

EDITORIAL

State RepresentativeVincent Candelora **Process Is As Important As Substance**



Rules are in place for a reason, and no one should have the ability to unilaterally ignore them, regardless of title. In the Connecticut General Assembly, Mason's Manual of Legislative Procedure is used as a set of rules to maintain order and ensure a smooth process. It is expected that all members

adhere to these rules; however, some legislators have blatantly violated these legislative.

Specifically, one set of rules explains that only nine senators will be seated as voting members of the Transportation Committee. But when the Transportation Committee convened on March 20 to debate and vote on thirty-two bills including three that would begin the process for implementing tolls on Connecticut highways, I noticed the committee was constituted with ten senators.

On Tuesday, March 26, I wrote a letter to legislative leaders, bringing to light that there is currently one too many state senators on the legislature's Transportation Committee, and I also asked that they correct this violation by removing a senator from the Transportation Committee. After receiving a response excusing the violation by stating that this is how we've always done it, I brought up the matter again during the legislative session on Wednesday, March 27, when I addressed the House of Representatives. The response I got back this time indicated that House leadership will take this finding seriously, and urge the Senate Leader to uphold the Joint Rules and remove one senator.

On a separate occasion earlier this month, I publicly expressed concern over leaders in the house proposing a new concept eliminating a religious exemption on vaccines after the deadline for proposing bills had passed. I took this stance because the public must be heard before removing rights and privileges from our statutes, and our rules are designed to safeguard from these abuses. But yet our majority leader continues to take the actions they thought were best, while trying to circumvent the legislative process. This issue, however, points to a growing concern of the erosion of process bringing uncertainty to the public and setting a climate of arbitrary and capriciousness.

Why do I continue to raise these procedural issues? Because when our process erodes so does the public's confidence in government. Five years ago, the legislature passed a budget imposing a unitary tax and raising the digital download tax to 6.35%. These two taxes never received a public hearing and, as a result, the legislature failed to realize the real impact. General Electric left the state, and Aetna, along with many other insurance companies threatened to leave. The legislature scrambled eight weeks later



to repeal these taxes.

Let's Be "Frank"

Well brother, my favorite time of year is upon us. I always loved the Spring. It always meant Yankee baseball on the radio and weeks in church preparing for Easter. With Easter, came the great smells of Easter meals. Despite the pain and the time it takes, I am still having fun and so far we are winning which makes it more fun.

The Easter season was always the best. The preparations not only for the family to get together but for us to reflect and re-dedicate ourselves to Christ. We would spend almost every day of Lent with a visit to church preparing for the coming of Christ on the Ressurection day. There were Stations of the Cross, praying the daily Rosary, reconciliation and penance.

I was also one of the altar boys for all the services which meant I got to help with preparing the palms for Palm Sunday, stripping the altar for, Good Friday and decorating that same altar for the excitement of the ceremonies for the Easter Vigil and Sunday services.

Holy Thursday began with the service and procession at St. Anthony Church. We would then spend an hour of prayer and then take the journey to visit five Churches. Back then churches stayed open all night for prayer, with ushers greeting you at the door and making sure there were no problems.

We would save our pennies for months so we could make the donation for the poor and light our candles and say some prayers. We would walk first to St. Michael, then Sacred Heart, then St. Peter's on Kimberly Ave. and St. John's on Davenport Avenue, before returning to Saint Anthony. A quick google check has that as 7 miles). Even those rare occasions when we had a car, mom would make us walk and tell us to offer the sacrifice up to God. I wasn't carrying a cross or anything but it was still a haul for husky pre-teen kid whose bed time was normally 8:00.

Friday there would definitely be no meat and no eating between meals. We would have the Stations of the Cross at 3:00 and the Veneration of the Cross with the procession of Gesu Morto(the dead Jesus) at 7:00. There was no organ but a cappella singing was allowed. It was very solemn and some more time to reflect on doing things for others and working to be a better person.

NASA

Information is fed to us every day by our federal government. Lately, I've noted that one of my most revered sources of scientific fact - NASA - now seems to be faltering in its ability to provide information we can trust.

Back in 2008 NASA told us "in five to 10 years the Arctic will be free of sea ice in summer." This January the Danish Meteorological Institute published data showing that - since 2005 - the volume of Arctic sea ice has increased by approximately 80 billion cubic meters. Are Danish scientists idiots, did NASA badly bungle this prediction or did they intentionally misguide us? As to Arctic ice, I'll trust the Danes.

In February NASA claimed that "fire seasons are burning longer" due to global warming. But, at the end of 2018, the National Interagency Fire Center reported that US forest fire burn acreage had declined from 40+ million acres per year in the decade between 1926 and 1936, to less than 10 million acres per year in the last decade. Is burn length more important than burn acreage or is this a convenient twist of fact used to underscore a non-scientific political point?

On Feb. 6, 2019, NASA announced, "melting sea ice is raising sea levels." We don't need a science degree to understand this one. The ice melts in our drink, but the level of the liquid doesn't rise. Sea ice is in the sea/liquid, but NASA tells us that when it melts sea levels rise? Was NASA's announcement simply badly worded science or intentional misinformation?

NASA produced temperature data graphs in 1999 that differ substantially from those it published in 2016. Its changes conveniently fit the global warming narrative. Was NASA wrong then or are they wrong now?

rative. Was NASA wrong then or are they wrong now? In 1958 we charged NASA with the study of both earth science and space science. So, it pointed its probes both into space and back at Earth. Then, in the '80s, NASA's primary charge became Earth. It launched 15 earth-science satellites to monitor things like forest fires, rainfall and sea ice. But NASA's attention to actual science may have dwindled a bit in 2010 when Obama puzzlingly reset it's primary mandate to: "reach out to the Muslim world ... help them feel good about their historic contribution to science, math and engineering." Then, in 2013, the Smith-Mundt Modernization Act gave the federal government authority to directly propagandize US citizens, whereupon NASA's stream of earth science publications has seemingly devolved into the type of politicized hyperbole noted above.

These are but a few examples of NASA's mingling of fact, disinformation and politics. Has Earth become so politically charged that – to paraphrase Ocasio-Cortez - moral correctness is more important than actual science? Maybe NASA should stick to space stuff. Fortunately we have other scientists and our own common sense to help guide us.



North Branford Fire Department

Residential Burning Permits

Forms shall be available for residents to pick-up at the Fire Marshal's office and Town Manager's office located at Town Hall, 909 Foxon Road. Forms are also available on the Town's website www.townofnorthbranfordct.com

Completed forms must be returned to Fire Marshal's Office. Applications must be received by the Fire Marshal's office three days prior to burning.

Upon receipt of a completed signed form, the Fire Marshal's office may physically inspect and photograph the site where the brush is to be burned. Only brush can be burned. No limbs over 3 inches in diameter. No stumps or leaves. Permits are issued for 30 days. Burning can only take place between 10am and 5pm.

A copy of the form will also be faxed to the North Branford Police Department.

The resident will be instructed to contact the North Branford Police Department (a) 203-484-2703 on the day they wish to actually conduct the burn.

If complaints are received, police officers will be dispatched to determine if a nuisance exists. If deemed necessary, the appropriate fire company will be dispatched and the fire will be extinguished.

If the resident does not have the appropriate approval to burn, at the discretion of the local burning official or the incident commander, police intervention may be required. Pursuant to Connecticut General Statute sec. 22a-174, failure to obtain the necessary approval to burn is a Class C misdemeanor and punishable by fine of \$ 200 or imprisoned not more than six months or both.

Applicants must follow all guidelines and requirements.

You are required to have a 50 foot buffer from any structure or property line. You are required to have a water supply, capable of extinguishing the fire.

Chimineas and fire pits less than 3 feet in diameter do not require a permit.

"Knox Box" Ordinance Requirements

On March 1, 2018 North Branford Town Council enacted Ordinance # 252, which amends Chapter 40 of the Code of the Town of North Branford. The following is a summary of the new ordinance. A copy of the entire ordinance, Chapter 40 is available in the Town Clerk's Office or on the town website.

All Commercial occupancies are required to install key lock boxes, containing keys to their premises

Multi-family residential structures that have restricted access and have a common corridor for access to the living units are required to have a key box.

These boxes will allow for rapid entry without the need to cause excessive damage to doors and windows in the event of an activated fire alarm or incident during non-occupied hours.

Failure to comply will result in penalty of \$100 per month.

SPRING IS HERE.....BE SAFE

Safety Tips for Outdoor Grilling:

Gas and charcoal BBQ grills must only be used outdoors. If used indoors, or in any enclosed spaces, such as tents or garages, they pose both a fire hazard and the risk of exposing occupants to toxic gases and potential asphyxiation.

Position the grill well away from siding, deck railings and out from under eaves and overhanging branches.

Place the grill a safe distance from lawn games, play areas and foot traffic.

Keep children and pets away from the grill area: declare a three-foot "safe zone" around the grill.

Periodically remove grease or fat buildup in trays below grill so it cannot be ignited by a hot grill.

Charcoal Grills

Purchase the proper starter fluid and store the can out of reach of children, and away from heat sources.

Never add charcoal starter fluid when coals or kindling have already been ignited, and never use any flammable or combustible liquid other than charcoal starter fluid to get the fire going.

Gas Grills

Check the gas cylinder hose for leaks before using it for the first time each year. A light soap and water solution applied to the hose will quickly reveal escaping propane by releasing bubbles. If you determine your grill has a gas leak, by smell or the soapy bubble test, and there is no flame:

Turn off the gas tank and grill.

If the leak stops, get the grill serviced by a professional before using it again.

If the leak does not stop, call the fire department.

If you smell gas while cooking, immediately get away from the grill and call the fire department. Do not attempt to move the grill.

Never store propane gas cylinders in buildings or garages. If you store a gas grill inside during the winter, disconnect the cylinder and leave it outside.


