North Branford Rotary seeking Nominations for 2022 Community Service Award

The club is requesting nominations from individuals in town who know someone deserving of the Service Above Self Award. The award represents individuals in our community who actively help others, demonstrate meaningful humanitarian service, and have made an impact to the community as a result of their efforts. While volunteer efforts are preferred, recognition for paid employees for outstanding achievement for the benefit of the community will be considered. The club also welcomes posthumous nominations to be recognized.

The club recognized three distinguished North Branford residents last year. Judy Bannon, Laura Burich, and Victoria Lanza were presented with the Service Above Self award at the well-attended annual event.

Club President Melinda Fonda commented with, "Last year the club decided there's no better way to say thank you to distinguished individuals in our town than to recognize them with an award that symbolizes dedication, compassion and generosity. We intend to bring out the best of our community with these awards. I believe we were successful in achieving that last year and we look forward to doing it again this year."

The club will be holding the event this year on Thursday June 23, 2022 at the Mill Pond Tavern. Individual nominations can be made by going to the North Branford Rotary website or Facebook page where a nomination form can be submitted online. The form will ask for basic information of the individual being nominated and require specific details as to why the individual being nominated exemplifies Service Above Self in order to be considered for the award. The club asks to include specific details and be thorough in explaining times when the individual has displayed "Service Above Self." The deadline to submit a nomination is April 15th, 2022. So

NB Schools raise \$63,000 for Heart Association.

Collectively, PreK-5 students and families have raised over \$63,000 for the American Heart Association through the Kids Heart Challenge Program. Through this program, students worked in their community to spread awareness about leading a heart healthy lifestyle by spreading awareness about the benefits of regular exercise and physical activity. They also seek to fundraise for the American Heart Association to provide for research for heart surgery, heart transplants, and advancing the lives of those impacted with a variety of heart defects. Lastly, they attained individual and school recognitions for meeting personal, family and school physical activity challenges.

The success of this campaign in North Branford was made possible by our two physical education teachers. First, Dave Carpenter - PE Teacher at Totoket Valley Elementary School, has been successfully running the Kids Heart Challenge at his school for 14 years, and he has led efforts to raise over \$200,000 for the American Heart Association in that time.. *continued on page 4*





Budget Conversation About the State Budget is **Just Getting Started**



On the opening day of the 2022 legislative session, Gov. Lamont paid a customary visit to the House chamber to unveil his plan to adjust the second year of the two-year budget that was adopted last spring. His speech included this nugget:

"For decades, governor after governor has increased taxes and fees; in the land of steady

habits, it seemed inevitable. But, it was a habit I was hell-bent on breaking. For three years, we've held the line against broad-based tax increases."

It's a sentiment that the governor often expresses these days, giving the impression that he's played no role in the escalating cost of living here.

But Connecticut residents won't have to look back that far to find evidence to the contrary. The 2019 budget signed by Gov. Lamont carried \$1.9 billion in tax hikes, including a digital downloads tax, a levy on meals and beverages, a tax on parking, and a tax on dry cleaning. Of course, I could go on.

So, it would be hard to blame any taxpayer who watched the governor's speech—perhaps more accurately, campaign speech—with a dose of skepticism.

Naturally, the governor's top line talking points focus on tax relief. By now, you've no doubt read about a couple of his plans. With that in mind, I'll tell you about points you might not have read about. His proposed adjustment to the second year (FY23) of the two-year budget comes with a 2.4 percent increase, and it would be an 8 percent increase over the first year (FY22) of spending.

As concerning, the governor has proposed moving already-budgeted federal pandemic aid outside of the state budget, giving him more discretionary spending in an election year. On politics, the governor's plan includes some of his favored feel-good media staples—a \$42 million earned income tax enhancement, \$27 million for free museum passes, and \$5 million for free summer bus service.

As one newspaper headline framed it, "Lamont goes big with re-election budget."

Thankfully, his speech to members of the General Assembly was just the start of the conversation. As legislators, our primary task this session is to make budget those budget adjustments. I'll share more as the conversation picks up speed.

Hopefully, the net result will be a Connecticut that's a little more affordable.






Southern Regional Music Festival



KILL – A – WATT

Kill - A- Watt meters available to all North Branford and Northford residents. Measuring your electricity, where is your money going?

Kill – A – Watt meters are now available in both Smith and Atwater Library. Meters identify which items in your home are using the most amount of electricity as well as how much power is used per day, per month, or per year. Once you know the amount of power an item uses you can then determine how much that item costs you in dollars, per day, month, or year. Each meter checked out of the library will also come with the directions. The meter is simple to use. Plug the meter into a wall outlet, plug the appliance into the meter, press the purple button to display kilowatts. At the end of the day you will see a number on the display of the meter, multiply that number by your electric rate. You can find your electric rate on your electric bill.
