"THEY WERE ANGELS FOR ME"

I'm not from Northford, I'm not even from Connecticut, my first home is 1000 miles away in South Texas. I met my husband up here and settled into Northford, but it never felt like home until a year ago.

A year ago this September I had a beautiful baby girl. We delivered her in the car. Yes that actually happens to people. As it was happening to me, I kept saying, "this doesn't really happen to people." The entire debacle is funny now, but that day was terrifying. It was the worst and best day of my life. People ask me how this happened and I still don't know the answer. When I finally got in the backseat to go to the hospital, I screamed hysterically, "she's coming now!" and my husband yelled out, "no she's not!!!" and then he got out of the driver's seat to check anyway just to see his daughter's head. He ripped off my pants and one

shoe and after calling his dad first, yes his dad first, called 911. I have never been so scared and desperate. I was desperate for relief, for someone who knew what they were doing, and desperate for my daughter to be okay. All the worries of my high risk pregnancy rushed through me and I thought this would be the day I met my daughter, but also might lose her. In that moment those feelings were real and overwhelming. I literally screamed out to God.

A North Branford policeman first showed up, quickly after him, the fire department and paramedics arrived. One of the firemen is my husband's cousin so that has made for very fun holidays now, and in that moment was a familiar face. I cried and screamed and these men walked me through every step.

I admit in those first moments I didn't have faith in this crew, but these men and I were in it together. Together, this community of paramedics, policemen, fire fighters, and my husband and I delivered a little girl. My memories of those moments are extraordinary. I felt protected and safe and more importantly my child was safe. They were angels for me. I was treated with dignity, urgency, and utmost care. They held my hand, held the baby, and welcomed life into the world with me. Whatever the experience was on the other side, for me it was life saving and life defining. After my daughter was born I was taken to the hospital and had some after birth complications, and my doctors told me that those men helped more than I knew, things could have easily gone terribly, but because of their actions everything was okay,

I saw them all about a month after she was born, they were so easy going about it, "just doing my job ma'am" type of attitude. But their job saved my whole world. A year later our little Eloise is crawling, giggling and smiling. I tell her daily,

A year later our little Eloise is crawling, giggi "mommy will always keep you safe." The truth is, that experience humbled me, and I would lay down my life for my daughter, but I'm so grateful for when mommy can't keep her safe I have this community to help me.

This last year I've walked around this town with a new light. This is my home. All the things that make you feel like you are home, I felt on that one day. The sense that you and your children are safe here, that this community cares, and that we are in this together. My daughter will grow up in the safe hands of our local heroes, and if her mom needs them I know they will be there.

EDITORIAL

State Representative Vincent Candelora Protecting the Public Trust



My parents tried to instill fiscal discipline in me while growing up. Those sensible rules didn't fully kick in until I was on my own, managing my own money. In government, the officials are stewards of public money and have a responsibility to spend it according to budged line-items under carefully crafted procedures. Because of the natural

tendency to treat other people's money differently, throughout time, government has imposed restrictions, including ethical restrains and disclosure rules to ensure that the public trust is maintained.

Recently some of our quasi-public agencies have come under fire for mismanagement of their budgets, ranging from bonuses and pay increases to mismanagement of public funds, including purchasing artwork from family members for thousands of dollars. Old Lyme First Selectwoman Bonnie Reemsynder and Deputy Secretary of State Scott Bates have resigned from the disgraced Port Authority. The fact that these two individuals remain in positions of public trust is a question for another day, but the reality is that these indiscretions have come to light through our state auditing and Freedom of Information laws where emails, documents and correspondence, are disclosable upon request. In a statement reported by the Hartford Courant, Governor Lamont directed the hiring of an independent firm to audit the authority and include recommendations for a "model of good governance, accountability and transparency."

I find it ironic that the Governor is seeking greater oversight for these groups at the same time he and the legislative democrats created The Partnership for Connecticut, Inc., charging it with administering up to \$300 million and exempting it from all disclosure and state ethics laws. What could possibly go wrong? Furthermore, the make-up of this board has been delegated to private individuals who will have the sole authority to appoint almost twothirds of the members. No procedures for transparency. No process for auditing, and no rules governing ethics. Is Connecticut setting itself up for another port authority scandal? History would suggest so.

Not only does this organization lack any rules to ensure the public trust, it seems to have already been established in violation of the minimum standards set by the Democrats in their budget. While the board has yet to meet, it somehow has already been legally constituted, is expending resources on a website and legal fees (www.connecticutpartnership.org), is advertising for a chief elections officer, and, according to paperwork filed with the secretary of state, has already appointed Barbara Dalio as its board chair.

Interesting the enabling legislation forces five public officials to serve on a thirteen-member board, a construct that hopelessly puts our public officials in the minority and unable to garner enough votes to ensure the public trust



is maintained. Connecticut must rely on the other eight private individuals who may have little or no appreciation for their accountability to the public. Hoping that these people are reading the same articles about the disgraced port authority is not enough. In the next legislative session, Democrats and Republicans must come together to impose "good government, accountability and transparency" laws to this corporation that is charged with fulfilling a public function with tax dollars. Connecticut deserves nothing less.

A Coach

We entrust our children to people we call "coaches." Some can have a wonderful influence on our kids, often the product of a lineage of the coach who coached the coach. My high school football and track coach had a method he called the "ham-sandwich." He would say, "If I do MY job right, Westfall, I can stand back and eat a ham sandwich on game day because you will know your game plan, your jobs and your techniques with such astounding precision that you won't need me to hover over you like you're a bunch of two-year-olds." While it seldom worked to perfection, it had a profound affect on my teammates and me.

My coach put his players in a pre-game meeting with instructions to review our game plan and inspire each other... No coach. We had to organize ourselves and did, at first haphazardly, then with order and input from all. Coach checked on us through the captains and made adjustments as needed.

He also made us learn through teaching. Our best discus thrower stagnated at around 150 feet and slumped into the 140s. Coach abruptly ended his practice session one day and told him to stop throwing for a week. He then advised him that he wouldn't have the week off because he had to teach the rest of us how to throw the discus. The next week he broke out of his slump, into the 170s and threw in the mid 180s in States.

My Coach died before I had the chance to understand what I thanked him for when, as a senior in college, I took my only trip back to my high school. In response to my thanks he gruffly said, "Just pass it on Westfall."

Thirty-nine years later, after having had the wonderful experience of coaching football and track at North Branford for 14 years, I think I understand the essence and meaning of the Ham-Sandwich. It imparts more responsibility on the student athlete. It tasks them with organization, both individually and in groups. It inspires young adults to discipline themselves instead of expecting external oversight and punishment. And when they succeed, student athletes earn a greater sense of accomplishment.

Looking back on my career as a coach, I am hopeful that I inspired a few young adults in this way.

It's About the Land

August 2019

The saga continues of the formation of Lake Gaillard, a man-made reservoir for storage of drinking water. With the completion of the main dam in 1927, the dike in 1928, and the completion of field surveys to establish the line and grade of the three tunnels and borings to evaluate the quality of rock formations at tunnel depth, work could begin on driving two of the tunnels through bedrock to tap and divert sources of water in Guilford (Sugar Loaf tunnel) and Northford (Gulph tunnel). Without tunnels, the new reservoir in North Branford could not be filled because the watershed of the new reservoir (Lake Gaillard) was too small. Likewise, getting water efficiently out of the reservoir and to the distribution system in New Haven and its surrounding communities would require driving a third tunnel (Great Hill tunnel) beneath the New Haven Trap Rock (today's Tilcon) quarry. The outlet of Great Hill tunnel would connect with a large water transmission main to be installed from New Haven through the Foxon section of East Haven to North Branford.

Electric power would be needed to illuminate the tunnels as they were driven deep underground. Work on the Sugar Loaf and Gulph tunnels was preceded by erection of a power line strung for more than two miles from the United Illuminating Co.'s line on Forest Road in North Branford, over Great Hill (Totoket Mtn.), and over the Sugar Loaf Hills in Guilford to the West Branch of the West River where a diversion dam was to be constructed. A vertical shaft was excavated down to the planned Sugar Loaf tunnel's floor, about midway to the West Branch stream in North Guilford. Within the shaft, a lift operated by electric power was installed so men could descend to the elevation established for the tunnel's floor. There they would begin the process of driving the tunnel in opposite directions. Specialized machines were used to bore holes in a specific pattern into the bedrock, each of the holes just large enough to receive sticks of dynamite. The dynamite was wired to receive an electric charge for detonation. This procedure was also followed for the Gulph and Great Hill tunnels. The blast-shattered rock, which had to be removed before advancing further, was referred to as "tunnel muck". From the Sugar Loaf tunnel's elevator shaft, one crew drove the tunnel west toward the future Lake Gaillard and another drove the tunnel east toward the West Branch of the West River in Guilford. The elevator lift was also used to remove the tunnel muck to a nearby disposal area. A crew working from the tunnel intake in Guilford below the future dam on the West Branch of the West River would eventually meet the crew working its way east from the elevator shaft. And a crew working from where the Sugar Loaf tunnel would eventually outlet into the future Lake Gaillard would drive the tunnel east to meet the crew working west from the elevator shaft in Guilford.



Last month, Northford resident Van Augur participated in the prestigious "Tragos Quest to Greece" study abroad program. This program, funded through a scholarship from the Sigma Phi Epsilon fraternity, is an unparalleled study abroad experience in which fewer than two dozen of the nation's best and brightest are immersed in a two-week, intensive journey through Ancient Greek culture and philosophy. On the trip, Van and his fellow scholars explored nearly two dozen historical sites spanning from the Bronze Age to the Byzantine period. 

Matty Chamberlain Still Getting it Done!



WEST HAVEN, Conn. – New Haven junior centerfielder <u>Matt Chamberlain</u> (North Branford, Conn./North Branford) picked up another honor on recently, being named to the ABCA/ Rawlings All-East Region First Team. The allregion teams were voted upon by each region's members of the American Baseball Coaches Association.

Chamberlain was previously named an All-Northeast 10 Conference First Team selection earlier this month after ranking among the conference's leaders in several offensive categories. The all-conference and all-region honors are

the first of his career.

He was one of seven student-athletes from the Northeast 10 Conference to land on the first team, and one of 15 overall to earn all-region accolades. Chamberlain, along with the rest of the first team honorees, will all have their names advance to the ballot for the ACBA's All-America Teams, the winners of which will be announced on Friday, May 31.

Chamberlain put together a breakout junior campaign in 2019, closing the season on a 10-game hitting streak, and had a hit in 16 of his last 17 games. He also reached base safely via either a hit, walk, or hit by pitch in 35 of 37 games this season.

Chamberlain led the NE10 Conference with a .494 on-base percentage, ranked second in slugging (.606) and seventh with a .346 batting average. He ranked eighth in the conference with six homers and was third with 32 walks, which led the team for the second straight season. He posted a career-high 22 steals in 27 attempts, which was tied for fourth in the NE10. He also led the Chargers with 32 runs scored, 34 RBI and three triples, while tying for the team lead with nine doubles.

Chamberlain enjoyed a stellar start to the season that earned him recognition on a national level. He was selected as the NE10 Player of the Week, the NCBWA East Region Hitter of the Week and the NCBWA National Hitter of the Week on February 27 after going 10-for-17 and posting a .588/.667/1.353 slash line over the first four games, along with nine runs scored, 13 RBI, four home runs, three walks and two stolen bases.

Chamberlain put together 13 multi-hit games throughout the season, including one in each of the first five games, including a 3-for-5 performance with a pair of home runs and seven RBI in a 17-1 win over then-No. 19 Saint Thomas Aquinas on February 23. He went 2-for-4 with a walk, home run, three RBI and two runs scored at Stonehill on April 7, and drove in three runs at American International on April 14.


