Family looking to Increase Scholarship Funds



When Johnnie Mouning, passed away in 2007, several of his colleagues at Yale University funded a scholarship in his memory. The fund balance is just shy of \$65,000. In honor of Father's Day, his family is reaching out to raise an additional \$35,000 to increase the endowment balance to \$100,000 before the first scholarships are awarded in 2017. This will allow them to maximize how much may be awarded to each student.

The scholarships will be awarded to eligible students at James Hill-

house High School in New Haven, CT (where Mr. Mourning graduated) and North Branford High School (where his four sons graduated).



Veto Session Nears: Will the Legislator Act to Override?



The Governor rejected a number of bills with the power of veto this past month, and on June 20th, the legislature will convene to discuss overriding his veto. A two thirds vote of both chambers is needed.

Public Act 16-98, An Act Concerning Operators of Athletic

Activities, Coaches and Referees And the Employer Relationship is one of the bills under consideration. I sponsored this bill and supported it through the legislative process. Last year, I was contacted by Guilford Youth Soccer Club. The club had been audited by the Department of Labor who made an initial finding that all payments made to referees at soccer games and to persons holding clinics for its players constituted an employer-employee relationship, and therefore, the club had to pay unemployment taxes. These payments went to hundreds of individuals in \$20 increments. The club appealed the decision and after spending time and money succeeded in most of its challenge. The case is still pending on others.

Whether an employer-employee relationship exists depends upon whether the employee is under the direct supervision and control of the employer. Typically, most sporting clubs have no idea who is showing up to officiate a game, and certainly exhibits no control or supervision over the official. The officials control when the game begins and ends. Despite the department's private acknowledgement to me that a referee can almost never be considered an employee of the teams that he or she is officiating over, they still make this finding in their audits against volunteer sports clubs and leave it to these clubs to prove otherwise. In my opinion, I believe the department hopes that a club will just pay the fine as just another money grab from the state.

If the department succeeds in imposing this policy on all our club and school sports, it becomes unworkable to hold a game. Imagine teams will need to collect W-2 forms along with two forms of identification before the start of every game. If an official fails to bring his or her driver's license or social security card to the field, a game may not commence. It sounds absurd, but this is the exact result the department is looking for when they make these findings. Recognizing the negative impact on youth sports, even the Connecticut teacher's union supported this bill.

The Governor vetoed the bill claiming that our sports organizations should use the Department of Labor as a resource to determine when an employer/ employee relationship exists. The suggestion begs the question. If the Department is already improperly imposing fines on youth sports clubs by twisting the law to create an employee-employer relationship between a team and a referee, how will they serve as an objective resource for these clubs to avoid this pitfall?

This state needs to change its outlook on how it treats residents and businesses. These agencies are predatory, arrogant and act outside the boundaries of the law. If they are willing to put volunteer, nonprofit youth sports through the cost of audits and appeals, I can only imagine what they do to taxpayers on a daily basis. I hope we can override this veto.

This, plus the fact that Marge was one of the few patients with a living spouse made us a social attraction. That and my visiting every day for many hours made us subject for special visits by medical students specializing in geriatric medicine and many of the patients and even the staff, wanting to see the man who is still living after almost 80 years married to the same woman.

Marge is now fully recovered from a gash on her forehead, which prompted me to say, she was lucky she hit her head or she could have really gotten hurt (a little humor) and a fractured big toe thanks to the finest care in the most pleasant and comforting atmosphere that speeded her recovery. Despite the finest therapy and meals it didn't stop her from saying every day, "I want to go home." And she did. and here we are hoping to make the next chapter in November.

Her coming home resulted in a change in our lives ... While Marge was little changed from when she left the family had decided we were less able to be trusted to live our lives without more assisted living. The VNA (Visiting Nurses Association) were engaged to provide therapy and medical help. The therapists and nurses are to be complimented on their skills and while I would like to name them individually, to do so I risk slighting someone in the many that came. I use the fact that I was among the first "Physics Therapist" now called "Physical Therapist" licensed in Connecticut in 1943 as the criterion on which I base my judgement of their skills.

It is embarrasses inc to relate what I'm about to since I never dreamed I would ever find myself in this position .. but I feel it is my duty to relate the following as my contribution to what we've come to need and to how thankful we are to have these wonderful friends, neighbors, and town services to make our lives as livable as possible in our advanced age.

As we grew older the most troubling was the loss of our equilibrium. Yes .. We knew the fluid in our ears controlled our equilibrium, but since learned that the brain has something to do with it. But it came on so fast the last two years. As our family got concerned, they put us on family watch. While not admittedly so obviously evident, I myself got concerned when 1 fell in the garden the first time and had to call for help to get to my feet. Enough so that after I made certain I could do what I was doing within reach of some part of the golf cart to grasp. A tactic I still use when trying to prune the fruit trees or the grapes. As pathetic as it is and ridiculous as it must look to someone watching me maneuvering the cart in all different directions to reach a needed branch or vine removal. I still refuse to give up, despite even that is becoming fruitless since weakening hands make the simple task of squeezing the pruners sometimes an effort in futility.

My sons' suggested that I get one of those Medical Alert things you wear around your neck and press a button for help if no one was near especially since my dependence on the golf cart for any physical activity takes me some distance from the house. Finally, I succumbed after a couple of falls in the house and one by Marge that resulted in seven stitches in her forehead, fractured big toe, and four weeks in Evergreen Woods as I related above.

Now comes the important part. A couple of days ago I got up at about 7:30 A.M., dressed, reached for mv medical alert hanging on the end of the bed and then very foolishly threw it over my head with my feeble arms and lost my balance backward winding in a heap on the floor unhurt, but thoroughly embarrassed.

With no other alternative I pushed the little button, laid back and waited. Almost instantly, (maybe ten minutes), there was Kenny Neubig concerned for my welfare, to haul me to my feet, in a not too easy task considering the circumstances. Barely on my feet when Jason and another young chap whose name I don't know, arrived if needed. Almost instantly medical alert was calling to see if I was tended to. Kenny assured them the fire department had responded and everything was fine. I told them they deserved recognition for their wonderful services but it was probably too embarrasssing for me to give them the credit they deserved but I changed my mind and admit to all my wonderful readers before my demise, and to fertilizing the lawn wherever my ashes can do the most good.

I want to thank all of you who missed me, and being not too bad from the neck up will try to enrich your lives with my 'Wit and Wisdom' once again.

Memorial Schoalrship Goes to Alana Cotton

The Arthur F. and Astrid Hansen Wolfe Memorial Scholarship was awarded at North Branford High School on June 1, 2016, by Wallingford resident, Linda Wolfe Rankin, daughter ofthe Wolfes, The following is the talk delivered by Mrs. Rankin.

"Before I present the Arthur F. and Astrid Hansen Wolfe Memorial Scholarship, I'm going to tell you about my parents and how they influenced me.

I am a native of Northford, growing up on a dairy farm on Forest Road in a Colonial saltbox that had six fireplaces! Dad had ninety head of cattle and one hundred acres of land, working from sun-up to sundown. Committed as a charter member to the Northford Volunteer Fire Department Company #2, he often stopped doing his chores, even when milking cow, to go fight a fire. When I was little and did not want to take a nap, my dutiful mother put me in the pickup truck and drove until I fell asleep! As you might guess, as a farmer's daughter, I didn't ride on ponies but on calves instead and, of course, drank lots of fresh milk! We later moved to Middletown Avenue and the kind of farm changed as Dad turned to raising chickens! He built a brooder coop where three hundred baby chicks could keep warm and a two floor chicken house for one thousand chickens. He had a route, selling eggs and fresh chickens. I had chores and one was to candle eggs to test for imperfections. Also, my father had two other jobs, working as acarpenter for a lumberyard in Wallingford and as a North Branford town constable. He worked so hard to make a living! Meanwhile, Mom opened her own Little Folks Nursery School in Northford. Dad made sand

Besides animals, my parents enjoyed plants. Dad had a very bountiful, varied vegetable garden, including a patch of strawberry rhubarb. By Memorial Day, he set up a stand by the road to sell his rhubarb, well-known in Northford! Other chores for me were weeding and picking veggies. With the size of the garden, they c o u l d preserve by freezing



and canning for the winter. Mom made what was then called a "meat and potatoes" supper every night. We had beautiful, colorful flower gardens, which were leisure-time pleasure, not work to them.

When I was about ten years old, I wanted to take piano lessons. My parents, who always encouraged me to learn, bought an upright piano but knew it would be hard making turns to get it into the living room. Dad was persistent, so he asked friends for help. They removed a window and lifted the piano in. My lessons began, and I studied both piano and organ, becoming organist and choir director of North ford Congregational Church. They were so proud, and I was very appreciative of their sacrifices. Mom and I liked to sing and harmonize as I played. When she was a teenager like you, she was in musicals and vaudeville at the Northford Community House, which stands today on route 22. Maybe you play an instrument or sing in a chorus yourself.

My dad did so much for me! If a clasp on a piece of jewelry broke, or a tire on my car was soft, Dad would help. Onesnowy slippery day, on my way to teach in Wallinford, my car couldn't make it up Snake Hill, somehow he sensed that, left work, drove to the top of the hill, walked down and met me, turned my car around and drove me to school.

Mom, Dad and I enjoyed doing things together, having fun but also, facing challenges. Each had such a sense of humor. Mom had wit and Dad, his smile, which was his legacy. Mom and I baked Danish Christmas cookies; Dad and I watched westerns on TV. We tried new restaurants and traveled in the U.S. and abroad. My parents retired and I got married. I am a mother and a grandmother, loving my roles as much as my parents delighted in theirs.

My parents taught values and ethics just by being who they were. I try to be kind, gentle, supportive, hardworking, helpful, warm and dedicated. Most especially, from them I learned the qualities of being loving and caring and the importance of giving a smile. What role models they were for me. I was blessed.

Who is your role model or mentor? Maybe your parents, grandparents, God parents teacher, coach or friend. Remember, you to cn be that role model.






