Social Media and Instant Access to Information



Last Friday as I was getting ready for bed, I received a text from my son that his college had gone into lockdown over an active shooter. He and some fellow students locked down the building and went into the basement, and for the next two hours we texted back and forth. He listened to updates on the police scanner; I went on Facebook and

Twitter to follow the moment by moment updates from the school and other students. The student reports ranged from multiple gun shots heard around campus and reports of a couple people injured. When the night was over, a suspect had been apprehended for firing a sing shot hitting a nonstudent on the sidewalk near a campus building.

As I now reflect on this experience, I have mixed emotions about social media and the impact, both positive and negative, that it brought to this incident. I was grateful that the school provided updates to the parents and quickly put the school into lockdown to protect them, and I had instant access to my son via texting. As I trolled through twitter to try and get information, students and parents posted wild versions of what was actually occurring on campus. My son said that the officers were following so many false reports of other shootings around campus, they were actually delayed in tracking where the shooter went.

Social media has given people platforms and allows us to participate in arenas that we normally would not have access. The actual event of the shooting was traumatic for the students that witnessed it. The remaining trauma developed through two hours of twitter and Facebook reporting that exaggerated stories, were politically charged, and unnecessarily critical of a situation before it even played out. I wonder how many people were traumatized from the social media posting as opposed to the incident itself.

Our society has become so emotionally charged these days over politics and current events, and I think social media has ignited it. People need to figure out when to be spectators versus participants. Legislation won't help



this issue, but I think there is a connection between all the school bullying, emotionally charged people and social media.

I am thankful for the Hamden High hockey team, especially the yearly games against Fairfield Prep, ND-West Haven and West Haven High.

BIRTH RIGHT

[know the Right from Wong]

President Trump has thrown many into fevered pitch by suggesting that he may limit birth right citizenship. Reading the law and its interpretation over the years, it's hard to figure out why we have come to this pointed dispute. Here's my look at the issue.

Article 1 of our Constitution gives Congress the power to establish a "uniform Rule of Naturalization." In 1950 the Supreme Court said, "[t]he exclusion of aliens is a fundamental act of sovereignty ... inherent in the executive power." While there are constitutional checks on these powers, there are very sound and literal interpretations of the 14th Amendment that support the President's idea.

The landmark case heralded as the birth right progenitor is the 1898 case of U.S. v. Wong Kim Ark. It held that "a child born in the United States, of parents of Chinese descent, who, at the time of his birth, were subjects of the emperor of China, but have a permanent domicile and residence in the United States" was entitled to citizenship based on his birth on American soil. So, how would this flush with an executive order or Congressional act?

The 14th Amendment states: "All persons born or naturalized in the United States, and subject to the jurisdiction thereof, are citizens of the United States and of the state wherein they reside." One's "residence" is the place where one actually lives as distinguished from one's "domicile," a place of temporary sojourn. Thus, a birthright is conferred only when born to a mother who has established US residency. Proof of residency requires a lease, a home address, a driver's license, electric bill, etc. This is consistent with the Wong decision on this issue because Wong's parents had established permanent residence in California. This rational interpretation of the law suggests that an executive order may deny the grant of citizenship to transients and alien visitors.

The precise language of the 14th Amendment also suggests that the person must be subject to the jurisdiction of the United States. What this means and whether it can apply to people living here without authorization is an issue never reached by the Court. Like the residency requirement, it stands right with the Wong decision. It could be clarified by executive order or congressional action and then subjected to judicial review. Applied even handedly to all aliens, it could withstand equal protection, due process and racism claims.

In considering such measures it is important to realize that they do not portend any automatic denial of citizenship. While they undo automatic citizenship for some, all of the other avenues of citizenship remain available. While not being mean or heartless, these citizenship requirements would prevent aliens from taking advantage of our social welfare programs, overburdening our educational systems, or gaining a foothold for other invidious aims.

Wealthy Russians, Chinese and others have sojourned to the US for decades to give their children US citizenship. (see *Birth Tourism Brings Russian Baby Boom to Miami*, Cynthia McFadden, NBC News, 1/10/18; *US Cracks Down on Birth Tourism Industry*, Cynthia Liao, Immigration Blog, 3/7/18). Giving away citizenship to these foreigners is ludicrous. No other thinking country does this. It should be done on a case-by-case basis. **D. Kirt Westfall 11/3/18**

Alton L. Eliason (Bucky) died October 29th peacefully at the age of 101. Born February 12, 1917, he was married for 81 years to the love of his life, Marjorie. He was born and raised in North Haven where he acquired his love of farming.

The youngest of seven, he became interested in physical fitness. He owned a gym in New Haven in the early forties and became one of the first physiotherapists in the state. He wrote for many fitness and organic gardening magazines, and was best known for his "Wit and Wisdom" articles in The Totoket Times.

He worked at Pratt and Whitney, owned Northford Cleaners, delivered the New Haven Register and worked at the Post Office, where he retired. His life revolved around his family and working the homestead.

He leaves his daughter, Linda Kos, son Leslie (Carolyn) Eliason, grandchildren Kim Mathew) Williams, Stephanie (John) Flanagan, Jacquelyn Kos, Sean {Allyson} Eliason, and Shilo Megill, 12 great grandchildren, and 2 great-great grandchildren.

The History of Thanksgiving

Thanksgiving Day, annual national holiday in the <u>United States</u> and <u>Canada</u> celebrating the harvest and other blessings of the past year. Americans generally believe that their Thanksgiving is modeled on a 1621 harvest <u>feast</u> shared by the English colonists (<u>Pilgrims</u>) of <u>Plymouth</u> and the <u>Wampanoag people</u>. The American <u>holiday</u> is particularly rich in <u>legend</u> and symbolism, and the traditional fare of the Thanksgiving meal typically includes <u>turkey</u>, bread stuffing, <u>potatoes</u>, <u>cranberries</u>, and <u>pumpkin</u> pie. With respect to vehicular travel, the holiday is often the busiest of the year, as family members gather with one another.

Plymouth's Thanksgiving began with a few colonists going out "fowling," possibly for turkeys but more probably for the easier prey of geese and ducks, since they "in one day killed as much as...served the company almost a week." Next, 90 or so Wampanoag made a surprise appearance at the settlement's gate, doubtlessly unnerving the 50 or so colonists. Nevertheless, over the next few days the two groups socialized without incident. The Wampanoag contributed <u>venison</u> to the feast, which included the fowl and probably <u>fish</u>, <u>eels</u>, <u>shellfish</u>, stews, <u>vegetables</u>, and <u>beer</u>. Since Plymouth had few buildings and manufactured goods,

most people ate outside while sitting on the ground or on <u>barrels</u> with plates on their laps. The men fired <u>guns</u>, ran races, and drank <u>liquor</u>, struggling to speak in broken English and Wampanoag. This was a rather disorderly affair, but it sealed a treaty between the two groups that lasted until <u>King Philip's War</u> (1675–76), in which hundreds of colonists and thousands of <u>Native Americans</u> lost their lives.

The <u>New England</u> colonists were accustomed to regularly celebrating "Thanksgivings," days of <u>prayer</u> thanking God for blessings such as military victory or the end of a drought. The U.S. <u>Continental Congress</u> proclaimed a national Thanksgiving upon the enactment of the Constitution, for example. Yet, after 1798, the new <u>U.S. Congress</u> left Thanksgiving declarations to the states; some objected to the national government's involvement in a religious observance, Southerners were slow to adopt a New England custom, and others took offense over the day's being used to hold partisan speeches and parades. A national Thanksgiving Day seemed more like a lightning rod for controversy than a unifying force.

Thanksgiving Day did not become an official holiday until Northerners dominated the federal <u>government</u>. While sectional tensions prevailed in the mid-19th century, the editor of the popular <u>magazine</u> *Godey's Lady's Book*, <u>Sarah Josepha</u> <u>Hale</u>, campaigned for a national Thanksgiving Day to promote unity. She finally won the support of President <u>Abraham Lincoln</u>. On October 3, 1863, during the <u>Civil War</u>, Lincoln proclaimed a national day of thanksgiving to be celebrated on Thursday, November 26.

The holiday was annually proclaimed by every president thereafter, and the date *Continued on Page 6*

chosen, with few exceptions, was the last Thursday in November. President Franklin D. Roosevelt, however, attempted to extend the <u>Christmas</u> shopping season, which generally begins with the Thanksgiving holiday, and to boost the economy by moving the date back a week, to the third week in <u>November</u>. But not all states complied, and, after a joint resolution of <u>Congress</u> in 1941, Roosevelt issued a proclamation in 1942 designating the fourth Thursday in November (which is not always the last Thursday) as Thanksgiving Day.

As the country became more urban and family members began to live farther apart, Thanksgiving became a time to gather together. The holiday moved away from its religious roots to allow immigrants of every background to participate in a common tradition. Thanksgiving Day <u>football</u> games, beginning with <u>Yale</u> versus <u>Princeton</u> in 1876, enabled fans to add some rowdiness to the holiday. In the late 1800s parades of costumed revelers became common. In 1920 Gimbel's <u>department store</u> in Philadelphia staged a parade of about 50 people with <u>Santa</u> <u>Claus</u> at the rear of the procession. Since 1924 the annual Macy's parade in <u>New</u> <u>York City</u> has continued the tradition, with huge <u>balloons</u> since 1927. The holiday associated with Pilgrims and Native Americans has come to symbolize intercultural <u>peace</u>, America's opportunity for newcomers, and the sanctity of home and family.

Days of thanksgiving in <u>Canada</u> also originated in the colonial period, arising from the same European traditions, in gratitude for safe journeys, peace, and bountiful harvests. The earliest celebration was held in 1578, when an expedition led by <u>Martin Frobisher</u> held a ceremony in present-day <u>Nunavut</u> to give thanks for the

safety of its fleet. In 1879 <u>Parliament</u> established a national Thanksgiving Day on November 6; the date has varied over the years. Since 1957 Thanksgiving Day has been celebrated in Canada on the second Monday in October.

Women's Club, GFWC Is Accepting Scholarship Applications

The Connecticut Federation of Women's Clubs has announced two scholarships that are available to Connecticut women pursuing advanced courses of study at Institutions of higher learning. Awards are based on future promise, scholastic ability and financial need.

The Dorothy E. Schoelzel memorial scholarship has a maximum award of \$2,000. Candidates must have completed three or more years of undergraduate work in an accredited institution with a 3.0 average or higher in the field of Education.

The Phipps scholarship has a maximum award of \$1,000. Candidates must have completed two or more years on undergraduate work in an accredited institution with a 3.0 average or higher toward a Bachelor's or post graduate degree.

Completed applications must be received by February 10, 2019.
