HAPPY FOURTH OF JULY

The Formation of the United States

On July 4, 1776, the thirteen colonies claimed their independence from England, an event which eventually led to the formation of the United States. Each year on July 4th, also known as Independence Day, Americans celebrate this historic event.

Conflict between the colonies and England was already a year old when the colonies convened a Continental Congress in Philadelphia in the summer of 1776. In a June 7 session in the Pennsylvania State House (later Independence Hall), Richard Henry Lee of Virginia presented a resolution with the famous words: "Resolved: That these United Colonies are, and of right ought to be, free and independent States, that they are absolved from all allegiance to the British Crown, and that all political connection between them and the State of Great Britain is, and ought to be, totally dissolved."

Lee's words were the impetus for the drafting of a formal Declaration of Independence, although the resolution was not followed up on immediately. On June 11, consideration of the resolution was postponed by a vote of seven colonies to five, with New York abstaining. However, a Committee of Five was appointed to draft a statement presenting to the world the colonies' case for independence. Members of the Committee included John Adams of Massachusetts, Roger Sherman of Connecticut, Benjamin Franklin of Pennsylvania, Robert R. Livingston of New York and Thomas Jefferson of Virginia. The task of drafting the actual document fell on Jefferson.

On July 1, 1776, the Continental Congress reconvened, and on the following day, the Lee Resolution for independence was adopted by 12 of the 13 colonies, New York not voting. Discussions of Jefferson's Declaration of Independence resulted in some minor changes, but the spirit of the document was unchanged. The process of revision continued through all of July 3 and into the late afternoon of July 4, when the Declaration was officially adopted. Of the 13 colonies, nine voted in favor of the Declaration, two -- Pennsylvania and South Carolina -- voted No, Delaware was undecided and New York abstained. John Hancock, President of the Continental Congress, signed the Declaration of Independence. It is said that John Hancock's signed his name "with a great flourish" so England's "King George can read that without spectacles!"

Today, the original copy of the Declaration is housed in the National Archives in Washington, D.C., and July 4 has been designated a national holiday to commemorate the day the United States laid down its claim to be a free and independent nation.



State Representative Vincent Candelora **Connecticut's Borrowing Crunch**



Over the past decade, I've written a lot about Connecticut's borrowing issues, and how the state enjoyed an artificial, robust market to sell bonds. So as the warning alarms sounded, Connecticut still sold its bonds at a competitive rate and maintained a competitive rating. The market has finally caught on, and Connecticut is having a


difficult time borrowing money at a reasonable cost. So essentially, Connecticut is paying \$1 to borrow money instead of .60 cents.


In order to alleviate this issue, the Treasurer has proposed switching the state over to credit revenue bonds. These types of bonds have revenue earmarked, or set aside, to fulfill its payment obligations, and thus, will receive a better rating which reduce borrowing cost. For example, the Treasurer would propose setting aside 4% of Connecticut's income tax revenue. This revenue would directly be diverted into a bank account and used to repay bonds, or "loans". Puerto Rico and Illinois utilize these type of bonds, and Connecticut is attempting to join those dubious ranks.

I supported the legislation in the Finance Committee. Of course, I'm not happy with the position Connecticut faces; however, the bill proposes to take any savings realized from these credit revenue bonds and divert them into the state's rainy day fund. At least is would create a structure to help the state rebuild its savings account and pay down its obligations.

Unfortunately, this legislation never came to a vote in the House or Senate, but as we continue to deliberate the state budget, this issue will play a major role. Connecticut's budget makes up three components: spending, revenue and borrowing. For too many years, it's been too easy for the state to borrow, and often time, legislatures took that piece of the budget for granted. Even worse, past budgets moved spending into borrowing in order to balance the budget. Those days are over. I believe we can only fix our credit rating by reducing our bonding and moving some of those spending items back to the operational side of the budget. Regardless, the legislature

> is going to have a long summer.





Space Weather 3-D

Humans have measured the changes in energy hitting Earth from space for more than 55 years. From 1962 to 1975 eight space probes were launched to measure - among other things - ultraviolet light (UV), gamma rays, cosmic rays and x-rays. These probes discovered that the sun's energy varies greatly in eleven-year cycles. We learned that our solar system collides with other stuff too – helium clouds for instance - as it hurtles through not-so-empty space. Cumulatively, these variants have come to be known as "Space Weather."

There are at least ten active missions studying this array of Space Weather. The space probe PICARD was launched in 2010 to assess "the link between solar cycles and temperature changes on earth." Yes, that's right, really smart people are actually trying to quantify how the fiery ball in our sky will change the temperature in Timbuktu or Totoket next Tuesday. Since 2008, the probe known as SOLAR has measured changes in our sun's irradiance. Some scientists are now trying to integrate this data into atmospheric and climatology models. A set of space probes ("STEREO") orbit on opposite sides of the sun to give us a 3-D view of changes in the sun's corona.

And, yes, scientists are carefully measuring the variance in the sun's coronal mass ejections (CMEs), in part to see how they mess with our cellular service, computers and electrical grids. Others are studying the connections between CMEs, plasma streams ("solar wind"), earthquakes and volcanic eruptions (the big exploding mountains that spew greenhouse gases into Earth's atmosphere) to assess yet still other ways the sun's energy affects our planet.

PLANNING FOR THE FUTURE

At least once a week a client comes into my office desperate to execute a Last Will and Testament as soon as possible. This may be motivated by an upcoming vacation, or a recent death in the family, among other things. If you are planning on dying soon, a Last Will and Testament is a must have. Wills contemplate your demise and fall under the category of "Death Planning." Death planning takes care of your estate after you pass away. One important question for people to consider is: What if you plan on living? Wills take care of your affairs after you pass away, but what happens if you don't die but become incapacitated in some way? Incapacity does not just strike the elderly; it does not discriminate between old and young. Planning for incapacity is what I like to call "Life Planning." Life planning takes on many different forms. One of the core documents in a "life plan" is a Durable Power of Attorney. A Durable Power of Attorney is a written legal instrument in which you (the principal) appoint another person or institution (the attorney-in-fact or agent) to act on your behalf. By appointing an attorney-in-fact or agent you are NOT giving up the right to also act on your own behalf as you would normally. You are merely deputizing someone else who can also act as you would.

If a person becomes incapacitated and has not executed a Durable Power of Attorney, the Court can appoint someone to act on their behalf, similar to the way an agent acting under a Power of Attorney would act. The Court appointed person is called a Conservator. There are two types of Conservators: Conservators of the Person and Conservator of the Estate. Often the two roles will be filled by the same appointed person. There are two types of Conservatorship proceedings: Voluntary and Involuntary. In a Voluntary Conservatorship the individual to be conserved knows that they are having difficulty managing their affairs, and requests that the court appoint someone to assist. In an Involuntary Conservatorship someone other than the individual to be conserved requests that they be appointed because they believe the individual is unable to manage his/her affairs.

The process of having yourself or someone else conserved is quite complicated and certainly more expensive than executing a Power of Attorney. The major advantage in having a Conservator appointed is that the Court oversees the actions of the Conservator through periodic accountings and reviews.

To involuntarily conserve an individual the court must find clear and convincing evidence that the person is incapable of caring for himself/herself, and is unable to manage his/her financial affairs. Involuntarily conserving an individual involves several attorneys and doctors, as well as multiple hearings at the Probate Court.

The Conservatorship process can be costly and time consuming. Conservatorship proceedings can be avoided by executing a properly drafted Durable Power of Attorney. Plan for the future but don't forget to plan for the present. A balanced plan should reflect both "life" and "death" planning.

So, I have found through multiple discussions with young adults, that yet again the lack of history education in our public schools has led to the general misunderstanding of life in general. Yet some would say those times were hard, and opportunity was far less. Yet I don't believe the facts bare that out... Are our lives somehow demonstrably easier? I don't think so. I think we live in a world of massive anxiety and stress, and serious depression. Are our kids absolved from the trials and tribulations of life's hard choices? I don't think so. So as I see it, life is just as hard today as it ever was. Yet there are serious differences; Moms not home, upward mobility is harder,

Town Mystery - Part 2 The house at 530 Foxon Road, known to many as the "Baldwin House,"

The house at 530 Foxon Road, known to many as the "Baldwin House," was built in 1832. My prior article detailed a bit of mystery surrounding its famous architect, Itheal Town, "gravestones" found under the basement floor and several hidden chambers in the house. But, while this suggests Underground Railroad activity, written history shows no connection between the house and the Underground Railroad. In its fledgling stages in 1832, the Abolitionist Movement literally invented itself just after the house was built. So we did some research in an effort to learn whether the house could have been quite uniquely designed and built with this specific intention. Israel Baldwin, a church deacon, deeded 42 acres of his North Branford farm to his son Micah in 1827. Micah hired Ithiel Town to design the house. Construction was complete in 1832, but Micah never used it, instead deeding it to his nephew George Baldwin in 1834. George was Micah's nephew, the son of Josiah "George" Baldwin.

The most prominent Abolitionist of the day was New York businessman Arthur Tappan. He founded the American Abolitionist Society (AAS) in 1836. Each year representatives of the various state anti-slavery societies met at annual meetings of the AAS in New York City. Among them was a representative from Connecticut, "J.G. Baldwin." This likely was Josiah Baldwin, Micah's brother, who used the nickname "George." He represented Connecticut's antislavery society and sat in the same room planning Abolitionist activities with the foremost Abolitionist of the day - Arthur Tappan. Arthur Tappan's brother and business partner – Lewis Tappan – was responsible for organizing and financing the defense of the captives of the Amistad in New Haven and, with the "Amistad Committee" sought and obtained the assistance of a New Haven attorney, Roger S. Baldwin, to serve as lead counsel in the case. Another Tappan-brother charity, the Union Theological Seminary, founded in 1835, was dedicated to "the fierce and bitter agitation of the Anti-slavery and colonization questions..." Lo and behold, serving on its board of directors was none other than North Branford's Micah Baldwin.

So, both of North Branford's Baldwin brothers were prominent members of Abolitionist organizations in the 1830s. But, while this merely suggests that they <u>may have</u> built the house with the intent to use it in the Underground Railroad, there are yet more connections between the house and the Abolitionist movement that make this conclusion more obvious.






North Branford High School baseball team recently held their banquet at Woodwinds in Branford. More than 100 athletes, parents and friends were there to celebrate past, present and future.





The team continued Floyd's tradition of collecting nonperishable food items to donate to the Food Pantry of North Branford.





Fire Department Safety Tips Fireworks

Fireworks are enjoyable and exciting to watch, but every year they injure thousands of people, many of them children, and cause thousands of fires.

ALL FIREWORKS with the exception of sparklers and fountains **ARE ILLEGAL**, in Connecticut, and may not be sold, purchased, or used. Only regulated firework displays by state licensed, professional pyro-technicians, which have been approved by local and state officials, are permitted.

The only safe way to enjoy fireworks is to attend an approved public display.

Do not buy fireworks from road side stands. Local establishments that are licensed to sell fireworks are inspected by the fire marshal. "Sparklers" as determined by the State, include sparkling devices of not more than 100 grams of mixture per item and are non-explosive and non-aerial. These include common stick sparklers, cone, base, spike and fountains. These are the only items that can be legally sold or purchased in Connecticut.

Safety In Places of Public Assembly

Every day, millions of people wake up, go to work or school, and take part in social events. But every so often the unexpected happens: an earthquake, a fire, a chemical spill, an act of terrorism or some other disaster. Routines change drastically, and people are suddenly aware of how fragile their lives and routines can be. Each disaster can have lasting effects — people may be seriously injured or killed, and devastating and costly property damage can occur. People entering any public assembly building need to be prepared in case of an emergency.

Before You Enter

Take a good look around. Is the main entrance wide and does the doors open outward to allow easy exit? Is the outside area clear and unobstructed? Any outside exits blocked?

Plan a Meeting Place

If you had to get out in a hurry, have a place planned for you and your party to meet.

When you Enter

Locate exits immediately. When you enter a building, you should look for all available exits. Some exits may be in front and some in back of you. Be prepared to use the closest exit. You may not be able to use the exit that you entered.

Do You Feel Safe

Does the building appear to be overcrowded? Are there fire sources such as candles burning, pyrotechnics or other open flame sources that make you feel unsafe? Are there safety systems in place such as sprinklers and smoke alarms? Ask the management about your concerns. If you do not feel safe, leave the building immediately.

During An Emergency

You need to react immediately. If an alarm sounds, you see smoke or fire, or some other unusual disturbance, immediately exit the building. Get out and stay out. Under no circumstances should you ever go back into a burning building.

Concerns or Questions

In 2003, a fire at The Station nightclub in Rode Island claimed 100 lives. Fire and building codes are in place to protect you.


