Candelora Sworn In, Reappointed Deputy House Republican Leader

HARTFORD – **State Representative Vincent Candelora (R-86)** took the oath of office on Wednesday, January 4th, kicking off his sixth term representing the 86th district in the Connecticut General Assembly.

Since 2011, Candelora has served as Deputy Republican Leader, which is the second highest position in the House Republican Caucus.

"It is an honor to be appointed Deputy House Republican Leader," **Candelora** said.

Candelora was appointed to serve on the legislature's Finance, Revenue and Bonding, Legislative Management, Judiciary and Public Health Committees. Also, Candelora will serve as the Chair of the legislature's Screening Committee, which is tasked with reviewing all legislation before it is put up for a vote in the House.

During opening day of the 2017 legislative session, Candelora introduced an amendment that would have given the House the authority to vote on contracts, awards or agreements put forth by the executive branch and state unions.

The amendment failed on a 76-72 party-line vote.

Candelora put forth the legislation in an attempt to give the House a greater say in current contract negotiations.

"The reality is that our pension contracts are being underfunded and the executive branch unilaterally could make the decision to not fully fund our pensions. As it currently stands, the legislature does not get an opportunity to really scrutinize contracts and understand exactly what is in them before they are forced to vote on them. These expenses comprise a great majority of our overall budget, and every year we are struggling to balance that budget. It is important that the legislature have a greater say in that process," noted **Candelora**.

Candelora added, "Legislators deserve to have a greater say in the contract negotiation process, which is why I put forth this amendment. It should not be merely the executive branch and unions coming to an agreement."


At the breakfast the compiled results of the Survey will be discussed with hope that the Town business people will offer their suggestions to address these concerns.

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State Representative Vincent Candelora The Legislature's Procedural Reform on Union Contracts



During the opening day session, on behalf of my caucus, I offered an amendment that would have required the House to vote to accept or reject

all union contracts, awards and agreements negotiated by the Governor's office. The vote failed on party lines 76-72. As the state begins multiple contract negotiations, it is imperative that the body responsible for passing the budget, the legislature, has the ability to accept or reject these contracts. They comprise a majority of our budget resources, and while I think these votes are some of the most difficult to cast, we really have no choice. Allowing them to be approved without legislative scrutiny is irresponsible.

Our leader remarked that she has been in the legislature for 20 years, and the Speaker of the House has never called a contract up for a vote. Under current House rules, a contract or agreement may be called for a vote by the Speaker. If the contract or agreement is not voted on within 30 days, it is deemed approved. Every contract and agreement over the last 20 or more years has been approved by the passage of time, rather than

During the avote of the legislature.

Governor Malloy remarked in this opening day address that Connecticut has been underfunding the pensions for 30 years. When I first got elected in 2007, I recall the surprise that rippled through the chamber as members found out that the pension payments did not have to meet actuarial levels. In other words, by contract, Connecticut had the ability to underfund the pension and use the money for other purposes if the Governor and union leadership agreed to it. Unfortunately, that practice occurred far too many times, and now our pensions are in trouble.

While I was disappointed that the amendment failed, the Speaker has decided to bring the recent agreement to restructure the pension payments to a vote on February 1st. This deal essentially allows the Governor to push off millions of debt payments and amortize them over a few decades. No one is happy about this deal, but Connecticut does not have the ability to make these payments in the wake of our massive budget deficit. I am disappointed that this deal was negotiated in isolation of all the other reforms that need to occur, and I believe we should have a vote on a total contract, rather than piecemeal approvals, but the fact that the General Assembly will be able to have a debate over one of these type of agreements is progress, and I am hopeful that we will have many more.



"Don't Widen The Plate"

Editors Note: I received this story as an e-mail from one of our readers, Unfortuantely I do not know it's origin and I do not remember the readers name but I thought it would be of interest to our readers. I might add, this man is my new hero.

In Nashville, Tennessee, during the first week of January, 1996, more than 4,000 baseball coaches descended upon the Opryland Hotel for the 52nd annual ABCA convention.

While I waited in line to register with the hotel staff, I heard other more veteran coaches rumbling about the lineup of speakers scheduled to present during the weekend. One name, in particular, kept resurfacing, always with the same sentiment — "John Scolinos is here? Oh man, worth every penny of my airfare."

Who the hell is John Scolinos, I wondered. No matter, I was just happy to be there.

In 1996, Coach Scolinos was 78 years old and five years retired from a college coaching career that began in 1948. He shuffled to the stage to an impressive standing ovation, wearing dark polyester pants, a light blue shirt, and a string around his neck from which home plate hung — a full-sized, stark-white home plate.

Seriously, I wondered, who in the hell is this guy?

After speaking for twenty five minutes, not once mentioning the prop hanging around his neck, Coach Scolinos appeared to notice the snickering among some of the coaches. Even those who knew Coach Scolinos had to wonder exactly where he was going with this, or if he had simply forgotten about home plate since he'd gotten on stage.

Then, finally ...

"You're probably all wondering why I'm wearing home plate around my neck. Or maybe you think I escaped from Camarillo State Hospital," he said, his voice growing irascible. I laughed along with the others, acknowledging the possibility. "No," he continued, "I may be old, but I'm not crazy. The reason I stand before you today is to share with you baseball people what I've learned in my life, what I've learned about home plate in my 78 years."

Several hands went up when Scolinos asked how many Little League coaches were in the room. "Do you know how wide home plate is in Little League?"

After a pause, someone offered, "Seventeen inches?" more of a question than answer.

"That's right," he said. "How about in Babe Ruth's day? Any Babe Ruth coaches in the house?"

Another long pause.

"Seventeen inches?" came a guess from another reluctant coach.

"That's right," said Scolinos. "Now, how many high school coaches do we have in the room?" Hundreds of hands shot up, as the pattern began to appear.

"How wide is home plate in high school baseball?"

"Seventeen inches," they said, sounding more confident.

"You're right!" Scolinos barked. "And you college coaches, how wide is home plate in college?"

"Seventeen inches!" we said, in unison.

"Any Minor League coaches here? How wide is home plate in pro ball?" "Seventeen inches!"

"RIGHT! And in the Major Leagues, how wide is home plate in the Major Leagues?"

"Seventeen inches!"

"SEV-EN-TEEN INCHES!" he confirmed, his voice bellowing off the walls. "And what do they do with a Big League pitcher who can't throw the ball over seventeen inches?" Pause. "They send him to Pocatello !" he hollered, drawing raucous laughter.

With our marriages, with the way we parent our kids. With our discipline. We don't teach accountability to our kids, and there is no consequence for failing to meet standards. We simply, widen the plate!"

Pause.

Then, to the point at the top of the house he added a small American flag. "This is the problem in our schools today. The quality of our education is going downhill fast and teachers have been stripped of the tools they need to be successful, and to educate and discipline our young people. We are allowing others to widen home plate! Where is that getting us?"

Silence.

He replaced the flag with a Cross.

"And this is the problem in the Church, where powerful people in positions of authority have taken advantage of young children, only to have such an atrocity swept under the rug for years. Our church leaders are widening home plate for themselves! And we allow it."

"And the same is true with our government. Our so called representatives make rules for us that don't apply to themselves. They take bribes from lobbyists and foreign countries. They no longer serve us. And we allow them to widen home plate and we see our country falling into a dark abyss while we watch."

I was amazed. At a baseball convention where I expected to learn something about curveballs and bunting and how to run better practices, I had learned something far more valuable. From an old man with home plate strung around his neck, I had learned something about life, about myself, about my own weaknesses and about my responsibilities as a leader. I had to hold myself and others accountable to that, which I knew to be right, lest our families, our faith, and our society continue down an undesirable path.

"If I am lucky," Coach Scolinos concluded, "you will remember one thing from this old coach today. It is this: if we fail to hold ourselves to a higher standard, a standard of what we know to be right; if we fail to hold our spouses and our children to the same standards, if we are unwilling or unable to provide a consequence when they do not meet the standard; and if our schools and churches and our government fail to hold themselves accountable to those they serve, there is but one thing to look forward to ..."

With that, he held home plate in front of his chest, turned it around, and revealed its dark black backside. "... dark days ahead."

Coach Scolinos died in 2009 at the age of 91, but not before touching the lives of hundreds of players and coaches, including mine. Meeting him at my first ABCA convention kept me returning year after year, looking for similar wisdom and inspiration from other coaches. He is the best clinic speaker the ABCA has ever known because he was so much more than a baseball coach.

His message was clear: "Coaches, keep your players—no matter how good they are—your own children, your churches, your government, and most of all, keep yourself, ALL, at seventeen inches.

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North Branford Fire Department continues to provide the highest quality of emergency and non-emergency life safety services to the citizens and visitors in our community. Through the department's commitment to continuous improvement, staff development and implementing new and innovative programs to create greater economic efficiencies and improve emergency service effectiveness to North Branford residents. In compliance with National Fire Protection Standards (NFPA) 1720, Standards for the Organization and Deployment of Fire Suppression Operations, Emergency Medical Operations and Special Operations to the Public by Volunteer Fire Departments, the North Branford Fire Department exceeds the national consensus standard, on scene within 8 minutes after dispatch.

During 2016 North Branford fire department personnel answered 1887 calls for service. The dollar loss related to fire damaged property during this period was \$458,000. Property saved was in excess of 23 million dollars.





The Northford/North Branford Home Delivery Program will be starting its fifth year on January 17, 2017.


