Connecticut's Financial Struggles State Representative Vincent Candelora



This next budget year, marks the tenth anniversary of Connecticut's fiscal crisis, and we are still seeing very little improvement. The Governor and unions have announced a concession deal that seeks \$700 million in "givebacks" and the deal is being met with mixed reviews.

Regardless of the details of the union package, the five year extension on the contract is a non-starter for me. Union leadership continue to cry foul that the state continues to attempt to balance the budget on their backs; yet for the second time in five years, the Governor has negotiated an agreement that extends their contract another five years into 2027. These extensions essentially delay the inevitable need for comprehensive state employment reform, and nibbling at the edges every few years only insures these midterm negotiations that don't fix the problem.

Three of our rating agencies have downgraded our bond rating which will make it more expensive to borrow. Because of this downgrade, the treasurer's office reported that it is twice as expensive to bond, and recommends shifting to revenue credit bonds. Credit revenue bonds, which are utilized typically by cities, such as Bridgeport, Washington D.C. and Chicago, require the borrower to earmark a revenue stream to pay back the bonds. Essentially, the treasurer is recommending a self-imposed wage garnishment in order to hold down borrowing costs. Approximately 4% of our income tax revenue will get segregated into a bank account where bond creditors automatically get paid.

Connecticut's poor revenue performance is attributed to the fact that our top 100 taxpayers generated 49% less tax revenue than the previous year, thus opening up \$300 plus deficit. My fears when the Democrats raised the income tax on the wealthy are being realized. They're leaving. I spoke to one resident who moved his family and business to Florida. By doing so, he's saving \$10 million a year in taxes. That revenue represents 25% of our care for kids program.

I believe it is not just the taxes that are causing people to leave. In the Governor's budget proposal, he's shifting \$50 million of additional funding to Hartford, which is facing bankruptcy, at the expense of our small town. While the legislature weighs in on this proposal, Hartford responds by announcing a policy to provide identification cards for illegal immigrants and proving these illegal residents with access to all of its city services. Meanwhile towns struggle with the reality of increasing taxes by 4-6 mills in order to address this shortfall. Again, regardless of how anyone feels about illegal immigration, cities send the wrong message by announcing new, costly programs in the face of bankruptcy. Government's inability to control its spending prompts the discussion, why stay in Connecticut? Sadly, we continue to lose population.

House Republicans have drawn the line in the sand. We cannot raise taxes and we cannot have massive cuts to our towns. We continue our attempts to negotiate a bipartisan budget package, and I am hopeful that Democrats will support our perspective. Connecticut is a great state and I believe it can make a comeback!

PLANNING FOR THE FUTURE

Long Term Care Insurance (LTCI) used to be one of the best ways to protect your assets from nursing home exposure. With the cost of care in a Connecticut skilled nursing facility often exceeding \$15,000 per month, owning a LTCI policy used to make sense for many people.

The cost of LTCI is based on the age and health of the applicant. Insurance companies gamble on the health of their clients, but they need to minimize their risk in order to stay in business. One way to minimize said risk is to charge high premiums for their older and less healthy clients.

Many older people will simply not qualify for an LTCI policy because there is too much risk for the insurance company. One strategy to avoid the higher premiums is to apply for LTCI when you are young. However, you will be paying your premiums over a longer amount of time, so there may be no real savings.

Recently there has been a trend by insurance companies to increase their rates across the board for all of their policy holders. So, even if you got the LTCI policy when you were young and in good health, there is a good chance that rate could increase dramatically over the lifetime of the policy. The rate increases force people to do one of three things: reduce the amount of benefits within the policy to make it more affordable or bite the bullet and pay in the 40% increase (if they can afford it) or to drop the policy and effectively flush all of the premiums they have paid in the past down the toilet. None of these options are very appealing to most people. However, there is another option, that does not involve insurance at all.

An Irrevocable Asset Protection Trust (IAPT) provides an opportunity for individuals, both single and married to protect their assets long term. These assets could be available to you in the future to pay for things that Medicaid does not, or for an individual's spouse or as a legacy for future generations, without the risks associated with giving these assets away to another individual.

An IAPT is a legal entity separate from the person who creates it. It is created by signing a Trust agreement where the Grantor irrevocably transfers assets to the trust which is supervised by a third person called a Trustee (often the Grantor's children or other relative) who holds and manages that property in Trust for the benefit of the people who are named as beneficiaries.

Timing is extremely important when establishing an IAPT. "Beat the Clock" is the name of the game. In order for an IAPT to work it must be set up well in advance of anticipated nursing home care (currently 5 years). After the passage of enough time the assets held by the IAPT will be insulated from the ravages of a long term stay in a nursing home

New Look at "Space Weather"

To the Editor:

The recent "Space Weather" editorial by Kirt Westfall not only contains a scientific error related to the amount of harmful carbon dioxide being pumped into our atmosphere, but it incorrectly implies that climate change might be caused by space weather.

The "space weather events" referenced in President Obama's Executive Order of October 13, 2016, Executive Order have nothing to do with climate change but everything to do with solar flare radiation disrupting military and domestic satellites, electrical generation, distribution grids and computer networks, all of which are crucial to national security. The order followed a significant solar flare event that compromised some of our electronic and electrical grid infrastructure and was directed at government departments to prepare and harden defense against future solar storms.

The fundamental flaw in his article questioning the science of climate change is that he only quotes a gross outflow of carbon dioxide (C02) from land and oceans, when the relevant number is the *net* measurement, which includes inflows too. Our planet naturally both absorbs and releases C02 as part of the global carbon cycle, and both lands and oceans absorb more C02 thanhey release. In fact, the planet's land mass absorbs almost twice as much C02 as it did before the industrial age, and our oceans absorb about three times as much. This is because since the industrial revolution, we have opened up a steady tap that adds C02 to the atmosphere. Yes, the human addition is small compared to the one-way flows into and out of our land and oceans, but compared to the net flows, we have tipped the scale dangerously to one side.

Mr. Westfall's contemptuous query as to whether "we confuse ourselves with theories of carbon cycle feedback" argues an intellect unwilling or unable to understand the dynamics of the most serious threat to a livable environment on earth.

A close reading of chapter 6 of the IPCC Climate Change 2013 - The Physical Science Basis report, and the figure depicting the Earth's carbon cycle, flows and stocks inparticular, clearly-Shows the fallacy of Mr. Westfall's assertions. It is perhaps more understandable to refer to the unquestionable increase not the ppm (parts per million) of greenhouse gasses and C02 in the atmosphere since the beginning of the industrial age. That analysis gives the clearest and most understandable picture of clear and everincreasing concentrations over time.



On Saturday, June 3 from 9:30 am to 11:30 am, Geoff Smith and Otto Schaefer will lead a 2.5-mile hike on the Mattabesett Trail, home of the highest peak in North Branford at 720' (a 360' elevation gain). Follow a steep ravine through an old vine-yard and hemlock grove up to the high point, which is the junction of North Branford, Durham, and Guilford. On the way, you will see old border markers, pass intermittent streams and a waterfall and there will be at least one stream crossing. Due to the terrain, this hike is not recommended for young children. Bring water and wear sturdy hiking boots. Meet at 9:15 am at Stage Coach Rd, off of Route 17, in Durham. From Northford Center, go 4.1 miles north on Route 17. Turn right onto Stage Coach Rd, then go 300 yards to a sharp left turn. The trailhead is on the right at the turn. Please do not block the entrance for emergency vehicles. Park along the road wherever possible. (rain date June 4)

On Sunday, June 4, NBLCT members Hank Petroskey and Ted Groom will lead a two-hour leisurely family friendly and educational 1.5-mile walk on a hidden gem of trails located behind Stanley T. Williams and Totoket Valley Elementary School (TVES). See stonewalls, a brook, an old trough, and various types of trees on trails that were constructed in the 1970s. Meet at the playscape at TVES at 9:15.



"Not just a Coach A Mentor and a Friend

Dear Editor:

Our small town was knocked to its knees with the news that Floyd Parness passed away. You would be hard pressed to find one person in this town who didn't cross paths with him in one way or another and those interactions always left you with a smile. You couldn't help but be taken in by his quirky personality, his quiet demeanor and his zest for life. As adults, we were all left wondering "how could this happen" and we wrestled with the fact that he was so healthy, so fit, so full of life. It was hard for us adults to wrap our head around this. However, it very quickly and very clearly became evident that there was another more important thing for us adults to deal with...our children's emotions.

The student athletes of the track and cross country teams were rocked to their core. They loved Floyd not only as a coach, but as a mentor and a friend. He was their tireless cheerleader, their source of inspiration and the one person they continually looked to for guidance. Guidance on how to pick themselves up after a bad run, how to strive to be the best they could be, how to be a good team mate and maybe most importantly, how to be a good person. His athletes were left with broken hearts and a shattered vision of how life is supposed to be. As parents, we watched helplessly as they tried to deal with their grief.

We watched these kids, on their own, give action to their grief. As a team, they brought flowers to Floyd's house and they walked the cross country course laying flowers down along the way. They also decided they wanted to hold a candlelight vigil to honor Floyd. This was their way of giving voice to their feelings. Perhaps it was Floyd's gentle guiding ways that lead them to take these actions. We can surely know that the lessons Floyd taught them will guide them in the future as well.

As parents, we watched our children comfort each other. We also watched as their school community came together to help them. We would like to thank North Branford Superintendent Scott Schoonmaker, NBHS Principal Todd Stoeffler, NBHS Athletic Director Kory Kevorkian, NBHS Track Coach Brent Ramsey and all the NBHS teachers and staff. These educators knew our children were hurting and they supported them in every way possible. They allowed our children to have time and space to figure out how to cope with their loss. Also, we'd like to thank the entire Parness family. They attended the vigil, they listened to our children speak and they understood how much our children were hurting. At the funeral, they spoke about how important his "other kids" were to Floyd. In their own grief, they comforted our children. For that we will forever be grateful.

We pray for comfort and healing for Floyd's family and all those who were touched by him.

NB Plastic Film Recycling Program Update

The NB Solid/Hazardous Waste and Recycling Committee wants to bring you up to date on the progress the Town has made in recycling plastic film. Through the end of May, we have collected over 1,000 pounds of plastic film. That's the equivalent of 80,000 plastic shopping bags. Thank you all for making the program such a success.

We do need to discuss some items that cannot go into the collection totes around NB. Please do not place potato chip bags, candy bags, frozen food bags, or packaged salad bags. Unfortunately, these are not polyethylene plastic (number 2 and 4 recycle symbol) and are not part of the program. It can be a bit confusing, but placing these items in the collection totes, then requires the students and volunteers picking up the plastic film to sort through the bags of plastic film and remove the non-acceptable items. It is not only time consuming, but can be a bit messy at times, especially if any food residue is left behind. A good rule of thumb is if the plastic bag makes a noticeable crinkling sound when you squeeze it, it probably does not go in the bin. If you follow the list of items on the display posters where the collection bins are located, it will reduce the number of non-acceptable items. Thanks again for your cooperation and participation in this program.


