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



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State Representative Vincent Candelora Where Are We Headed?



Democrats have often accused Republicans of being too negative when it comes to discussing Connecticut's economic health. I believe the negativity is relative. If you are a realtor, home builder, or other small business owner, you'd probably think public officials aren't being vocal enough about our economic situation. Two weeks ago, I

had the opportunity as a voting member on the State's Bond Commission to be that voice.

The Commission met to approve roughly \$680 million of projects, ranging from athletic fields to building repairs and approve additional bonding. I voted against every agenda item, including ones that affect my district as hundreds of people sat in the room waiting for a photo opportunity with the Governor to celebrate the approval of their project. As I walked out of the room, these very recipients of the money shook my hand and thanked me for standing up for what is right. I appreciated their understanding, but it doesn't solve our problem.

As I said in that meeting, I voted against the projects, not because I disagreed with their merits, but because we can no longer afford them. When you buy a car or a house, unless you have the cash, you typically take out a loan or mortgage and begin paying for that car or house. Logical, right? In Connecticut, we "purchase" that car or home and while we created the obligation to pay, we don't take out that loan until sometime down the road. As a result, under Governor Malloy, Connecticut has increased its approved, unfunded projects from \$2.5 billion to over \$7.5 billion. This number is not on the books and on top of what we already pay for debt! I voted against these projects to shed light on this discussion.

It's no wonder that Connecticut's outlook continues its negative rating by Moody's Investor Services. They state, "Connecticut's outlook is negative, which reflects a lagging economy and weakening demographics that have led to budgetary strain. . . [W]e believe that economic trends will place negative pressure on the state's finances in the next few years, while the very high fixed costs reduce flexibility." Fitch and S & P had similar conclusions, holding Connecticut back, however, are a "burden of debt and unfunded pension liabilities" that, in relation to resources, among the highest in the country.

At the same time, the state piles on unfunded projects, actions speak louder than words, and Governor Malloy got caught in a lie as he asked his department heads to make cuts, but certified to the Comptroller that the budget was in balance. House and Senate Republicans noticed the discrepancy, and, at our request, the Legislature's independent Office of Fiscal Analysis found that our budget is in the red to the tune of \$78 million.

I believe Connecticut can pull out of this fiscal crisis, and I will continue to take the difficult votes and speak up to shed light on this issues. Political spin needs to stop. My greatest concerns after this election is that the Governor will try and raise taxes again. After all, the rating agencies noted one condition that favors the state, "its wealthy economic base" and an "unlimited" legal ability to levy taxes. That's what got Connecticut into the trouble in the first place.

Property Assessment Deferral Program

The Town of North Branford recognizes the importance of economic growth in our community. In an effort to assist businesses expanding in town the Town Council has adopted an Assessment Deferral Program.

The Program enables a property's assessment to be unchanged during the period of construction or rehabilitation and until the issuance of a Certificate of Occupancy or two years after the application approval, whichever comes sooner. The deferral program enables the increased assessment to be deferred for up to five years.

Improvement from the project must result in an increase in the assessed property of at least 35% in value along with other requirements detailed in the application. This program began October 1, 2016.

North Branford Land Conservation Trust, Incorporated It's About the Land

What is it about open space which generates a passion among a few in this town to save it? For one thing it isn't covered with parking lots, pavement, buildings, lawns, and other features of 'developed' property. We think of open space as forest land, open fields, or farmland. Much of the undeveloped land in town is forested open space in a variety of forms. It is land which isn't protected by law or conservation easements, meaning that it could be developed in the future. It has trees large and small, shrubs, seedlings and perennial vegetation such as wild flowers in the understory. Parts of it may be wetland (swamp), and a stream may run through it. It's a place where birds, deer, wild turkey, other mammals, maybe bear, and where cold blooded creatures such as snakes, turtles, and salamanders in vernal pools make their home. There are places where high, near vertical craggy ledges of fern-covered rock formations rise up from the ground; and other places which are steeply sloping with deep ravines and where water tumbles over boulders after a storm. There is also a promontory with a view of the Farm River valley. And if it is summer and an outbreak of gypsy moth is stripping trees bare, a walk through the woods can be an unpleasant experience. Invasive plants and shrubs, some bearing sharp thorns planted for landscaping and escaped into the forest, may also add to the unpleasant experience. So if open space doesn't have the features of beautifully landscaped property, what's the attraction?

Not all of our members are "tree huggers" yet they see the preservation and protection of open space as an important component of public policy. Saving open space is good for an urbanizing society which needs clean air, clean water, buffers between residential and commercial/industrial areas, flood protection, places for passive recreation where it's possible to enjoy the natural world on a hiking trail, or fishing in a tree-shaded stream. These features of open space, we've come to realize, contribute to good physical and mental well-being. A walk in the woods either alone or socially with a group can be time well spent.

Your land trust advocates on behalf of open space. We'd like to save as much of the remaining undeveloped acreage in town as is prudent especially at locations where subdivision of the land would create new problems for the town. We think that hiking and fishing are great, healthy pastimes and that a program of land acquisition should be undertaken with this in mind. But moving forward on projects like these is daunting. It will require the talents and perseverance of many.

The land trust can't do it alone. We don't have the resources. We need public and private partners, experienced grant writers, people with good digital information and mapping skills, and good communicators for fund raising and finding partners. 


