DESTINATION NORTH BRANFORD

The North Branford Economic Development Commission is astounded by the positive response from residents for the DESTINATION NORTH BRANFORD SUNFLOWER PROJECT. The Project Committee is currently made up of 15 "Projecteers" (project volunteers) and is adding people each week. The purpose of the project is to attract visitors to our local businesses, to beautify North Branford with sunflowers everywhere and to increase our native pollinators to our gardens.

The local farming community is helping already. Larry Augur from Larry Augur Farm gave the Committee an important understanding about growing sunflowers.

Ryan Van Wilgen, from Van Wilgen's Garden Center, contacted Chas. C. Hart Seed Company in Wethersfield, CT, that generously donated 500,000 sunflower seeds for distribution to North Branford residents and businesses to plant throughout Town.

The Committee plans to distribute these FREE seed packets this spring. There will be a choice of short or tall sunflower seeds and directions will be on the packet. The seeds will need to be planted in a sunny spot.

The EDC hopes that restaurants will join in with menu items using sunflower seeds.

We hope businesses will join this exciting initiative and grow sunflowers on their property or in large pots.

The Committee is pleased to have a resident of Evergreen Woods (formerly a home owner in North Branford) volunteering as a "Projecteer" and excited to have the support and

participation of Evergreen Woods in the Sunflower Project. We hope that everyone in North Branford will locate your own sunny spaces and get ready to plant in May.

State Representative Vincent Candelora The Governor's Budget: An Attack on the Middle Class



On February 14, Republican legislators spent the evening at a reception with Governor Lamont. Despite it being Valentine's Day, I, along with my colleagues, appreciated his willingness to hear from our party, especially given that House Republicans represent 40% of the state. The Governor was gracious and heard our concerns, but his

budget didn't demonstrate that he listened.

I think we were all taken aback by the level of tax increases and cuts to our towns in the Governor's budget. When you include tolls, his budget proposes over \$4 billion in new taxes in the biennium. I am most concerned, however, with the framework of this budget. Governor Lamont hails from Greenwich. His wealth is no secret to the public. As a democrat, however, one would think he would champion the "little guy". Surprisingly, this budget does the opposite. It crushes the middle class.

While I have always believed that income tax increases on the wealthy drags our economy down and has led Connecticut to last place in job recovery in New England, expansion of the sales tax is far more dangerous. Not only does it make our retail businesses less competitive, it's impact can be significant on middle class families and seniors. Despite that, Governor Malloy has proposed imposing a sales tax on almost every type of service, ranging from veterinarian services to haircuts, from legal, accounting, engineering, and interior design services to home improvement services, from garbage collection and parking to textbooks, car seats and sports and recreation services. Nothing is spared taxation.

Sadly, his budget also undoes so many good proposals in our bipartisan budget from last session. Concurrently with raising all these sales taxes, he seeking to reimpose taxation on pensions and social security income, which we began phasing out in 2019. He then proposes the elimination of the 3 month look-back period on gifts and extends the estate filing from 6 months to 9 months, two proposals that will benefit the wealthy at the expense of middle class.

The Governor wants to tax every ounce of sugary drinks at a rate of 1.5 cents. A 64 ounce of soda will be taxed .96 cents. He claims this proposal is a healthcare initiative, yet he fails to tax artificial sweeteners. To suggest that drinks flavored with honey, maple syrup and real sugar are somehow safer than those flavored with aspartame defies science and logic.

So the Governor's budget is the beginning of the process. I hope, however, it is not the starting point. Our middle class is being squeezed out of Connecticut, and I believe this budget protects the wealthy and our cities at the expense of our towns.





Let's Be "Frank"

Well brother, many have called to tell me that last issue's story of my "Yute" brought back memories of their own childhood. I did have to explain to some what a cold water flat was (I didn't realize I was that old) and many didn't understand the part about no bath tubs or what a roll away bed was. Other than that, as I promised, it's time to move on to the "Hill Section".

My first years on the "Hill" are foggy as I was very young. I do remember some things that have stuck with me forever. For me it was a new experience. I guess at five years old, everything is a new experience. But this was much different from what I was accustomed to on Water Street.

First, there was a bath tub. I remember my first experience brought the police to the house. I was so scared of my encounter with this foreign object that I thought I was goning to drown. I didn't swim and I just didn't understand the concept. I screamed so loud and mommy yelled at me so loud that Theresa next store called the cops because she thought mom was killing me. Later she learned to stay calm when mom went on one of her "disciplinary rants".

Our house seemed to separate the Italians from the blacks. As a youngster growing up in an all Italian neighborhood, I was quite confused by people who were of a different color and a different background. I was a complete foreigner in my new neighborhood. One side of the street was filled with Italian immigrants who spoke mostly Italian. I did not. On the other side there were more kids and I soon became friends with them. There was Big Butch, Little Butch, Dougy and Kenny. I had fun plaing ball with them but I soon realized they had different schedules than I did. They didn't have to go in at noon and again at five for family meals.

As a youngster I envied their freedom. As I grew older I realized most of them had no father living at home and some didn't even know who their father was. There were no formal family meals for them. They ate when they felt like it and seldom together. To this day I enjoy our family meals (especially on Sunday when the kids join us) and cannot think of life without them. Back then I never really thought about what they were missing.

I remember you were not happy to leave your friends in the old neighborhood. You would take the downtown bus from Notre Dame and walk to Wooster Street to hangout with your gang. Scarpelino's, Gambardella's, Ciaburri's and Marino were a few of the names I remember. You would then walk home about three miles at 8:00. You continued to go to St. Michael's Church and attended their CYO (Catholic Youth Organization) and you played for their basketball team. The neighborhood changed as I became a teenager and walking in the streets at night was no longer healthy. In the evening, I was barely allowed to walk a block by myself for fear of being jumped or worse. "Anthony use to walk three miles," I would protest. But mom would just tell me how times and neighborhoods had changed.

I don't remember much about Mary in my earlier years. You were my hero. She was just a girl. A sister who got away with everything because

Which Hunt?

The Salem Witch Trials were fueled by a community's fear and resentment of those who were different. The town found several convenient outliers upon whom to focus the public's ire: a Caribbean slave, a homeless woman and an elderly, poor woman. The accusations were completely general and baseless - "she's a witch!" After this meritless accusation, a mountain of evidence was concocted, enough to incite a tribunal to strangle these women to death by hanging them in the public square. To this day we herald this process of accusation without evidence, followed by the fabrication of crimes as the profound miscarriage of justice known as a "witch-hunt."

Trump's accusation that the Mueller investigation is a witch-hunt has been widely criticized as a childish wise crack used to unduly ridicule a duly assigned federal probe. Is it? Compare the real "witch hunt" (above) with the nature and substance of the Mueller investigation. Deputy AG Rod Rosenstein's written instructions to Mueller were the subject of Representative Jim Jordan's (OH) questions to acting AG Robert Whittaker at recent House Judiciary Committee hearings. He asked whether numerous redactions in Rosenstein's instructions to Mueller were in fact the names of the targets of the "probe." "Did Rod Rosenstein direct Robert Mueller to target specific Americans?" Jordon pointedly asked. Put another way, has Mueller been investigating a crime or concocting one to fit these targeted individuals? Which hunt is Mueller on, the one for specific people, or the one for the perpetrators of a crime?

Rather than specify a crime to investigate, Rosenstein appears to have directed Mueller to target specific individuals - among them the duly elected president. As such, the bald accusation of "collusion" has been loosely wrapped around their necks, roughly framing a subject about which the details are thereafter being conjured - a proverbial witch-hunt designed and intended to strangle political outliers in the public square.

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Abortion Rights? Abortion rights? What was he talking about and why? Virginia Governor Ralph Northam - a doctor - fanned the flames of controversy with strange statements about a post-birth procedure for ending the life of a child born with severe birth defects.

Virginia's proposed legislation would have allowed abortions after 24 weeks when the expecting mother and her doctor agreed it was "necessary to prevent... impairment of [the mother's] mental or physical health." It also would have eliminated the need to show that the expecting mother would otherwise suffer any substantial or irremediable harm. The existing law allowed abortions after 24 weeks but required that three doctors agree that aborting the child was necessary to prevent substantial and irremediable harm to the expecting mother.

Northam said he was describing just one "particular example" for ending a child's life when he said: "The infant would be kept comfortable... then a discussion... between [doctor and mom]" whether to end the child's life. Why did Northam address any post-birth procedure at all in the context of legalized abortion when the proposed law addressed neither severe birth defects nor post-birth procedures? If the proposed law intended to allow third trimester abortions only for a child with severe birth defects it would have said so and Northam wouldn't have called his post-birth procedure a "particular example."

This proposed, open ended, infinitely permissive abortion law was in no manner limited to a severely deformed fetus. Northam's statements clearly envisioned a vastly expanded universe of lawful abortive decisions that somehow - intersected with the post-birth procedure he described. In this light, those who assert that Northam's example of this post-birth procedure was entirely unrelated to the proposed law are engaging in deflective nonsense designed to draw our attention away from the slippery slope to outright infanticide.

PLANNING FOR THE FUTURE By Attorney Marc P. Guertin

Lately, the same question has been posed to me by several of my clients "What is the difference between and Irrevocable Trust and a Revocable Trust?" On a base level the answer to the question is easy, one trust is revocable and the other is not. But that does not quite answer the question my clients are really asking. What they really want to know is what type of trust is right for my situation?

In many ways revocable trusts and irrevocable trusts are similar. All trusts act like a "legal container" that holds property for the benefit of the "beneficiary" of the trust. The beneficiary can be an individual, an institution or a charity. Trusts are legal agreements between three different parties: The Grantor, who establishes the trust, the Trustee, who administrates the trust, and the beneficiary, who receives some sort of benefit from the trust.

Imagine that a trust acts like a cardboard box that holds your assets. Revocable Trusts are an "open box trust." You can put assets into the box and you can take assets out of the box. The box is an alter ego for yourself. You have total control. On the other hand, Irrevocable Trusts function like a "closed box trust." You can put assets into the trust, you just cannot get them out. Your trustee controls the assets inside the Irrevocable Trust, not you.

Revocable Trusts are very good at minimizing the probate process (although not necessarily the probate fees charged by the state of Connecticut). They are also very good at avoiding or minimizing estate taxes, and are beneficial in many other ways. What a Revocable Trust will not do is protect assets against the high cost of nursing home/skilled nursing care.

If my clients are concerned about the costs associated with spending time in a nursing home we usually discuss the power of an Irrevocable Trust. Irrevocable Trusts are a legal entity separate from the person who creates it. As a "closed box trust," irrevocable trusts insulate the assets inside the trust from things like the cost of nursing home care. In order for an Irrevocable Trust to work it must be set up well in advance of anticipated nursing home care.

Delinquent Tax Bills

The Tax Department recently mailed more than 2,500 delinquent notices to taxpayers. Many are due to people paying the first half of the bill last July and then misplacing it for the second payment that was due in January. (We've all done that!) But that's not the lion share of them.

Hundreds are returned to the Town from the Post Office for bad addresses. (Since when is Foxon Road "no such street" - so much for automation!) Remember that these bills originate at the Department of Motor Vehicles and reflect vehicles that were registered as of October 1, 2017. The address that DMV had on file for your registration is what is provided to the Town and ultimately used for the mailing of the tax bill and subsequently delinquent notices, etc. If you have moved since 10/1/17 or changed from a street address to a P.O. Box (or vice-versa), those reasons may explain why your bill was returned to the Town. Another common problem is the incorrect tax town on file. DMV's records occasionally will list North Branford residents' bills as other towns and we similarly receive other non-North Branford resident's information for our bills. Lastly, another common problem is incomplete addresses - particularly condominiums and apartments. If the information from DMV comes to us as 229 Branford Road (for example) without a unit number, it will most definitely be returned to the Town.

The bottom line is that many taxpayers have not paid their 2017 Grand List tax bills – no more than any other year - but this problem occurs annually. The unpaid bills will continue to accrue 18% annual interest will ultimately leave you without the ability to register your cars. This leads to angry folks who are at DMV and halted in their registration process or folks with bills that have lingered on and the interest amount exceeds the original tax amount. We try to use the Internet to find people, but it just isn't practical.

If you had vehicles that were registered as of October 1, 2017 (or real estate, or business assets [for that matter!]) and you haven't received a tax bill or delinquent notice, please call the Tax Department at 203-**484-6011 immediately.** Those accounts that remain delinquent will be receiving "Demand Notices" in March. This is the last step before the delinquent accounts are turned over to a State Marshal – which translates to additional fees.
