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State Representative Vincent Candelora Connecticut's Comeback Requires More Inspiration



In sports, and even in life, a big comeback usually requires a bit of ingenuity or inspiration.

The budget proposal offered last week by Gov. Lamont advertised a "Connecticut Comeback," yet it lacks those aforementioned qualities to fuel the drive toward that pledge.

Given the varied challenges posed by the pandemic, if there was ever a moment that

demanded something new or bold-this was it.

Instead, we received a budget that relies upon either revenue from federal aid, tapping our state's rainy day fund, or a dose of intense economic growth unlike anything we've seen over the last two decades. That bit of multiplechoice uncertainty alone is a poor foundation from which to operate, but many will find broken promises on tax relief even more frustrating.

Retired teachers will be disappointed by the pension tax exemption remaining at 25 percent rather than the expected 50 percent. Additionally, the overall retiree pension and annuity tax exemption created in 2017 would hold at 28 percent rather than growing according to a—bipartisan—schedule adopted four years ago. A corporate surcharge that's supposed to sunset won't, and the governor's once-promised property tax relief has failed to materialize.

In delivering his speech to Connecticut, Gov. Lamont said, "we don't need more taxes, we need more taxpayers." I'm not sure his budget proposal is the magnet he thinks it is.

Those broken promises on tax relief, combined with a proposal that would increase your price at the gas pump, or even another that would drive the costs of goods higher by targeting truckers with a mileage fee, will only make Connecticut a more expensive place to live.

Many segments of our state's population, whether business owners or parents of school-aged children, are looking for leadership. Instead, the governor's budget proposal signals that he intends to continue governing through inertia. He simply reacts to what COVID throws at us.

A budget that lacks inventiveness in assisting Connecticut's business community emerge from the pandemic—this one fits that bill—threatens to have us lose competitive ground to Massachusetts and Rhode Island, with both states having invested heavily in that goal.

There's a long way to go in the process to develop the two-year budget, and it's my hope that we'll see more proposals akin to some of the good incremental steps Gov. Lamont has taken to create a more efficient state government, such as allowing DMV customers to do more online.

The governor is right—Connecticut does need a comeback, and it has for a while. But I fear the banal approach outlined last week just won't get us there.

When I deliver this edition, it will be the first day of Lent, commonly known as Ash Wednesday. As a child, that was the beginning of a most religious and reflective time of our Catholics lives. Especially if you went to Catholic school and had a mother who was quite handy with a wooden spoon, a leather belt or a ping pong paddle.

Ash Wednesday would traditionally begin with attending Mass in the morning. Following the Mass, ashes would be dispensed (only by a priest) and this would be followed by making a list of things to give up in sacrifice during the Lenten season. My list usually included candy, ice cream, the use of foul language and potato chips. I tried to give up doing my homework and taking out the trash but that would only help mom to hone her skills with the wooden spoon.

Ash Wednesday was also the beginning of fast and abstinence. No meat on Ash Wednesday or any Friday during lent and no eating between meals. It was Stations of the Cross on Fridays, to go along with our tuna fish, egg salad or cheese sandwich for lunch and spaghetti with tuna fish or a frittata for supper.

Working in Pacelli's, (the local Italian grocery store) was also a sacrifice as it was the hardest forty days of the year for the store. Being the only employee of two aging owners, I had the "pleasure" of preparing (loading and rotating) the stock for the holiday specialties. Large prosciuttos stored in the cooler along with salami, pepperoni, ham, basket cheese and grated cheese for the ham pies (apizza gaina). Adding that to hauling countless cases of tomatoes and oil from the warehouse to the shelves in preparation for all the holiday cooking filled most of my time after school.

It's funny how I could never understand the reasoning behind many of these traditions when I was young. I am definitely old school and in the old school, when children asked questions, the answer given by parents and the "good sisters" was always, "because that's the way it is". It never inspired me to further my understanding, it just added to my confusion and frustration. I could never really understand why the world would be a better place because I gave up candy and chips. I never liked the prayer as ashes were being administered, "Remember that you are dust and unto dust you shall return." I didn't need to have that dirty spot on my forehead after I groomed my hair for the cute girls in the classroom. I also saw many adults getting ashes and they were mean, nasty and the furthest thing from good Christians there could possibly be. Yet they paraded around the neighborhood wearing their "symbol of Christianity".

Then as a teenager, I got close to Father Mario. He was a priest ahead of his times. Although he came from Italy he was not old school. He answered questions. He corrected some of the nuns incomplete teachings and explained the real meaning of the season and of Christianity.

Keeping holy the Sabbath (he instructed) didn't mean you had to go to church. It meant you had to do something meaningful for your fellow man. During Lent, he explained, "Remembering to take time to pray but also, visiting the sick, or helping the elderly in the neighborhood or doing something nice for someone was better than giving up meat or potato chips.

I still skip the meat on Fridays and I still try to make Mass on most Sunday's even though the Arch Bishop has declared immunity of sin for missing Mass during the pandemic. But I think I have tried to be nicer to people, help where I am needed and if I give something up, it's so I can give it to someone who needs it more that I do.

So in preparation for the season, I try to add to my daily routine by doing special favors for those in need, be it whatever I can do to help. I take more time for reflection and prayer and I try to refresh my attitude with kindness and patience. I still skip the meat on Fridays and that might possibly be


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

The origin of Presidents' Day lies in the 1880s, when the birthday of Washington—commander of the Continental Army during the American Revolution and the first president of the United States—was first celebrated as a federal holiday. In 1968 Congress passed the Uniform Monday Holiday Bill, which moved a number of federal holidays to Mondays. The change was designed to schedule certain holidays so that workers had a number of long weekends throughout the year, but it has been opposed by those who believe that those holidays should be celebrated on the dates they actually commemorate. During debate on the bill, it was proposed that Washington's Birthday be renamed Presidents' Day to honour the birthdays of both Washington (February 22) and Lincoln (February 12); although Lincoln's birthday was celebrated in many states, it was never an official federal holiday. Following much discussion, Congress rejected the name change. After the bill went into effect in 1971, however, Presidents' Day became the commonly accepted name, due in part to retailers' use of that name to promote sales and the holiday's proximity to Lincoln's birthday. Presidents' Day is usually marked by public ceremonies in Washington, D.C., and throughout the country. From encyclopedia Brittanica

George Washington (February 22, 1732^[b] – December 14, 1799) was an American political leader, military general, statesman, and Founding Father who served as the first president of the United States from 1789 to 1797. Previously, he led Patriot forces to victory in the nation's War for Independence. He presided at the Constitutional Convention of 1787, which established the U.S. Constitution and a federal government. Washington has been called the "Father of His Country" for his manifold leadership in the formative days of the new nation.

Washington received his initial military training and command with the Virginia Regiment during the French and Indian War. He was later elected to the Virginia House of Burgesses and was named a delegate to the Continental Congress, where he was appointed Commanding General of the Continental Army. He commanded American forces, allied with France, in the defeat and surrender of the British during the Siege of Yorktown. He resigned his commission after the Treaty of Paris in 1783.

Washington played a key role in adopting and ratifying the Constitution and was then twice elected president by the Electoral College. He implemented a strong, well-financed national government while remaining impartial in a fierce rivalry between cabinet members Thomas Jefferson and Alexander Hamilton. During the French Revolution, he proclaimed a policy of neutrality while sanctioning the Jay Treaty. He set enduring precedents for the office of president, including the title "Mr. President", and his Farewell Address is widely regarded as a pre-eminent statement on republicanism.

Washington owned slaves, and, in order to preserve national unity, he supported measures passed by Congress to protect slavery. He later became troubled with the institution of slavery and freed his slaves in a 1799 will. He endeavored to assimilate Native Americans into Anglo-American culture, but combated indigenous resistance during instances of violent conflict. He was a member of the Anglican Church and the Freemasons, and he urged broad religious freedom in his roles as general and president. Upon his death, he was eulogized as "first in war, first in peace, and first in the hearts of his countrymen". He has been memorialized by monuments, art, geographical locations, stamps, and currency, and many scholars and polls rank him among the greatest U.S. presidents. *Wikepedia* Abraham Lincoln (/'linkən/; February 12, 1809 – April 15, 1865) was an American statesman and lawyer who served as the 16th president of the United States from 1861 until his assassination in 1865. Lincoln led the nation through the American Civil War, the country's greatest moral, constitutional, and political crisis. He succeeded in preserving the Union, abolishing slavery, bolstering the federal government, and modernizing the U.S. economy. Lincoln was born into poverty in a log cabin and was raised on the frontier primarily in Indiana. He was self-educated and became a lawyer, Whig Party leader, Illinois state legislator, and U.S. Congressman from Illinois. In 1849, he returned to his law practice but became vexed by the opening of additional lands to slavery as a result of the Kansas–Nebraska Act. He reentered politics in 1854, becoming a leader in the new Republican Party, and he reached a national audience in the 1858 debates against Stephen Douglas. Lincoln ran for President in 1860, sweeping the North in victory. Pro-slavery elements in the South equated his success with the North's rejection of their right to practice slavery, and southern states began seceding from the union. To secure its independence, the new Confederate States fired on Fort Sumter, a U.S. fort in the South, and Lincoln called up forces

North Branford Public Libraries Presents: Donna Katsuranis- Active Dreaming

The work I do is called Active Dreaming. It is a technique developed by Robert Moss, with whom I worked for quite a few years. His book "Conscious Dreaming" is by far the best work on the subject.

Active Dreaming is a method of dream sharing which synthesizes modern Dreamwork and ancient shamanic practices. It views dreams as Experiences, and inspires folks with powerful tools to explore dreams. At the heart of Active Dreaming is one basic tenet: The dreamer is the final authority on the meaning of their dreams. As such, my work is not Dream Analysis per se (or, heaven forbid, dream "interpretation"). It is an introduction to a way of sharing dreams that empowers the dreamer and gives some options for what to do with the information they have uncovered. Sometimes this leads the dreamer to the meaning behind the dream. Sometimes it leads to far more.

The core technique of Active Dreaming is the Lightning Dreamwork process. This is a quick, fun and respectful way to share dreams, receive non-intrusive feedback, and move toward creative action to honor dreams and bring their magic into our lives.

to suppress the rebellion and restore the Union.

As the leader of moderate Republicans, Lincoln had to navigate a contentious array of factions with friends and opponents on both sides. War Democrats rallied a large faction of former opponents into his moderate camp, but they were countered by Radical Republicans, who demanded harsh treatment of the Southern traitors. Anti-war Democrats (called "Copperheads") despised him, and irreconcilable pro-Confederate elements plotted his assassination. Lincoln managed the factions by exploiting their mutual enmity, by carefully distributing political patronage, and by appealing to the U.S. people. His Gettysburg Address became a historic clarion call for nationalism, republicanism, equal rights, liberty, and democracy. Lincoln scrutinized the strategy and tactics in the war effort, including the selection of generals and the naval blockade of the South's trade. He suspended habeas corpus, and he averted British intervention by defusing the Trent Affair. He engineered the end to slavery with his Emancipation Proclamation and his order that the Army protect and recruit former slaves. He also encouraged border states to outlaw slavery, and promoted the Thirteenth Amendment to the United States Constitution, which outlawed slavery across the country.

Lincoln managed his own successful re-election campaign. He sought to heal the war-torn nation through reconciliation. On April 14, 1865, just days after the war's end at Appomattox, Lincoln was attending a play at Ford's Theatre with his wife Mary when he was assassinated by Confederate sympathizer John Wilkes Booth. His marriage had produced four sons, two of whom preceded him in death, with severe emotional impact upon him and Mary. Lincoln is remembered as the martyr hero of the United States and he is consistently ranked as one of the greatest presidents in American history. *Wikepedia*

- Everyone 18 or older, and under 59 years of age, is bound to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.
- On Ash Wednesday and Good Friday, only one full meatless meal is allowed. Two other meatless meals, sufficient to maintain strength, may be taken according to each one's needs, but together they should not equal another full meal. Eating between meals is not permitted. When health or ability to work would be seriously affected, the law does not oblige.
- Catholics should not lightly excuse themselves from these prescribed minimal penitential practices.
