In 1991, Sisto Melillo opened his "closeout" store in North Branford. After 10 years of selling insurance, he decided to fall back on his roots follow in his parents footsteps and go into retail. "I worked with my parents since I was a kid and I always had a burning desire to be an entrepreneur", he offered.

Eight years later he realized more was needed so he re-invented himself and began selling flowers which became the bulk of his business. Now at the close of 2016, Sisto has decided it's time to re-invent himself again and he has closed the doors Save & Discount, a staple in North Branford.

"I have enjoyed every minute of this experience. I met my wife here, I raised my kids here and I met many friends in this store," he said with sadness in his voice. I have been here for births, graduations, weddings and even deaths of family members. I am most proud of the more than 200 employees I have had, most of them being high school kids which I am most proud of. I'd like to think I made a difference in their lives as they certainly have in mine."

State Representative Vincent Candelora **A New Session, But Same Challenges**



With hopes of a better new year, the legislature is being sworn in this week. The House of Representatives will look different with 8 new Republican seats joining 64 others to bring the balance to 72 Republicans and 79 Democrats. With such close margins, I believe the process will become more thoughtful and deliberative, but will bring

more work. It's a big change from 2008 where Democrats outnumbered Republicans 114 to 37.

The budget is obviously a huge issue, and we are beginning to hear about midyear cuts to cities, towns and programs throughout the state. Fortunately, North Branford was spared significant cuts compared to other towns and cities. State agencies are being asked to cut ten percent from their budgets which prompted the Department of Military Affairs to cut the Honor Guard for military funerals. While I do not support this cut, it certainly is foreshadowing to how difficult the budget is going to be, and I am cognizant of the fact that the next state budget will contain very difficult decisions. I believe a budget can only happen if Republicans and Democrats come together and support it. Republicans, therefore, cannot sit back and throw stones, and Democrats must listen to and incorporate Republican ideas. Ultimately, both sides are going to have to think twice before speaking publicly, and in short, I predict that no one will like the proposed budget in the spring, but I am hopeful that it will be a budget that moves Connecticut in the direction of job growth and prosperity.

I will be returning as Deputy Republican Leader where I help in crafting policy and chair the Screening Committee. This committee reviews the bills before they are set for final votes in the House. Every bill will likely need bipartisan support to move through the process and, therefore, will undergo heavy scrutiny. We are in unchartered waters, and I look forward to the work.

In this long session, individual legislators can propose their own bills so I welcome any emails or phone calls with suggestions. One bill I plan to propose will attempt to change the culture of the way government treats business. All too often, we hear companies complain that there is uncertainty in our laws, the rules change, or government is heavy handed. To help bring certainty to the process and to change the culture from predatory to cooperative, I'm proposing a bill that would allow companies to seek declaratory rulings from the attorney general when there is a bona fide dispute over the interpretation of a regulation. I believe that such a process can keep both parties out of court and possibly save the state money, but most importantly balance the power between heavy-handed agencies against the private sector. Secondly, we need to provide companies an opportunity to cure some violations before a fine or penalty is handed down. All too often, I hear from businesses that innocently fail to comply with a law or make a clerical mistake, which turns into a hefty fine from the state. Government and private business need to work cooperatively to grow Connecticut, and I hope these proposals begin a dialogue on how government can be a partner rather than a predator to job growth.

Well brother, as dad use to say, "Another year shot to hell". Personally, it wasn't a bad year. I went on a couple of vacations, lost a few pounds, got a new grandson and the NBHS baseball team made the playoffs again.

Christmas was great as my two grandsons were in the Church pageant with the five week old Nico playing the baby Jesus. Following the Mass we had a great meal, and then watched the kids open gifts for what seemed like three days. We did cut down this year but Johnnie (almost four) enjoyed it so much it took him forever to open as he played with each one before moving on to the next one. Times like this makes me realize how fortunate I am. To be able to share a beautiful Church service with a parish family, a meal with family and friends and two healthy grandchildren has to wake you up to the reality of how good your life is, even with all the setbacks throughout the year. I did make the mistake of taking Frankie back to New York the day after Christmas. The round trip took about 7 hours (normally 3.5) but even that was tolerable. Santa was good to me as I hope I was to all.

I will say, I am glad the holiday season is over. It's a lot of preparation for a few nice days. The bad news is we are another year older. I know that because as I watched the New Year's Eve festivities on TV, I realized I did not know who any of the performers were in Times Square. I was in bed by 10PM. The good news is that we are another year older and New Year's Day was the best I've felt on New Years day in a very long time.

The town had a full year under a Democratic majority after a long time with the Republicans in charge. There were promises of transparency and change and although it's only been a year, I haven't seen many changes. Many of the victories they are claiming were already in place and we still seem to be the same. I still feel that we need to go to the style of government that is followed by most towns with a paid elected mayor. With this system we have so many people claiming to run the town, that we don't know who is really accountable and who is really in charge. Everyone can point fingers at everyone else and the buck never seems to stop anywhere.

On the National front the upcoming Trump presidency has the country in an uproar. Claims are going from "the end of he world" to "a time of prosperity and growth". I myself, like my views on local politics, feel that little will change. Some might call me a pessimist. I look at it more as a realist. Unless we change our attitudes, the few people at the top can't change anything.

Speaking of attitudes, North Branford lost a hero on Christmas Day. Lyla Bogardus, a nine year old who had been fighting cancer finally lost her battle. I did not know Lyla but like everyone else in town, I knew of her. She was a courageous young girl who taught a small town like ours to never quit and always face challenges with a smile. Upon her death the community joined together with "Purple for Lyla". Purple ribbons, on mailboxes trees and firehouses and fire trucks and purple lights on homes and the town Christmas tree. Any person who can bring a town together and in her death, teach us all what life is about, is a hero.

Happy New year brother and I'll see you soon.



Governor Malloy's threat to refuse the endIng of Sanctuary City status if Trump denies that as a local effort to circumvent national laws in which illegal immigrants are granted special consideration in that they are protected from deportation and excused in every possible way from illegal activities, other than murder and such horrific crimes. Some thirty or more years ago there was a very conserted effort to get English declared our Official Language by a substantial number of us, and yes including me. While operating in a sort of truce the problems this has created are evident if you try to visit the Montreal Quebec area. where all signs are in French and even English merchants are forbidden to display their merchandise in English, I noticed how this is a problem world wide, I was made aware of what a frightening experience it can be when on returning from a trip to the west coast several years ago decided to return through the beautiful Canadian Rockies and the unbelievable mile after mile of farm land as smooth as a billard table. In fact, so level it made our acres of flat land almost hilly in comparison. After days of this monotony we looked with great anticipation to driving In a Canadian city. What drew my attention was that the directional signs started being printed in French under the English. This gave me me comfort in that now at least I learned what east, south, west and similar signs would mean to me when I reached Montreal. But little did I realize the resentment they hold for any person speaking English in their refusal to speak to you in English even when they could. Looking for Route 89 to Vermont and the U.S. I was answered with shrugs. Finally when I stopped for gas lasked this young fellow directions and he laughingly told me how to go. He was an American student. But my troubles were just starting. Somehow I got on a road that took me into a devel-

opment of 5000 summer homes bordering Lake Champlain that I later learned the residents moved into for the summer; but this was not summer and there wasn't a resident to be seen or found. With the streets winding in every direction it was like finding my way through a corn maize. Seeing a young woman in the distance I reach her just as she was entering a house. Ijumped out and ran full speed just as she was opening the door. Asking her how I could get to Route 89.I was greeted with a blank look as she shrugged her shoulders. I asked her if she could speak English and she said, holding her thumb and first finger about an inch apart, "A little bit". Finally, I found a little store run by an American and he guided me or I would be still there.

Visioning what this country was destined to be I supported several English First"organizations. I wrote Rosa DeLauro and she praised the benefits of other languages, especially Spanish. And fought every effort to make English our official language. Now I tell you one example the welcoming of Spanish speaking people has done to our workers and how the employers use it to keep our workers in servitude.

A care worker told me a heart rendering story just yesterday. This woman of about 50 had been happily employed as a care worker for many years. She loved the work. Helping people was her calling, but when her mother became indegent she took a leave of absence to care for her. On her mother's death after 2 years of devoting all her time to her care she attempted to find work, only to be greeted at every employment agency, and she approached everyone she could find with, "do you speak Spanish fluently?" Born here and sepaking only English, she was turned away. Thinking this was only a short deterrent, she kept searching, finally having to sell her home to live. Now she lives every day worrying that it's only a matter of time till her

present employer will tell her, "I'm sorry, but I have a Latin that needs care and I need someone who speaks Spanish fluently."

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
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Brownie Troop Hosted Local Author

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



Cookbook Club To Meet In January

For home cooks, the December cookbook selection was stunning. "Great Peasant Dishes of the World" by Howard Hillman features 77 recipes from 52 countries. Beyond that, Mr. Hillman, also author of "Kitchen Science," accurately captured fragrant and inexpensive ethnic dishes both comforting and exotic. Scotch Broth, hearty with barley, leeks, carrots and turnip was soothing. Kottbullar, which we know as Swedish meatballs, were offered as an appetizer and, with a combination of beef, pork and veal were light and succulent. Main courses included Somen, a Japanese noodle that was cool and refreshing, and Sarma, a Yugoslavia style stuffed cabbage that was warm and satiating. Gnocchi di Patate, a poached potato and flour dumpling and Bacalao a la Vizcaina, a cod with sweet peppers, mint and lemon, were supported by an English Bubble and Squeak (cabbage and potatoes) which is sometimes an entree itself. A Lebanese Tabbouleh with bulgar, mint, cinnamon and ripe tomatoes and a curried cauliflower served as side dishes. Finally, the entire feast was supported by a simply terrific Irish Soda Bread recipe accompanied by marmalade and Irish butter. Dessert? Swedish Apple cake (Appelkaka), more a casserole than a cake in the traditional sense, was available with vanilla ice cream. While this particular cookbook is decades old, the recipes sing and would delight anyone. And it is entirely readable.
