Rotary Partners with Liberty Bank for Thanksgiving



Moderates on the march? Not so fast...

One of the smaller yet important mysteries inside the halls of the Legislative Office Building hit mainstream media recently through an article in the Hartford Courant entitled, "Moderates on the March."

The story was about a group of House Democrats—27 of them—who have announced themselves as moderates, speaking in pro-business tones and embarking on fundraising efforts to help like-minded candidates win office.

Right now, Democrats control the House chamber 96 to 54. If only more of these so-called moderates had stepped forward during conversation and votes on key issues over the last few years, our state might not have a new truck tax, a prepared meals tax, criminal justice polices that give short shrift to victims, or even an increased filing fee for businesses. I could go on, but you get the point: Connecticut is a difficult and expensive place to live and run a business, and it's clear that these so-called moderates aren't quite the advocates the claim to be.

The problem for voters? Outside of the two Democrat lawmakers leading this moderate march, the identities of these "Blue Dog" representatives are unknown.

It's closest-guarded secret in the Legislative Office Building.

From their perspective, it's understandable-if you end up on a list chances are voters will compare your record to what you say you are.

For most, the result of such comparisons won't be favorable.

The beauty of the Courant headline announcing a nebulous moderate pack is that Democrat legislators can claim membership when the audience suits them.

With an election year right around the corner, and the cost of living here continuing to increase, it'll be a useful tool-particularly when redistricting will have some of the them introducing themselves to brand new constituents.

So during the next legislative session, monitoring how majority party legislators vote will be the best way to see if they pass the moderate sniff test. And heading into Election Day, asking questions such as, "did you vote for the payroll tax" or "did you vote for the digital downloads tax" might be insightful when determing if a lawmaker is the moderate fiscal hawk he or she purports to be.

Unfortunately for you and our state, more often than not the answer to those questions will be "yes."

NB Plastic Film Recycling Program – Year Five Update It is hard to believe, but we are wrapping up the fifth year of the $N\overline{B}$ Plastic

Film Recycling Program.

We collected some 4,400 pounds of plastic film for 2021, bringing our total for the five years to just over 21,000 pounds. Wow, 10 tons of plastic, thanks to your efforts to recycle.

Recently there seems to be a significant amount of unacceptable types of plastic film being dropped off. Besides, it having to be sorted and then thrown away, it takes a lot of time for our volunteers to process it.

It seems to be just a few individuals or households contributing to the problem, as the type of unacceptable items is consistent at certain collection locations.

A good rule of thumb is to just place items that are listed on the posters in the collection areas. Unacceptable items that appear occasionally are: deli bag paper inserts, drinking straws, and mylar balloons.

Again, all items must be clean and dry. To help ensure this, we suggest turning all bags inside out. This includes, cereal, deli, bread, ziplock, and salt bags.

We understand folks want to save room when collecting the items at home,

The trash bags filled with torn wrapping paper and empty boxes are now replaced with a few torn envelopes from some holiday gift cards.

This is not only being experienced by me but by many people I have spoken with. As there are more family members at the cemetery then there are at the dinner table. Many of the traditions have been buried with them. The palates of the new generation have changed as well as their gift requirements. The shots of brandy, sambuca and lemoncello have been replaced by shots of insulin.

Yes my brother, things have changed. But what hasn't changed are the memories of these great times. What hasn't changed is that we are still celebrating the birth of Christ and the birth of our religion and beliefs. What hasn't changed is the fact that a baby was born to poverty and chaos and in his short thirty three year life on this earth, he has changed the lives of millions.

Through these changes, much of the money that has been spent in the past has been saved. The craziness of the preparation has given us a more sedate time. A time for reflection and a time self examination. As I mentioned, many people in my age group are going through some of these same feelings. Maybe with the money saved on gifts and food and frivolous things we use to call holiday necessities, we can re-budget.

There are many legitimate charities that need our help. Veterans who fought for our freedom are living on the streets. Families are hungry and children are starving. Senior citizens are being robbed of their dignity and their health by a government that is forgetting about them.



The Officers and Members of the North Branford Fire Department, wish to extend our Best Wishes for a Safe and Happy Holiday Season to all. Use Common Sense During the Holiday's

Home fires increase during this time of year. Heating devices, fireplaces, holiday lighting, candles and decorations, all contribute to the increased risk.

North Branford Fire department Recommends:

- 1. Use only UL listed lights and extension cords.
- 2. Keep extension cord use to a minimum. Do not overload your electrical system. If you are blowing fuses, find out why. Check for frayed wires. If the lights don't work when you test them, toss them. Don't take the chance.
- 3. Keep decorations away from open flame and heating sources.
- 4. If you have a live tree, keep it watered and dispose of as soon it starts to dry out.
- 5. Keep your means of escape clear. Don't block a door with the tree or other decorations.
- 6. Use candles correctly. Keep away from any decorations, curtains and paper tablecloths.
- 7. Do not leave home without turning off all lights, extinguishing all candles and any portable heating units. At night check to make sure that your house is safe, before you go to bed.
- 8. Make sure you have at least one operating smoke detector on every floor.

Fireplace and Stove Safety:

More than one-third of Americans use fireplaces, wood stoves, and other fuel – fired appliances to heat their homes. Unfortunately, many people are unaware of the fire risks associated with wood and other fuels.

North Branford Fire Department encourages you to practice the following fire safety steps:

- 1. Have your chimney or wood stove cleaned and inspected annually
- 2. Keep the area around your fireplace or stove clear of flammable decorations or materials
- 3. Always use a metal mesh screen with fireplaces, and keep your glass doors open
- 4. Never use flammable liquids to start a fire
- 5. Use only seasoned hardwood
- 6. Build small fires that burn completely and produce less smoke
- 7. Never burn cardboard, trash or other debris in your fireplace or wood stove
- 8. *Never leave a fire unattended* and extinguish before going to bed or leaving the house
- 9. Soak hot ashes in water and place them in a metal container *outside and away* from your house

Facts of the Month

Heating Equipment fires account for 16 % of all home fires and 22 % of all home fire deaths. The majority of these fires occur during December and January. Cooking equipment was the leading cause of home fires and fire injuries, causing 46% of home fires that resulted in 19% of the home fire deaths and 44% of the injuries

What better gift for a loved one this year, new smoke and

carbon monoxide detectors. And offer to install it too.



Recycling News Holiday Recycling

Please recycle the packaging that your holiday shipments arrive in. The cardboard goes into the recycle bin but the Styrofoam goes into the trash.

Don't be fooled by the recycle symbol on the Styrofoam. Any bubble wrap is considered plastic film and can be brought to a plastic film drop off location. Get out your frustrations by popping it first.

Plastic shipping envelopes are also considered plastic film. These are the ones that are plastic on the inside and outside.

Holiday wrapping paper is mostly not recyclable because most of it has metallic, glitter or velvety flocking on it. Also, the ribbons and bows cannot go into the recycle bin.

Holiday Donations

For items that still have some life in them, consider posting them on the Facebook page: North Branford & Northford Free Items.
Help someone else out, unclutter your house and help the environment at the same time. For a larger audience check out Freecycle.org in East Haven or New Haven.

You can also look up your item in the New Haven Downsizing Donation Guide. It lists multiple organizations that want your stuff! Just search for 'New Haven Downsizing Donation Guide''.

Christmas Tree Pickup will be January 3 – 14, 2022.

Be on the lookout for your 2022 Recycling/Trash Information card in a January issue of your Totoket Times. Keep this card all year for important dates and information about what can be recycled.

Plastic Film Recycling Plastic bags do NOT go into your recycling bin.

To recycle them, please drop off<u>clean and dry</u> bags at our town's collection bins or any store that takes them. Many do. All of our collection sites have received free Trex benches because of the amount of plastic film they have collected. The following locations are collecting plastic film for our town: Country Paint and Hardware, T.J's Launderette, Town Hall, Atwater and Smith Libraries, STW Community Center, Northford Store and The Food Pantry of North Branford.

Plastic film includes: grocery bags, newspaper sleeves, wood pellet bags, salt bags, and zipper bags for recycling. They also accept plastic wraps from water bottle cases, diapers, bathroom tissue, and paper towels, as well as bubble wrap and shipping pillows.

Plastic bags with recycling symbols #2 or #4 **ARE** accepted. Plastic bags with recycling symbols #5 or #7 (i.e. salad and grape bags), crinkly snack bags (potato chips, popcorn, and candy wrappers), pet food bags, frozen food bags, and any bags with food residue are **NOT** accepted.

Plastic bags and wraps get recycled into products such as new grocery bags, benches, and decking.

The Solid/Hazardous Waste and Recycling Committee is looking for new members. We also are in need of volunteers to help for just an event or two during the year.

Please call the Town Manager if you are interested. If you would like to help with getting the word out about recycling then this is a great place to get started.
