On Sunday, May 6, at 1 pm, the North Branford Land Conservation Trust (NBLCT) will hold a Photography Hike at the Notch Hill Brook Trail at Ciro Road in North Branford. # **EDITORIAL**

# State Representative Vincent Candelora Mid-Term Budget Adjustments



This past week, Republican and Democrats each offered budget adjusted for the 2019 fiscal year. While each party have similar reductions offered, Democrats increase spending by over \$400 million from the Governor's proposal and Republicans did not. The fundamental driver is our rainy day fund. When we passed the original budget, both parties agreed to cre-

ate a "volatility revenue cap" in recognition that our income tax revenue can vary significantly based upon the stock market. The cap draws a hard line at any income tax received above \$3.15 billion automatically gets diverted to our rainy day fund or savings account. Those moneys are required to be used for reducing unfunded liabilities, such as pension liability, or remain in the fund for future emergencies.

The Democrats are proposing to tap into some of that money to offset spending cuts while Republicans fear that the revenue gains over the past six months, which generated the surplus, are only one-time revenues due to federal tax law changes and, thus, should not be used for ongoing expenses. Republicans, therefore, propose dedicating 2/3 of the fund, approximately \$600 million, to our State Employees' Retirement Fund, the Teachers' Retirement Fund and the Retired Teachers' Health Fund. All of which are on life support. These payments ultimately would reduce our debt service payments into the fund by reducing the actuarial payment.

In both parties' budgets, we restore funding to towns that the Governor proposed cutting and we restore funding for the Medicare Savings Plan. We fully fund the Renters Rebate program, where last years' budget shifted the cost to municipalities. We preserve grants for substance abuse treatment and mental health care, fully fund the fire training schools and restore funding for School Based Health Clinics. We increase funding for emergency placements and employment and day services for those with intellectual and developmental disabilities. We also protect the Care 4 Kids program and increase funding for our private providers.

When the Appropriation Committee met last Friday, neither budget adjustment proposal had enough votes to get out of committee. The conversation undoubt-



edly will return to leadership for negotiations. While I look forward to the negotiations and I am hopeful we can continue our bipartisan spirit, these negotiations have different implications than last fall. Connecticut currently has a two-year budget in place, although in deficit. If an agreement is not reach, towns and schools will still receive funding unlike last fall where no budget existed. So while the pressure of municipal aide will not be driving these discussion, I hope the desire to bring fiscal stability to the state will.

## "Where do we go from Here?"

#### **Dear Editor:**

Thank you, North Branford, for reminding us that there still *is* an EARTH DAY and for the town's good work in recycling and helping manage the choices we make to live a better life. We all should be totally aware and committed to promoting changes to our everyday routine that can make a difference. North Branford has done an admirable job and their success should be applauded.

Now I know it's quite a leap to go from an Earth Day celebration to my thoughts and concerns that follow. Nevertheless, with a nod to "living a better life," I'd like to make a few comments here about about the appearance of Northford center since, as a Northford resident, this is what I see every day.

For starters, I think part of the problem is there are no sidewalks. I'm not suggesting sidewalks would be a good idea given the layout of the center and types of businesses here. But what is worth noting is that without pedestrian traffic, Northford center is mostly a drive-by or crossroads intersection and, as such, doesn't lend itself to observation from a moving car. Maybe that explains why we don't seem to notice the appearance of our center. However, next time you find yourself stopped at a light or in traffic, please take a moment to look around — what you'll see is a hodge-podge of business signs, vacant store fronts in deplorable condition, a community bulletin board with paint peeling and message too hard to read, and other sites that could use some thoughtful attention. When I drive through town, I am reminded of the TV commercial for Febreze where the announcer states that the person in the room has gone "nose blind" to the odor coming from athletic socks and such. In other words, the inhabitant of the room is so used to it that he doesn't even smell it anymore. Is that what's happening to us? Are we so used to the sorry state of our center that it fails to register with us, that we've gone blind to it? We can do better! We're not talking big-ticket fixes here, just addressing a need for improvement.

Where do we go from here? I don't know, but I do think calling this to our attention is the first step in raising awareness. To that end, I'd like to know what other residents think and urge folks to contribute to this message by writing in to this newspaper with your observations/suggestions about our center and whether you agree or disagree that some improvement is needed. Let's see what kind of interest is generated and what kind of response we get.

In closing and in keeping with the spirit of Earth Day, let's try to come together and commit to a better life (in small or big ways) for ourselves and one another as residents of the same town and planet.

On May 8th the registered town voters have the opportunity to vote on the budget proposed by the Town Council. We moved our family here 3 years ago for both a better educational opportunity and because we fell in love with the amazing "small town" community that has such a huge heart. It has never ceased to amaze me how extraordinary it is to be a part of the community and the positive difference we make when we come together. That was until seeing that our Town Council has a majority which does not support investing in our future by approving the Board of Education budget.

After finding out that a majority of the Council voted to not approve the BOE budget we joined many parents who are outraged by the vote and the decrease of funds available for investing in our future. I have personally attended the last 3 meetings and at the meeting on 04/23/18 the Deputy Major proposed an additional \$500,000 to help "cover" the gap of what they appropriated without increasing the mil rate. Where was this \$500,000 before? This convenient knee jerk reaction appears to be in response to the volume of parents who attended the last meeting and for those of us who have shared their views on social media.

The spending per student is the lowest of our neighboring towns. This is NOT something to be proud of. While our amazing schools do an incredible job despite the poor decisions of a majority of our Town Council they could be doing more IF THEY HAD APPROPRIATE FUNDING.

In addition the Town Council conveniently proposed and allocated money for side walk and curb repairs as well as a few other capital projects at the 04/23/18 meeting. This should of already been included in the budget as part of maintaining the town property. Amazing how they found more money to invest without increasing the mil rate and rather timely as IF this would pacify the parents of students whose future is at jeopardy.

My son who is under the age of 10 is now worried if his school will be able to do art projects next year or if they will have instruments for music. He is worried if the library will get new books. He is worried that some teachers or staff won't return. A child should not have to worry about those things.... yet some of the children spoke at the last meeting because they are worried too. With the majority of our Town Council not supporting the BOE budget they have every reason to be. It is a shame.

To the representatives on the Town Council who voted NO you have our support and will have our votes. We appreciate your advocacy for our future!

On May 8th my husband and I will be voting NO on the budget. In addition we have paid attention to "who voted how" on the budget and you can be sure those members will not have our family's vote for their presence on the council in the future. We need representatives who are vested in our children!

Please vote NO on May 8th! It is important for our future. It is important for our community. Above all, it is important to our children.

# NBIS Recognized as an "Exemplary School"

The Connecticut Association of Schools (CAS) offers several awards and recognition programs to member districts and schools throughout the school year. # **Residential Burning Permits**

- Forms shall be available for residents to pick-up at the Fire 1) Marshal's office and Town Manager's office located at Town Hall, 909 Foxon Road. Forms are also available on the Town's website www.townofnorthbranfordct.com
- 2) Completed forms must be returned to Fire Marshal's Office. Applications must be received by the Fire Marshal's office three days prior to burning.
- 3) Upon receipt of a completed signed form, the Fire Marshal's office may physically inspect and photograph the site where the brush is to be burned. Only brush can be burned. No limbs over 3 inches in diameter. No stumps or leaves. Permits are issued for 30 days. Burning can only take place between 10am and 5pm.
- 4) A copy of the form will also be faxed to the North Branford Police Department.
- 5) The resident will be instructed to contact the North Branford Police Department @ 203-484-2703 on the day they wish to actually conduct the burn.
- 6) If complaints are received, police officers will be dispatched to determine if a nuisance exists. If deemed necessary, the appropriate fire company will be dispatched and the fire will be extinguished.
- 7) If the resident does not have the appropriate approval to burn, at the discretion of the local burning official or the incident commander, police intervention may be required. Pursuant to Connecticut General Statute sec. 22a-174, failure to obtain the necessary approval to burn is a Class C misdemeanor and punishable by fine of \$ 200 or imprisoned not more than six months or both.
