Tomorrow, my wife, Laima Nori, takes her oath. She had her own journey and is becoming a Citizen independently through her own qualifications. I am proud of her and will be at her side when she can finally claim to be an American.





The Public Speaks, And The Finger Pointing Begins



In a recent Hartford Courant editorial, Speaker of the House, Brendan Sharkey blamed Republicans for "routing for failure" and causing the negative outlook in the state. I would not normally acknowledge this type of partisan bickering, but it points to the heart of the problem with the Democrat leadership in Hartford who unfortunately were the driving force be-

yond this year's budget. Speaker Sharkey confuses genuine opposition to policies and any proposed alternatives as bad for Connecticut. His editorial might as well said, "Shut up and put up", and that exactly how the budget process worked this year. The leadership went behind closed doors, crafted an onerous tax package, and sprung it upon the legislature for a quick vote. After it passed and the public realized what was in it, the outcry began along with companies and residents announcing their plans to leave the state.

Republicans asked to be full partners in the legislative budget process, but we were denied. We came up with our own alternative budget that had no tax increases, pared the state bureaucracy, supported our most vulnerable residents, and compelled the public employee unions to negotiate some concessions that Governor Malloy promised four years ago but never delivered. The Democrats summarily ignored this proposal and now the Republicans' opposition to these taxes and spending policies are being blamed for Connecticut's problems.

I never believed that awful budget would have passed this year. It did. After some of our major employers announced plans to leave, Hartford scrambled to try and fix it. Each day, however, a new tax or bad policy was uncovered. For instance, residents headed for Hammonasset Beach only to find out that the state parking fee now has a 6.35% sales tax added, and lines of cars piled up as cashiers tried to make change. Car washes had two days to try and figure out how to collect sales tax through their automated machines that were not equipped to collect the tax. Teenagers found that they had to wait longer for driving exams so that DMV, with their already limited resources, could issue licenses to illegal immigrants. Now, as if all this wasn't enough, and before the ink is even dried on the \$1.8 billion tax increase, Democrats are contemplating a Special Session in the fall to create a mileage tax where residents will be taxed based upon the amount of miles driven.

Speaker Sharkey fails to see the cause and effect of the public's reactions to these bad policies and merely wants to cast blame on the Republican opposition. The fact that he took part in crafting a tax package behind closed doors, refused any Republican input in the budget process, and voted for these policies demonstrates how out of touch he is with what residents expect out of our leaders. I truly hope that his finger pointing is merely a strategy to combat the growing public wrath and to blur the record, and he doesn't actually believe that Republican opposition to these taxes is causing the statewide negativity. If not, we are in for even more trouble.
