**Tom Smith** is a life-long resident of Northford. Upon graduation from Wilbur Cross High School, he became a postman at the Northford Post Office. He married and raised two children, Kristin and Debbie, with his wife Marianne in Northford. Tom continued to serve as a postman for forty years. He was often commended for his attention to detail and the personal attention given to the residents on his routes. Tom also had his own landscaping company in town and worked for and is known by many.

Tom, the eldest grandson of Frank and Angelina Cecarelli, was instrumental in securing the development rights of Cecarelli Farms in Northford which led to the preservation of the farm for generations. As a member of North Branford Rural Preservation Committee, Tom was the first in this area to go through the Farmland Preservation program with the state, securing the farm in private ownership and protecting it from housing or other development.

Throughout his life, he has been a member of Northford Company 2 Fire Department fighting fires and responding to emergencies in the North Branford Community and neighboring towns. In 2008 Tom received recognition for 50 years of active service in Co. 2. While active in the Co 2, he was involved in organizing the Northford Carnival and presently helps coordinate the annual golf tournament which raises funds to maintain the firehouse and support community efforts like the North Branford Scholarship Fund. He was also a member of the Fireman's Ball Committee and hosted various activities at Co 2 for its members. Tom has been a long-standing member and sexton of the Northford Cemeteries Association. He joined his father, Charlie Smith, as caretaker of the cemetery in the early 1950s and has served as president of the Association for forty years. Recently, he also became the superintendent of Bare Plain Cemetery in North Branford.

enjoyed town baseball, hockey, football, and volleyball, especially at the high school level. He is an avid Boston Red Sox and New York Giants fan.

He often shows his antique cars at the Potato and Corn Festival, as well as other local charity events. In 2007, the community rallied together for an old-fashioned barn raising on Tom's property. The Hansen Barn, circa 1880, was removed from its original home in North Haven in 1987 and was raised by the community and members of the Northford Timberframers almost 20 years later. Many local charities were supported during this process including the Angels Foundation, the Miller Historical Museum, Walk for Lupus Awareness, as well as a local family.

Tom proudly represents the town of North Branford, and the village of Northford, as an Alan Davis Shining Star.



**Marcey Onofrio** has been a resident of Northford for 43 years. She is married to her husband Ron and has two children, Morgan and Cory. Growing up in Northford, Marcey attended the North Branford Public School System and graduated in 1984. Marcey's children followed in her footsteps and attended North Branford Public Schools. After graduation Marcey attended The Academy for Business Careers and became a paralegal. She then worked in the legal field for eight years. However, Marcey's love for children steered her away from the professional world when she decided to set up her own home daycare.

In November of 1993, Marcey opened her home daycare and she has continued to operate her business to this day. Marcey has helped raise countless children by caring for and nurturing them while their parents remain at work. She creates an environment in which the children, as well as their families, feel that they are an extension of her family. The trust and respect she has always earned is evident since all her daycare families are referred through word of mouth. In the earlier years Marcey was a Girl Scout leader. As her children became involved in sports, Marcey ran numerous fundraisers for the various sports teams in which her children were involved. She also served as secretary of the North Branford Touchdown Club and helped organize many functions to benefit students and athletes. Over the years, Marcey's husband, Ron, was very involved in town events and fundraisers as well. She helped him organize and run the many DARE car shows as well being involved behind the scenes at many other events. In doing so the fundraisers benefited many students, the North Branford School District, and our community.

In 2005, Marcey was asked if she would volunteer one Thursday night a month and run for a seat of the North Branford Board of Education ("don't ever fall for the one Thursday night a month line"). After a board member resigned before the next election, Marcey completed that term for two months prior to the upcoming election. She prevailed in that election and subsequent elections, and has served on the Board of Education to the present. Over the years, Marcey has held various positions on the board including Chair, Vice Chair, and Secretary.

Marcey has always believed that providing North Branford's children with a solid education is the most important investment a community can make. The time she spends in board meetings represents just a small fraction of the hours that she devotes to the students and the school district. Marcey is deeply involved in community activities and spends many hours in the schools and at extracurricular events. Her attention to the students of North Branford mirrors her caring and devotion to the children in her daycare.



**David Palumbo** has been a lifelong resident of the North Branford community and business owner in town. David also married a lifelong resident Sandra Dostie Palumbo. He raised 3 children in the community. Samantha (26), David Jr. (25), and Jake (16).

David was raised on a local farm in town, and showed horses all around the country and became a Worlds and National Champion by the age of 14 years old. David is a product of the North Branford School System. After graduation from N.B. High he worked for businesses in the transportation Industry, and in 1991 David founded his own business Palumbo Trucking. Palumbo Trucking is a dedicated tanker business that serves the North East Region. 30 years later, he has grown his business in the North Branford community in Real Estate, Diesel Repairs, Transportation, and now the Rail Road Industry.

One of Tom's favorite pastimes was participating in North Branford community softball. His team, Smitty's Clippers, was the team to beat . As a spectator, he has always

## State Representative Vincent Candelora State Government is Becoming Inaccessible, and that Really Stinks



Something stinks in the legislature, and I'm not talking about the perfume. A recent opinion piece published in the Hartford Courant by a health advocate concerned about fragrances in tightly-packed committee rooms got me thinking about state government these days. In particular, this question from the author: *"So many people* 

want to testify at Connecticut legislative hearings, but how many are staying away because of their concerns about being enclosed in spaces with scented products?"

I understand the author's point, but as someone who sits in these committee rooms, I think there's a more odious issue at play when it comes to the citizenry's interaction with government: the process itself has become increasingly inaccessible.

Take the simple act of testifying on a bill. For the average person concerned about an issue, getting those precious three minutes in front of committee members is akin to climbing a mountain—the hours-long process is exhausting if not disorienting.

Testifying involves a lottery process that's dominated by lobbyists and special interest groups. On top of that, state bureaucrats always get their say first.

Signing up at breakfast but not speaking until dinner, or even later, is common.

Can you can afford to miss a day of work to wait your turn in Hartford? And this simple procedural issue is the tip of the iceberg.

Consider recent headlines about pro-tolling legislators conspiring with the governor to create a "public" forum on transportation featuring a tolling-friendly audience.

How about the budget-building tactics employed by Democrats who control both chambers of the legislature? Delivering a thousand-page budget bill—a document loaded with tax and fee increases—a few hours before a vote is unacceptable.

Most taxpayers would appreciate a chance to weigh in on such policy decisions that carry such significant impact on their lives.

Legislative business conducted after midnight? Don't get me started.

Ignoring statutory requirements to hold legislative hearings on state agency audit reports, including many that point to significant government failures?

Yes, that happens.

There's no doubt that this General Assembly, controlled by Democrats for the better part of four decades, has lost its way.

Can some of these problems be fixed easily? Of course they can. Change the rules to allow citizens to testify ahead of lobbyists. Hold public hearings on final budget bills. Allow representatives and senators to ask questions about those audit reports.

Will those changes happen? Without greater party balance in the legislature, I'm afraid we just won't get there. It'll take you hours to testify, and my colleagues and I will never get to pose questions about audit reports that detail waste, fraud, and abuse.

## State Senator Christine Cohen Good News About State Finances

EDITORIAL

I'd like to start off the 2020 new year by bringing you a bit of good news about state finances.

Connecticut's Budget Reserve Fund, which acts as our state "savings account" and is sometimes referred to as our Rainy Day Fund, is at its highest level in state history: \$2.8 billion, or 14 percent of our annual expenditures. Financial advisors suggest it be at 15 percent; we'll reach that in June. For an analogy, the average household income in Connecticut is \$75,000 a year, so that's like you having \$11,250 in your household savings account.

Not only does Connecticut have its largest budget reserve in history, it's also twice as large as most U.S. states: the median state rainy day fund balance in America is just 7.6 percent, according to the National Association of State Budget Officers (NASBO).

On the jobs front, a recent report by the state comptroller makes an important distinction when it comes to Connecticut's job-growth numbers: the difference between private-sector job growth (which is doing well) and government-sector jobs growth (which has gone backwards for many years). Private-sector jobs in Connecticut have rebounded since the end of the Recession, growing by 119,000 since January 2010. But government jobs in Connecticut have been decimated, falling by 16,000. When you read news stories about Connecticut's job growth, please remember that private-sector job growth and government-sector job cuts are all rolled into one, final number.

A new report from the legislature's non-partisan fiscal analysis office shows that over the past decade, from 2008 until this year, Connecticut's overall budget has grown by just 2.4% per year, while the discretionary portion of our budget grew at a miniscule seven-tenths of 1 percent per year (0.7%). According to NASBO, the 33-year historical average across America is a 5.6 percent state spending increase per year. That means that over the past decade, thanks in part to fiscal necessity and some bipartisan fiscal policies, Connecticut's budget has grown at less than half the national average.

Connecticut is also growing millionaires. According to state tax returns, the number of Connecticut residents declaring incomes in excess of \$1 million per year has grown by 8% since 2014. Connecticut also has one of the highest concentrations of millionaires and billionaires per-capita of any state in America.

And finally, Wall Street is positive on Connecticut because the legislature has taken steps to stabilize its finances. America's three biggest bond rating agencies – Standard & Poor, Moody's Investors Service, and Fitch – all recently assigned various "A" ratings to Connecticut's general obligation ("GO") bonds.

I know we have some financial hurdles to face in the future, but I want you to know that the legislature has been taking serious steps to reduce state spending and increase our savings.

# Presidential Preference Primary Registration Deadline

The Registrar of Voters would like to inform the electors of the Town of North Branford of information pertaining to the upcoming Presidential Preference Primary to be held on Tuesday, April 28, 2020.

In order to participate in voting in **any** primary in the State of Connecticut, electors must be registered in the political party for such primary. The upcoming Presidential Preference Primary is for the Democratic Party **only**. Unaffiliated voters (i.e. not registered in any party) are **not permitted** to vote in any primary in the State of Connecticut. However, unaffiliated voters can apply to register in a political party in order to vote in a primary. Electors should take note that enrolled party members may transfer from one party to another party three months **prior** to a primary. **The deadline to transfer parties for the Democratic Presidential Preference Primary is Tuesday, January 28, 2020.** Electors who registered as "**Independent**" are members of the Independent Party and will **NOT** be eligible to vote in the Democratic Presidential Preference Primary unless they transfer parties by the above deadline. **North Branford Registrar of Voters** 

## North Branford Annual Economic Development Review 2019

Thank you to the volunteer members of the North Branford Economic Development Commission (EDC) for their support during the year (we had a quorum at every monthly meeting!) and particularly the contribution to our 'successes' through the tireless efforts of EDC Chair, Liz Caplan.

During the year EDC developed and launched the 'Destination North Branford' program with the help of volunteer communication professionals. One objective is promoting State-wide visibility of the Town, its attractions and the quality of life in the community. Another objective is to increase agri-tourism and build pollinator pathways to increase agricultural and horticultural yields. We involved local landscapers and farmers in the planning process and will be expanding these initiatives in 2020.

Many businesses and residents joined in this 2019 initiative, which included The Sunflower Project and the Destination North Branford video, both completed at little expense to the Town. We are seeking volunteers again to help us implement these initiatives including launch a residential wildflower pollinator pathway program from within the community and to generate awareness outside of the community. Our draft presentation of the North Branford Sunflower Project will be co-presented with the North Branford Land Conservation Trust (NBLCT) to some 1500 attendees at the Annual Conference of the CT Land Conservation Council in March.

We have facilitated quarterly meetings of the leaders of local manufacturers during the year with speakers that bring value to our community such as SBA, CERC, Work Force Alliance, Manufacturers Associations and renewable energy specialists. These breakfast meetings have been hosted by local manufacturers including Honeywell, ESI and will continue in 2020; our first speaker on February 18th will be Colin Cooper, State of CT, Chief Manufacturing Officer (CMO).

Our 2020 plans include meeting with businesses leaders to learn more about their concerns and development plans and to assess whether there is potential for their supply chain vendors to relocate closer to North Branford.

We are delighted that Honeywell chose to relocate two business units into their Northford facility in 2019 and now have over 650 full time employees there.

Tilcon invested some \$6 million in local equipment upgrades in 2019 and provide a key material in infrastructure improvement across the Country.

Economic Development collaborated closely with the Town Planner on the scope, development and completion of the ten-year Plan of Conservation and Development (POCD). It is anticipated in 2020 that POCD Action Plans will be prioritized and EDC will include implementation of several tasks defined in the consultant's report.

Several new businesses have been established and publicized in partnership with the Shoreline Chamber of Commerce and the local media, including Rose Vineyards, Stewards of the Land Brewery and there are other business developments in progress.

We have worked closely with North Branford Land and Conservation Trust and Evergreen Woods during the year to conserve and support their efforts to create new recreational spaces in the community.

We are working with the Totoket Historical Society (THS) to develop plans to create an Historic District in North Branford. We also assisted Totoket TV's relocation to the former North Branford Town Hall which has been substantially renovated.

David Lehman, Commissioner of the CT Department of Economic and Community Development (DECD) and the Governor's Chief Economic Advisor, was the guest speaker at the Annual State of the Town breakfast together with Town Manager Michael Paulhus which was

## **NB Land Conservation Trust Wants You**

The North Branford Land Conservation Trust is seeking one or more community service, volunteer groups to help us do conservation work at our Harrison Farm Preserve on North Street, North Branford. The project can be scaled for any size group, from 10 to 100. 6 to 20 volunteers at a time might be best, but we can work with any number up to 100.

We need help creating wildlife habitat by building "wildlife brush piles". The "brush" is really dead wood (small logs and branches of various sizes) that has been cut into manageable-size pieces by our volunteers. This wood is blocking our ability to control the invasive plants effectively. It also is perfect for brush piles that provide habitat for small wildlife, if the pile is constructed correctly.

Six to ten capable volunteers can complete a brush pile in 1 to 2 hours, depending on how ambitious they want to be in terms of target size for the completed effort. There is a technique needed, which we can teach to the volunteers in about five minutes. And there is flexibility as to approach, allowing for some creativity. Finally, there is a nice sense of accomplishment when the pile is completed and the photos are taken!

Note that we estimate that the wood and branches which are blocking our progress are sufficient to build 12-15 more brush piles (we've built 3 thus far). So there is plenty of work left to do; hence up to 100 volunteer work sessions (2 hours or so) could be accommodated.

This work can be done anytime, with a goal to complete most of the work this winter, spring, or early summer. There will be similar projects over the next few years.
