# State Representative Vincent Candelora

Ditch the Gamesmanship, Take "Unintended Consequences" Seriously



Public policy is a constant, influential force in the lives of residents, and when the weight of government's decisions grows too heavy, residents and main street shop owners begin to contemplate their futures in our state. And in 2018, there was a lot of contemplation.

Last year marked the ninth consecutive year that Connecticut lost residents to other

states as another 30,000 people became ex-Nutmeggers. It was one of the largest out-migrations we've seen over a single year in the past decade. Tax hikes passed in 2011 and 2015 weighed heavy.

Considering decisions made this year, more tax hikes and the current push for tolls, it wouldn't surprise me to see even more people seek prosperity elsewhere. The budget signed back in the spring increased the cost of living here in Connecticut through a radical sales tax expansion, going as far as targeting a purchase you might make while playing an app-based game on your cell phone. Now, Angry Birds enthusiasts will, perhaps, be angry when they play.

Democrats' no-stone-unturned revenue hunt led to one of the year's biggest and perhaps unresolved controversies-a hidden tax on most grocery items that came to light through taxation instructions offered to stores by the state's Department of Revenue Services (DRS.)

Republicans successfully objected to the implementation of that hidden tax, though an enduring discrepancy between revised DRS tax instructions to stores and the actual law on the books has left many audit-fearing grocery store owners feeling uneasy if not uncertain about what to tax.

If you think that sounds problematic, just wait until the state's new paid family and medical leave program-a mandatory payroll tax-hits its full stride.

Unfortunately, the phrase "unintended consequences" has become synonymous with Democrat policy initiatives. With it, the arts of deflection and gamesmanship have grown.

That grocery tax problem? Democrats say it wasn't the words in their budget, but rather an overzealous DRS bureaucrat and Republicans making a misleading fuss over nothing.

Right now, the debate over tolls is steeped in that gamesmanship. Tolls remain a linchpin in Governor Lamont's vision for transportation despite opinion polls that show most residents oppose the idea of heaping hundreds of millions of dollars more in annual taxes onto the backs of in-state drivers. Legislative Democrats, who have offered no transportation plan of their own, say they'll support the governor's plan—but only if Republicans do, too.

Translation: They understand tolls are unpopular, and they're leveraging Republicans' crystal clear opposition to tolls as a tool to avoid casting a difficult vote ahead of an election year.

Last week, Republicans continued our strong record of offering alternative ideas. This time, it's a transportation plan that not only funds our infrastructure needs, but also reinstates the transportation oversight committee (eliminated by Gov. Malloy) that was responsible for prioritizing our state's projects. The Republican plan also moves labor and pensions costs from transportation bond funds to the general fund where it belongs.

While I appreciate that Gov. Lamont is fighting for what he believes in, I believe his pursuit of tolls will result in one heck of an unintended consequence: more fed up people leaving an already-unaffordable state, feeling as though government is working against them.

I hope this difficult conversation over transportation and the resounding outcry over taxes and business policies will cause the governor and Democrats to recognize the impact of their decisions. Such awareness, combined with Republicans carrying alternative ideas, could produce fertile ground for bipartisan talks as the holiday season approaches.

Info: Linda at 203/287-8673 **Carbon monoxide** (CO) is an odorless, colorless gas that interferes with the delivery of oxygen in the blood to the rest of the body. It is produced by incomplete combustion of fuels that include coal, wood, charcoal, natural gas, propane, and fuel oil. Problems can arise as a result of improper installation, maintenance, or inadequate venation. The symptoms are sometimes confused with the flu or food poisoning. Infants, elderly, pregnant women, and people with heart or respiratory illness are particularly at high risk from the effects of carbon monoxide poisoning. Nationally an estimated 300 people a year die as a result of carbon monoxide poisoning and thousands of others end up in the emergency room.

What you need to do: Ensure that all fuel burning appliances are properly adjusted and maintained. Have annual inspections of heating systems, chimney and flues. Never leave a car running in the garage. Install a carbon monoxide detector near your sleeping area.

If your CO detector goes off, or if everyone in the house are experience flue like symptoms that improve when your not home, call 911 and get out of the house. **Fireplace and Home Fire Safety:** 

With the high price of fuel oil and natural gas, many homeowners are using alternate heating sources. Last year, North Branford Fire Department responded to numerous chimney fires, and furnace malfunctions. More than one-third of Americans use fireplaces, wood stoves, and other fuel–fired appliances to heat their homes. Unfortunately, many people are unaware of the fire risks associated with wood and other fuels.

North Branford Fire Department encourages you to practice the following fire safety steps:

- 1. Have your chimney or wood stove cleaned and inspected annually
- 2. Keep the area around your fireplace or stove clear of flammable decorations or materials
- 3. Always use a metal mesh screen with fireplaces, and keep your glass doors open
- 4. Never use flammable liquids to start a fire
- 5. Use only seasoned hardwood
- 6. Build small fires that burn completely and produce less smoke
- 7. Never burn cardboard, trash or other debris in your fireplace or wood stove
- 8. *Never leave a fire unattended* and extinguish before going to bed or leaving the house
- 9. Soak hot ashes in water and place them in a *metal container outside and away* from your house
- 10. Cover the chimney with a mesh screen spark arrester
- *11. Install smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors* on every level of your home
- 12. Have your oil or gas furnace serviced at least once a year
- 13. Provide proper venting for all heating appliances

#### **Don't Forget Your Appliances**

**Dryers:** The leading cause of dryer fires is a lack of maintenance. Whether you have electric or gas these simple rules can prevent a tragedy.

- Do not operate dryer without a lint filter. Clean filter before and after each use.
- Clean out the exhaust duct at least once a month.
- Once a year, remove the back cover and vacuum out the area around the heating element.
- Use only metal flexible pipe and the shortage distance possible to the outside.
- Make sure that the dryer is plugged into an outlet suitable for its needs. **Do not use extension cords**.

**Ovens:** Cooking fires are the number one cause of home fires and injuries. Unattended cooking is the leading cause of kitchen fires.

- Keep cooking area clean and clear of combustibles.
- Do not wear loose fitting cloths that can dangle onto stove burners and

- Follow manufactures instructions on self-cleaning ovens. Clean heavy accumulations of grease before starting cleaning cycle.
- If a fire starts in the oven, turn off electric power or gas supply, do not open door.
- If a small fire starts in a pan on the stove, turn off electric power or gas supply and cover with a lid. Do not remove lid even if the fire appears to be out. **Do not use water to extinguish a grease or oil fire.**
- If you have a Microwave Oven fire, keep the door closed and turn off the power.

**Dishwashers:** Yes, even dishwashers cause fires. The heating elements and timing devices can short out and cause a fire.

Remember: Never leave home without turning off all appliances
