
The event raises funds for the senior center and is also a great social event for residents as well as an opportunity for area restaurants to be recognized for their generosity as well as their talents.

A Second Chance for Criminals Without Regard to Victims



As you all have heard, we passed the budget during special session. In addition to taking up the budget, the Governor repurposed his criminal justice reform bill. The Second Chance Bill seeks to raise the maximum age of juvenile justice jurisdiction to 20 years of age by creating a

"young adults" category. The bill extends youthful offender status to these adults where the adjudication will not result in a criminal conviction, and the arrest records will be kept confidential. Four years after the conviction, arrest records would be erased automatically. Lastly, the bill would eliminate the bail system for persons charged with misdemeanors.

Needless to say, this bill met bipartisan opposition during the regular session, and neither the House nor Senate took the matter up for a vote. During special session, the Governor made another push for the bill, and again neither chamber would take it up for a vote. During the budget debate, the Speaker of the House agreed to not call the school construction and bonding bill in order to "insure" that legislators would come back for a vote on this criminal justice bill. The Governor and majority party leadership are holding school construction hostage in hopes of getting enough support to pass it.

In general, it troubles me the efforts that our Governor will go through to protect criminals at the expense of the victims and safety of the public. I believe this initiative is not based in sound policy, rather he is seeking to merely save money during this budget crisis. The more people that we can let out of prison, the less money the state expends.

Proponents argue that because the human mind is not developed until 25 years of age, the state should be treating them differently under our criminal laws. First, it makes no sense that we would send a message that actions lack consequences because of brain development. Children begin learning right from wrong at the age of two and receive punishment for bad behavior whether in school or at home. Our criminal justice system already has "second programs", such as accelerated rehabilitation, pardons, and jail re-interview services, not to mention judicial and prosecutorial discretion to plea bargain cases. These same proponents who are worried about the development of the brain also advocate for legalizing marijuana for recreational purposes despite the fact that drug use at an early age is scientifically proven to cause permanent damage to brain development.

This Second Chance Bill died in the regular session for a reason. The Governor should move off from this push to ram this legislation through special session. It is ill-conceived in my opinion, and we should look at reforming the framework of our existing system, rather than giving people a free pass for criminal conduct.

Property values have gone down, taxes will be going up, no new services and they cut the education budget by close to one million dollars, so we might have to cut teachers. They will surely blame it on the old administration but still, the people change but the problems don't.

Once again the town held the budget referendum vote and less than 5% of the registered voters participated. . This entire process makes no sense to me. Even if the 15% needed, vote against the budget, the Council only has to change the budget by \$1.00. Everyone knows this is crazy so no one votes and then the Council can say there is apathy and they are doing the best they can. I still think they are doing the best hey can but they need to change some of these archaic rules to avoid simply running in the cow pastures.

Good news on the economic development front. We are getting a dollar store right smack in the middle of Route 80. We had one move in about a year ago up the road and I don't even know if it's still open. This one will be bigger but I hope they are planning on a traffic light or we will be able to count the traffic incidents on a daily basis.

We're getting ready for Memorial Day. No big plans. As I always say things aren't what they use to be. Everyone goes their separate ways. Frankie might come home for part of the weekend but that just means he borrows the car, does his laundry and goes golfing with his buddies. Whatever he does, I'm happy he knows he can come home whenever he wants even if it's just to use the facilities.

EDITORIAL

PLANNING FOR THE FUTURE By Attorney Marc P. Guertin

In recent years my firm has conducted hundreds of educational workshops on various legal topics usually with a focus on estate planning. There are certainly provisions to handle the distribution of your assets at your death, but it also contemplates what happens if you become incapacitated. It is more focused on your life verses focusing on your death, while still efficiently handling your post mortem affairs.

Trusts are also your best shot at avoiding the time consuming and very public process of probate. Whereas, a Last Will and Testament, is a "ticket to probate." Most of the time Wills are all about going to probate court and trusts are all about avoiding any major contact with the court. Why do people want to avoid probate? Most of the time it is because it is an expensive, time consuming and public process.

Some trusts are narrowly pointed at specific problems in life. Irrevocable Asset Protection Trusts, for instance, are utilized to shelter assets that represent a lifetimes worth of work from the financial devastation that comes along with a stay in a nursing home.



North Branford Boys Track & Field

On May 4th the North Branford High School Boys Track & Field Team traveled to Cromwell for a Tri Meet with Shoreline Conference Schools Cromwell High School and Morgan High School. Morgan finished 1st with 77 points, Cromwell took 2nd with 59 points and the T-Birds finished 3rd with 45 points. 



to be burned. Only brush can be burned. No limbs over 3 inches in diameter. No stumps or leaves. Permits are issued for 30 days. Burning can only take place between 10am and 5pm.

- 4) A copy of the form will also be faxed to the North Branford Police Department.
- 5) The resident will be instructed to contact the North Branford Police Department @ 203-484-2703 on the day they wish to actually conduct the burn.
- 6) If complaints are received, police officers will be dispatched to determine if a nuisance exists. If deemed necessary, the appropriate fire company will be dispatched and the fire will be extinguished.
- 7) If the resident does not have the appropriate approval to burn, at the discretion of the local burning official or the incident commander, police intervention may be required. Pursuant to Connecticut General Statute sec. 22a-174, failure to obtain the necessary approval to burn is a Class C misdemeanor and punishable by fine of \$ 200 or imprisoned not more than six months or both.
- 8) Applicants must follow all guidelines and requirements.
- 9) You are required to have a 50 foot buffer from any structure or property line. You are required to have a water supply, capable of extinguishing the fire

Residential Burning Permits

- Forms shall be available for residents to pick-up at the Fire Marshal's office and Town Manager's office located at Town Hall, 909 Foxon Road. Forms are also available on the Town's website www.townofnorthbranfordct.com
- 2) Completed forms must be returned to Fire Marshal's Office. Applications must be received by the Fire Marshal's office three days prior to burning.
- 3) Upon receipt of a completed signed form, the Fire Marshal's office may physically inspect and photograph the site where the brush is

10) Chimineas and fire pits less than 3 feet in diameter do not require a permit.

Fireworks

Fireworks are enjoyable and exciting to watch, but every year they injure thousands of people, many of them children, and cause thousands of fires. **ALL FIREWORKS** with the exception of sparklers **ARE ILLEGAL**, in Connecticut, and may not be sold, purchased, or used. Only regulated firework displays by state licensed, professional pyro-technicians, which have been approved by local and state officials, are permitted.

The only safe way to enjoy fireworks is to attend an approved public display. Do not buy fireworks from road side stands. Local establishments that are licensed to sell fireworks are inspected by the fire marshal. "Sparklers" as determined by the State, include sparkling devices of not more than 100 grams of mixture per item and are non-explosive and non-aerial. These include common stick sparklers, cone, base, spike and fountains. These are the only items that can be legally sold or purchased in Connecticut.
