

"We Have to Work Together"

Dear Editor:

Towns and cities struggle to find ways to increase their revenues without increasing taxes. Our town is no exception. One tool our town can use, is to find ways to expand our tax base. This practice can have its advantages and its consequences.

On the one hand, revitalizing or 'recycling' existing developed land can be a huge boost for the town coffers. A 'fix what's broken' approach, encouraging landlords to update properties left vacant or in disrepair. Improving our appearance will attract new business and businesses - thus increasing tax revenue.

On the other hand, there is the lure of new development. There are those who believe development will increase our tax base and solve our money problems. More residents and more businesses = a balanced budget.

This couldn't be further from the truth. If it were so, our town would have been wealthy a long time ago. We wouldn't be raising the mill rate every year - trying to meet an ever growing budget. The reality is, dollar for dollar, developed land usually costs a town *more* than it takes in. Your first thought might be "that can't be right". But when you think about it and consider all the services a town needs to support development, spending is the harsh reality.

Believe it or not, the farms, fields and woodlands that seem so tempting and ripe for development are actually *profitable* for our town. For every tax dollar a town takes in, undeveloped land can cost as little as 18 cents to maintain. There are several studies that support this. They may vary in scope, but they have the same result. Fields, farms and woods = a town's most economical asset.

Yes, our town has plenty of room for development. But development should be appropriate or it will have its costs. Our town's future rests in the hands of those planning it and land owners who have a stake in it. We have to work together, making thoughtful decisions that put our town's vision and economic health first. It is possible to prosper and preserve our scenic rural character.

State Representative Vincent Candelora Domestic Violence Reform



This week the Judiciary Committee is finishing drafting and voting on bills. While the Committee passed out a controversial measure known as Second Chance Society which eliminates the 1500 foot drug free zones around school and makes drug possession a misdemeanor, the Committee will not

be voting on the assisted suicide bill. The Second Chance Society will now go to the Senate, but it's fate is uncertain since it only made it through the Committee by a 22-20 vote.

Another controversial bill seeks to remove weapons from a person who is subject to a temporary restraining order. Under current law, a person subject to a permanent restraining order cannot possess, own or purchase weapons. While extending this prohibition to those subject to a temporary order sounds simple, it's not.

A temporary restraining order is granted ex parte, meaning without a hearing. A court, therefore, will grant a 14 day restraining order based upon a sworn statement that the applicant is exposed to imminent harm by a family member or spouse. This application, if granted, lasts only 14 days, because, in order to meet due process requirements, the parties must then appear in court to be heard in order for a more lengthy one be imposed.

While everyone wants to see weapons removed from a volatile situation, the legislature is struggling with creating a law that passes due process requirements. Even though a temporary restraining order lasts only 14 days, if someone's weapons are taken, it could take up to two years to get back. Hence, some people subject to a restraining order may be found non-violent, but still would be unable to get their weapons back due to the construct of Connecticut's gun laws. We are in talks with the Governor's office to cure this problem.

I also worry about the individual who wants to get their spouse out of the house prior to the service of divorce paper. Those times can be volatile, and if it is mandatory that someone's gun permit be taken every time an order is issued, it may have the potential for a volatile situation to get violent.

This bill will likely pass this year, and some reform of our restraining order laws make sense. I hope we continue to work in a bipartisan fashion to ensure the due process rights of our resident and protect people from violence. Neither concept should be mutually exclusive.

It wasn't until I was sitting in the dining room in my house in Brussels, on our "American Thanksgiving" surrounded by empty plates and glasses, listening to everyone say what they were thankful for that it finally hit me just how much those past few months meant to me. I spent the fall semester studying abroad in Brussels, Belgium enrolled in a European program. I was expecting the typical American abroad experience filled with traveling, drinking, and exploring all kinds of new things, but what I had was 10x more than that.

I am not an extroverted person by any means. I generally keep a small group of friends around me and don't venture out far past them, but going abroad completely changed that. To say going abroad changed me is an understatement. At the ripe age of 19 I feel as though going abroad gave me the ability to completely reinvent myself for the better and I can only imagine what it would do for all of the students who are currently feeling stuck in their lives. According to National Association of Foreign Student Advisers, only 2% of American undergraduate students study abroad. This statistic is mind-boggling. To me, and many other students that have spent time studying abroad, it was the most memorable college experience. You go to whichever country you choose having certain thoughts and values and then a few months later leave with a whole new perspective. So much of everything I thought I once valued was changed. Although it was a scary realization to have, I now know how important it was for me to have said realization.

I no longer fear change, I embrace it. New strange food, I'll try it. Whatever gets thrown in my direction I have learned to deal with it and try to make the best of the situation. Before going abroad I was so focused on the plan I had set up for myself back in high school: go to college, get my degree, get a job, start my life. By going abroad, I have realized that my life is already started and I need to stop thinking that it won't start until I am done with school.

It's safe to say that everyone wants to have an amazing college experience, but how to get that takes a lot of different steps. Not only is it about finding clubs and organizations to be a part of and a good solid group of friends to spend nights studying with, but it's about getting out of your comfort zone. So to the seniors graduating from high school, and any current college student, I urge you to find all of those wonderful things and more by going abroad. If it wasn't for that first experience, I would never even think to start planning out a trip to Zimbabwe for next year!


Softball Teams Starts Season with Two Wins
