Dear editor:

Connecticut went through revaluation in 2024, and homeowners are now feeling the impact in 2025. This comes on top of federal changes affecting Wall Street, our retirements, and our safety nets. Lately, it feels like everyone is feeling the strain. That’s why I’m trying to be as active as possible—getting involved in town business, meeting new people, and listening to their stories. We’re going through a cycle of change, and if we don’t find common ground soon, we risk breaking apart. Many of the current changes are causing suffering for our most vulnerable neighbors. Food pantries—essential for those facing food insecurity—

are being hit the hardest. And this is happening while everyone is feeling it in their wallets. How can we work together to ensure these vital operations stay afloat? When we pull funding, the burden shifts right back to us. Another pressing issue is housing that’s achievable for all. A Starbucks is opening in my neighborhood, and I find myself wondering: where will the workers live? The cheapest apartment in town is nearly \$2,000 a month—plus utilities. Can we realistically expect these workers to stay in town and serve us coffee each morning? As tariffs rise, that coffee will only get more expensive. Whether you prefer Starbucks or Dunkin’, the person behind the counter deserves a place to live and a private life of their own. I’ve started to realize that I’ll be sharing my home with my son far longer than my parents did with me. It’s possible he may never be able to own a home in our community. And then there’s the anger—political silos and personal attacks. We’re forgetting we’re all in the same storm. We may be in different boats, but we’re riding the same waves of policy changes, fears of violence against communities, and economic uncertainty. I don’t always agree with what I hear, but I try to ask myself: is it better to listen and learn—or react in anger? Anger won’t heal the misunderstandings and hurt. Some people feel uncomfortable being asked to share their pronouns. Others feel erased when they have to explain they have two moms or two dads. Maya Angelou is just as much a part of American history as George Washington or Thomas Jefferson. And yes, George Washington wanted to import farmers to the Ohio territory because the settler farmers weren’t sustainable enough. A mindful, more humane approach to border security may be the way forward. I’d love to hear what farmers think about this. Leaders should be for the we, not the me. They should support the democratic principles this country was built on—not exploit its weak points for personal gain. When leaders show they are serving themselves instead of us, it’s time to vote them out. That’s the power of elections: they give us a voice, a choice, and the chance to hold our representatives accountable. Replacing incumbents should never feel disloyal. So next time you vote—whether for union leadership, town or city officials, or state and federal representatives—ask yourself: are they leading for we, or for me? **Kara Papa**

What’s really going on with Trump,
budget cuts and Connecticut Republicans



President Donald Trump’s attempt to curb federal spending and address a \$36 trillion budget deficit has provided a gift to Gov. Ned Lamont and state Democrats to deflect attention from the looming fiscal abyss they created by refusing to adjust Connecticut’s biennial budget in 2025 for only the second time in more than three decades. Last session, on the way out the door, Democrats shoveled almost \$400 million to higher

education in the last tranche of COVID money, only to recently acknowledge the higher education nest egg of more than \$1 billion hoarded away while our local schools and special education systems go without needed funding.

Predictably, Connecticut’s 20024-2025 surplus shrunk from \$297 million to \$70 million. Due to a legally questionable fund transfer of more than \$340 million at the beginning of the year, it has bounced back up to \$390 million. Overruns continue to mount in Medicaid, partly driven by illegal immigrant health care, overtime payments to state workers and other overruns in several agencies. House Republicans offered a balanced budget last spring that addressed these overages and reflected the new fiscal realities. Democrats ignored our warnings, and as spending continued to balloon into the new year, only minor rescissions were made by Governor Lamont, no real structural adjustments, and no calls for legislative action to control these deficiencies by the same leaders who find time to get to the nearest podium daily.

Connecticut, for the first time in history, has seen expenditures grow over the enacted budget by \$500 million in this current budget year. The only other time the legislature refused to adjust its budget was 2008 and that inaction turned a \$30 million deficit into \$960 million in red ink within months. Do you sense a pattern?

It took a decade to get out from underneath the crushing downward fiscal spiral.

So, as we enter a new budget cycle, what is the governor’s strategy? Blame Trump for potential future Medicaid and education cuts with road shows and news conferences, as our state continues to spend beyond its means. Sadly, the fiscal guardrails we once unanimously supported will be forever altered to fit the narrative of one-party rule. Democrats are taking a deep sigh of relief that they have President Trump in the White House to lay blame for their budgetary malfeasance over the past year. So far this session, Democrats have

proposed everything from expanding free college programming and illegal immigrant alien health care to free diapers and tax breaks for people who don’t pay income taxes at all. Salary increases for state employees are in the cards, too.

All of this, of course, sets the table for future tax increases, less job growth — if that’s even possible — and a markedly unaffordable Connecticut.

In Trump, statehouse Democrats have their boogeyman — but it’s just a distraction. They’re the real problem, and it’s time to pull off the mask and hold them accountable for their role in Connecticut’s looming financial nightmare.

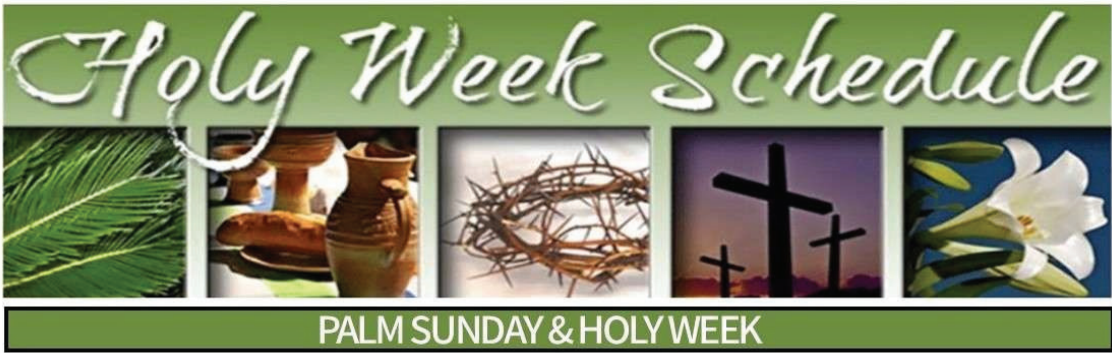

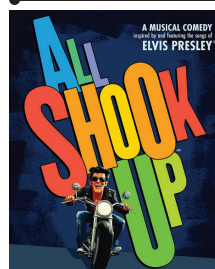
