With this new passion to help, Jim joined the Bridgeport Fire Department where he has been for 22 years and where he has just been awarded the Fire Fighter of the Year. Through all these experiences, Jim was the perfect choice to be named the North Branford's emergency Management Director.

His main function in this position is to "prepare and execute a plan for man made and natural disasters which may affect our town. This involves revising our Emergency Operation Plan (last revised in 2010) and being in alignment with consistent terminology and structure. This task is performed with an Emergency Planning Team consisting of Police and Fire Chiefs, Public Works, Town Management and community leaders.

At this time Jim is also trying to put together a Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) which is an organized volunteer group which is trained to assist all community activities as well as emergencies.

"It's important to be prepared and try to stay ahead of any disaster as much as possible," Jim warns. Here are some of the little things we can have ready as we prepare for power outages:

- 1. Have one gallon of water per person per day.
- **2.** Have an emergency blanket.
- 3. Flashlights and battery operated transistor radios. (NO CANDLES).
- 4. Stay connected with cell phones. Text messages take up less energy.
- **5.** Extra batteries on hand.
- **6.** First aid kit
- 7. A Whistle.

### Buying Business: Connecticut has lost its Way By State Representative Vincent Candelora



On Wednesday, September 28, the legislature convened for a special session to debate the \$220 million corporate aid package negotiated by the Malloy Administration to Lockheed Martin, which owns Sikorsky Aircraft. I have never felt that I had no

choice but to support legislation until now. Connecticut has reached a point where our economic policy is driven by crisis to keep our businesses from fleeing the state through financial incentives.

How did we get to this point? A Democrat controlled legislature and years of the legislature passing anti-business policies. The Democratic majority imposed not one, but two of the largest tax increases in our state's history, which as a result crippled taxpayers, families and businesses.

It is nearly impossible for businesses to survive, never mind thrive, in Connecticut. I can attest to this reality because I am one of those small business owners.

During a briefing with Lockheed Martin officials, the helicopter giant indicated that it would cost them \$400 million more to build the next generation of aircraft in Connecticut compared to any other state they considered for production. Namely, Sikorsky's president said, "Connecticut was not the cheapest state." When discussing production costs in Connecticut, the vice president added, "It's a \$400 million hole we're trying to fill. Everybody's got to pitch in."

To put it simply, it is more costly to run a business in Connecticut compared to nearly any other state. With that being said, a \$220 million dollar deal is what it took to keep Sikorsky's business in Connecticut, cover their remaining costs and protect nearly 8,000 jobs.

Although I always advocate for growing jobs and building our economy, we are at a point where we can no longer keep up with this façade – creating the appearance that our state's problems just don't exist. Connecticut is in deficit, we cannot afford such a deal, but yet we have no choice. The legislature's non-partisan Office of Fiscal Analysis has recently predicted that the state will face a \$2.7 billion budget deficit in Fiscal Year 17 and 18.



We need to get back to the basics and focus our efforts on cutting taxes and creating a healthy business climate so that we don't have to buy our businesses to stay. When the next legislative session convenes again in January, I hope that we can focus on developing common sense proposals to rebuild Connecticut and regain the economic edge and fiscal health we once had.

### PLANNING FOR THE FUTURE By Attorney Marc P. Guertin

Long Term Care Insurance (LTCI) used to be one of the best ways to protect your assets from nursing home exposure. With the cost of care in a Connecticut skilled nursing facility often exceeding \$15,000 per month, owning a LTCI policy used to make sense for many people.

The cost of LTCI is based on the age and health of the applicant. Insurance companies gamble on the health of their clients, but they need to minimize their risk in order to stay in business. One way to minimize said risk is to charge high premiums for their older and less healthy clients.

Many older people will simply not qualify for an LTCI policy because there is too much risk for the insurance company. One strategy to avoid the higher premiums is to apply for LTCI when you are young. However, you will be paying your premiums over a longer amount of time, so there may be no real savings.

Recently there has been a trend by insurance companies to increase their rates across the board for all of their policy holders. So, even if you got the LTCI policy when you were young and in good health, there is a good chance that rate could increase dramatically over the lifetime of the policy. The rate increases force people to do one of three things: reduce the amount of benefits within the policy to make it more affordable or bite the bullet and pay in the 40% increase (if they can afford it) or to drop the policy and effectively flush all of the premiums they have paid in the past down the toilet. None of these options are very appealing to most people. However, there is another option, that does not involve insurance at all.

An Irrevocable Asset Protection Trust (IAPT) provides an opportunity for individuals, both single and married to protect their assets long term. These assets could be available to you in the future to pay for things that Medicaid does not, or for an individual's spouse or as a legacy for future generations, without the risks associated with giving these assets away to another individual.

An IAPT is a legal entity separate from the person who creates it. It is created by signing a Trust agreement where the Grantor irrevocably transfers assets to the trust which is supervised by a third person called a Trustee (often the Grantor's children or other relative) who holds and manages that property in Trust for the benefit of the people who are named as beneficiaries.

Timing is extremely important when establishing an IAPT. "Beat the Clock" is the name of the game. In order for an IAPT to work it must be set up well in advance of anticipated nursing home care (currently 5 years). After the passage of enough time the assets held by the IAPT will be insulated from the ravages of a long term stay in a nursing home







## **TVES Introduces New Mascot**



## Fire Department News

#### Carbon Monoxide, What you need to know:

**Carbon monoxide** (CO) is an odorless, colorless gas that interferes with the delivery of oxygen in the blood to the rest of the body. It is produced by incomplete combustion of fuels that include coal, wood, charcoal, natural gas, propane, and fuel oil. Problems can arise as a result of improper installation, maintenance, or inadequate venation. The symptoms are sometimes confused with the flu or food poisoning. Infants, elderly, pregnant women, and people with heart or respiratory illness are particularly at high risk from the effects of carbon monoxide poisoning. Nationally an estimated 300 people a year die as a result of carbon monoxide poisoning and thousands of others end up in the emergency room.

What you need to do: Ensure that all fuel burning appliances are properly adjusted and maintained. Have annual inspections of heating systems, chimney and flues. Never leave a car running in the garage. Install a carbon monoxide detector near your sleeping area.

If your CO detector goes off, or if everyone in the house are experience flue like symptoms that improve when your not home, call 911 and get out of the house. **Fireplace and Home Fire Safety:** 

With the high price of fuel oil and natural gas, many homeowners are using alternate heating sources. Last year, North Branford Fire Department responded to numerous chimney fires, and furnace malfunctions.

More than one-third of Americans use fireplaces, wood stoves, and other fuel-fired appliances to heat their homes. Unfortunately, many people are unaware of the fire risks associated with wood and other fuels.

North Branford Fire Department encourages you to practice the following fire safety

#### steps:

- 1. Have your chimney or wood stove cleaned and inspected annually
- 2. Keep the area around your fireplace or stove clear of flammable decorations or materials
- 3. Always use a metal mesh screen with fireplaces, and keep your glass doors open
- 4. Never use flammable liquids to start a fire
- 5. Use only seasoned hardwood
- 6. Build small fires that burn completely and produce less smoke
- 7. Never burn cardboard, trash or other debris in your fireplace or wood stove
- *8. Never leave a fire unattended* and extinguish before going to bed or leaving the house
- 9. Soak hot ashes in water and place them in a *metal container outside and away* from your house
- 10. Cover the chimney with a mesh screen spark arrester
- *11. Install smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors* on every level of your home
- 12. Have your oil or gas furnace serviced at least once a year
- 13. Provide proper venting for all heating appliances

#### Don't Forget Your Appliances

**Dryers:** The leading cause of dryer fires is a lack of maintenance. Whether you have electric or gas these simple rules can prevent a tragedy.

- Do not operate dryer without a lint filter. Clean filter before and after each use.
- Clean out the exhaust duct at least once a month.
- Once a year, remove the back cover and vacuum out the area around the heating element.
- Use only metal flexible pipe and the shortage distance possible to the outside.
- Make sure that the dryer is plugged into an outlet suitable for its needs. **Do not use extension cords**.

**Ovens:** Cooking fires are the number one cause of home fires and injuries. Unattended cooking is the leading cause of kitchen fires.

- Keep cooking area clean and clear of combustibles.
- Do not wear loose fitting cloths that can dangle onto stove burners and catch fire.
- Follow manufactures instructions on self-cleaning ovens. Clean heavy accumulations of grease before starting cleaning cycle.
- If a fire starts in the oven, turn off electric power or gas supply, do not open door.
- If a small fire starts in a pan on the stove, turn off electric power or gas supply and cover with a lid. Do not remove lid even if the fire appears to be out. **Do not use water to extinguish a grease or oil fire.**


