# **Open Letter Requesting Assistance**

Nancy DeBrule-Clemente and her staff at Natureworks are once again helping this summer to restore the gardens at the Smith Library. This is not the first time they have come to the rescue acknowledging the need for our public places to look well maintained. However, we cannot expect that Natureworks should be the prime source of the care and maintenance of The Edward Smith Library. The Library Board is very grateful for Nancy DeBrule-Clemente's gift, of the talent of her employees and the material they are using to enhance the library property.

In North Branford we are looking forward to new economic development. The Route 80 corridor is a prime location for new building and opportunities. Likewise, Northford is expanding with the arrival of a winery and more housing near the center.

As a community, we are proud to be an agricultural center, however, much of the property surrounding our municipal buildings does not reflect that. Every year, at tax time, the hue and cry comes that we must keep our taxes low. In that effort, especially in consideration for limited income and retired residents, Fran Merola's public works budget does not allow for additional help to properly maintain these properties.

Gardening volunteers are needed for our libraries. An addition, I am sure that Fran could use volunteer help at other places. Gardening is a good exercise, keeps you young and trim. Please consider helping out. # Who's hands are in the cookie jar?

Most newspapers have avoided a recent story uncovered by Christine Stuart of the CtNewsJunkie.com which reveals that the federal government has withheld approximately \$250,000,000 of Medicaid payments pending additional information. The Department of Health and Human Services, CMS, has questioned the

methodology that our Department of Social Services used in qualifying residents for Medicaid. While this money may ultimately be received, questions are being asked over who knew what when and why hasn't this issue been disclosed. In addition, I believe this shortfall of funds has other consequences.

On July 1, 2013, the Governor signed Public Act 13-239 into law. This Act, among other things, permitted the Treasurer to issue GAAP Deficit bonds in an amount not to exceed \$750 million. Section 69 of the act restricts the use of these proceeds as follows: "(b) The State of Connecticut does hereby pledge to and agree with the holders of any bonds, notes and other obligations issued pursuant to section 68 of this act, that the state shall not treat the proceeds of any such bonds, notes or other obligations as constituting revenue of the General Fund, nor shall such proceeds be available for any current or future budget appropriation." When I showed my fourteen year old son this language and asked what it meant, he said, "you can't use the money." Seems pretty clear.

On or around October 2013, the Treasurer issued bonds in an aggregate amount of \$560 million and deposited said funds into the state's checking account. I believe that the funds could not be diverted for any current budget appropriation. Coinciding with this federal Medicaid shortfall, our checkbook balance has fallen below \$560 million in the weeks of May 31, June 7 and June 14, 2014, thus, leading to conclusion that the GAAP funds of \$560 million are being used to offset our revenue shortage for Medicaid expenditures. If this is the case, I am concerned that our administration may be running afoul of bond covenants, and at the least its statutory obligations. I'm sure when asked, the Treasurer will provided some justification for the use of this money.

I voted against Public Act 13-239 and stated on the House floor that I believed that this money would be absorbed into the budget as opposed to serving as a reserve to offset our accounting deficit. In less than six months, the administration has done exactly that-spent a portion of the money. Somebody has stuck their hand in the cookie jar and should be held accountable for breaking this promise.

# WIT & WISDOM Dr. William H. James

Dr. James needs no introduction or my relating of his accomplishments through his long life since relating them again here would just be repetitious as his obituary relates them so thoroughly. To most of you who knew Dr. James he was "Bill", but to me he was always Dr. James. Even when I called I always asked for Dr. James. I don't really know why unless it was in reverence to his scholastic achievement, of which I never accomplished. In hind sight it was ridiculous since Dr. James never paraded his degrees and was as interested in every person of whatever distinction, and as Virginia related, he went out to talk with the fellow, pumping out their septic system with as much interest as a college president.

I relate this since ours was a close and long relationship that started when I delivered his New Haven Register Sunday mornings many years ago and he would be waiting for me to discuss the news of the day during which he always inquired as to my personal activities. This was our relationship, but our friendship really began when I wrote an article on the Federal Reserve System that appeared in one of the local news media 27 years ago.

I remember the call as though it was yesterday, since the person asked if he could visit me since my article intrigued him. Naturally, knowing of the callers credentials, I awaited the visit, which was the same day. We retired to our greenhouse where we conversed in the warmth there in and in the course of our conversation I related what a farce our monetary system was since it was based on the creation of debt and the bankers monopoly was ridiculous since our government borrowed money from the Feds, a private banking institution, and paid interest on it when our Constitution says," Only Congress has the authority to coin money and declare the value thereof".

From this our friendship grew, since Dr. James called me many times and I he, as often as several times a week. I learned much from Dr. James and confess, in all my humility, he from me. I was his informant of all financial news he didn't know since I was, and still am, a reader of the other less known, but often more honest than the New York Times and Wall Street Journal, captive journals of our banking system, that tell only what they want you to know, that he read. In all the 27 years of our friendship I thought, and suggested, he make his book, The Monetarist and the Evolving Crisis, a continuation of 2 former books, written when he was 100, a much shorter version. That with peoples time so filled with other activities were unlikely to read his long epistle. But, I think this was one time when his degrees influenced his actions and he felt the necessity to publish a substantial book to justify his academic credentials and to attract the people capable of understanding his message, while I felt it was more important to reach the average man and by being cheaper, it would attract a larger readership and prove more influential in spreading his messenger.

With no one to discuss the events happening so rapidly these days, I am sad and lonesome with no one to turn to. I'm to old, and there is no other awaiting my call. We had so much in common.

A story you might find musing; As I was standing in line behind my brother Harold to enter services for my brother Chester (who had died at 97), the gentleman seating us greeted Harold with, "And who are you?". Harold in his fry humor said, "I'm next". The man evidently confused, stuttered, "no, no, I mean what's your name?"

# **PLANNING FOR THE FUTURE By Attorney Marc P. Guertin**

Revocable Living Trusts serve many functions. One of the most useful functions of a revocable living trust is that if properly funded, it enables a person to avoid the probate and the time and expense that goes along with

At its core probate is the process of removing a decedents name from property and assets that person owned when they were alive. So, it follows that if your name is not on any property or assets when you die- there is no need for probate. Revocable Living Trusts help people to do just that.

A Trust acts as a legal container that holds property for the benefit of the beneficiary of the Trust, who is usually a person, an institution or a charity. Trusts are legal agreements between three different parties: The Grantor (sometimes called a Trustmaker or Settlor) who establishes the Trust, the Trustee who administrates the Trust, and the beneficiary, who receives some sort of benefit (usually income) from the Trust.

Imagine a Revocable Living Trust as an "open box." You can put assets into the box and you can take assets out of the box. The box is an alter ego for you. You can manage the assets in the box or appoint someone else to do that for you. You have total control-just as if you owned the assets outright (outside of the trust). Assets owned by the Trust (most likely managed by you for your benefit) will not have to be probated when you die- because you don't own them- the Trust does.

Revocable Living Trusts are a great method of avoiding probate and the costs, lack of privacy and time associated with probating an estate. By using a Revocable Living Trust you can put your assets into your beneficiary's hands in days instead of months, minimize the cost of transferring the assets, and do so privately.

## Lake Gaillard Walk-A-Thon Returns!

### **Children and Smoke Alarms**

Sleeping children don't always awake when a smoke alarm activates. Children, ages 6 thru 10 seem to be most effected. While these dramatic facts are worrisome, we shouldn't allow them to obscure the fact that smoke alarms are highly effective at reducing fire deaths and injuries. Roughly 70% of deaths occur from fires in homes without smoke alarms or disabled smoke alarms.

Think about how heavily you or your children sleep. As loud as smoke alarms can be, sometimes children sleep through it. Research has shown that some children don't wake up from the loud beep of a typical smoke alarm.

There are many new types of smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors on the market today. Some of the new features include:

\*Personalized Instructions, which allows you to record customized escape instructions

\*Fire Drill Feature, which allows a time delay to simulate an actual fire alarm

\*Loud 85 decibel outputs

\*10 year batteries

There have been many advances over the last 10 years in home smoke alarms. Smoke and carbon monoxide detectors are electrical devices and the do have a life limit. It's a good idea to replace your detectors every 10 years. We also want to emphasize the need to continue planning and practicing home fire escape plans and to insure everyone in your home can be awakened by the sound of the smoke alarm. We will continue to reinforce the importance of developing and practicing a home fire escape plan during which the smoke alarm is activated so all family members know its sound.

### September is School Safety Month

Parents are reminded to discuss safety issues with your children. This should include bus and school safety. Members of the North Branford Fire Department are conducting inspections of all town schools, K-12 during August.

If you have any questions about bus or fire safety, you can contact your child's school or the fire marshal's office.

### **Please Display Your House Numbers**

Please help us help you. Sometimes it can be difficult to find the proper address when responding to an emergency. Please have proper house numbers that can be viewed from both directions on the street.

- 1. At least 4 inches in height, in a contrasting color to the background
- 2. Visible from the street
- 3. If the building is set back by more than 100 feet, the number should be affixed to a post or mailbox not more than 10 feet from the driveway

### **Questions and Additional information:**

Dr. William H. "Bill" James, age 104, of North Branford, Connecticut, died peacefully on August 19, 2014. Blessed with long life, good health, and a strong work ethic, William was possibly Connecticut's oldest military veteran, serving in May this year as Grand Marshall of his town's Memorial Day events, at which he gave a speech. He leaves a record of accomplishment, drive, intelligence, and widespread friends and affiliations. Born in 1910 to John and May James, William came of pioneer stock and spent his childhood on rural farms. Starting in the 1920's, he and his mother traveled to Europe where

each pursued educational opportunities, with William studying at the University of Lausanne, Switzerland, before returning to the U.S. to attend and graduate from Brown University in 1933.

William held a variety of jobs before, during and after college. He began his professional career during the Depression, working as a public school teacher in New Canaan CT. Three years later he switched to the school system in Easton CT, where he began as a Teaching Principal in 1936 and advanced to increasing responsibility until interrupted by WWII, for which he volunteered and served in the Air Force (chiefly in India, China, and on Tinian Island), ultimately retiring as a Major. Returning home after WWII, William resumed his work with the Easton schools while using the GI Bill to obtain his Masters and Ph.D. degrees from Yale University.

William also married after the war, taking as his bride in 1950 the former Virginia Stowell of New Britain, CT, daughter of Austin and Doris Stowell of that city. Promoted to Superintendent of Schools for Easton in 1953, William in 1958 relocated to the larger school system of Branford CT to become Superintendent of Schools there. It was at this time that he, Virginia, and their daughter Hillery moved to Northford CT where Hillery attended public schools and Virginia taught in the Wallingford school system. In 1966 William became an Associate Director of the Connecticut Commission for Higher Education, from which he retired in 1977. He had also begun part-time college teaching in 1949 and continued until 1993 as an adjunct professor for several universities. A long-time writer, William wrote newspaper columns during the 1930's, writing about political and economic affairs, and he is the author of several books: "The Monetarists and the Current Crisis" (1975), "The Monetarists and the Continuing Crisis" (1997) and "The Monetarists and the Evolving Crisis: Wake Up, Americans, We are Losing our Great Nation" (2011). From 2011 forward, William published occasional commentaries on public affairs. Besides writing, William stayed active with educational organization, Rotary International, the SAR (Sons of the American Revolution), the American Legion, and the VFW, among others. He was also an avid follower of local, national, and world events, enjoying several newspapers each day. In addition to his work and writing, William enjoyed small-town America and invariably became "Bill" during his many decades of visiting Lyme CT, Halifax VT, or New Harbor, ME. Some of his greatest pleasures were talking with friends, meeting new people, telling stories, working outdoors, or enjoying nature and wildlife. Well remembering his own struggles with early poverty, the chaotic '20's, the Depression, and WWII, Bill was sympathetic to those who struggle against forces larger than themselves; at the same time, he was a strong advocate of hard work and continuous self-improvement, believing that such effort gave any individual his or her best chance for a good life.
