State Representative Vincent Candelora Reality Check: Connecticut Can't Afford

Democrats' Reckless Budget

Democrats in the state legislature recently advanced two troubling budget



bills—one that raises taxes, and another that blows through the state's spending cap. Together, these proposals represent their alternative to Governor Lamont's February budget plan that also backs away from defending Connecticut's hard-won fiscal guardrails.

House Republicans believe Connecticut deserves better. That's why we introduced

the Reality Check Budget—a responsible alternative that reins in spending, respects fiscal limits, and invests in the core services residents depend on. You can view details at realitychecket.com.

The Democrats' budget spends far more than Connecticut taxpayers and businesses can afford. It makes our state even more expensive and returns us to the failed policies that raised taxes, not once but three times!

In contrast, our budget honors the fiscal guardrails that helped set the stage for historic tax relief in 2023, paying down debt and rebuilding our reserves. It also provides us with flexibility to deal with changes in federal funding that may come our way. Our plan spends \$1.285 billion less than Democrats' and \$769 million less than the Governor's. It stays \$45.5 million under the spending cap in FY26 and by \$928.5 million in FY27.

But we don't just spend less—we spend smarter.

Our proposal protects state aid to municipalities and school districts, and it increases funding to help towns cover rising special education costs—relieving pressure on property taxes. We increase Medicaid reimbursement rates for financially teetering providers who understandably need more money for the services they provide, which will help protect and enhance healthcare for everyone.

Among initiatives we've proposed:

- 1. More funding for CT Foodshare
- 2. Increased support for domestic violence survivors
- 3. Funding to reduce student absenteeism
- 4. Full expansion of CRISIS mental health interventions
- 5. Removing a portion of the "public benefits" charge from electric

We achieve these goals by making strategic choices focused on what's most important to our citizenry. For example, we end free state healthcare for illegal immigrants—saving an estimated \$116 million over two years. Despite Democrat objections, emergency care and access to school-based and federally qualified health centers remain available.

We also save taxpayers approximately \$481 million over two years by budgeting only for state employee positions we can reasonably expect to fill, instead of funding every vacant position on paper. We eliminate deputy commissioner positions and require a 5 percent spending reduction at each agency—the latter saving another \$67 million over the biennium.

We reject the Democrats' proposed 1.75 percent capital gains tax hike, which would extract \$500 million from residents over two years. Our plan reduces health insurance costs by removing an administrative fee that's passed on to consumers. The "Passport to Parks" fee, set to increase this summer, would be removed from motor vehicle registrations.

Not surprisingly, Democrats immediately labeled our proposal "dead on arrival." That's the arrogance of one-party rule—a system that's made Connecticut one of the most unaffordable states in the nation.

For over a year, Democrat leaders have argued that our state's fiscal guardrails are a barrier to funding core services. That argument grew louder following President Trump's push for federal fiscal restraint—giving them a convenient excuse to abandon financial discipline here at home.

Let's Be "Frank"

Well brother, with our continuing sense of entitlement for our kids and the "everyone gets a trophy mentality", I felt it was important to put a few of my Mother's Day columns together and reprint an edited version. The month of May was always a special month for our mom. Not only did we celebrate Mother's Day but also her birthday.

My mother was a terrible person who in today's society would have been sent to jail. When I did something wrong, she wasn't afraid to hit first and ask questions later. If for some reason it was later found out that I was innocent of the crime, her sense of fairness was to let me know that she would be more lenient on the next offense.

In my home, low grades in school were not accepted. It wasn't enough to just try. Work without results was just a waste of time. If you studied for four hours and did not get an "A", then you should have studied for six.

When I told her about the things all the other kids had that I did not, she was not sympathetic. She pointed out the things I had that others did not.

When I complained about working full time while going to high school and college, she didn't help me lighten my load, she taught me to manage my time better.

When I used foul language, she never rationalized that it was "the language of the times". She washed my mouth out with soap and that was the lesser of the penalties for bad language.

When I misbehaved in school or disrespected my elders, she didn't tell me how stupid those people were or make a scene at the school because her "baby boy" was being abused. She told me that in life you had to figure out how to overcome hurdles and deal with all types of people.

We could only stay home from school when we were sick. There was no allowance made for mental health days. If you stayed home from school, you stayed home from everything. That included friends coming over after school(except to bring you your homework assignments) and even talking on the phone. If you were too sick for school, you were too sick for anything else.

When it was time for the talk on sex education there were no diagrams or books to read. She simply told me to keep my hands to myself and if she found out I was "doing something wrong", she would cut off a part of my body that I loved.

There were no large screen TV's or gym memberships. If you wanted exercise, run around the block, take out the trash or wash the kitchen floor. Speaking about the trash, we didn't take it out when we were ready, we took it out when she was.

Yes, my mother was terrible. She would never cut me slack and never let me get away with anything. She taught me to fend for myself knowing that she was always there to set me on the straight path should I stray. She taught me that good values and morals could not be compromised. She taught me that tough love was a very difficult task (which often hurt her more than me) but in the long run the results would be better.

So as I continue to watch my wife with her adult children and grandchildren and my daughter with her two kids, I marvel at the unconditional love and patience they demonstrate every day and it makes me smile and remember mom.

I was lucky to have a mother who "got it" and guided me to this point in my life when many of the other kids in our neighborhood went the way of drugs, jail, suicides and more.

I'll see you soon. Tell mom after 25 years I still think of her everyday. I love her and miss her. Happy Mother's Day to All!

In recognition of his extraordinary dedication and unwavering commitment to the agricultural community,

William "Will" DellaCamera exemplifies the very essence of *Service Above Self*.

Will has been a fixture at Cecarelli Farms since childhood—always eager to listen, learn, and participate in the daily workings of farm life. After college, he returned to the farm to work alongside Nelson Cecarelli, embracing progressive farming techniques and helping to modernize operations. Today, Will continues to honor that legacy while expanding the farm's reach and impact.

He is an active leader in agriculture, serving on both local and state committees, and he engages deeply with the community. Will participates in events such as Farm Days, Plowing Days, and Eco Fairs. He is a consistent presence at programs hosted by the Totoket Historical Society, the North Branford Conservation Land Trust, North Branford Recreation, North Branford Rotary, and North Branford Public Schools. Notably, he helped organize the first Indigenous Peoples' Day celebration at the farm in October 2024, overlooking the Totoket Mountains.

Will has made a steadfast commitment to food access by managing a successful CSA program and providing produce boxes to local food banks. He continued this work even after federal funding for the USDA's COVID-era food distribution program ended, ensuring families in need still had access to fresh produce.

In August 2024, a devastating 13-minute hailstorm destroyed Will's entire crop. Yet instead of focusing on personal loss, Will rose to the moment and became a powerful advocate for small farmers across the state and nation. He reviewed the gaps in the existing crop insurance system, listened to other farmers' frustrations, and began speaking at town meetings and state forums.

Then, in a bold and symbolic act of advocacy, Will drove his tractor from Connecticut to Washington, D.C.—stopping at farms along the way to raise awareness about the growing challenges faced by small farmers due to extreme weather. His efforts captured national attention and helped secure a \$220 million federal grant for farmers affected by weather-related losses during the 2023–2024 growing seasons.

Will's advocacy didn't end in Washington. He continues to be a tireless voice for those too often unheard—listening, learning, and fighting for policy change. His passion for farming, dedication to public service, and commitment to lifting others make him a shining example of what *Service Above Self* truly means.

William DellaCamera is not only a steward of the land—he is a steward of his community.

They take household batteries

The Regional Water Authorities' HazWaste Central will be open on Saturdays starting on May 17th through mid-October. They are closed on the weekends of Memorial Day, July 4th and Labor Day.

HazWaste Central helps area residents in member towns protect water quality by safely disposing of household wastes. Located at RWA at 90 Sargent Drive in New Haven, HazWaste Central is open from <u>9 a.m. until</u> <u>noon on Saturdays only</u>. Household hazardous waste comes from everyday products used in the home, garage, yard or garden.

A visit to HazWaste Central is quick and easy. Participants never have to leave their cars, and the waste is off-loaded by professionals. Some of the household wastes that can be dropped off include aerosol cleaners and sprays, antifreeze, oil-based paint and pool chemicals. Plastic Wrap Reminder

Most bird seed, pet food and mulch bags are not made of the right plastic to be considered plastic film. And even if they are labeled as recyclable, they would need to be clean to go into the plastic film bin. Please put these items into the trash unless it has a recycle symbol on it and has been turned inside out and clean.

Black plastic plant pots and takeout containers are not recyclable. The machinery can't detect the black plastic. Either try to return the plant pots to the place where you bought your plants or try to reuse them. I find the takeout containers have many uses around the house.

Please Don't Feed the Storm Drain

Is your storm drain covered with leaves or grass clippings? Please take a few minutes to rake them off so the water can flow into it.

Storm drains are designed to only carry rainfall runoff from our streets into our local waterways. Anything but water can contribute to water pollution and drainage issues. Pesticides from treated lawns and gardens can also end up in your drinking water, threatening water quality.

Please clean the street of grass clippings. Blowing grass clippings onto the road is dangerous to drivers, motorcycles, bicyclists, harms local storm sewers and aquatic life.

Memorial Day (originally known as **Decoration Day**) is one of the federal holidays in the United States for honoring and mourning the U.S. military personnel who died while serving in the United States Armed Forces. It is observed on the last Monday of May. Memorial Day is also considered the unofficial beginning of summer in the United States

It is a day for visiting cemeteries and memorials to mourn the military personnel who died in the line of duty. Volunteers will place American flags on the graves of those military personnel in national cemeteries. Others such as family and friends will also come to lay flowers and grieve on the graves of those who died in the US military.

The first national observance of Memorial Day occurred on May 30, 1868. Then known as *Decoration Day* and observed on May 30, the holiday was proclaimed by Commander in Chief John A. Logan of the Grand Army of the Republic to honor the Union soldiers who had died in the American Civil War. This national observance followed many local observances which were inaugurated between the end of the Civil War and Logan's declaration. Many cities and people have claimed to be the first to observe it. However, the National Cemetery Administration, a division of the Department of Veterans Affairs, credits Mary Ann Williams with originating the «idea of strewing the graves of Civil War soldiers—Union and Confederate» with flowers.

Official recognition as a holiday spread among the states, beginning with New York in 1873. By 1890, every Union state had adopted it. The world wars turned it into a day of remembrance for all members of the U.S. military who fought and died in service. In 1968, Congress changed its observance to the last Monday in May, and in 1971 standardized its name as «Memorial Day».

Two other days celebrate those who have served or are serving in the U.S. military: Armed Forces Day, which is earlier in May, an unofficial U.S. holiday for honoring those currently serving in the armed forces, and Veterans Day on November 11, which honors all those who have served in the United States Armed Forces.

Cities and towns across the United States host Memorial Day parades each year, often incorporating military personnel and members of veterans' organizations. Some of the largest parades take place in <u>Chicago</u>, <u>New York</u> and <u>Washington</u>, <u>D.C.</u>

Americans also observe Memorial Day by visiting cemeteries and memorials. Some people wear a red poppy in remembrance of those fallen in war—a tradition that <u>began with a World War I poem</u>. On a less somber note, many people take weekend trips or throw parties and barbecues on the holiday, perhaps because Memorial Day weekend—the long weekend comprising the Saturday and Sunday before Memorial Day and Memorial Day itself—unofficially marks the beginning of summer.
