Cohen Supports Bill To Lower Insulin Prices

Press Release: State Senator Christine Cohen joined the co-chairs of the legislature's Insurance & Real Estate Committee to announce a new bill that will cap the cost of insulin for Connecticut patients and will even allow for access to insulin on an emergency basis without a doctor's prescription.

"One in four insulin patients aren't using enough insulin to remain healthy. People are suffering, and we need action now to combat insulin price increases. Thanks to the leadership of the Insurance Committee, that is exactly what this bill does," said Sen. Cohen. "While Senate Bill 1 is a priority for Senate Democrats, I'm pleased that this legislative proposal is receiving widespread, bipartisan support. Diabetes doesn't recognize political party lines, and we need to be working across the aisle to ensure this comes to fruition."

Senate Bill 1 contains several provisions to help diabetes patients and their families including:

- Capping insulin costs including for all insulin and diabetes supplies at \$100/month. This would be the toughest cap in the country.
- Allowing patients to go to a pharmacist up to three times a year on an emergency basis to get insulin filled without a prescription.
- Using a fund created by unused prescriptions the Department of Social Services to fund a new program to assist low-income type 1 diabetics access insulin.
- Releasing specific bill language is the next step in the legislative process following the announcement last month by the Senate Democrats that lower insulin prices for Connecticut residents is their number one priority this session.

The legislation is being introduced as exorbitant insulin price increases are severely impacting diabetes patients in Connecticut. According to Health Care Cost Institute, the cost of insulin nearly tripled between 2002 and 2013, then doubled again from 2012 to 2016.

Senate Bill 1 will help the approximately 10 percent of Connecticut's adult population that has diabetes to afford life-saving insulin without having to adopt the unsafe practice of rationing their medicine. Diabetes is the seventh-leading cause of death in Connecticut.

"We have two goals with this legislation. One is saving money for families who need insulin in Connecticut, and the other is saving lives," said state Senator Matt Lesser (D-Middletown), who is Senate Chair of the Insurance & Real Estate Committee. "No one in Connecticut should die because they need insulin. In addition to capping costs, this bill helps families affected by skyrocketing insulin prices. For people on high-deductible plans, new federal guidance allows people to start accessing insulin and diabetic supplies at dollar one, before meeting their high deductible, so that is no longer a barrier to seeking care. We're also seeking to create an emergency fund for people around Connecticut who have fallen through the cracks – like Logan Smith of Minnesota, who died because he turned 26, fell off his parents' health plan and couldn't afford the insulin he needed to stay alive. We're also creating an emergency provision so if you are in diabetic shock, you can go to a pharmacist up to three times per year to get insulin without a prescription."

"The cost of insulin is out of control, and this bill will ensure that Connecticut residents finally have access to affordable insulin," said Rep. Sean Scanlon (d-Guilford), who is House Chair of the Insurance & Real Estate Committee. "By capping the cost of insulin and insulin supplies at \$100 per month, Connecticut will have the lowest insulin costs in the country and diabetics will no longer have to worry about affording the medicine they need to survive."

Vincent Candelora Full House of Issues on Tap in the Legislature



The bill proposals are filed, committee meetings are underway, and the public hearing calendar is taking shape. Yes, the 2020 legislative session here.

I'll continue my work with the committees on Finance, Public Health, General Law, and Legislative Management. Early days have produced a diverse set of topics that'll

be under consideration between now and when the session ends May 6, from controlling the cost of insulin to sports betting.

Naturally, the state budget casts a large shadow on everything we do. A big part of the legislature's job is to adjust the second-year of the two-year budget that was approved last spring. The governor struck an optimistic tone on the session's opening day, and while I remain concerned about our state's fiscal policy and antagonistic attitude toward business, I'm always hopeful that the legislature's majority party will begin to take steps to right the ship.

Budget and economy aside, there's a bunch of topics I'm digging into this session. Among them is the need to give victims of domestic abuse easier access to financial assistance. Women trying to leave abusive situations often find it difficult to qualify for the critical state aid they need because their spouse's income is factored during the application process. Unfortunately, that administrative hurdle can be enough to cause some women to stay in a dangerous situation because they don't have the financial resources to cover their living expenses. I'm supporting legislation that would allow victims to apply for temporary state services without being required to list their spouse's income. A case review would be held within 90 days of the initial application.

If you've read any of my recent columns here, you've likely noticed my interest in issues tied to government transparency. My colleagues and I started the session by asking majority party leadership to:

- hold a public hearing on the final budget bill;
- require a vote in order to conduct business after midnight;
- give residents a better shot of being heard earlier at public hearings. I'll continue to seek greater transparency in quasi-public entities, such as the troubled Connecticut Port Authority, and the Connecticut Partnership for Education—a public-private partnership backed by billionaire Ray Dalio that uses millions in state dollars yet enjoys freedom to conduct board discussions in private sessions.

An omnibus bill last year that contained good policy related to liquor control unfortunately came with a negative side effect for Connecticut farm wineries. The legislation could empower a new class of wine manufacturers who aren't required to grow their ingredients, allowing those businesses to simply buy thousands of gallons of out-of-state wine, bottle it, label it, and sell it as if it's a locally-produced gem. It's an unfair situation that should be rectified before the legislation is implemented this summer.

Finally, I find there aren't many places I go where someone doesn't share concern about teen vaping. School administrators are grappling with the epidemic, and few would say they're gaining ground in the fight. I'm glad the governor has shown concern about the topic. I'll push to move sales of flavored vaping products out of convenience stores—they should be sold exclusively at smoke/vape shops, where I believe there are stronger efforts to keep them away from kids.

Presidents' Day as we know it.

Presidents' Day is a federal holiday celebrated on the third Monday in February; Presidents' Day 2020 occurs on Monday, February 17. Originally established in 1885 in recognition of President George Washington, the holiday became popularly known as Presidents' Day after it was moved as part of 1971's Uniform Monday Holiday Act, an attempt to create more three-day weekends for the nation's workers. While several states still have individual holidays honoring the birthdays of Washington, Abraham Lincoln and other figures, Presidents' Day is now popularly viewed as a day to celebrate all U.S. presidents, past and present.

The story of Presidents' Day date begins in 1800. Following the death of <u>George Washington</u> in 1799, his February 22 birthday became a perennial day of remembrance.

At the time, Washington was venerated as the most important figure in American history, and events like the 1832 centennial of his birth and the start of construction of the Washington Monument in 1848 were cause for national celebration.

While Washington's Birthday was an unofficial observance for most of the 1800s, it was not until the late 1870s that it became a federal holiday. Senator Steven Wallace Dorsey of <u>Arkansas</u> was the first to propose the measure, and in 1879 President <u>Rutherford B. Hayes</u> signed it into law.

The holiday initially only applied to the District of Columbia, but in 1885 it was expanded to the whole country. At the time, Washington's Birthday joined four other nationally recognized federal bank holidays—<u>Christmas</u> Day, <u>New Year's Day</u>, the <u>Fourth of July</u> and <u>Thanksgiving</u>—and was the first to celebrate the life of an individual American. <u>Martin Luther King Jr.</u> Day, signed into law in 1983, was the second.

The shift from Washington's Birthday to Presidents' Day began in the late 1960s, when Congress proposed a measure known as the Uniform Monday Holiday Act. Championed by Senator Robert McClory of <u>Illinois</u>, this law sought to shift the celebration of several federal holidays from specific dates to a series of predetermined Mondays.

The proposed change was seen by many as a novel way to create more three-day weekends for the nation's workers, and it was believed that ensuring holidays always fell on the same weekday would reduce employee absenteeism. While some argued that shifting holidays from their original dates would cheapen their meaning, the bill also had widespread support from both the private sector and <u>labor unions</u> and was seen as a surefire way to bolster retail sales.

The Uniform Monday Holiday Act also included a provision to combine the celebration of Washington's birthday with that of <u>Abraham Lincoln</u>, which fell on February 12. Lincoln's Birthday had long been a state holiday in places like Illinois, and many supported joining the two days as a way of giving equal recognition to two of America's most famous statesmen.

McClory was among the measure's major proponents, and he even floated the idea of renaming the holiday Presidents' Day. This proved to be a point of contention for lawmakers from George Washington's home state of <u>Virginia</u>, and the proposal was eventually dropped.

Nevertheless, the main piece of the Uniform Monday Holiday Act passed in 1968 and officially took effect in 1971 following an executive order from President Richard M. Nixon. Washington's Birthday was then shifted from the fixed date of February 22 to the third Monday of February. Columbus Day, Memorial Day and Veterans Day were also moved from their traditionally designated dates. (As a result of widespread criticism, in 1980 Veterans Day was returned to its original November 11 date.)

Did you know? Presidents' Day never falls on the actual birthday of any American president. Four chief executives—George Washington, William Henry Harrison, Abraham Lincoln and Ronald Reagan—were born in February, but their birthdays all come either too early or late to coincide with Presidents' Day, which is always celebrated on the third Monday of the month.

While Nixon's order plainly called the newly placed holiday Washington's Birthday, it was not long before the shift to Presidents' Day began.

The move away from February 22 led many to believe that the new date was intended to honor both Washington and Lincoln, as it now fell between their two birthdays. Marketers soon jumped at the opportunity to play up the three-day weekend with sales, and "Presidents' Day" bargains were advertised at stores around the country.

By the mid-1980s, Washington's Birthday was known to many Americans as Presidents' Day. This shift had solidified in the early 2000s, by which time as many as half the 50 states had changed the holiday's name to Presidents' Day on their calendars.

Some states have even chosen to customize the holiday by adding new figures to the celebration. Arkansas, for instance, celebrates Washington as well as civil rights activist Daisy Gatson Bates. <u>Alabama</u>, meanwhile, uses Presidents' Day to commemorate Washington and <u>Thomas Jefferson</u> (who was born in April).

Washington and Lincoln still remain the two most recognized leaders,

If you were on trial, being prosecuted for a crime and the prosecution rested after 18 witnesses without proving its case, would YOU ask for more witnesses?

The House prosecutors presented a case based on an anonymous accusation, presented 18 witnesses, withheld one, introduced nothing but hearsay, denied the defendant any opportunity to present evidence and failed to prove or charge any crime or misdemeanor. When the Senate defense team voted to reject additional evidence, the House prosecutors claimed it wasn't fair. Mitt Romney said we needed additional evidence but then voted to convict Trump on the completely unproven, non-crime.

Some legal and factual sanity: The Democrats' articles of impeachment sought to remove a sitting president for exercising lawful executive power, disregarded separation of powers and failed to charge an impeachable offense. Trump was impeached for exercising lawful executive powers when he pursued an investigation of Joe Biden based on Biden's 2018 videotaped brag of violating the 1998 US-Ukraine Treaty on Mutual Legal Assistance in Criminal Matters when he claimed he forced Ukraine to fire it's chief prosecutor. Because of Biden's brag the US and Ukraine were arguably compelled to investigate that breach of international protocol. The notion that a president can be impeached for complying with a treaty certainly undermines the rule of law.

Article II Section 4 of our Constitution required charges for "high crimes and misdemeanors" and a "conviction" in the Senate. Conviction is a term unique and specific to a **crime**. Clinton, for example, was impeached on 12 separate and specific criminal charges, including perjury. "Abuse of power" is not a crime, so that charge was null and void from the get go because without a crime there can be no conviction and by extension no impeachment and no need to disprove a "non-crime."

Anyone who followed *Fast and Furious* in 2012 knows that, like Trump in 2020, Obama claimed executive privilege over DOJ records when AG Holder was held in contempt for failing to produce them. To overcome the privilege the House filed a lawsuit so the judiciary could resolve the matter. Yet, when Trump asserted the same privilege in 2019 the House chose neither to subpoena the records nor to override the claim in federal court. Instead, the House impeached the President for exercising executive privilege. Any recognition of Trump's impeachment for his exercise of executive privilege would also recognize that Obama committed an impeachable offense, mangling the balance of powers and our rule of law by making the lawful exercise of executive power grounds for impeachment.

Back in September, 2017, Mad Max Waters declared, "Impeachment is about whatever the Congress says it is. There is no law that dictates impeachment." You can't make this stuff up; the impeachment proceedings in the House and Senate seemed like a Marx Brothers' movie.

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
Guagliumi Collage at Smith Library

but Presidents' Day is now popularly seen as a day to recognize the lives and achievements of all of America's chief executives. Some lawmakers have objected to this view, arguing that grouping George Washington and Abraham Lincoln together with less successful presidents minimizes their legacies.

Congressional measures to restore Washington and Lincoln's individual birthdays were proposed during the early 2000s, but all failed to gain much attention. For its part, the federal government has held fast to the original incarnation of the holiday as a celebration of the country's first president. The third Monday in February is still listed on official calendars as Washington's Birthday.

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Southwest Conservation District Leads Farm River Watershed Planning Project

The Southwest Conservation District (District) has contracted with the CT Council on Soil and Water Conservation (Council) to lead the development of a management plan for the Farm River watershed. The \$74,000 awarded for this project is part of a larger source water (drinking water supply) protection grant provided to the Council by the USDA Natural Resources Conservation (NRCS) and will be matched by funds and in-kind services locally provided by the District (\$20,000) and the Regional Water Authority(RWA) (\$50,000) respectively. This planning effort will take place over the next year and is actively seeking public input from stakeholders and interested citizens.

The Farm River watershed is in south central Connecticut and provides approximately 10% of the region's drinking water. RWA supplies 45 million gallons of water a day to a population of 430,000 people. The Farm River flows directly into Long Island Sound, making it critical for protecting that natural treasure. The study area for this project is located in the Towns of Branford, North Branford, East Haven, and Guilford, and features a mix of urban, suburban, and rural land uses. This medium sized watershed is approximately 16,300 acres in size with approximately 8,500 acres in agricultural and forested lands.

In late 2018, the Farm River watershed was selected by NRCS, as one of 15 watersheds nationwide to participate in a National Water Quality Initiative (NWQI) pilot for source water protection. NRCS followed up this announcement by hosting a series of stakeholder meetings last year that included representatives from local municipalities, water utilities, health departments, non-governmental agencies, and interested residents. The effort has also been supported by the CT Dept. of Public Health (CT DPH), the CT Dept. of Energy and Environmental Protection (CT DEEP), and the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) source water program. These initial meetings identified the need to develop a watershed plan that addressed both urban and agricultural nonpoint source pollution and would protect both drinking water and Long Island Sound. With these goals in place, the Council was able to secure NRCS funding, including the match, to move forward with the project work.

"The Southwest Conservation District is excited to work with the various stakeholders to develop a watershed management plan for the Farm River" stated Chris Sullivan, Executive Director. "Once it is completed, this plan will open up additional federal funding to help us improve water quality and protect natural resources in this important watershed."

Chris Malik, Watershed Manager with CT DEEP, works closely with EPA's 319 nonpoint source pollution program and saw the opportunity to work together with USDA on this project. "I am happy that USDA is allowing the planning effort to focus on the entire watershed and not just agriculture lands" explained Malik. "Coordinating NWQI and 319 planning makes sense both environmentally and economically."

This is not the first planning effort on the Farm River. In 2011 a "Source Water Protection Plan" was completed for the Farm River Watershed by the Atlantic States Rural Water and Wastewater Association (ASRWWA) and funded by the EPA. The Regional Water Authority has participated in these previous planning efforts and is committed to updating and coordinating that work with this latest planning initiative. "We look forward to working with the watershed's stakeholders in developing the Management Plan for the Farm River Watershed. This planning document will outline the course for a healthier watershed." said Ron Walters a Senior Environmental Analyst with RWA.

The Town of North Branford has also focused on the Farm River in land use planning and has consistently included actions to protect the Farm River in their Plan of Conservation and Development (POCD). In the most recent POCD adopted in 2019, some specific strategies of preserving the River and its valley includes protecting the upland areas around the river, improving water quality, and developing a watershed management plan. Additionally, the Town of North Branford's Conservation and Inland Wetlands and Waterways Agency (CIWWA) updated its regulations in 2015 expanding the regulated area around the Farm River from 100 feet to 200 feet in order to monitor more activities within the close proximity of the River.

"The Farm River is a significant resource to the Town of North Branford. The River traverses the entire length of the Town and provides essential habitat to numerous species of fish, birds, and other wildlife. The Town is excited to be a part of this highly skilled team working to develop a plan to help improve and protect the Farm River." said Carey Duques, North Branford's Town Planner.

A public information session will be held in the watershed to gather public input on the development of the plan and to gather local information on water quality and locations of potential impacts to the river. The session will be held later this spring. Make smoke alarms work for your safety

Smoke alarms are the residential fire safety success story of the past quarter century. Smoke alarm technology has been around since the 1960s. But the single-station, battery-powered smoke alarm we know today became available to consumers in the 1970s, and since then, the home fire death rate has been reduced by half.

Important: Working smoke alarms are essential in every household. It is necessary to practice home fire drills to be certain everyone is familiar with the smoke alarm signal, and to determine if there are any obstacles to a quick and safe evacuation (including the inability for some to awaken to the smoke alarm signal).

Installation and maintenance tips

- Install smoke alarms on every level of your home, including the basement, making sure that there is an alarm outside every separate sleeping area. New homes are required to have a smoke alarm in every sleeping room and all smoke alarms must be interconnected.
- Don't install smoke alarms near windows, doors, or ducts where drafts might interfere with their operation.
- Never paint smoke alarms. Paint, stickers, or other decorations could keep the alarms from working.

A life-saving test: check your smoke alarms regularly

- Test your smoke alarms once a month, following the manufacturer's instructions.
- Replace the batteries in your smoke alarm once a year, or as soon as the alarm "chirps" warning that the battery is low. Hint: schedule battery replacements for the same day you change your clocks from daylight savings time to standard time in the fall.
- Replace detectors every 10 years, new technology makes the old ones obsolete. New detectors have less false alarms and alert to an actual fire quicker.
- Never "borrow" a battery from a smoke alarm. Smoke alarms can't warn you of fire if their batteries are missing or have been disconnected.
- Don't disable smoke alarms even temporarily. If your smoke alarm is sounding "nuisance alarms," try relocating it farther from kitchens or bathrooms, where cooking fumes and steam can cause the alarm to sound.
- Consider installing smoke alarms with "long-life" (10-year) batteries.
- Plan regular fire drills to ensure that everyone knows exactly what to do when the smoke alarm sounds. Hold a drill at night to make sure that sleeping family members awaken at the sound of the alarm. Some studies have shown that some children may not awaken to the sound of the smoke alarm. Know what your child will do before a fire occurs.
- If you are building a new home or remodeling your existing home, consider installing an automatic home fire sprinkler system. Sprinklers and smoke alarms together cut your risk of dying in a home fire 82 percent




