



Legislative Leaders Won't Reconvene the 2020 Session, but there's Work to Do



There are four caucuses in Connecticut's General Assembly—the House and Senate Democrats, and the House and Senate Republicans—and last week the leader of each decided against reconvening the 2020 regular legislative session that had been scheduled to adjourn May 6.

The joint announcement cemented what most

legislators knew long ago, that the COVID-19 crisis would zap hundreds of pending bills tackling topics that ranged from assisting victims of domestic violence to commercializing marijuana.

It's likely that we'll hold a special session, perhaps in late summer, to get our arms around completing essential tasks—most important, adjusting the second year of the biennial budget to match state revenues that are declining sharply. That duty has been difficult enough over the last decade, but the economic impact of this sprawling disaster is immense.

The current fiscal year—it ends June 30—will finish with a \$530 million deficit that's likely to be filled through a combination of federal assistance and the state's \$2.5 billion rainy day fund. Already, the governor has said next fiscal year's deficit could at least double this one.

With that in mind, I'm somewhat surprised that Governor Lamont hasn't taken more decisive action on an issue that's gaining attention among both news reporters and residents who are active on social media: state employee raises that go into effect July 1. The pay increases will cost the state roughly \$135 million, and many Connecticut residents have wondered whether we can afford that price tag at the onset of a long spell of financial uncertainty.

Whether you agree with all of his decisions or not, the governor has moved swiftly on many fronts since he closed schools, bars, and restaurants back in mid-March. More often than not, the thrust of his executive orders matched action implemented in other states.


If other states have taken steps on similar salary-related issues, shouldn't Connecticut do the same? We could contemplate delaying these scheduled raises, reviewing the state's financial condition in increments to determine whether our budget is stable enough to release them.

But I'm not sure that will happen. The governor was noncommittal on the subject during a news briefing recently, indicating that he'd think about the raises against the backdrop of the many Connecticut residents whose financial security has been obliterated by this crisis.

Meanwhile, the chief negotiator for state employee unions has, to put it politely, rejected the notion of delaying the scheduled pay increases to divert the money to support nonprofit social services agencies gasping under the weight of this pandemic.

If history is any indicator, state bureaucracy will prevail.

After all, this month Connecticut delivers the first of two "longevity"



payments made annually to some government employees. The total price tag? Roughly \$23 million a year.

When it comes to July's raises, I hope the governor can, as he said, "achieve the right balance."

#### Town's 2020-21 Budget Under the COVID-19 Pandemic

The Town Council concluded their budget deliberations and were able to reduce the 2020-21 Proposed Budget increase of 1.30 mills down to a mill rate increase of .12 mills in recognition of the financial impact of the COVID-19 pandemic. The mill rate for the 2020-21 fiscal year will be 33.58. Pursuant to the Governor's Executive Order # 7 I, section 13, the Town Council also voted to forego the budget referendum process for this year and have formally adopted the budget. In this period of social distancing, a public vote cannot be safely conducted. In addition, asking our taxpayers to come out to the polls is directly contradictory to the message of Stay Home/Stay Safe. Other options were explored — online voting for example, but these are not allowed per our State Election Laws. The legal notice detailing the 2020-21 Town Council Budget is found is this edition of the Totoket Times. As always, if you have questions regarding the budget, please call the Finance Department at 203-484-6002.

Executive Order 7 S allows our taxpayers to submit a request for an additional 90 days (without interest) to pay tax/sewer obligations to the Town that are due between April 1, 2020 and July 1, 2020. The fillable version of this form is available on the Town's website (<a href="www.townofnorthbranfordet.com">www.townofnorthbranfordet.com</a>) under Latest News. The deadline to file this form is July 1, 2020. If you have any questions, please contact the Tax Collector's Office at 203-484-6011.

### Take a Deep Breath

For a century we have survived epidemics and pandemics without destroying our society in the process. We understand and accept this natural order by mourning the deaths of thousands, redoubling our precautions and taking solace in the fact that the survivors will make us stronger. The CDC's statistics reveal the give and take between life and death in this annual battle, reminding us that between 30 and 60 thousand Americans died from influenza during our latest "flu season."

In contrast to the past century of perseverance against the flu, as of April 8, the US economy has been shut down for three weeks because of 12,911 lives lost to the Coronavirus. These drastic changes in our lives give us sound reason to pause and question why these measures were necessary for the Coronavirus but never for Influenza. More yet, why doesn't the ingenious "social distancing" that supposedly thwarts the Coronavirus affected our annual Influenza epidemic?

The global economic shutdown now holds my 86-year-old mother hostage in her building, threatening to put her in a 2-week lockup if she leaves, all the while allowing deliveries from Amazon by men who wipe their nose with latex gloves as they deposit packages at her door. She peers through an 8x12 computer screen for eight+ hours each day, a two-dimensional portal to the outside world as Coronavirus hysteria denies her religious worship and contact with her family and friends. Meanwhile, our children's education is suspended and many of us have lost their ability to earn a living.

Unlike our battle against Influenza and other infectious diseases, we seem to be convinced we can hide in our homes until medical science saves us from the Coronavirus. This notion seems to exist without regard for the starvation, rioting and carnage that will come over time from our isolation and the destruction of the global economy. In light of big brother's inability to stop the ravages of Influenza with a magic "flu shot" for the past 50 years, is it utter hubris to expect medical science to save us before our economy and social fabric disintegrate?

We have no choice but to be vigilant and resourceful, to arm ourselves with information and understanding of the real dangers at hand. We must go about the brave business of survival, but always err on the side of caution. I urge us all to have confidence in our record of extricating ourselves from similar recurring predicaments.

## "... Full Support for building a New High School..."

I am writing to voice my FULL support for building a new high school in North Branford. I cannot imagine that this is a question, or even up for debate, based on the condition of the current building. It would be a great injustice to our community if the Town Council does not do everything in its power to move this project along as quickly and smoothly as possible.

My husband and I moved to North Branford in May of 2011; our daughter was then 15 months old. I grew up in Guilford, where I have taught English since 1999. My husband grew up in Wethersfield and is a School Administrator in New Haven. As Educators, we chose to move to North Branford because we valued a small community with strong values. I knew the High School in North Branford was an old building, but I was naive in my assumption that it was in similar condition to the old Guilford High School. I also assumed, in 2011, that with the new GHS being built and almost all high schools in the state being upgraded, that it was safe to believe that NBHS would be a new building by the time my infant daughter was headed into high school. She is now in 4th grade and I am gravely concerned that that may not be the case.

When I toured NBHS earlier this year, it was only my second time in the building. From the outside, it looks similar to the old GHS. What is going on inside makes the **old** GHS look like a top notch building, and that is outrageous. I was expecting a leaky roof, older windows, and difficulty in temperature control. I was NOT prepared for a fully flooded basement, windows sealed shut with duct tape, a library that is trapped in the late 20th century, bathrooms flooded with sewage, a second floor that cannot be accessed by anyone on crutches or in a wheelchair, locker rooms that are an insult to our student athletes and classrooms falling apart. This is not a should or should not situation; It is a must.

I have done some research into the NEASC reports provided to the North Branford BOE. I have served as a Chair on two NEASC committees at GHS and we are also currently going through a NEASC evaluation. North Branford has been told via this accreditation process since the year 2000 that the facilities at NBHS were sub par. The Town Council has had more than enough time to resolve this issue.

A family member of a Town Council member, a woman who does not live in North Branford (she lives in Guilford) was on one of the North Branford community pages touting the idea that North Branford should not bother building a new high school and should instead, send all of its students to surrounding high schools. This is an outrageous suggestion for many reasons, but it worries me that this person, who is not a town resident, is vocalizing an idea that a Town Council Member might share. North Branford students have a RIGHT to an education in a safe and healthy building with the peers they have grown up with and in a community they can call their own.

My daughter attended the FRC Pre-K 3 and 4 program and will be proud to graduate with students she has been friends with since she was three years old. I have been impressed with all the educators we have worked with throughout this system. I am proud to live in North Branford and I do not regret our thoughtful decision to move into this community. I believe the right decision will be made and the plans for a new high school will move forward. The faculty and our students deserve a new building that will support them well into the 21st Century. The time is now.



### **North Branford Fire Department**

Residential Burning Permits. Town Hall is closed to the public, but you can still obtain a burning permit. Go to the Town Web site:

http://www.townofnorthbranfordct.com/newweb/resources/site1/General/documents/NB%20Open%20Burning%20Permit%202017.pdf and download the form, fill it out and email it to: deputyfiremarshal@townofnorthbranfordct.com If you need just a renewal for an expired permit just call the office and leave a message. 203-484-6016.

Forms shall be available for residents to pick-up at the Fire Marshal's office and Town Manager's office located at Town Hall, 909 Foxon Road. Forms are also available on the Town's website www.townofnorthbranfordct.com

Completed forms must be returned to Fire Marshal's Office. Applications must be received by the Fire Marshal's office three days prior to burning.

Upon receipt of a completed signed form, the Fire Marshal's office may physically inspect and photograph the site where the brush is to be burned. Only brush can be burned. No limbs over 3 inches in diameter. No stumps or leaves. Permits are issued for 30 days. Burning can only take place between 10am and 5pm.

A copy of the form will also be faxed to the North Branford Police Department.

The resident will be instructed to contact the North Branford Police Department @ 203-484-2703 on the day they wish to actually conduct the burn.

If complaints are received, police officers will be dispatched to determine if a nuisance exists. If deemed necessary, the appropriate fire company will be dispatched and the fire will be extinguished.

If the resident does not have the appropriate approval to burn, at the discretion of the local burning official or the incident commander, police intervention may be required. Pursuant to Connecticut General Statute sec. 22a-174, failure to obtain the necessary approval to burn is a Class C misdemeanor and punishable by fine of \$ 200 or imprisoned not more than six months or both.

Applicants must follow all guidelines and requirements.

You are required to have a 50 foot buffer from any structure or property line. You are required to have a water supply, capable of extinguishing the fire. Chimineas and fire pits less than 3 feet in diameter do not require a permit.

#### **COVID-19 (Corona Virus)**

Public health officials continue to discover more about this new virus. Personto-person spread of the virus is thought to occur mainly via respiratory droplets produced when an infected person coughs or sneezes. It may also be possible that a person can get COVID-19 by touching a surface or object that has the virus on it and then touching their own mouth, nose, or eyes. This is very similar to how the common cold and influenza are spread. People are thought to be most contagious when they are most symptomatic. Some spread might be possible before people show symptoms. How easily a virus spreads from person-to-person can vary. The virus that causes COVID-19 seems to be spreading easily.

Based upon these facts, people can take these everyday preventative actions to help stop the spread of viruses

Wash your hands frequently. Wash for 20 seconds with soap and water. Be sure to wash your hands when you come home from public places. If you do not have access to soap & water, use an alcohol-based (at least 60%) hand sanitizer. Use enough sanitizer to thoroughly cover your hands and rub until dry.

Avoid touching your eyes, mouth, and nose with unwashed hands

Stay home if you are sick. Children should stay home from school or daycare if they are sick.

Cover your cough and sneezes with a tissue. Discard the tissue properly. Wash your hands. If you do not have a tissue, use the crook of your elbow. Avoid being around sick persons.

If you are sick or have sick household members, frequently disinfect commonly touched surfaces, such as doorknobs and handles, faucet handles, remote controls, tabletops, etc.
