Dear Editor:



State Representative Vincent Candelora Connecticut State-Run Retirement System-Who Are We Really Helping?



Public Act 16-29 establishes the Connecticut Retirement Security Authority (CRSA), a quasi-public state agency governed by a board of directors, which may be supported from administrative fees charged to participating members. The authority is tasked with establishing and implementing the

Connecticut Retirement Security Program (CRSP). A subsequent amendment, which passed both chambers, allows for an exchange in which the private sector supplies these benefits.

I ultimately did not support this legislation. The bill was premised on the fact that individuals, especially low-wage earners, do not have retirement plans. The law requires that employers must automatically enroll each employee in the program no later than 60 days after the employer provides the employee with the informational material on the program. If the employee does not affirmatively opt in, the employer must enroll the employee with a contribution of at least 3% but not more than 6% of the employee's taxable wages. A covered employee may opt out of the program by electing a contribution level of zero.

In its original form, this bill offered 401k type plans where pretax dollars are used for the retirement vehicle, hence, income taxes are deferred until the money is withdrawn in retirement. This vehicle is the preferred method of saving for retirement and certainly should be used for low-wage individuals since it leaves more money in their pockets. The majority party in the legislature eliminated this option when they realized it would cost the state \$10 million in income tax revenue. So sadly, they protected the interests of government at the expense of our workers. The state, therefore, is promoting these Roth IRAs, not because they are the best retirement vehicles, but because it protects the states' interests. Unsuspecting and uninformed individuals will only be educated on one option, which in most cases, is a bad decision for them.

The private sector already provides retirement plans for individuals whose employer does not offer them. When I met with Guilford Savings Bank this past winter, they explained that they offer these 401k type programs already, free of charge and if the government offers this "opt out" program, our community banks cannot compete with government and Connecticut could see more job losses. The public is much better served by opting out of this state plan and visiting a community bank to explore your options.

Although the employers have no control over these retirement plans, do not administer the plan and do not receive any paperwork on the plans beyond the initial enrollment, the state makes them potentially liable for anything that goes wrong with the investment while the quasi-government administrators are immune from liability. It's an astounding policy when you think about it, but no surprise as the entire law elevates the protections of government at the expense of the people it governs.

There is no question that Connecticut residents do not save enough for retirement, but rather than force them to do so under an ill-conceived government plan, maybe the legislature should ask themselves why people don't save for retirement? Could it be that we are the most expensive and tax-burdened state in the country to live in? The legislature has done an exceptionally poor job of managing its money and we certainly should not begin micromanaging the money of its people. I recommend employees opt out of this program and visit your community banks.

BOE Forced to Make Cuts for 2016-2017 School Year

Recently, The Board of Education presented the Town Council with its budget for 2016/2017 school year. The budget called for \$1,454,148 or 4.8% increase over last year. The increase was primarily based on contractual salary and medical benefit increases as well as a literacy coach for grades six through twelve, a certified librarian for Jerome Harrison School, the increase of a Jerome Harrison Special Education teaching position from half time to full time and new athletic uniforms.

After consideration by the Town Council it was determined to give them \$300,000. and up to \$165,000 in Special Education grants. This left a shortfall of almost \$1,000,000. With the new number in mind, the BOE was forced to go back and make some cuts to reach that figure.

On May 19, 2016, Superintendent of Schools Scott Schoonmaker sent a letter home to the parents, addressing the changes that would be necessary to meet the required budget numbers. Some of the items he addressed are as follows:

The Literacy Coach and certified librarian were eliminated from the budget as were new athletic uniforms were eliminated from the budget.(It should be noted that these items were not eliminated from previous year, only as budgeted requests).

Eliminated from the previous year to compensate for contractual increases were the following items:

- Reduction of one professional development day for teachers.
- The reduction of one student day from the calendar.
- Four teaching positions have been eliminated.
- Four paraprofessionals have been eliminated.
- Reduce a clerical position from 12 month to 10 month.
- Eliminate one custodial position.
- Activity fee added to grades 6-12 reducing the athletic budget by 15%.

North Branford form of government puts the responsibly of the number on the Town Council, but the actual cuts are left up to the Board of Education. During a recent interview with the Times, Mr. Schoonmaker pointed out, "Obviously any time we lose personnel who provide services to our children, it is a great loss. Other options were to shorten the school year by one day or eliminate more teachers. The activity fee will save two more teaching positions which would have eliminated programs and increased class sizes".




