Dr. Nichol is a seasoned leader with more than thirty years' experience in education, having most recently served as the superintendent of Ellington Public schools.

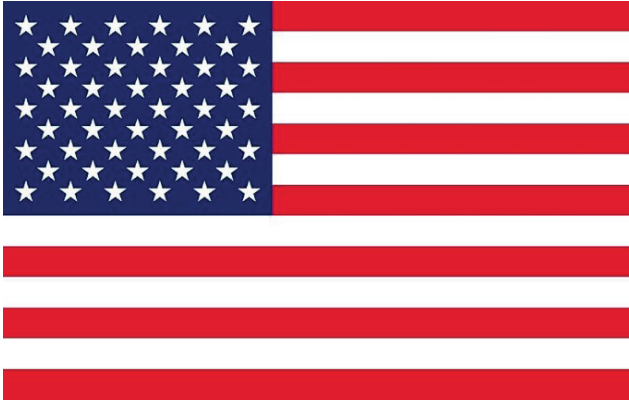
Dr. Nichol officially starts his position on July 1st, but has hit the ground running, meeting with residents and staff to endure a seamless transition.

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State Representative Vincent Candelora



Gubernatorial campaign politics have captured most of the headlines this summer, but there’s a consequential development that hasn’t gotten the buzz it deserves. One of Connecticut’s casino tribes is getting into the marijuana business, and the deal that put it there deserves a much closer look.

The little coverage it has received fixated on the attention-grabbing headline that cannabis lounges could one day open at the casino. That’s the eye-catching part. The real story is elsewhere, in regulation, enforcement, and tax revenue. On every one of those fronts, the cannabis compact between the State and the Mashantucket Pequot Tribe raises concerns.

Under the compact, Tribal Enterprises can cultivate, manufacture, transport, deliver, and sell cannabis throughout Connecticut while operating under an entirely separate regulatory framework. Enforcement authority stays with the Tribe, not the State. So Connecticut license holders outside the tribe enterprise remain answerable to state regulators and state enforcement, while their direct competitors play by a different set of rules.

The tax arrangement is just as lopsided. The compact exempts tribal entities from state and municipal taxation on commercial transactions with state licensees, whether those sales happen on tribal land or off it. When transactions occur on tribal land, the Tribe keeps its own tax instead of remitting that revenue to the state. Meanwhile, Connecticut’s licensed cannabis businesses have invested millions of dollars, paid steep licensing fees, complied with extensive regulations, and faithfully sent their tax dollars to state government. Try explaining to those owners why their competitors get to sell into the same market on far more favorable terms.

The compact also authorizes statewide delivery and direct commercial transactions between Tribal Enterprises and Connecticut licensees. In practice, that creates a parallel cannabis market with enormous economic and regulatory consequences, and it does so without any of the scrutiny a change this large should face. No legislative debate. No public hearings. None of the economic or public health analysis that ought to accompany a decision of this magnitude.

That last point matters most. The State is only beginning to grapple with the serious health risks tied to high-potency THC products. At the very moment we should be slowing down and studying the issue, this compact dramatically expands availability instead.

Lawmakers from both parties deserve the chance to examine an agreement that reshapes commerce, taxation, and public health policy across the entire state. Connecticut residents deserve that too.

This is a significant development, one that should have received serious deliberation by the legislature. Instead, the compact was negotiated quietly by Governor Lamont’s Department of Consumer Protection, with no hearings and no public vote. An agreement this consequential should never have been finalized behind closed doors.

Senator Cohen Welcomes
State Grants to Protect Our Land

Senator Christine Cohen (D-Guilford) today welcomes two state grants totaling more than \$1.1million, to permanently protect more than 100 acres of open space in North Branford and Durham, preserving critical natural corridors, drinking water supplies and public recreational access across the district.

In North Branford, a \$611,000 grant will support the purchase of the former Amatrudo Farm property on Middletown Avenue by the Trust for Public Land and North Branford Land Conservation Trust. The 25 acre parcel sits near the Farm river headwaters, adjacent to Ceccarelli Farm, which is already protected through the states Farmland Preservation Program. The Farm River feeds into Lake Saltonstall, a public water source for the South Central Connecticut Regional Water Authority. Once protected, the property will open public access for kayaking, hiking, birding and fishing.

In Durham, a \$520,000 grant will support the permanent protection of two forest parcels totaling 80 acres along the Mattabesett section of the New England Scenic Trail, at the base of Pistapaug Mountain in the Parmalee Brook Valley. The Trust for Public Land and the Middlesex Land Trust will work with the National Park Service and the Connecticut Forest and Park Association to re-route the trail off the road, improving safety and the hiker experience. The parcel protects nearly three quarters of a mile of the terrain and strengthens a wildlife corridor stretching from the Long Island Sound to New Hampshire.

“The 12th District is home to some of Conencticut’s most treasure natural landscapes, and this funding ensures they stay that way,”Senator Cohen said.

“Protecting the Farm River Water shed means protecting the drinking water supply for communities across South Central Connecticut, the habitat that sustains native species, and the open land that has made North Branford such a special place to live for generations. The work along the New England scenic Trail in Durham will permanently safe guard 80 acres of forest and wetland in the heart of our district, and improve the hiking experience for thousands of people who use that trail each year. I am proud of what we are preserving here and grateful to the Governor’s administration for making this a reality”.

For the Health of it...

What's All This Buzz About Protein?



It's hard to escape, the nutrition buzz of the day shouting at you as you scroll, shop and watch TV. In the past "Fat Free", "Gluten Free" and "Low Carb" have been the headliners. The current buzz puts the spotlight on protein and sends an unsolicited message that's hard to ignore. Even if it's not a topic of interest, it seems to creep into our thoughts, having us not only question our choices but often reach for the wrong items in the name of healthier options.

Deceptive advertising hits a nerve with me especially on the topic of health & nutrition. I get it, it's marketing. The intent is to draw us in and we're busy, so it's easy to get drawn in without fact checking, But I can tell you with confidence that the 15 grams of protein you're getting from that bag of chips is not the same as the protein you're getting from chicken, eggs or edamame. Consumers looking for healthier solutions for themselves and their families, often don't know there is a difference.

If you've spent any time on social media, watched health programs, or walked through a grocery store lately, you've probably noticed that protein seems to be everywhere and in just about everything. Fitness influencers talk about it constantly, and many people are asking whether they're getting enough. Real facts and substance do exist amidst the buzz, and if we're not careful we can miss it. So let's cut through the confusion, define protein and its purpose, and let those facts rise to the surface.

Protein is one of the three main macronutrients the body needs, along with carbohydrates and fats (yes, that's right, despite what previous hype may have led you to believe, the body needs carbohydrates and fat!). It plays a vital role in building and repairing tissues, supporting the immune system, creating enzymes and hormones, and maintaining healthy muscles, skin, hair, and organs. Protein is made up of smaller building blocks called amino acids. Some of these amino acids are produced by the body, while others, known as essential amino acids, must come from food.

Research and health trends have highlighted the importance of protein for overall wellness including its connection to muscle health. While athletes and bodybuilders have long understood the value of protein for muscle repair and growth, experts now recognize that maintaining muscle mass is important for everyone, especially as we age. Peak muscle mass hits at around 30 and then the subtle decline begins where we naturally lose muscle tissue, a process called age-related muscle loss. Consuming adequate protein, along with regular exercise, particularly strength training, can help slow this process. Maintaining muscle contributes to better mobility, balance, and independence later in life. Thus re-emphasizing the fact that slacking off on a healthy lifestyle is not something that will keep your future self healthy, strong and independent.

Weight management is important to many people, so the fact that protein may help with managing weight increases its appeal. Foods rich in protein tend to be more filling than foods high in refined carbohydrates. After eating protein, we often feel satisfied longer, which can reduce hunger and help prevent overeating. In addition, the body uses slightly more energy digesting protein than it does digesting fats or carbohydrates.

However, more is not always better and extra protein does not automatically turn into muscle. Muscle growth also requires physical activity and resistance exercise. In addition, when it comes to protein and nutrients in general, it's not about how much we consume, but how much we absorb that makes the difference. Absorbing adequate protein requires sufficient protein intake spread throughout the day, along with overall good digestive health.

Good sources of complete protein can come from both animals and plants, with animal protein offering the most balanced choices. A complete protein is one that contains all 9 amino acids that the body cannot produce on its own. Examples of complete animal proteins include chicken, fish, eggs, dairy products, and lean meats. Among popular complete plant based choices are hemp seeds, chia seeds, edamame, and organic tofu. Many nutrition experts encourage variety because different foods provide additional nutrients beyond protein itself.

The rise of protein-enriched snacks and supplements also add to the confusion. Quality protein powders and shakes are a great on the go "gap filler". The key word here is "quality". A quick tip is to look to the ingredient list rather than being sold by the bold type on the front of the package. Think of your protein shake as a convenient supplement to your balanced whole food meals.

The most important thing to remember is, the protein conversation is not just another fad. Let's not allow the hype to detract from the fact that protein is truly essential for the body and plays a major role in strength, health, and well-being. The key messages are, balance and be discerning, not all protein is created equal. Rather than chasing the latest high-protein trend, we may benefit most from focusing on a varied diet that includes healthy protein sources as part of an overall nutritious lifestyle.

COPY OF THE DECLARATION OF INDEPENDENCE

When, in the course of human events, it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another, and to assume, among the powers of the earth, the separate and equal station to which the laws of nature and of nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separation.

We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable rights, that among these are life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness. That, to secure these rights, governments are instituted among men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed. That, whenever any form of government becomes destructive of these ends, it is the right of the people to alter or to abolish it, and to institute new government, laying its foundation on such principles, and organizing its powers in such form, as to them shall seem most likely to effect their safety and happiness.

Prudence, indeed, will dictate that governments long established should not be changed for light and transient causes; and, accordingly, all experience has shown, that mankind are more disposed to suffer, while evils are sufferable, than to right themselves by abolishing the forms to which they are accustomed.

But, when a long train of abuses and usurpations, pursuing invariably the same object, evinces a design to reduce them under absolute despotism, it is their right, it is their duty, to throw off such government, and to provide new guards for their future security. Such has been the patient sufferance of these colonies; and such is now the necessity which constrains them to alter their former systems of government. The history of the present King of Great Britain is a history of repeated injuries and usurpations, all having in direct object the establishment of an absolute tyranny over these states. To prove this, let facts be submitted to a candid world.

He has refused his assent to laws the most wholesome and necessary for the public good.

He has forbidden his governors to pass laws of immediate and pressing importance, unless suspended in their operation till his assent should be obtained; and when so suspended, he has utterly neglected to attend to them.

He has refused to pass other laws for the accommodation of large districts of people, unless those people would relinquish the right of representation in the legislature; a right inestimable to them and formidable to tyrants only.

He has called together legislative bodies at places unusual, uncomfortable, and distant from the depository of their public records, for the sole purpose of fatiguing them into compliance with his measures.

He has dissolved representative houses repeatedly, for opposing, with manly firmness, his invasions on the rights of the people.

He has refused for a long time, after such dissolutions, to cause others to be elected; whereby the legislative powers, incapable of annihilation, have returned to the people at large for their exercise; the state remaining in the meantime exposed to all the dangers of invasion from without, and convulsions within.

He has endeavored to prevent the population of these states; for that purpose obstructing the laws for naturalization of foreigners; refusing to pass others to encourage their migrations hither; and raising the conditions of new appropriations of lands.

He has obstructed the administration of justice, by refusing his assent to laws for establishing judiciary powers.

He has made judges dependent on his will alone, for the tenure of their offices, and the amount and payment of their salaries.

He has erected a multitude of new offices, and sent hither swarms of officers to harass our people, and eat out their substance.

He has kept among us, in times of peace, standing armies, without the consent of our legislatures.

He has affected to render the military independent of and superior to the civil power.

He has combined with others to subject us to a jurisdiction foreign to our constitution, and unacknowledged by our laws; giving his assent to their acts of pretended legislation:

For quartering large bodies of armed troops among us;

For protecting them, by a mock trial, from punishment for any murders which they should commit on the inhabitants of these states;

For cutting off our trade with all parts of the world;

For imposing taxes on us without our consent;

For depriving us, in many cases, of the benefits of trial by jury;

For transporting us beyond seas to be tried for pretended offenses;

For abolishing the free system of English laws in a neighboring province, establishing therein an arbitrary government, and enlarging its boundaries, so as to render it at once an example and fit instrument for introducing the same absolute rule into these colonies;

For taking away our charters, abolishing our most valuable laws, and altering fundamentally the forms of our governments;

For suspending our own legislatures, and declaring themselves invested with power to legislate for us in all cases whatsoever.

He has abdicated government here, by declaring us out of his protection, and waging war against us.

He has plundered our seas, ravaged our coasts, burnt our towns, and destroyed the lives of our people.

He is at this time transporting large armies of foreign mercenaries to complete the works of death, desolation, and tyranny, already begun with circumstances of cruelty and perfidy scarcely paralleled in the most barbarous ages, and totally unworthy the head of a civilized nation.

He has constrained our fellow citizens, taken captive on the high seas, to bear arms against their country, to become the executioners of their friends and brethren, or to fall themselves by their hands.

He has excited domestic insurrections amongst us, and has endeavored to bring on the inhabitants of our frontiers, the merciless Indian savages, whose known rule of warfare is an undistinguished destruction of all ages, sexes, and conditions.

In every stage of these oppressions, we have petitioned for redress, in the most humble terms. Our repeated petitions have been answered only by repeated injury. A prince, whose character is thus marked by every act which may define a tyrant, is unfit to be the ruler of a free people.

Nor have we been wanting in attentions to our British brethren. We have warned them from time to time of attempts by their legislature to extend an unwarrantable jurisdiction over us. We have reminded them of the circumstances of our emigration and settlement here. We have appealed to their native justice and magnanimity, and we have conjured them by the ties of our common kindred, to disavow these usurpations, which would inevitably interrupt our connections and correspondence. They too have been deaf to the voice of justice and of consanguinity. We must, therefore, acquiesce in the necessity, which denounces our separation, and hold them, as we hold the rest of mankind, enemies in war, in peace friends.

We, therefore, the representatives of the United States of America, in General Congress assembled, appealing to the Supreme Judge of the world for the rectitude of our intentions, do, in the name, and by authority of the good people of these colonies, solemnly publish and declare, that these United Colonies are, and of right ought to be free and independent states; that they are absolved from all allegiance to the British Crown, and that all political connection between them and the state of Great Britain is and ought to be totally dissolved; and that, as free and independent states, they have full power to levy war, conclude peace, contract alliances, establish commerce, and to do all other acts and things which independent states may of right do. And for the support of this declaration, with a firm reliance on the protection of Divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other our lives, our fortunes, and our sacred honor.

The Next Electronics Drop Off will be on July 11th.

The event will be held at Public Works from 9am to noon. We will be collecting electronics such as TVs, computers, small appliances and almost anything that has a plug. We cannot accept smoke detectors, A/C's or dehumidifiers. Our trash hauler will not take that TV you have on your lawn near the trash cans.

We will also be taking **mattresses** (clean and dry), **batteries**, **propane tanks** in reusable condition and **used oil** for FREE.

Hazwaste Central is open

Safe & Free Disposal of Residential Household Hazardous Waste
They take household batteries.

The Regional Water Authorities' HazWaste Central will be open on Saturdays starting on May 30th through mid-October. They are closed on the weekends of July 4th and Labor Day.

HazWaste Central helps area residents in member towns protect water quality by safely disposing of household wastes. Located at RWA at 90 Sargent Drive in New Haven, HazWaste Central is open from **9 a.m. until noon on Saturdays only**. Household hazardous waste comes from everyday products used in the home, garage, yard or garden.

A visit to HazWaste Central is quick and easy. Participants never have to leave their cars, and the waste is off-loaded by professionals. Some of the household wastes that can be dropped off include aerosol cleaners and sprays, antifreeze, oil-based paint and pool chemicals. Plastic Wrap Reminder

Most bird seed, pet food and mulch bags are not made of the right plastic to be considered plastic film. And even if they are labeled as recyclable, they would need to be clean to go into the plastic film bin. Please put these items into the trash unless it has a recycle symbol on it and has been turned inside out and clean.

Black plastic plant pots and takeout containers are not recyclable.

The machinery can't detect the black plastic. Either try to return the plant pots to the place where you bought your plants or try to reuse them. I find the takeout containers have many uses around the house.

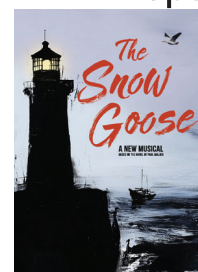
