Public Health Epidemics: Teenage "Juuling"

and Retail Sale of Marijuana



This next legislative session, I again will be serving on the Public Health Committee. This committee addresses a wide spectrum of health issues ranging from medical practices and procedures to drug and alcohol addiction. We will likely be hearing bills on legalizing the retail sale of marijuana on one hand, and curtailing teenage use of

tobacco products on the other. I hope our discussion of the later will bolster the point that introducing another addictive drug into mainstream society will only increase teenage use and create long term addiction problems for these individuals.

One popular brand of e-cigarettes, JUUL, contains the same amount of nicotine in one pod as a pack of cigarettes. These devices are shaped like a USB drive and are easily concealed, and students are even using them in school during class because, just like with the various forms of marijuana, the drug can be delivered without a flame and smoke. According to a state public health study, teenage users were initially exposed to vaping from a family member or friend. More than half of the youth also reported that they used their electronic devices for other substances, such as marijuana, THC or hash oil, or THC wax.

This fall, the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) classified youth ecigarette use an epidemic and requested that the manufacturers take action in order to reduce youth access and use. Because of this trend, the Institute of Medicine and the American Medical Association have supported raising the legal age to purchase tobacco products from 18 to 21, and we will likely see this proposal again this year.

Students who would otherwise be unwilling to inhale a traditional cigarette are more apt to try e-cigarettes, and locally, studies show that students no longer fear marijuana as an addictive drug. I believe that marijuana use among teens will rapidly become a bigger problem than e-cigarettes if the retail market comes to Connecticut. Both of these markets target our youth with flavored nicotine, such as fruit and mint, and THC laced gummy bears, sodas, and baked products. Given that the same devices can use nicotine and THC packets, it is difficult for school administrators to differentiate whether a student is vaping or getting high on marijuana. Some school have purchased and utilize test kits for \$10 each which determine whether the devices have THC concentrates in them.

Because the delivery system for THC and nicotine has changed, the health impacts are still either unknown or negative. Studies have shown that marijuana use under the age of 23 impacts brain development and causes



a permanent reduction in I.Q. of up to eight points. As your state representative, I will continue to take in the information, but I have a growing concern of the national trend to allow for the retail sale of marijuana. As a parent, I regularly talk to my children about these

"....It's Only a Matter of Time..."

Dear Editor:

In his November 23rd, 2018 editorial State Representative Vincent Candelora rightly points out the unintended consequence of tolls and the inevitable increase in traffic volume on town roads 80, 17, and 22 as motorists attempt to avoid these tolls. I commend him for his insight.

Unfortunately, at present there are already traffic concerns and I would like to specifically address the intersection of Woods Hill Rd. and Middletown Ave (Rt 17) in the Northford section. Woods Hill Rd, in effect, has become an extended ramp for I-91 and in no way has it been designed for the volume of traffic it receives. In addition, I feel the configuration of the intersection is a major contributor to what seems a dramatic increase in the number of accidents. The intersection is not configured at a right angle, allowing vehicles travelling northbound on Rt 17 to make a left turn onto Woods Hill Rd at a high rate of speed, most often dangerously close to southbound vehicles and cutting the corner so close as to cross over the stop bar on Woods Hill Rd. into oncoming traffic.

Adding to this dangerous mix is the increased number and size of trucks ignoring the 'No Thru Trucks' signage, and for those 18 wheeled rigs that do obey the sign, the spectacle of one backing up onto Rt 17 into oncoming traffic.

I am by no means a traffic engineer but there is ample evidence of an issue. Numerous accidents, blaring horns from close calls, broken glass, oil, sand, car parts and (as of this writing at least) the most recent late-night Christmas Eve accident that now has the Stop sign at Woods Hill Rd standing half as tall. So many accidents it seems in the past few months that neither state or local public works even bother to fully clean the mess anymore.

I would urge town officials and the local traffic authority to consider this intersection hazardous and work with the state to improve its safety. Suggestions include signage on Rt 17 alerting motorists to use caution at the intersection, warning trucks prior to turning onto Woods Hill Rd, speed calming methods on this stretch of Rt 17, and even a re-design of the intersection itself. As Mr. Candelora stated, the quality of life of neighbors in this area is being negatively impacted, and more important, I am concerned that it is only a matter of time before there is a tragic injury or fatality. **Respectively, Eric Albert**

- 4. Cut across the bottom of your paper so it is straight.
- 5. Cut your folded paper so it looks like the triangle above.
- Then unfold it gently. Don't worry if your snowflake isn't exact: No two snowflakes are ever alike.

NORTH BRANFORD PUBLIC SCHOOLS PRESCHOOL ROLE MODEL SCREENING FEBRUARY 1st, 2019

Project PRIDE is a special education preschool located at

Jerome Harrison School, North Branford, CT. The program incorporates children without disabilities to model appropriate social, language and play skills within preschool activities. This program meets four days a week (Monday through Thursday) with two sessions (morning 9:00-11:30, afternoon 12:45-3:15). The program is seeking three and four-year-old children with typically-developing skills to serve as role models in our classes for the 2019-2020 school year.

To be enrolled as a role model peer, children must pass a preschool screening which assesses cognitive, speech-language, motor and social skills. Role model peers must be toilet trained. If parents are interested, please contact Mrs. Kohler at

203-484-1235, to schedule a screening appointment. The screening will take approximately 30 minutes.

The names of children who pass the screening will be placed in a lottery that will take place in February or as soon as enough candidates have applied. Parents will be notified by phone in February if their child is selected. Children who are selected will participate at no cost. However, transportation must be provided by the parent.

I HAVE A DREAM

Martin Luther King Jr. delivered, August 28, 1963

I am happy to join with you today in what will go down in history as the greatest demonstration for freedom in the history of our nation.

Five score years ago, a great American, in whose symbolic shadow we stand today, signed the Emancipation Proclamation. This momentous decree came as a great beacon light of hope to millions of Negro slaves who had been seared in the flames of withering injustice. It came as a joyous daybreak to end the long night of their captivity.

But one hundred years later, the Negro still is not free. One hundred years later, the life of the Negro is still sadly crippled by the manacles of segregation and the chains of discrimination. One hundred years later, the Negro lives on a lonely island of poverty in the midst of a vast ocean of material prosperity. One hundred years later, the Negro is still languished in the corners of American society and finds himself in exile in his own land. And so we've come here today to dramatize a shameful condition.

In a sense we've come to our nation's capital to cash a check. When the architects of our republic wrote the magnificent words of the Constitution and the Declaration of Independence, they were signing a promissory note to which every American was to fall heir. This note was a promise that all men, yes, black men as well as white men, would be guaranteed the unalienable rights of life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness. It is obvious today that America has defaulted on this promissory note insofar as her citizens of color are concerned. Instead of honoring this sacred obligation, America has given the Negro people a bad check, a check which has come back marked insufficient funds.

But we refuse to believe that the bank of justice is bankrupt. We refuse to believe that there are insufficient funds in the great vaults of opportunity of this nation. And so we've come to cash this check, a check that will give us upon demand the riches of freedom (*Yes*) and the security of justice

We have also come to this hallowed spot to remind America of the fierce urgency of now. This is no time to engage in the luxury of cooling off or to take the tranquilizing drug of gradualism. Now is the time to make real the promises of democracy. Now is the time to rise from the dark and desolate valley of segregation to the sunlit path of racial justice. Now is the time to lift our nation from the quicksands of racial injustice to the solid rock of brotherhood. Now is the time to make justice a reality for all of God's children.

It would be fatal for the nation to overlook the urgency of the moment. This sweltering summer of the Negro's legitimate discontent will not pass until there is an invigorating autumn of freedom and equality. 1963 is not an end, but a beginning. And those who hope that the Negro needed to blow off steam and will now be content will have a rude awakening if the nation returns to business as usual. There will be neither rest nor tranquility in America until the Negro is granted his citizenship rights. The whirlwinds of revolt will continue to shake the foundations of our nation until the bright day of justice emerges.

But there is something that I must say to my people, who stand on the warm threshold which leads into the palace of justice: in the process of gaining our rightful place, we must not be guilty of wrongful deeds. Let us not seek to satisfy our thirst for freedom by drinking from the cup of bitterness and hatred. We must forever conduct our struggle on the high plane of dignity and discipline. We must not allow our creative protest to degenerate into physical violence. Again and again, we must rise to the majestic heights of meeting physical force with soul force. The marvelous new militancy which has engulfed the Negro community must not lead us to a distrust of all white people, for many of our white brothers, as evidenced by their presence here today, have come to realize that their destiny is tied up with our destiny, and they have come to realize that their freedom is inextricably bound to our freedom. We cannot walk alone.

And as we walk, we must make the pledge that we shall always march ahead. We cannot turn back. There are those who are asking the devotees of civil rights, "When will you be satisfied?" We can never be satisfied as long as the Negro is the victim of the unspeakable horrors of police brutality. We can never be satisfied as long as our bodies, heavy with the fatigue of travel, cannot gain lodging in the motels of the highways and the hotels of the cities. We cannot be satisfied as long as the Negro's basic mobility is from a smaller ghetto to a larger one. We can never be satisfied as long as our children are stripped of their selfhood and robbed of their dignity by signs stating for whites only. We cannot be satisfied as long as a Negro in Mississippi cannot vote and a Negro in New York believes he has nothing for which to vote. No, no, we are not satisfied and we will not be satisfied until justice rolls down like waters (*Yes*) and righteousness like a mighty stream.

I am not unmindful that some of you have come here out of great trials and tribulations. Some of you have come fresh from narrow jail cells. Some of you have come from areas where your quest for freedom left you battered by the storms of persecution and staggered by the winds of police brutality. You have been the veterans of creative suffering. Continue to work with the faith that unearned suffering is redemptive. Go back to Mississippi go back to Alabama, go back to South Carolina, go back to Georgia, go back to Louisiana, go back to the slums and ghettos of our northern cities, knowing that somehow this situation can and will be changed. Let us not wallow in the valley of despair. I say to you today, my friends, so even though we face the difficulties of today and tomorrow, I still have a dream. It is a dream deeply rooted in the American dream.

I have a dream that one day even the state of Mississippi, a state sweltering with the heat of injustice, sweltering with the heat of oppression, will be transformed into an oasis of freedom and justice.

I have a dream that my four little children will one day live in a nation where they will not be judged by the color of their skin but by the content of their character. I have a dream today. I have a dream that one day down in Alabama, with its vicious racists, with its governor having his lips dripping with the words of "interposition" and "nullification", one day right there in Alabama little black boys and black girls will be able to join hands with little white boys and white girls as sisters and brothers. I have a dream today.

I have a dream that one day every valley shall be exalted, every hill and mountain shall be made low, the rough places will be made plain, and the crooked places will be made straigh, and the glory of the Lord shall be revealed ,and all flesh shall see it together.

This is our hope. This is the faith that I go back to the South with. With this faith we will be able to hew out of the mountain of despair a stone of hope. This will be the day, this will be the day when all of God's children will be able to sing with new meaning: "My country, 'tis of thee, sweet land of liberty, of thee I sing. Land where my fathers died, land of the pilgrim's pride, from every mountainside, let freedom ring!'

And if America is to be a great nation, this must become true. So let freedom ring from the prodigious hilltops of New Hampshire. Let freedom ring from the mighty mountains of New York. Let freedom ring from the heightening Alleghenies of Pennsylvania. Let freedom ring from the snow-capped Rockies of Colorado. Let freedom ring from the curvaceous slopes of California. But not only that: Let freedom ring from Stone Mountain of Georgia. Let freedom ring from Lookout Mountain of Tennessee. Let freedom ring from every hill and molehill of Mississippi. From every mountainside let freedom ring.
