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State Representative Vincent Candelora A New Horizon in Connecticut



I want to take this opportunity to thank the voters in North Branford, Guilford, Durham and Wallingford for returning me to Hartford to represent you. It is truly an honor to be your voice in Hartford and I am grateful for the opportunity. When I first got elected ten years ago, Connecticut entered what some now call, the Great Recession, and for the

past ten years, the House Republican caucus has proposed eight balanced budgets. All of those budgets, except one, were summarily rejected by the Democrats. Each year, we continue to see our revenues erode and our spending increase; and the legislature has met every shortfall with tax increases only to find the economy becoming more sluggish.

The latest election has created an opportunity for better dialogue as Connecticut voted for balance in the General Assembly. On November 8, residents voted 3 additional Republican senators and 12 additional Republican representatives into office which changes the vote margins to an 18 to 18 tie in the Senate and 79 to 72 margin in the House. While Democrats still maintain control in the House, their margins have shrunk to a four vote majority. Naturally, I believe we will have greater, more meaningful conversations.

Because the Senate is tied, the Lieutenant Governor will need to cast a vote to break any tie. At the committee level, most committees will only have a one vote plurality. These committees serve as the originator of legislation and the first deliberative bodies for our laws and budget. I am hopeful that we will have more inclusive and comprehensive dialogue at the committee level. In the past, the majority party on the committees would pass bills out as a "work in progress", and often times, the chairs would rewrite the bills behind closed doors before they reached either chamber. This process cannot happen any longer. With greater Republican numbers comes better conversation, and that's a good thing for Connecticut.

Ultimately, the legislature has our work cut out for us. As predicted in my column last month, the Governor's office and our Office of Fiscal Analysis reported four days after the election that our budget deficit has grown. In



the current year, Connecticut is facing a \$100 million revenue shortfall, and in the 2017-19 budget biennium, our deficit has swelled to \$3.25 billion. While these numbers are daunting, I return to Hartford with more optimism than ever because with our new numbers, we will see better dialogue, more transparency, and meaningful conversation to put Connecticut back on track without more tax increase.

It's About the Land

I confess. I'm an analog man. I enjoyed drawing features of the landscape on maps to show contours, water courses, wetlands, soil types, forest types, high rock ledges, and other distinctive features of the land. Maps of this nature were hand-drawn and based entirely on field surveys. However, preparing maps with this kind of information was very labor intensive, and time consuming. Now, technology has made it possible to produce detailed maps generated through the use of very high resolution cameras mounted in planes and land sensing instruments in satellites orbiting the earth. But that doesn't solve the problem of locating parcel boundaries, town lines, and trails. These cannot be seen from a photograph and/or outer space. Survey crews must locate them on the ground. With specialized instruments which can communicate with satellites, a point on the ground can be given a precise digital location. Even a smart phone can be used to locate a trail or a property corner, less accurately than a professional survey, but with adequate accuracy for the need. So what does this have to do with a land trust?

Maps are essential to our understanding of the earth we all share. As a land trust we rely on digitized information to identify and make plans for saving land with natural features we think should be permanently conserved (including farmland and historic sites) for public benefit. Imagine if the only information we had available to make important land use decisions were vague property descriptions of the past, a rough estimate of acreage, and no map to show parcel locations, environmental features and proximity to other parcels with similar qualities.

A few NBLCT members have mastered the use of mapping software to make maps for planning purposes. Mapping helps us see where our parcels are in relation to other open space such as town-owned land, RWA and other privately-owned property. Discovering 'connections' among each of the land ownerships will be useful in identifying locations for future foot-paths, scenic vistas, access to fishable streams and protection of water quality. We've already identified larger tracts of land which we think should be protected as open space; some because they have outstanding scenic ridge lines, others because they would connect existing NBLCT parcels with open space in Guilford, Wallingford, and other smaller parcels which would complement existing historic districts and/or preserve farmland. That is the type of land we want to identify and assign a priority for acquisition.

If 2016 was your year to put a comprehensive estate plan in place, you have about two months to accomplish that goal. In my experience, the toughest part of estate planning is starting the process. Once the process has begun, it rolls along rather quickly and can be accomplished in a fairly short amount of time.

The best way to begin the estate planning process is by having a conversation with your spouse and adult children. Clients often ask me if they should discuss their estate plans with their adult (or nearly adult) children. As long as your kids are not anxiously waiting for you to die or actively planning your demise, there are many benefits to discussing your plans with your children. Talking about your estate plan with your children can eliminate surprises after you die.

A quick conversation can ensure family harmony long after you are gone. Whether you have a plan in place or are considering putting an estate plan into place, family get-togethers provide the perfect opportunity for such discussions.

Communication is the key to a successful family meeting. When speaking with your children explain the: who, what, when, where, how and WHY of your estate plan. This makes it easier for your children as well as the planning professionals who may be left with the task of explaining what you were trying to accomplish through your estate plan. Some children may feel slighted because they were not named as Executor or Trustee. If you are concerned about one of your kids feeling this way, I suggest getting out in front of this problem. There may be very good reasons why that child was not named. Look for opportunities to communicate these reasons.

Often children will regard unequal treatment in an estate plan as a statement of their parents love or lack thereof. This is usually far from the truth. Sometimes parents wish to provide more for a child who needs more help, and less to children who are more successful. It is imperative that you communicate your reasoning with your children. If there is no communication, it is usually left up to the (often vivid) imagination of the child to assume why you planned your estate that way.

A decent estate planning attorney will always help you plan for dollars and cents. A good estate planning attorney also takes into account the family issues and dynamics. For many people, preserving the family unit after they are gone is a major concern. There are things that you can do today that will have an impact on the lives of your children long after you pass. We often invite our clients to bring their children in to meet with us. It is always nice to meet the people who will benefit from the planning that we do. Your children can be involved in the process by discussing Executor and Trustee selections with you. This gets them involved and makes them feel like their opinion has worth, which will reap dividends for many years to come. Your kids should know (or at least know how to contact) your life insurance representative, financial planners, accountants and attorneys. Parents should try to introduce these professionals to their children. When they do meet, note how the advisors respond. Their response to your children will be a good indicator as to how helpful these advisors will be to your children in the future.

fuel – fired appliances to heat their homes. Unfortunately, many people are unaware of the fire risks associated with wood and other fuels.

North Branford Fire Department encourages you to practice the following fire safety steps:

1. Have your chimney or wood stove cleaned and inspected annually

North Branford Fire department Recommends:

- 1. Use only UL listed lights and extension cords.
- 2. Keep extension cord use to a minimum. Do not overload your electrical system. If you are blowing fuses, find out why. Check for frayed wires. If the lights don't work when you test them, toss them. Don't take the chance.
- 3. Keep decorations away from open flame and heating sources.
- 4. If you have a live tree, keep it watered and dispose of as soon it starts to dry out.
- 5. Keep your means of escape clear. Don't block a door with the tree or other decorations.
- 6. Use candles correctly. Keep away from any decorations, curtains and paper tablecloths.
- 7. Do not leave home without turning off all lights, extinguishing all candles and any portable heating units. At night check to make sure that your house is safe, before you go to bed.
- 8. Make sure you have at least one operating smoke detector on every floor.

Fireplace and Stove Safety:

More than one-third of Americans use fireplaces, wood stoves, and other

- 2. Keep the area around your fireplace or stove clear of flammable decorations or materials
- 3. Always use a metal mesh screen with fireplaces, and keep your glass doors open
- 4. Never use flammable liquids to start a fire
- 5. Use only seasoned hardwood
- 6. Build small fires that burn completely and produce less smoke
- 7. Never burn cardboard, trash or other debris in your fireplace or wood stove
- *8. Never leave a fire unattended* and extinguish before going to bed or leaving the house
- 9. Soak hot ashes in water and place them in a metal container *outside and away* from your house

Football Team Improves to 5-3 After getting off to a slow 3-1 start, The North Branford High School

After getting off to a slow 3-1 start, The North Branford High School football team has run off 4 straight wins to improve their record to 5-3.

On November 3rd, the T-Birds traveled to Granby, to take on the Granby Memorial Bears in a non-conference contest. North Branford had a balanced scoring attack scoring a touchdown in each quarter and beating the Bears by a score of 29-21. Junior quarterback Jeff Jablonski completed 7 passes but only threw 11 times as coach Basil decided to primarily use a ground attack. Headed by senior Nico Sommo who had 92 yards in 14 carries and junior Nick Mancini who rused 11 times for 75 yards and a touchdown, the T-Birds controlled the ball. Jablonski ran the ball twice for 7 yards but made the most of each carry scoring both times. Senior Dylan Blake had 3 receptions for 46 yards and senior Matt Sibley had a 6 yard reception for a touchdown.

Defensively, the T-Birds received solid performances from Sibley, Mancini and sophomore RJ Sobask who all had 8 tackles and 10 assists each as senior Justin Augur was 6 & 6. Sibley, Augur, Dillon Nowak Xavier Cognata



and Jason Rysczyk all had sacks while the freshman Cognata recovered a fumble caused by Mancini. Senior Keane Regan had an interception.

Next up, the T-Birds returned home to play the 6-1 Ellington Knights. It looked bad as the Knights scored late in the fourth quarter to take a 14-6 lead but Jablonski led the team up the field and with time running out, North Branford scored a touchdown and Nick Mancini caught the 2 point conversion from Jablonski to tie it up and force an overtime.

North Branford won the toss and deferred to the Knights who score from the 10 yard line on three plays and kicked the extra point to go up 7. The Thunderbirds only took 2 plays as Mancini ran it in on the second play with a 9 yard scamper. Setting up to kick the extra point, the NB sidelines had a trick left up their sleeves as the snap went directly to Dylan Blake who carried a host of Knights into the end zone as the Thunderbirds raced onto the field in jubilation with a 22-21 victory.

On a windy night, coach Basil played it conservatively with only 12 passes and it was an "old school" football game with both teams pounding it out on the ground. This time, it was Mancini and freshman Charles Walcott who handled the bulk of the carries as Mancini carried 18 times for 70 yards and Walcott had 96 yards with 13 carries. Jablonski ran 3 times for 26 yards and scored on all 3 carries.

North Branford was sound defensively where it seemed as if everyone was getting into the act. Once again Sibley who seems to be in on every play, led the team with 7 tackles and 8 assists. Senior Justin Augur had 5 tackles and 4 assists and the reliable Mancini playing tough on both sides of the ball added 4 and 4 and also recovered a fumble. Keane Regan and Charles Walcott had 3 each. Reagan also had an interception as did freshman Bryce Sweetapple.

At press time, the T-Birds had 2 games left angainst Cromwell and Coginchaug, with an outside chance of making the State Tournament after a 1 - 3 start.
