

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
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

Hartford-A Modern Day Gettysburg



I write this column while visiting Gettysburg with our North Branford Boy Scout Troop. We've toured the museum and learned about the incredible Civil War battle. Throughout the trip, I've received phone calls, emails and texts from constituents, legislators and special interests groups. Many of them frantic over the eminent special session where a vote will finalize the fate of our corporate

giants, small businesses, hospitals, radiologists, surgical centers, nonprofit providers and taxpayers. I receive calls daily from people telling me stories of residents and businesses leaving the state. I can't help but draw a parallel to the slaughter of our brothers and sisters on a battlefield many years ago and the goings-on in Hartford. In both cases, we are eating our own, and it is sickening.

Because so many of these budget proposals never received a public hearing and affected parties never had an opportunity to weigh in on them, there is panic at the Capitol. Some groups, such as the radiologists, are literally fighting for their continued existence while bureaucrats and politicians are realizing that they miscalculated Medicaid cuts in those line items, and they cannot sustain the services without corrections. The Democrats continue to push on the gas pedal, rather than admit a mistake and start this process over.

In my nine years at the Capitol, I don't believe I have ever been so angry. respect others' opinions, and I'm okay with losing an argument, but I'm not used to seeing one party shut another party and the public out of a process that is so important for the entire state. Despite Republican's opposition to the unitary tax, for example, the Democrats voted against our amendment to remove it. After its passage, businesses, such as GE, Aetna and Travelers, threatened to leave the state and some have begun the process. Now, Democrats are trying to delay the implementation of this tax by one year. They should have listened in the first place and eliminated it altogether. So how are they going to delay this tax? Remember the "ground breaking" property tax reform where cities and towns are going to receive more funding and residents will pay less on car taxes? The ink isn't even dried on that proposal, and they're already raiding it to the tune of \$50 million in each year to make "fixes" to the budget. Bristol Meyers in Wallingford just announced closing their plant. Regardless of their reasons for leaving, that's a \$3 million tax loss for Wallingford. No property tax reform is going to fix this loss. If GE leaves Fairfield, they will have a similar hit. I am amazed that the leadership in Hartford doesn't see this dilemma. Every tax imposed has consequences.

After the last day of school, my daughter begged to go to work with me. I gave in. She came with me to the Capitol. I loved spending the day with her and receiving her spontaneous hugs. As we broke for lunch, she began a serious conversa-





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tion about common core and all the standardized testing. She wished we had a different governor who would repeal all the testing. She then asked, "Dad, can you figure out a way to move the business to Ohio?" Her comment was like a punch in the stomach. I cannot protect her from our environment. She hears the stories on the news. She's been impacted by all the changes in her education at school, and she heard the people talking around the Capitol that day. I wish the rest of the legislature was having lunch with her that day. If they could hear the perspective of a child, maybe they'd think and act differently.

Facts About the Fourth of July

We celebrate American Independence Day on the Fourth of July every year. We think of July 4, 1776, as a day that represents the **Declaration of Independence** and the birth of the United States of America as an independent nation.But July 4, 1776 wasn't the day that the Continental Congress decided to declare independence (they did that on July 2, 1776).

It wasn't the day we started the American Revolution either (that had happened back in April 1775).

And it wasn't the day Thomas Jefferson wrote the first draft of the Declaration of Independence (that was in June 1776). Or the date on which the Declaration was delivered to Great Britain (that didn't happen until November 1776). Or the date it was signed (that was August 2, 1776).

So what did happen on July 4, 1776?

The Continental Congress approved the final wording of the Declaration of Independence on July 4, 1776. They'd been working on it for a couple of days after the draft was submitted on July 2nd and finally agreed on all of the edits and changes. July 4, 1776, became the date that was included on the Declaration of Independence, and the fancy handwritten copy that was signed in August (the copy now displayed at the National Archives in Washington, D.C.) It's also the date that was printed on the Dunlap Broadsides, the original printed copies of the Declaration that were circulated throughout the new nation. So when people thought of the Declaration of Independence, July 4, 1776 was the date they remembered.

How did the Fourth of July become a national holiday?

For the first 15 or 20 years after the Declaration was written, people didn't celebrate it much on any date. It was too new and too much else was happening in the young nation. By the 1790s, a time of bitter partisan conflicts, the Declaration had become controversial. One party, the Democratic-Republicans, admired Jefferson and the Declaration. But the other party, the Federalists, thought the Declaration was too French and too anti-British, which went against their current policies.

By 1817, John Adams complained in a letter that America seemed uninterested in its past. But that would soon change.

After the War of 1812, the Federalist party began to come apart and the new parties of the 1820s and 1830s all considered themselves inheritors of Jefferson and the Democratic-Republicans. Printed copies of the Declaration began to circulate again, all with the date July 4, 1776, listed at the top. The deaths of Thomas Jefferson and John Adams on July 4, 1826, may even have helped to promote the idea of July 4 as an important date to be celebrated.

Celebrations of the Fourth of July became more common as the years went on and in 1870, almost a hundred years after the Declaration was written, Congress first declared July 4 to be a national holiday as part of a bill to officially recognize several holidays, including Christmas. Further legislation about national holidays, including July 4, was passed in 1939 and 1941.

PLANNING FOR THE FUTURE

Parents of minor children face many tough questions. One question that many parents don't want to ask themselves is, "Who will care for my children should I pass away or become incapacitated?" This is a difficult issue that many people struggle with. However, parents should nominate a Guardian for their minor children in their estate planning documents. Adding Guardians to your estate planning documents is the "easy" part; choosing a Guardian is a more difficult matter. My best advice would be to look for a good choice, not necessarily the perfect choice. The perfect choice does not exist. You are the perfect choice, and you are really looking for a "runner up". Trust your instincts.

How should you approach choosing a Guardian? There is no magic answer, but I recommend that you consider many different issues. Start with a long list of possible choices. Make a list of ALL the people you think could be good Guardians. Don't limit yourself. Think about siblings, parents, and other extended family members. Friends can make terrific Guardians as well.

When selecting a Guardian to raise your kids, I recommend that parents focus on "the love." Parents should consider whether each couple or person on your list would truly love your children if appointed to be their Guardian. Ask yourself, do these people have the capacity to love my children like I do? After all, you want the Guardians to treat your children as you would. Consider their values and philosophies. The people on your list most likely will share your values and philosophies on life, child rearing, religion and education.

Many parents are very concerned with the financial situation of potential Guardians. My advice is simple: don't worry too much about the finances or the size of someone's house. Don't eliminate a person because you think they don't have a high enough net worth. It's your job to financially plan for your children. You can provide funds for your children through proper estate planning. Many parents utilize life insurance to create an instant estate to care for the family that they leave behind.

After disregarding the financial issues, parents should consider some of the practical factors associated with Guardianship. How would raising your children fit into the Guardian's lifestyle? Do they have the necessary health and stamina to raise your kids? Do the potential Guardians have other children? If so, do they get along with your children? I could go on (and on) but I think you get the point. There are many important considerations when choosing Guardians. Look for love first and then address the practical factors of whether or not a person could handle the job of a lifetime.



North Branford Fire Department

A reminder to everyone that burning of brush is allowed in North Branford. The following is the process that must be followed. Any questions, call the Fire Marshal's office @ 203-484-6016

Residential Burning Permits

- Forms shall be available for residents to pick-up at the Fire Marshal's office and Town Manager's office located at Town Hall, 909 Foxon Road. Forms are also available on the Town's website www.townofnorthbranfordct.com
- 2) Completed forms must be returned to Fire Marshal's Office.

 Applications must be received by the Fire Marshal's office three days prior to burning.
- Upon receipt of a completed signed form, the Fire Marshal's office may physically inspect and photograph the site where the brush is to be burned. Only brush can be burned. No limbs over 3 inches in diameter. No stumps or leaves. Permits are issued for 30 days. Burning can only take place between 10am and 5pm.
- 4) A copy of the form will also be faxed to the North Branford Police Department.
- 5) The resident will be instructed to contact the North Branford Police Department @ 203-484-2703 on the day they wish to actually conduct the burn.
- 6) If complaints are received, police officers will be dispatched to determine if a nuisance exists. If deemed necessary, the appropriate fire company will be dispatched and the fire will be extinguished.
- 7) If the resident does not have the appropriate approval to burn, at the discretion of the local burning official or the incident commander, police intervention may be required. Pursuant to Connecticut General Statute sec. 22a-174, failure to obtain the necessary approval to burn is a Class C misdemeanor and punishable by fine of \$ 200 or imprisoned not more than six months or both.
- 8) Applicants must follow all guidelines and requirements.
- 9) You are required to have a 50 foot buffer from any structure or property line. You are required to have a water supply, capable of extinguishing the fire.
- 10) Chimineas and fire pits less than 3 feet in diameter do not require a nermit

Fireworks

Fireworks are enjoyable and exciting to watch, but every year they injure thousands of people, many of them children, and cause thousands of fires.

ALL FIREWORKS with the exception of sparklers **ARE ILLEGAL**, in Connecticut, and may not be sold, purchased, or used. Only regulated firework displays by state licensed, professional pyro-technicians, which have been approved by local and state officials, are permitted.

The only safe way to enjoy fireworks is to attend an approved public display.

Do not buy fireworks from road side stands. Local establishments that are licensed to sell fireworks are inspected by the fire marshal. "Sparklers" as determined by the State, include sparkling devices of not more than 100 grams of mixture per item and are non-explosive and non-aerial. These include common stick sparklers, cone, base, spike and fountains. These are the only items that can be legally sold or purchased in Connecticut.


