospital association—a tax hospitals say they can't afford. And as municipalities struggle with surging special education costs, it was Democrats that decided against fully funding the state's share, leaving property taxpayers holding the bag. Democrats in Hartford, not Trump, dumped hundreds of millions of dollars into higher education system last year while ignoring overruns in our Medicaid program.

People are paying attention, though. What they're seeing is a Democratic Party more interested in appeasing its progressive base than governing responsibly. This internal food fight isn't ending anytime soon, and that's actually good news for Connecticut taxpayers who deserve to know exactly who's calling the shots.

Because if this summer has taught us anything, it's that both sides of the intra-party squabble are toxic for taxpayers—whether it's the progressive radicals driving the agenda or their willing enabler in the governor's residence. Connecticut deserves better than this dysfunctional circus.

# For the Health of it...

#### What Weighs More: A Pound of Popcorn or a Pound of Nails?



The answer, of course, is neither because a pound is a pound. Whether it's an enormous mound of fluffy popcorn or a small pile of heavy nails, both weigh the same. Yet time and time again this classic riddle trips people up, having them insist that the nails are heavier.

A similar misconception centers around fat and muscle. You may have heard that muscle weighs more than fat and may even believe it to be true, but once again if we're talking pound for pound, they weigh exactly the same. Now here's where it's relevant to

your body and your health: a pound of fat takes up more space in your body than a pound of muscle. So while a pound of each weighs the same (just like popcorn and nails), fat is... fluffier. This is why someone who weighs 160 pounds for example, and has a higher muscle percentage might look leaner than someone who weighs the exact same but carries more body fat. However, there is absolutely no fluff about the fact that *muscle matters* at every age and the number on the scale seldom tells the whole story. So if you find yourself staring at the number on the scale daily and are discouraged by what you see or worse yet, are allowing it to define you, I have two words for you—*please stop*. Instead, pay attention to those non-scale victories that come with consistent changes over time, like clothes fitting differently, increased energy, and better sleep.

Strength training leads to muscle strength and it is not just for gym rats or twenty-somethings seeking to be beach-body beautiful. So if you were about to pull the age card and think this doesn't apply to you, you will soon see why that excuse doesn't hold much weight. I'm about to interrupt your cardio routine with an important message, there is no cut off point and that's great news! Numerous studies have shown that people in their 50s, 60s, 70s, 80s, and even 90s can gain strength and muscle mass with resistance training, bodyweight exercises, resistance bands, light dumbbells—whatever works for you, your fitness level and comfort. The important thing is consistency, not intensity.

And, there's no need to panic about needing to lift heavy weights or fear that you might bulk up. For most people, gaining large muscle mass takes intense training and often years of effort. We are talking about muscle strength more so than growth. What strength training *does* at any consistent level is boost metabolism, improve posture, and protect the joints. As an added bonus, the muscle you build burns more calories, even at rest, than fat does. So that strength training workout you did is still burning energy (calories) on your behalf, hours later. How's that for a bonus!?

Imagine what it would feel like to experience the benefits of improved mobility, bone strength, and even emotional well-being? Although healthy amounts of body fat are necessary, as we age, having muscle strength becomes more important (not less important) than ever. Research shows that older adults who engage in strength training just twice a week can improve in all these areas. Strong Muscles also mean better balance, coordination, and resilience. A report on cognitive health I came across recently mentioned improved memory as another benefit of exercise and most specifically, of strength training.

So, whether you're 25 or 75, hitting the weights (or even just doing bodyweight exercises in your living room) is one of the best gifts you can give your body and mind. Keep on with the daily walks or whatever else you're already doing to get movement into your day, but if strength training isn't part of your regular routine, it's time to give it a go. And remember: you're not trying to turn into a bodybuilder. You're just swapping a little fluff for some functional, powerful, muscle magic and reaping the rewards of all the good stuff that comes with it!

# IT'S ITALIAN - IT'S ALL GOOD

A special public screening of the docufilm, "Max Corvo - For Freedom: The War of OSS in Italy, 1943-1945," will be presented by the Italian-American Defense League and hosted in Derby by the Order Sons and Daughters of Italy America, at the Derby Lodge. 73 High Street, Derby, Connecticut Friday, August 22, at 6:30 P.M. All are welcome.

The film tells the remarkable, true story of Biagio Max Corvo, a young Sicilian immigrant who arrived in Middletown from Melilli, Sicily in 1929, at the age of nine. He came to Middletown with his mother, brother, and sister to join their father, Cesare, who was forced to leave the island six years before because he was persecuted by the Fascist regime. After growing up in Middletown and becoming a proud American, Corvo joined the Army shortly before World War II and became the Chief of Operations of Secret Intelligence of the American OSS (Office of Strategic Services-precursor of the CIA) in Italy during the military campaign of Allied forces in Italy from 1943 to 1945.

The film was produced by Cordan Enterprises, LLC, a Middletown company owned by members of the Corvo family. Ezio Costanzo, the award-winning director and screenwriter of the film, tells this story using a framework of historical events alternating with personal stories during the secret war conducted in Italy by the men of the American intelligence service, the OSS. The wartime events are enhanced with Corvo's individual, brilliant, and meticulous memories.

During World War II, Corvo was quickly recruited into the OSS, where he prepared an intelligence plan (Corvo Plan) for the organization in Sicily of a network of collaborators for the liberation of the island from the Fascists and Nazis (Operation Husky, 10 July 1943). He was appointed Chief of Secret Intelligence Operations for the OSS in Italy. He was chosen for this mission because of his familiarity with Italy and Sicily, for his knowledge of the Italian language and the Sicilian dialect, and his political friendships among the Italian refugees in the United States. Because of this background Corvo was able to propose and implement a series of espionage operations in the field, some of which were spectacular, in support of the war against the Germans and the Fascists. These missions helped achieve victory for the Allies in Italy during the war. Corvo recruited key personnel to work with him in OSS Secret Intelligence in Italy from Middletown. This included Atty. Vincent Scamporino, Attorney and Wesleyan graduate Emilio "Mim" Daddario, Sebastian Passanisi, Frank Tarallo. Louis Fiorilla and Sam Fraulino.

"Corvo's is a truly incredible story," says the director and screenwriter of the film, Ezio Costanzo, "if you stop and think that he joined the OSS when he was only 22 years old, after having lived in America for just thirteen years." Even more amazing is the fact that Max Corvo never graduated from high school, leaving school after the eleventh grade to work to help provide for his family during the Great Depression.

The decision to place this foreign-born, very young man as Chief of Operations for Strategic Intelligence operations in Italy was an authentic act of genius by Earl Brennan, the Head of the Italian Section for OSS in Washington. The success of the missions in the field ensured Corvo the constant support of General William Donovan, Director of the OSS. Donovan was a very tough and demanding man. Following the end of World War II and the surrender of the Germans, Corvo and the other leaders of OSS Secret Intelligence operations in Italy were returned rapidly to the United States as a result of complaints from a number of competing OSS agents in Switzerland, including Allen Dulles. Years later, and thanks to the vast documentation preserved by Max Corvo which his family placed in The Max Corvo Archive at Trinity College in Hartford, Connecticut, it was possible to reconstruct this particular moment of the history of Italy, the American OSS, and his work during the liberation of Italy from the Nazis and Fascists."

# If you cut me, I would bleed garlic and olive oil by Mark Hehl

Connecticut has the highest per capita population of Italian Americans in the USA. Our pizza is award winning and considered the best in the country. Here is a childhood recollection of a local Italian American who grew up in an Italian enclave during the 1950's.

As in most Italian American homes in the 1950s we ate pasta with tomato sauce (*I never heard it called gravy until many years later*). At many, if not most, meals. I remember my mother telling me to stir the sauce every 20 minutes when she went out. We only used a wooden spoon; a stainless steel was not allowed as it was thought to diminish the flavor. When I was young, I incorrectly thought that everyone ate pasta at most meals. As a teenager, I finally realized that only Italian-Americans did so.

In addition to using it to stir the sauce, a wooden spoon was used as a punishing weapon. On many occasions, I was hit with one by my mother for doing something that I should not have done. A wooden spoon brings back memories of the wonderful smell of the sauce simmering on the stove in my childhood home, and also the pain.

One day, the sauce was simmering on the stove, and a loaf of crusty Italian bread was sitting next to the pot. It was customary to break a small piece off and dip it into the sauce while it was cooking, but only one piece. On this day, my brother Dennis and I were talking in the kitchen while dipping the bread in the sauce and became *carried away*. Before we realized it, we consumed all the bread and half of the sauce. We were having some of my parents' friends over for dinner that day and there was not enough sauce left. It took three hours to cook the sauce and there was not enough time to make another batch. I remember listening to my mother's tirade for the following three days. It was not pleasant.

At about sixteen years old, I was invited to a non-Italian friend's home for dinner. They were passing around a bottle of salad dressing and I asked: "what is that stuff?". I have never seen salad dressing before that day. My mother always put olive oil, vinegar, and oregano on the salad prior to serving it. I still do not like prepared salad dressings and eat salad the way that I did as a child. I love olive oil so much that I usually skip the vinegar.

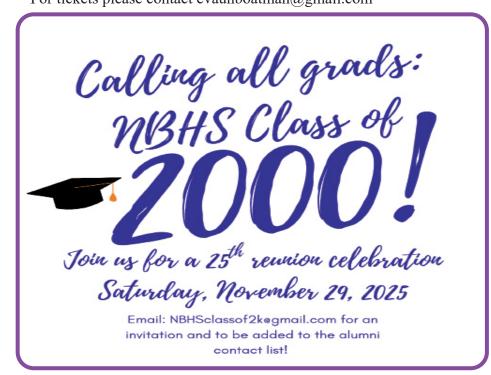

Household hazardous waste comes from everyday products used in the home, garage, yard or garden.

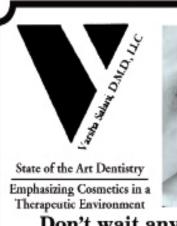
