
Totoket TV Receives Grant from State of Connecticut for New TV Equipment at Stanley T. Williams Community Center, Town Hall and Studio

Of the \$150,000 grant, \$60,599.41 was used to purchase and install new TV equipment at the main meeting room and adjoining control room at the Community Center. The main meeting room houses all Board of Education Meetings, additional Town Meetings and other Town activities.

The residents of NB can be very proud of their recycling efforts. We just need to seal up a few holes in the program, to ensure we recycle everything we can and to avoid additional costs.

Thank you for your attention and continued recycling. The purpose of North Branford's Solid/Hazardous Waste and Recycling Committee is to develop and implement environmentally sound solutions and best practices for solid waste disposal and recycling management on behalf of our town, in accordance with Connecticut laws and regulations.





The Town and your Solid/Hazardous Waste and Recycling Committee need the help of NB residents.

For the last several months, when our weekly recycling is processed at the MIRA plant in Hartford, a number of loads have been getting rejected due to excessive contamination.

When that happens, our hauler, John's, has to go back to Hartford, pick up the unacceptable items and bring to the Hartford incinerator to be burned as trash. John's bills NB for that extra trip and the contaminated recyclables are processed by MIRA while charging NB \$90 per ton rather than processing these recyclables for free.

Those costs, as well as, fines from MIRA, are passed on to NB, which can adversely affect our taxes.

How can you help you might ask?

If you are one of the residents that collect their recyclables in your house in a plastic bag and then just drop that bag in your recycling tote, we need you to empty the contents directly into the blue tote. When the load gets sorted at the recycling facility, all plastic bags and their contents automatically get rejected as contamination, no matter what may be in them. No inspection of the plastic bag's contents is done even though the bag could be full of acceptable recyclables.

Most blue totes came with a stencil on the lid showing acceptable recyclable items. Please place only those items in the blue tote.

If you are not sure if an item is recyclable, we ask that you put the item aside and contact us for guidance. Or, you can view the yearly Recycling & Trash

Slide Up the Dimmer Switch: Restoring General Assembly's

Influence Isn't an On/Off Proposition



Back in September, after a special committee of legislators contemplated the first extension of Governor Lamont's emergency powers, a reporter fired off important questions:

"At what point does it stop, what's the cutoff, when do you take the power back?"

Six months later, we're still waiting for the real answer.

The state's House of Representatives last week voted to extend Gov. Lamont's broad authority a third time. Majority party Democrats took this action a month before it was necessary, ignoring objections from Republicans—I'm among them—who contend lawmakers should work toward restoring the balance of power in state government rather than further his stay in the driver's seat to May 20.

As it stands, the General Assembly remains under the thumb of the governor. At any time, he can act to bypass the work of our body—to modify or suspend statutes as he sees fit.

Since the start of the pandemic, Gov. Lamont has issued some 90 executive orders affecting roughly 300 statutes or regulations. Last week, as we have for months, Republicans proposed a bipartisan process to analyze those orders to determine which of them should remain in place as our state wriggles free from the pandemic's grip. We know some of those orders, including those related to telehealth or vaccine administration, will remain valuable for some time. But others, such as those that give state agencies wide-ranging control over how business operate, deserve fresh perspective.

Unfortunately, our colleagues across the aisle see things differently—for them, the light of co-equal decision-making is a switch to be turned on or off. Right now, it's definitely off.

With the Legislative Office Building closed to the public, the statehouse's majority party is pursuing pet policies in the impersonal if not murky world of virtual government.

Ahead of their vote to extend the governor's powers, we offered a request backed up by amendment: Take a weeklong pause from the quest to install a new gas tax, government run healthcare, and election "reforms" and instead focus on restoring the General Assembly's standing in this pandemic. To reach common ground, we offered a more modest extension—to May 1—of the governor's powers to provide time to conduct that review of his orders. We proposed a change to how emergency declarations are installed, too, demanding a legislative vote while also requiring more frequent renewals.


Our definitive path forward (cthousegop.com/rebalance) failed in an 89 to 50 vote. By the time you read this column, it's likely the state senate will have voted for the longer extension too.

Back in September, the majority party senator who answered the reporter's question boasted that restoring the legislature as a co-equal branch would be the "first priority of business" in January. Now, it's abundantly clear that was never the Democrats' intention. I fear that if we don't break from their calculated complacency, if we don't chart government's way back to normalcy, it will become increasingly harder to toggle the General Assembly switch back to "on" mode.



IDS Continues Syrup Making Tradition

The Independent Day School continued one of its most recent, yet cherished, traditions of maple tree tapping and syrup making over the past few weeks. The activity has proven to be a highly educational and entertaining activity for students (and even parents!) of all ages at the school.

"Tapping Season," as it is affectionately referred to in New England, is the time of the year towards the end of winter when temperatures begin to creep above freezing during the day, but return to below freezing temperatures at night. This mixture of warming and cooling is considered the perfect time to begin tapping into maple trees, as those conditions allow for the most sap to emerge from the trees. Fortunately, IDS has almost 30 maple trees right here on its sprawling campus, making it a perfect, nearby tapping ite for maple syrup lovers and environmental enthusiasts.

"When the maple sugaring operation was first proposed, we knew we had some sugar maple trees at IDS," remarked Director of Facilities Jim Rumberger, "but when we took a closer look we found that along "Old Durham Road" we had over 30 sugar maples in close proximity. This has afforded us a unique opportunity to harvest high-quality sap, right here on campus." The entire process of maple syrup making takes place right on campus, both during and after school hours. Multiple grades of children assisted Rumberger and Lower School/Early Childhood Science teacher Xander Lowery in the tapping process.

After a few days passed, students were in action again helping with the collecting and storing of the tree sap by taking the filled buckets and placing them in a secure, outside storage unit where the sap could remain chilled. Once enough sap had been collected, Rumberger and parent volunteers began the long and tedious process of boiling the sap in a massive "cooker" which eventually turning the sap into delicious syrup.

"The sugaring process touches multiple topics across our science curriculum," said Lowery. "This includes tree identification, such as structure and function, photosynthesis, global seasonality, and states and properties of matter just to name a few." \ After weeks of hard work, careful planning, and countless great learning opportunities, IDS ended up with almost six gallons of sweet maple syrup to be shared with the community in various ways!


