

# State Representative Vincent Candelora **Classroom Safety Bill**



and graduations, but it's also a time when, under the state constitution, the legislature will convene a veto session to consider overriding any of the Governor's vetoes. Public Act 18-89 is one of those bills. It requires local and regional boards of education, as well as the State Department of Education, to address

daily classroom safety in a manner similar to how they must address bullying and teen dating violence under current law. Under the bill, "daily classroom safety" means a classroom environment in which students and school employees are not physically injured by other students, school employees, or parents; or exposed to physical injury.

By September 1, 2019, schools would have to revise their safe school climate plans to include provisions on classroom safety. The plan would require the school principal, when a student has violated daily classroom safety, to notify and provide details of the violation to the parents or guardians of the student, and when other students witness a violation, the board of education and the parents or guardians of the other students, without disclosing the identity of the student who committed the violation. Under the bill, if a teacher refers a student out of his or her classroom for a violation, the administrator can place the student in another educational setting that is best suited to meet the student's needs.

The administrator may return the student to the teacher's classroom if the teacher consents to such student's return or the school's crisis intervention team, whose members must be trained in the use of physical restraint and seclusion, or a team of teachers and administrators designated by the school principal to assess whether the student should return to the classroom, determines the return is warranted because (a) the student has received appropriate intervention and support and (b) there are adequate protections in the classroom for the safety of the teacher and other students.

Governor Malloy vetoed the bill out of concern that it "creates too great a risk that students of color and those with disabilities will be disproportionately affected by its new removal powers." Some educators also cited concerns

that the disclosure of the

incident could lead to

I supported the bill in

the House, and I believe

it's an important policy

that will lead to improved

safety and clarification

of the process. Superin-

tendents have expressed

concerns about some of

the language in the bill,

stakeholders to the table

to get this right.

Now after a few minutes I'm ready to go home. It's also just not the same without Mary there (don't tell her I said that)

## **Our Will and Testament**

This president was elected by a majority in the Electoral College, but he actually won less than 40% of the popular vote. Many therefore reasoned that he was NOT elected by the will of the people. A steady stream of abuse in the media, editorials, speeches, and public protests, both from the opposing political party as well as his own, vilified him as "a barbarian," a "yahoo," "dishonest," and deplorably "less than civilized." He was called "an idiot," and "the original gorilla" by a prominent general. The media mocked his bodily proportions and ridiculed his lack of refinement. Many openly called for his assassination. Others swore that if he were elected they would "immediately leave the country."

Who is the man described above? It was Abraham Lincoln. His election was immediately maligned by Southern Democrats as less than the will of the people and served as the immediate cause of the South's succession. In so doing the South declared that their will should be done by their own means, not by the rules of our constitutional republic (Article II, Section 1). The Civil War followed, killing 360,222 Northerners and 258,000 Southerners. In a very real sense this carnage was the direct result of the South's stubborn refusal to obey our law in the face of an electoral outcome that didn't suit their fancy. Whatever the cause(s) of the Civil War, the violent opposition to Lincoln by the South's Democrats multiplied his legacy exponentially by serving as the ultimate trigger for the emancipation of an otherwise helpless minority.

The following quote is from a famous writer and philosopher, an oftenparaphrased caution to our human nature and, in the case above, an ugly reminder that ought to guide both our public policy as well as our personal actions:

Progress, far from consisting in change, depends on retentiveness. When change is absolute there remains no being to improve and no direction is set for possible improvement: and when experience is not retained, as among savages, infancy is perpetual. Those who cannot remember the past are condemned to repeat it.

### PLANNING FOR THE FUTURE

A lot of my clients are very concerned with minimizing probate. Many people believe that as long as they have a valid Will, they can avoid or at least minimize Probate. This is exactly the opposite of what actually happens when you die with a Will.

A Will is often called "a ticket to Probate." If you really want to avoid the time, expense and public nature of the Probate process, a Will always falls short of the mark.

Many people look to Revocable Living Trusts to avoid probate. Probate is the process of removing a decedents name from property and assets that person owned when they were alive. So, it follows that if your name is not on any property or assets when you die- there is no need for probate. Revocable Living Trusts help people to do just that.

A Revocable Living Trust acts as a legal container that holds property for the benefit of the beneficiary of the Trust, who is usually a person, an institution or a charity. Trusts are legal agreements between three different parties: The Grantor (sometimes called a Trustmaker or Settlor) who establishes the Trust, the Trustee who administrates the Trust, and the beneficiary, who receives some sort of benefit (usually income) from the Trust.

Imagine a Revocable Living Trust as an "open box." You can put assets into the box and you can take assets out of the box. You can manage the assets in the box or appoint someone else to do that for you. You have total control- just as you would if you owned the assets outright (outside of the trust). Assets owned by the Trust (most likely managed by you for your benefit) will not have to be probated when you die- because you don't own them- the Trust does. That is not to say that a person can totally avoid probate in Connecticut with a Revocable Living Trust, but you can greatly reduce your interaction with the Probate court by doing so.

Revocable Living Trusts are a great method of avoiding probate and the costs, lack of privacy and time associated with probating an estate. By using a Revocable Living Trust, you can put your assets into your beneficiary's hands in short order instead of months or even years, minimize the cost of transferring the assets, and do so private manner.

# **Green Party Announces Candidate for 86th District State Representative**

The Shoreline Green Party, a chapter of the Green Party of Connecticut, announces the candidacy of Colin Souney for State Representative in the 86th District, comprising the town of North Branford, and parts of North Guilford, Durham, and Wallingford.

"Here in Connecticut, we are plagued by endless bickering of entrenched politicians over insensible taxations and ideas that yield the 'least worst' decisions. Past policy has depleted the state's budget and sent it into alarming debt." In one of the wealthiest states in the country, Connecticut allows its top-earners to pay less than their fair share, and he would push for a moderate increase in state taxes on the wealthiest one percent.

Unlike political insiders, Mr. Souney is willing to think outside the box. To address Connecticut's budget deficit, Mr. Souney advocates the legalization, regulation, and taxation of marijuana. Estimates have shown that this could add anywhere from \$50 Million to \$100 Million to the State's general fund annually. Mr. Souney has appeared and spoken before the state legislature and often been quoted in the press on this issue.

Another focus of his is ensuring health care for all. Specifically, he focuses on improving our Mental Health systems, and ensuring adequate funding for services to individuals and their families and communities. He feels strongly that access, preventative treatment and services within the mental health care system in our state, as well as the nation, is in need of serious attention.

Mr. Souney is well aware of what the working person in his region is tasked with on a daily basis. He knows that the current Connecticut minimum wage of \$10.10 per hour is well below what it takes to support oneself in our state and impossible to support an adult with a child. He advocates for an efficient but gradual increase in the minimum wage to \$15 hour that, if done properly, will safeguard small businesses.

As a small business owner, Mr. Souney wants to ensure the economic health of our communities. He sees the destruction created by companies like Amazon and Ebay, which are constantly undercutting the local retail industry. He will work to ensure they are adequately taxed, and that subsidies, tax breaks, and other incentives are available for small business.

Colin Souney runs on the Green Party ticket because he feels that the common person in Connecticut isn't getting a fair shake. He has the experience needed to make him the best person to represent the 86th District and, as he puts it, "to fight for you!"

#### Remembering the Wolfe's with a Scholarship

The Arthur F. Wolfe and Astrid Hansen Wolfe Memorial Scholarship was awarded at North Branford High School on May 30,2018, by Wallingford resident, Linda Wolfe Rankin, daughter of the Wolfes. The following is the talk Mrs. Rankin delivered about her parents:

"I am here tonight to award a scholarship in loving memory of my parents, Arthur F. Wolfe and Astrid Hansen Wolfe. They were well known in Northford and North Branford by many people because of their warmth, friendliness, wonderful smiles, spirit of generosity, and strong willingness to volunteer in local charities and organizations. Both of them served our community in a variety of ways.

Dad was a charter member of the Northford Volunteer Fire Department Company #2, which means he was part of the small group of men who founded the company and subsequently was a member for forty-nine years, missing the fiftieth anniversary celebration by one year! In addition, he was a long-time officer on the North Branford Constabulary Force. Arthur joined the Brotherhood of Masonry, a fraternal organization which reaches out to benefit mankind.

Astrid volunteered for the American Red Cross, often working at local bloodmobiles. She owned and taught at the Little Folks Nursery School in their home on route 17 in Northford for over twenty-five years. She was loved and remembered by parents and children alike. My parents took active roles in their church and helped those in need of food, rides, or someone to do handyman work. Daddy could fix almost anything! My Danish mom, who was a member of the Danish Sisterhood, was a terrific cook and baker.

As you can see, my parents were such good people: respected, admired, honored, and even treasured, but by no one more than me! A treasure is of great worth, value, or sentiment. 



She worked with scientists at the University of Connecticut, as well as the Connecticut Department of Energy and Environmental Protection and the Connecticut Agriculture Experiment Station for her research. After a 10-month investigation, Kailee found that of 303 plant fragments, 269 turned out to be invasive species, plants that if left uncontrolled can quickly damage native ecosystems. Her work afforded her the opportunity to present at the 11<sup>th</sup> Annual Conference on CT's Natural Resources where she won the top prize.
