Barbara Hanson, Co-Chair of the Hammonassett Festival. explains, "The event has traditionally taken place at Hammonasset Beach State Park in Madison, but ongoing construction at the park prompted us to take the event to the nearby -- and spacious --Guilford Fairgrounds."

We hope to raise community awareness of the culture and time-honored traditions of the Indigenous Peoples, as well as issues they face today. We hope to raise awareness of how we can work together to repair the balance between people and nature, and preserve the beauty and abundance of Mother Earth for those who live with the land and the seven generations that are coming. State Representative Vincent Candelora Connecticut's Budget



Last week, Connecticut made history. The House and Senate Chamber, controlled by Democrats, approved the Republican's budget proposal and sent a bipartisan document to the Governor's desk. After three days of negotiating with members, the House Democrats could not get enough support for their budget and abandoned calling it so Senate

Democrats took up debate on Friday afternoon. After a short discussion, three Democrat Senators stood offering support to the Republican's budget amendment where it passed 21-15. To the Speaker's credit, he chose to call the budget in the House and allow an opportunity for debate. Ultimately five House Democrats voted with Republicans to pass the budget bill 77-73. The Governor has now threatened a veto.

I believe the Governor should respect the will of the legislature and allow this budget to go into law. If he has concerns with certain provisions, we can discuss amendments down the road, but we need this budget to avoid the draconian cuts to education. The Governor abdicated his responsibility when he walked out of budget negotiations and refused to lead. Democrats are incapable of gaining enough support for their tax increases, including a secondary home tax, cell phone tax, cigarette tax, hotel tax, and nonprescription drug tax, and shifts of teacher retirement cost to local towns so the state is nowhere without this bipartisan budget.

The budget proposal offers the following: no new taxes; eliminates Social Security income tax and phases out tax on pension income for middle class families; Increases education funding and includes a new ECS formula to fairly distribute aid as well as a council to analyze and make any necessary changes to the new formula within the next year; stabilizes municipal aid and does not ask towns and cities to pay for teacher retirement costs; provides significant municipal mandate relief; fully funds day and employment services for individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities, reopens Care4Kids; prioritizes Transportation Prioritizes the state's transportation needs and stabilizes funding without tolls or new taxes; supports Seniors Lowers taxes for retirees by eliminating tax on social security for middle class families and phases out pension income tax for those with incomes below a specified threshold; helps seniors age in place by restoring and increasing funding for core programs and supports such as Meals on Wheels, the personal needs allowance, non ADA dial a ride, and the CT Home Care Program; funds state parks by implementing a new Passport to Parks program and dedicating a portion of the current hotel occupancy tax to a new Marketing, Culture & Tourism account; reduces size of government and Implements 10% reductions to certain agency accounts, overtime savings of 10%, a hiring freeze on non-24-hour non-union positions, and makes cuts to the legislature such as reducing the number of legislative committees; Includes a spending cap, bonding cap, and other long-term savings and Implements pension reform beginning in 2027 after the recently approved SEBAC contract ends.

I have always said that we will only have a budget with Republican and Democrat support. Unfortunately, rather than try and build consensus, Democrats tried to force a bad budget onto Connecticut. Fortunately, enough of their members had the courage to stand with Republicans to put Connecticut in a new direction. This budget is not perfect. There are many things in it that I hate, but it's the right budget for Connecticut.

Public Hearing - "Riverview Subdivision"

The North Branford Inland Wetlands & Watercourse Agency is reviewing a plan for a development called "Riverview Subdivision" at 363 Totoket Road. This is across from 400 Totoket Road and borders on Marjorie Drive. There will be a public hearing on September 27, 2017 at 6:30pm in the town hall.

It is application #2017-3 and calls for single family houses. There will be some grading, buildings and leeching lines within 200 feet of the Farm River and/or within the 100 foot wetland upland review area. The developer is Sunwood Development Corporation who developed the Schanz Farm property in Northford.

There are concerns about where the edge of the river is and where the wetlands actually are now.

Any residents who may have more information about the history of this area, and the flooding that occurs are encouraged to attend the public hearing or send a letter or email to Stephen Scavo, Chairman of the North Branford Conservation and Inland Wetlands and Watercourse Agency with any concerns that you may have.

Now to address Malcolm Moos, who served as Eisenhower's speech writer from 1958 when Adams hired him. He served with the utmost trust. Of this I learned from my research on the internet, where I couldn't find a single mention of Eisenhower engaging in a single discussion of the Military-Industrial Complex, even with his brother "Milton" with whom he often sought advice when planning a speech or discussion of any variety of subjects. Isn't this amazing he didn't seek the advice from his closest personal advisor whose help he sought throughtout his entire eight years?

Moos won Adams and Eisenhower's trust from his writings on Republican politics while teaching at John Hopkins University during which he also was employed by the Baltimore Sun as an associate editor. His moderate Republican stance was verified when he joined the Rockefeller Institute as Nelson Rockefeller's speech writer and worked for the Ford Foundation after leaving "Ike". Much is made of Moos turning ALL his papers from his association with Eisenhower upon his leaving to the Eisenhower Foundation, but no mention of the part regarding Eisenhower's warning of the Military-Industrial- Complex. Note, It is noted he turned (ALL) his papers over to the Eisenhower Foundation. That they were Moos personal papers deliberately kept from "Ike" or they certainly would have been turned over with his other papers at the time he left all the others.

I leave you to research all the other information yourself since to repeat it all here would be too long, but what prompted all this was Jim Cullen alerting me to the 20 papers found by Moo's son and daughter when they visited their fathers summer cottage on the lake in Minnesota on his death. That Moos didn't want these papers included with the original ones or he would have. It was over 20 years from the time he wrote them to their discovery in his preparation for the speech and there was sufficient time for him to release them and settle once and for all the question so important to history. The discovery of these papers did none of these except assure us Eisenhower had been duped and glorified by Moos speech.

Smoke alarms. If I asked you where your smoke alarms are in your home, could you tell me? If you're like many people, you may not pay much attention to where smoke alarms have been installed. However, location matters when it comes to smoke alarms.

Smoke alarms should be installed inside each bedroom, outside each sleeping area and on every level of the home, including the basement.

Working smoke alarms are a critical fire-safety tool that can mean the difference between life and death in a home fire. According to the nonprofit National Fire Protection Association (NFPA), smoke alarms can cut the chance of dying in a home fire in half. Meanwhile, NFPA data shows that home fires killed 2,755 people in 2013, an average of eight people every day that year. Many of these deaths could have been prevented with the proper smoke alarm protection.

As a member of the fire service, I've seen the devastating effects of fire first-hand; the burn injuries, the loss of homes and possessions are distressing. What's even worse is witnessing a family's anguish after a loved one has been killed in a fire. It's heartbreaking.

My sincere hope is that all North Branford residents make sure there are working smoke alarms installed throughout their homes. These simple steps can help make a life-saving difference, and prevent the potentially life-threatening impact of fire.

Here are additional smoke alarm tips to follow:

Install smoke alarms in every bedroom, outside each separate sleeping area and on every level of the home, including the basement.

Interconnect all smoke alarms throughout the home. When one sounds, they all sound.

Test alarms each month by pushing the test button.

Replace all smoke alarms, including alarms that use 10-year batteries and hardwired alarms, when they are 10 year old or sooner if they do not respond properly.

Make sure everyone in the home knows the sound and understands what to do when they hear the smoke alarm.

If the smoke alarm sounds, get outside and stay outside.

Go do your outside meeting place. Call the fire department from outside the home.


A visit into the paranormal!


Owl Prowler Event a Huge Success



A large c r o w d of over a hundred owl enthusiasts gathered at North Farms Park in Northford on Saturday, Sep-

tember 9, for an Owl Prowl at Big Gulph. Football Team Wins Season Opener




