

## State Representative Vincent Candelora

#### Clearer Picture on State Revenues Desperately Needed



A primary job of the General Assembly and the governor is to manage the state's finances, but these days it feels like the people who control Connecticut's checkbook and credit card are shirking that critical responsibility.

Over the last few weeks, conversation at the state capitol has focused on police accountabil-

ity and voting by absentee ballot. The state's budget picture, already challenged but made worse by the pandemic, has been shoved to the back seat. Republican lawmakers have written to our majority colleagues asking for focus on finances, and have even tried to petition for a session on the issue.

And it is an issue that needs addressing.

When the two-year budget was adopted in June 2019, this fiscal year's revenue was projected at \$17.4 billion. According to estimates adopted April 30, state revenues were off by more than \$2.5 billion.

Ordinarily, the Finance Committee would have met by July 1 as a component of adjusting the budget's second year. But the pandemic has curtailed our ability to adopt a full set of fixes. But adopting new revenue estimates? If the Judiciary Committee can hold a 12-hour Zoom hearing on police accountability, the Finance Committee can meet virtually to adopt a new state revenue schedule.

Why is this important? The state's general obligation debt is linked to general fund tax revenue, and for the purposes of state borrowing, Connecticut is still operating like we'll have \$17.4 billion in revenue.

Simply put, reality—and responsibility—is being ignored.

If we tackled that revenue reality, we'd have to adjust the bond cap—less revenue means less borrowing, triggering a process requiring the governor to produce a plan to reduce bond authorizations. Those reductions could top \$2 billion, but without the new revenue estimates the governor won't act.

I'm worried that the Finance Committee won't tackle those new estimates until after November's election. No incumbent wants to tell his or her constituents that funding is no longer on the way.

I wrote to the governor's office about all of this recently after requests for new consensus revenue estimates from the Finance Committee's leading Republican went ignored.

Meanwhile, as I write this the State Bond Commission will meet July 21 to perhaps allocate more than \$500 million in borrowing for projects already authorized by the legislature.

There's no doubt about it—we need to get revenues and borrowing plans synced, and the sooner we do it the better off our state will be.

## Let's Be "Frank"

Throughout my younger years, I was always told when you get to a certain age it's suppose to get easier. I am now convinced that whoever started that rumor never got to that certain age.

Handling health issues during this pandemic have been somewhat different but totally amusing and eye opening. I speak of these not to focus on me but in speaking to many in my age group and older, they are experiencing some of the same situations.

First there are the many appointments where there was always urgency not to cancel for fear that neglect would have devastating consequences. Enter the pandemic. All of those appointments are no longer critical, but for some reason it is important to do video and phone chats.

To start with, they scheduled blood work which they tell me is very carefully set up and at low risk for the dreaded virus. With my normal blood test I usually wait anywhere from ten minutes to sometimes more than half an hour. Now you make an appointment in advance, check in electronically and before you can wash your hands, they call you in and you are out of there. I don't want to compare blood testing with brain surgery but couldn't someone figure this out years before the pandemic forced them to think.

Then there is the annual eye appointment that has been a must for twenty years. I have been told that with diabetes, getting your eyes tested annually is a must. The voice on the other end told me they were postponing it until next year. When I reminded them I was a diabetic and was told I needed to be seen every year, I was informed the doctor had told them my eyes do not regress that much from year to year so there would be no problem with waiting another twelve months. Yes, the same doctor who has insisted I need to be checked yearly. Either someone has been pulling my leg for twenty years or they know something about my life expectancy they are not telling me.

Then there was the appointment with my GP who likes to see me every three months. I had already gotten my blood work back and was well aware of the results. I called in at my appointment time, gave her my weight, sugar readings, blood pressure, oxygen level and heart rate. We talked about the kids, the weather and of course the pandemic and that allowed her to renew prescriptions. She did get to see me (on a video) and I don't mind because she is very nice, but can we do this on a regular basis as it saved me a great deal of time and gas and I didn't have to make sure I was wearing clean underwear.

The diabetic specialist thought the numbers were a little high so we should "tweak" the insulin a bit. The tweak involved, stopping two meds and starting a new one. This experiment was "tweaked" for three weeks as I watched my numbers go up 40%. Exasperated, I finally offered my own "tweak" and now my numbers are close to perfect. I do have \$700. worth of useless (to me) insulin in my refrigerator, and my self evaluation and diagnosis seems to be working.

One other med I was taking was keeping me up all night with eight to ten trips to the bathroom. I was getting cramps in my legs and my magnesium levels were plummeting, increasing the cramps and giving me migraines.

On my own I started cutting back on that particular script. Blood pressure stayed ok, cramps went away and magnesium level is creeping back to normal. They have now suggested I drop that med, keep an eye on my pressure and it's possible I could probably stop with the magnesium supplements in a few weeks. Another few hundred dollars of meds (thank God for the insurance) that will be discarded.

After all this, the doctor who gave me my pacemaker looked at the transmissions I sent and proudly announced the implant was probably good for another six years.

With that proclamation I just asked him if someone else can use it when I don't meet that same deadline.






