The junior totaled 14 touchdowns for the year coming from passw receptions, an interception pick 6, a fumble return and kick-off return.


For his all around efforts, Tommy was named Defense Back to Southern Connecticut All-Conference Tier 1 football team.



EDITORIAL

State Representative Vincent Candelora The Transportation Debate Continues . . .



As we enter the holiday season, Hartford's activity has not slowed down. While the legislature is supposed to be part-time, budget issues keep us busy all year long, and December will be no exception. Tolls and transportation plans have taken up the airwaves, and despite years of conversation, I don't believe we are any closer to a resolution. Governor

Lamont has taken a strategic move of withholding payments for local road improvements to our towns as leverage to try and spark a deal, but despite these threats, he cannot garner enough votes for his transportation plan.

I believe our transportation conversation started in the wrong place. Rather than assessing our needs and budgeting a plan, the Governor and House Democrats continue to push the dialogue of tolls. Whether the proposal is trucks only or cars and trucks, the public isn't warming up to the idea because fundamentally they don't trust government. The flipflopping and ever-changing proposals doesn't bring confidence to win over the public.

At this point, I believe the best transportation proposal offered is the Senate Republican proposal, which funds the transportation program by shifting fringe benefit cots (pension benefits paid for by state employees) from the Transportation Fund to the General Fund. Surplus from the Rainy Day fund would pay down our pension debt, and free up those funds to carry the new pension general fund obligation. Essentially, the proposal pays down our 18% credit card debt and uses the saving from no longer having to make those interest payments on transportation projects. House Democrats and the Governor have criticized this plan because they don't want the Rainy Day fund to be used.

Here is why the proposal makes sense. In 2017, the bipartisan budget created Revenue and Volatility Caps which captures revenue before it's budgeted. The revenue is diverted into our Rainy Day fund and by law, must be used to pay down pension debt when it reaches 15%. Because of these caps, our budget's fund is slated to exceed 15% in just two years, where historically it has remained a 5%. This statutory structure is working as intended, and if these funds are not used to pay down our pension debt, I fear that they will be used on growing operational costs and increasing annual spending.

I am hopeful that we can continue to push the dialogue in the no-toll direction. Connecticut is not out of options. We can fund transportation without the need for tolls, and the Senate Republicans have shown the way.


Be Responsible for the Holidays

NB Land Trust Tree Identification Hike

Join the North Branford Land Conservation Trust for a winter tree identification hike on Saturday, December 14 on the Notch Hill Brook Trail led by Mike Ferrucci. Mike is a professional forester with field experience in four countries and thirty-three states. As the Land Stewardship Forester for the NBLCT, Mike organizes quarterly work parties made up of land trust members and other volunteers to help maintain the trails and the natural beauty of the Land Trust properties. Mike graduated with a Master of Forestry from Yale University in 1981. A resident of North Branford for over 50 years, he retains great memories of growing up in a rural farm town and knows our woods. The Notch Hill Brook Trail starts on town property and crosses the historic defunct trolley line. Once on land trust property the trail becomes a loop in secluded and undisturbed woodlands. At just under 2 miles, the red blazes lead you through a valley, across photogenic Notch Hill Brook, around swampland and up a rocky out-cropping. It is a moderately challenging hike. Meet at the end of Ciro Rd by 9:15am for a 9:30am step off. Heavy rain or snow postpones the hike until Sunday, December 15.



Feedback for Sunflower Project

Bright towering sunflowers, green rows in cornfields and brightly colored trees have given way to barren fields and slumping stalks. If you're anything like me, you love it.

Why? Because this season of cold, flattened or dead-headed flowers may have the look of gloom and hibernation – but this town is anything but sleepy. Things are brewing and fermenting here in North Branford, and I'm not just talking about beer and cider at Stewards of the Land Brewery (our new farm brewery!) or wine at our vineyards (Rosabianca and Rose Vineyards). I'm also talking about our town government and community organizations. This is the season where town leaders and volunteers work hard to reflect and analyze what has been accomplished over the past year as a community, and to prepare the "seeds" of new ideas for a new year with sharpened strategies to do even better.

This is exactly why The Sunflower Project, a volunteer-driven economic and community development project, wants your feedback. * 83.3% of those surveyed said the project benefited North Branford by beautifying homes and businesses, 75% reported an increased presence of pollinators and 75% also said it enhanced community connectivity across town.

*63.6% of those surveyed said they took advantage of donated seeds and planted them at their home or business.

An overwhelming number of people -96% -- said they would like the Town of North Branford to continue The Sunflower Project in the future. Recommendations for project enhancements included optimizing business participation, expanding sunflower visibility on major roadways, creating a sunflower maze destination and working with businesses to establish sunflower-themed events.


