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














The recent arrest of a previously deported Peruvian national in Hartford shines a harsh light on the failures of Connecticut's sanctuary city policies. This individual with a serious criminal history, including felony convictions out of New Britain and Bristol for unlawful restraint, burglary, and violating a protection order, represents the systemic risks these policies create. Arrested

by Hartford police on Nov. 20 for an alleged sexual assault that occurred in April, he was released on bond before federal immigration officials could issue a detainer. He roamed free until ICE apprehended him on the streets of Hartford on Dec. 3.

This incident reveals the peril of policies that prioritize shielding illegal immigrants over public safety. Despite being deported, this man returned to the U.S. in what federal officials called a "flagrant disregard for the laws of the United States and for the wellbeing of others". Hartford's sanctuary city policy that constricts cooperation with federal immigration authorities allowed him to remain at large, posing a preventable risk to residents. When repeat offenders like this individual exploit political loopholes, it is Connecticut's citizens who pay the price in both safety and security.

These policies also exacerbate Connecticut's financial challenges. The state's free healthcare program for undocumented children, already in extremely high demand, is projected to exceed its budget by \$30 million this year. Such initiatives, while intended to provide care for the vulnerable, inadvertently act as a magnet for illegal immigration, putting additional pressure on limited resources. This diverts funding from essential services such as education, infrastructure, and public safety that legal residents depend on.

Budgetary issues aside, the Hartford case demonstrates how sanctuary policies not only endanger communities but also erode trust in government and the rule of law. Victims of these crimes, like the woman allegedly assaulted in April, face an uphill battle for justice when offenders evade accountability due to political posturing. Meanwhile, taxpayers bear the brunt of policies that prioritize ideology over practical governance.

And chances are, this individual will just return to the United States again. Nearly as frustrating is the news media's indifference. Papers did little else than republish a shortened version of the press release from ICE, opting against digging into and providing even basic details of the alleged sex assault crime that led Hartford police to arrest the individual. Whether the Connecticut news media is interested or not, this isn't just a border issue—these issues are happening in our state.

Connecticut must reconsider its approach. Sanctuary policies need reform to ensure that federal and local authorities work together to uphold public safety, enforce immigration laws, and restore fairness to the system. The safety, well-being, and fiscal stability of the state depend on it. This incident, and the others like it, should serve as a wake-up call for more elected members of our state legislature to act decisively and prioritize Connecticut's legal residents over dangerous political experiments.

For as far back as I can remember as a kid, New Year's Eve was always a special night for the family. We would all go to my aunt Tess and uncle Rudy's house in Foxon. There I sat watching all the festivities, and upset because I was unable to be with my friends. The only good part was getting back to school and telling my friends about the party. I couldn't wait to tell him how my uncle puked on the rug. I also didn't understand why my grandmother and my parents would cry when Guy Lombardo began his yearly countdown to Auld Lang Syne.

Well, I survived that year and I became a hero at school with all my stories. I had my classmates rolling in the aisles, talking about the party. Boy, I couldn't wait for the next year to come.

With the next party rapidly approaching, I decided that I would definitely be ready for this one. I just received a camera for Christmas and I had it loaded and ready. This year would be my year to have some fun. The party started and so did I .When my relatives went into action I began to click away with my camera at quite a rapid speed. Boy these pictures would make Candid Camera look like a romper room amateur show. I wonder how much money my cousin Ric could give me so I wouldn't show his mother the pictures of him and his girlfriend in the corner. I also got a great picture of my uncle being sick. It's a good thing I bought colored film.

That year passed, and now things began to really change. I finally reached the big 16. I got my license during the summer and there was no way that I was going to the party this year. The arguments began once again in September. All of my friends were having super parties around town and I wanted to stop in on every one of them. Well, I thought I was gonna stop in on every one of them. Once again my mother put her foot down and that was always a pretty heavy foot. "We are a family". She kept telling me this over and over again. I remember that I kept yelling something about my being a big boy and that Lincoln had freed the slaves sometime ago. This was to no avail, so at the usual time of about 7:30 on New Year's Eve we began this journey over to my aunt's house. As soon as I entered. I went upstairs and hid in my uncle's office. I was gonna let them pay for not letting me go to my friends parties. They weren't gonna see my face for the rest of the night. At about 1130 I realized that nobody really cared if they saw me or not as no one had even come up to the room to see if I was still living or if I had jumped out the window in a fit of depression. I decided right there that I would have to go downstairs and make my presence known. I am a person who thrives on attention and this was ridiculous.

I descended the stairs with a snarl on my face, and I started to mingle in with the rest of the family. I felt a little better when my cousin told me that several of them tried to come up and rouse me out of the room, but once again, my mother told them the only way I'd come down was if they left me alone and made me think they had forgotten me. My mother she was always the smartest person in the room. That party and no great memories. All I can remember is that I wanted to go home and go to bed. My mother had made one look quite foolish, and I hated her for it.

Once again as Guy Lombardo began his countdown. My grandmother began to cry, and my mother as well. All I can remember is thinking "good they should cry for a long time for forcing me to come to this party.

1974. This party would be the greatest. I was 17 years old and on my way to the great adult life. My family also had a tradition going on at these parties that the adults were supposed to be unaware of. 17 is the age of which the younger kids begin to sneak drinks upstairs to see if we can have the great time that the adults were having. This was gonna be my year the turning point of these parties. Next year I'd be able to drink legally because they were going to change that majority law to 18 so this would be the last year for me sneaking drinks *continued on page 4*

Use Common Sense During the Holiday's

Home fires increase during this time of year. Heating devices, fireplaces, holiday lighting, candles and decorations, all contribute to the increased risk.

North Branford Fire department Recommends:

- 1. Use only UL listed lights and extension cords.
- 2. Keep extension cord use to a minimum. Do not overload your electrical system. If you are blowing fuses, find out why. Check for frayed wires. If the lights don't work when you test them, toss them. Don't take the chance.
- 3. Keep decorations away from open flame and heating sources.
- 4. If you have a live tree, keep it watered and dispose of as soon it starts to dry out.
- 5. Keep your means of escape clear. Don't block a door with the tree or other decorations.
- 6. Use candles correctly. Keep away from any decorations, curtains and paper tablecloths.
- 7. Do not leave home without turning off all lights, extinguishing all candles and any portable heating units. At night check to make sure that your house is safe, before you go to bed.
- 8. Make sure you have at least one operating smoke detector on every floor.

Fireplace and Stove Safety:

More than one-third of Americans use fireplaces, wood stoves, and other fuel – fired appliances to heat their homes. Unfortunately, many people are unaware of the fire risks associated with wood and other fuels.

North Branford Fire Department encourages you to practice the following fire safety steps:

- 1. Have your chimney or wood stove cleaned and inspected annually
- 2. Keep the area around your fireplace or stove clear of flammable decorations or materials
- 3. Always use a metal mesh screen with fireplaces, and keep your glass doors open
- 4. Never use flammable liquids to start a fire
- 5. Use only seasoned hardwood
- 6. Build small fires that burn completely and produce less smoke
- 7. Never burn cardboard, trash or other debris in your fireplace or wood stove.
- 8. Never leave a fire unattended and extinguish before going to bed or leaving the house
- 9. Soak hot ashes in water and place them in a metal container *outside and away* from your house

EMERGENCY BURN BAN LIFTED FOR TOWN OF NORTH BRANFORD

The North Branford Fire Marshal's Office, the Local Burning Officials for the Town of North Branford have lifted the emergency burn ban effective immediately, based on the lower fire hazard conditions issued by the State DEEP.

All rules relating to open burning must be followed – including when permits are needed. Residents are asked to still be vigilant to minimize the risks of wildfire ignition.

I couldn't figure out why my uncle liked it so much. Maybe adults get a charge out of getting sick, forgetting half of the evening and making complete fools of themselves. This was definitely not my best party. It was supposed to be the greatest, but it was worse than last year. The sad part was that there was no one to hate but myself, and that took all the excitement away from hating.

1975 this was definitely my year. I got myself a girlfriend and she was gonna see how great Italian families spend New Year's Eve together. Wait until all my relatives see that the ugly fat kid with the broken nose and crooked teeth has found himself a pretty girl. I put on my light blue leisure suit, my high platform shoes and I was ready to shine. It was my turn to have a good time at these parties. It was my turn to really find a quiet corner and spend the whole night making out.

Night pass quickly because once I found my corner, I only left for an occasional drink and a trip to the men's room. Boy what a night. Now I know why everyone enjoys these parties. It was like, going parking and not having to worry about getting caught by the cops or getting home too late. The night was ours. No one cared what we were doing because they were too involved with forgetting their problems for the night. We were in love and we had no problems. The time flew rapidly, and the only interruption was when my little cousin stuck a camera in our faces and said smile you're on Candid Camera. Boy he was such a little brat. Why couldn't he just leave us alone and let us continue the greatest petting session of all times.

Well, I can remember driving my girlfriend home as I walked her to the door. I was too tired to even kiss her good night. Her mother who would spy on us, to make sure that we weren't kissing too long, looked at us when we walked into the house, as though something was wrong. It was a part of this family and I was going to enjoy myself. I could make out anytime I wanted, but there was only one limited time to have a party with my family. I spent the entire evening playing games and drinking and singing with any aunts and uncles and older cousins. This is what being a family was all about. It was laughing together and crying together, talking about the good and the bad things of past and the hopes for the future.

My mother was crying about some of the very hard times that she had in her life and this year I didn't want her to cry. This is what a family is all about my uncle and a couple of my cousins decided to play party games to bring out the joys of life and wash the sorrows away. Soon everyone was singing and having a great time This is what family was for.

Family stuck together when times got rough and they made things easier. They're all about having a whale of a good time when my mother started to feel bad they could have let her cry all alone and continued with their party, but this was a family and we just didn't do anything like that, If one of us was hurting, we were all hurting. This party would remain in my mind for a long time and it still does because this is what New Year's Eve parties at my aunt's were all about.

The final party I went to as a kid was just like the others. We started talking about it in September and the anticipation grew as time got near and We saw each other often throughout the year, but nothing is as special as when we all get together and really do something as a family. It's not enough to see each other during the year because for one reason or another someone's always missing. No one would ever miss a New Year's Eve party because this was the time when we were all share and we couldn't fully share ifsomeone was missing. *continued on page 9*

Feast of the Seven Fishes The Feast of the Seven Fishes (Italian: Festa dei Sette Pesci) is an Italian

American celebration of Christmas Eve with dishes of fish and other seafood. [1][2] It is not a "feast" in the sense of "holiday", but rather a grand meal.

Christmas Eve is a vigil or fasting day, and the abundance of seafood reflects the observance of abstinence from meat until the feast of Christmas Day itself.[1][3]

Origins and tradition

The Feast of the Seven Fishes typically consists of seven different seafood dishes. The tradition comes from Southern Italy, where it is known as The Vigil (*La Vigilia*), but with no mention of the number seven. This celebration commemorates the wait, the *Vigilia di Natale*, for the midnight birth of the baby Jesus.

The long tradition of eating seafood on Christmas Eve dates from the Roman Catholic tradition of abstaining from eating meat on the eve of a feast day.[1] As no meat or animal fat could be used on such days, observant Catholics would instead eat fish (typically fried in oil). It is unclear when or where the term «Feast of the Seven Fishes» was popularized. Nick Vadala, writing for *The Philadelphia Inquirer* found the newspaper's oldest reference to the feast in a 1983 article. [4][5]

The meal includes seven or more fishes that are considered traditional. "Seven fishes" as a fixed concept or name is unknown in Italy. In some Italian-American families, there is no count of the number of fish dishes. A well-known dish is baccalà (salted cod fish). Fried smelts, calamari and other types of seafood have been incorporated into the Christmas Eve dinner over the years.

The number seven may come from the seven Sacraments of the Catholic <u>Church</u>, or the <u>seven hills of Rome</u>, or some other source. There is no general agreement on its meaning.[1][2]

Typical feast

The meal's components may include some combination of <u>anchovies</u>, <u>whit-</u> ing, lobster, sardines, baccalà (dried salt cod), smelts, eels, squid, octopus, shrimp, mussels and clams. [2] The menu may also include pasta, vegetables, baked goods and wine.

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
